12,000 Employers To Send In Tax On State TUC Program

AUSTIN, Mar. 23 .- Contribution report forms for the Mar. 25 payment to the Texas Unemployment Compensation Commission were mailed to more than 12,000 employers this week, Chairmandirector Orville S. Carpenter an-

nounced today. This form-TUC 3-must be used by employers to pay their tax of one and eight-tenths per cent on total payrolls during January, 1937. Carpenter pointed out. The deadline for this first monthly payment under the Texas act is Mar. 25.

Carpenter also called attention to the fact that many employers are confusing this payment to the Texas Commission with the oldage benefits tax payment for Jan-uary which was made to the Fed-

eral Government on Feb. 28. "These two taxes are entirely separate," Carpenter declared. "The old age benefits tax for the month of January, 1937, was paid to the United States Bureau of Internal Revenue on Form SS-1 But the form which we mailed out this week-TUC 3-is for the tax due the Texas Commission for unemployment compensation.

"Both forms call for separate distinct taxes," Carpenter "Employers who employed or more persons during at ast 29 weeks in 1936 must file forms. Form SS-1 should been filed with the Bureau Internal Revenue by Fab. 28, Form TUC 3 must be filed th us by Mar. 25. However, if employer did not employ many as 8 persons during 20 weeks in 1936, then he has to report only to the Federal Govern-ment on Form SS-1."
