Cross Plains won the Rising Star Invitation meet Saturday afternoon, scoring 30 points, with Olden a close second with 28 points. Throughout the meet the two teams were running neck-and-neck for first place, with it being anyone's meet until the last events were run off.

Rising Star took third place with a total of 26 1-2, with Eastland fourth with 20 1-2. Other totals were Coleman 18, Cisco 11 1-4, Ranger 5, Moran 5, Williams 5, Anderson 5, Gorman 5.

Anderson of Olden was high point man of the meet, scoring 13 points.

Freak Bills Make Usual Appearance In the Legislature

AUSTIN.—Every legislative session has its freak bills and strange proposals. When the 60-day period for offering bills at the present session of the Texas Legislature expired it was found to be no exception.

Proposals included: Making dog-owners responsible for bites their pets inflict, at home as well as in public. Sponsor of the bill said it had been requested by the letter carriers of Texas.

Something ought to be done about cattle-theft, which still flourishes in Texas, another legislator urged. He would increase punishment for cattle, hog, sheep and goat thieving to prison sentences of from two to ten years.

Rep. Arthur Holland, Belton, thinks intoxicated motorists should be curbed before—not after—the accident. He would authorize peace officers to "remove from traffic" automobiles about to be driven by drunks.

A House committee refused to pass out a bill stepping up attacks on news photographers to aggravated assault. But it voted favorably on a bill to ban the carrying of blackjacks. Its author indignantly refused committee amendments to include razors. "That is what the negroes in my county always carry," several committee members complained.

Rep. Frank Mann, Houston, wrote 15 bills repealing an obsolete statute concerning wreckmasters, who once had a thriving business salvaging stranded sailing vessels.

A stolen bale of cotton looks just like a legitimate bale, and so Rep. Harry Graves, Georgetown, wants a law to require tags on bales to show their origin.

Almost everybody with a "plan" this session put in an old age pension clause. One would license bookie shops and give part of the revenue to the old people.

One of the last minute bills of the session was one to paint school buses red, white and blue. For safety, not patriotic, reasons.

Domino playing is something of a rite with Texans. Rep. Ben Sharpe, Paris, wants a \$15 tax on such tables. Every time the House goes out of session the press table becomes a domino table.

The dog situation has several solutions in a dither. They proposed: Empower the state health officer to quarantine rabid areas, require vaccination of all dogs over six months old, allow county local option on vaccination.

Rep. Ross Harbin, Prairie Hill, proposed a bill making it easier to obtain a divorce on grounds of insanity. Marriage to an insane spouse who has been in an institution five years is enough, he thinks.

Eastland Athlete Blasts Two Marks In Track Meeting

The Brown twins of Eastland, Delmer and Elmer, scored heavily in the college division and aided North Texas State Teachers College of Denton to win with a total of 65 1-2 points Saturday at the Fort Worth Southwestern Exposition track meet.

Delmer set two new records in the college division of the annual event. One was in the 100-yard dash, in which the Eastland boy won first by taking 1:10 of a second from the old mark of 9.8. Also he beat the old record of 23 feet 7 1-2 inches by jumping 23 feet and nine inches in the broad jump.

Elmer was second in the 100-yard dash. Delmer also tied the special 100-meter mark of 10.6 seconds.

In the university division of the meet Texas A. & M. won first. Woodrow Wilson of Dallas won first in the high school division and in the academy and prep school division Texas A. & M. scored another first.

INTEREST SHIFTS TO NEAR CADDO WHERE WELL TESTS AS 17 MILLION FT. GASSER

Interest of Eastland county operators was partially shifted from their own activities to Stephens county, where W. T. Garrett et al No. 1 1-2 wells, six miles north of Caddo, was tested for 17,000,000 cubic feet of gas.

The well of Garrett, a former Eastland operator, and his associates, 800 feet from the east line, 400 feet from the south line of the west half of section 10, S. P. R. R. survey, block 3, obtained the gas between 3,865 and 3,933 feet.

After testing the gas was killed to cement 5 3-16-inch casing, preparatory to drilling in. Ten miles northwest of Caddo, one gas well was recently completed and another is in the process of completion and is showing oil. Both are producing from the same pay.

Observers believed the strata is the same from which good wells are producing in south Young county, near South Bend.

The operation completed recently for 20,000,000 feet of gas north of Caddo, was Talbot et al No. 1 Kennedy. Being completed with approximately the same amount of gas and showing some oil is Talbot et al Kennedy No. 2, section 10, T. E. & L. survey.

A general drilling campaign in the east quarter of Stephens county for deeper horizons may result from the showings, say observers. Thirty-two hundred feet was the lesser depth for some production in the same area.

One mile north of Eastland, in Eastland county, States Oil corporation No. 1 Schnick, section 1, H. & T. C. survey, block 4, was drilling below 1,280 feet.

North of Rising Star, Anderson-Drewey No. 1 Kate Grist, in an area where the company has drilled five other wells, north of Rising Star, was drilling at 220 feet in section 36, Lavaca county.

12,000 Employers To Send In Tax On State TUC Program

AUSTIN, Mar. 25.—Contribution report forms for the Mar. 25 payment to the Texas Unemployment Compensation Commission were mailed to more than 12,000 employers this week. Chairman-director Orville S. Carpenter announced today.

This form—TUC 3—must be used by employers to pay their tax of one and eight-tenths per cent on total payrolls during January, 1937. Carpenter pointed out. The deadline for this first monthly payment under the Texas act is Mar. 25.

Carpenter also called attention to the fact that many employers are confusing this payment to the Texas Commission with the old-age benefits tax payment for January which was made to the Federal Government on Feb. 28.

"These two taxes are entirely separate," Carpenter declared. "The old age benefits tax for the month of January, 1937, was paid to the United States Bureau of Internal Revenue on Form SS-1. But the form which we mailed out this week—TUC 3—is for the tax due the Texas Commission for unemployment compensation."

"Both forms call for separate and distinct taxes," Carpenter said. "Employers who employed eight or more persons during at least 29 weeks in 1936 must file both forms. Form SS-1 should have been filed with the Bureau of Internal Revenue by Feb. 28, and Form TUC 3 must be filed with us by Mar. 25. However, if an employer did not employ as many as 8 persons during 20 weeks in 1936, then he has to report only to the Federal Government on Form SS-1."

Car owners of Eastland County have failed to respond to pleas of the Highway Planning Survey to provide information on which the highway programs of the future will be based, a tabulation of returns received to Wednesday disclosed. The number of car owners sending in information on cards received when they registered their vehicles is insufficient to provide an accurate picture of the road needs of this County.

The information which is being collected will be used by the Highway Department and the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads in planning the future construction and maintenance of roads and highways in this County and in this section of the State. Local motorists should be sufficiently interested in improving of the road system of this County to ask for these cards at the time they pay their license fees and should fill in the cards and mail them, because information collected by the Highway Planning Survey will be used in designating federal funds which soon will be spent on improving the secondary road system of Texas.

The cards on which this information is being collected are self-addressed and require no postage. The Highway Department and the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads have gone to considerable trouble in order to offer highway users the opportunity of helping to plan their own roads. Just as citizens were long ago given the right to vote, car owners are now being given a similar right and should take advantage of their opportunity. It is to the advantage of each County to return at least as high a percentage of these post cards to the Highway Department as are returned by its neighboring Counties.

W. T. Walton, superintendent of the Ranger public schools, announced today that a total of \$30.44 had been donated by the children of the Ranger schools to a fund to aid those in New London whose children were killed or injured in the blast last Thursday afternoon.

Announcement was made in the schools Friday of last week stating that donations of from one to five cents would be accepted and the fund forwarded to New London.

"One boy," Mr. Walton stated, "who works for his money, brought 20 cents from his savings, stating that he wanted to give that amount, which shows the spirit with which the students gave their money."

A tabulation made today of the money given shows that Cooper school donated \$5.14, Young school \$7.11, Hodges Oak Park \$9.40 and the high school \$8.88.

Drive Will Start To Complete Band Uniform Purchase

At a meeting of the band committee, held in the offices of the Chamber of Commerce Monday night, it was decided that a drive to raise the \$418 necessary to buy band uniforms would be conducted in Ranger Wednesday.

A committee composed of C. B. Pruet, chairman; A. N. Larson, A. J. Rutliff and S. P. Boon was appointed to take charge of the drive to raise the balance needed to buy the new uniforms.

Cards are being prepared, pledging the signer to donate each month over a period of six months toward the purchase of the uniforms, and committees will be named to solicit the funds needed.

OKEH SURVEY FOR DISTRICT LEON PROJECT

A detailed survey of the Leon River Flood Control District will be started in mid-April by state reclamation engineers, Board Chairman Frank Sparks announced, Monday.

Application for the survey was made by the flood control directors and Eastland city officials joined by E. State Senator W. B. Collier and representatives T. S. Ross and George Davison Jr.

The flood control district was created by the legislature for water conservation and irrigation purposes in 1935. It is composed of Eastland and Callahan counties.

Ultimate approval of the district, a subdivision of the Brazos River Conservation & Reclamation district, as a federal project is the goal of directors. Approval of the state reclamation engineers, headed by Ralph McMahon, is tantamount to pre-consideration of approval by the federal government.

Already one survey, lacking in information necessary for federal and state authorities, was made by the district with funds appropriated by the legislature.

In 1936 the Leon district was included in Congress' omnibus flood control bill, signed by the president, for preliminary survey by the federal government. However, no appropriation for the work was made, officials state.

Plans for the flood control district include construction of a dam in the Mangum vicinity, seven miles southwest of Eastland.

Three engineers are expected to perform the detailed state reclamation survey.

More Receiving Funds From R. A.

Four hundred and fifty persons this year have been granted loans averaging 1200 from the Resettlement Administration, Geo. I. Lane, county supervisor, said at Eastland.

The loans covered advancements for purchase of feed, seed, livestock and groceries.

Regular period for acceptance of applications over, Lane said his office now is only receiving emergency requests from old clients.

Loans this year are far advanced in comparison to 1936, said Lane, who pointed out only 310 received loans last year. The average for 1936, however, was higher because any farmers received money for purchase of teams and tools. The average then was \$320.

Description of the Eastland field and Ranger airport was included in a directory of the United States, a copy of which, published by the U. S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of Air Commerce, was received Saturday.

LONDON, Mar. 23.—At an exciting session of the non-intervention sub-committee today, the Soviet ambassador, Ivan Maiski, warned that Italy's attitude toward Spain's civil war "imperiled the peace of Europe."

The envoy addressed the other delegates after the Italian ambassador, Dino Grandi, had frankly announced Rome's refusal to discuss withdrawal of Italian volunteers from Spain at this time.

Drive Is Launched For Federal Bank

WASHINGTON, Mar. 23.—Rep. Wright Patman, Dem., Texas, launched a drive in the House today to mobilize Democratic support behind legislation for federal ownership of the 12 Federal Reserve banks.

Patman, advocate of currency inflation, as a recovery influence, sent a letter to the 331 members of the House asking support of his proposal. He asserted a steering committee could be appointed to muster state-by-state sentiment for the bill.

Pointing out that only the so-called "blue-darter" hawks are destructive, while other varieties are "friends of the farmers," the statement said that all birds identified in newspaper photographs of the Mart group are of the beneficial species.

THE boxing game is beginning to show signs of humanity.

First, a fund is created in Washington, D. C., to take care of fighters injured in the ring.

Now John B. Kelly, secretary of revenue for the state of Pennsylvania, says that he is going to sponsor a bill in the state legislature to provide creation of a pension fund for old, disabled boxers.

The next thing you know the managers are going to stop shouting they can't hurt

deserve either sympathy or a pension, you might say.

But it must be pointed out: that the boxers don't get the so-called purse in its entirety. They are most fortunate if they wind up with one-half of the purse. Frequently, there are poor, misguided fellows like Primo Carnera who find out that there have been more bond issues and stock issues on them than U. S. Steel, Pfd.

And, anyway, it must be remembered that the poor devils do take quite a thumping around the head and generally lose wint sense—and dollars, too—they had, if any, in short order. For its own sake, if not for the sake of the unfortunates, the boxing game should take care of these maiming miseries.

THE rest of the country would do well to follow the lead taken by Washington, which is a comparative newcomer to the boxing game since the racket was legalized there only a few years ago.

Once or twice a year the promoters, Joe Turner and Goldie Ahearn, stage a benefit program with 10 per cent of the gate receipts going to the fund. In addition to this, all passes carry a 10-cent tax, which helps swell the fund. And, to top it off, the fighters themselves contribute 1 per cent of their purses to the fund each week.

And so whenever a fighter is injured in a Washington ring—say, his eye badly cut, or jaw broken—and he is unable to box for some time and is unable to provide food or lodging or clothing for himself or his family, he need only inform the boxing commission's mercy committee and collect sufficient money each week to tide him over.

PERHAPS you will wonder what on earth a boxer needs with a pension fund when the papers are full each day of this or that plug-ugly getting some princely sum for 45 minutes, more or less, of scuffling. If they can't hold onto that money then they don't

"Time to call a halt," was the senate's answer. Collier will push a separate bill for relief of school districts where reduced property valuations make it impossible for them to maintain proper schools and meet bonds.

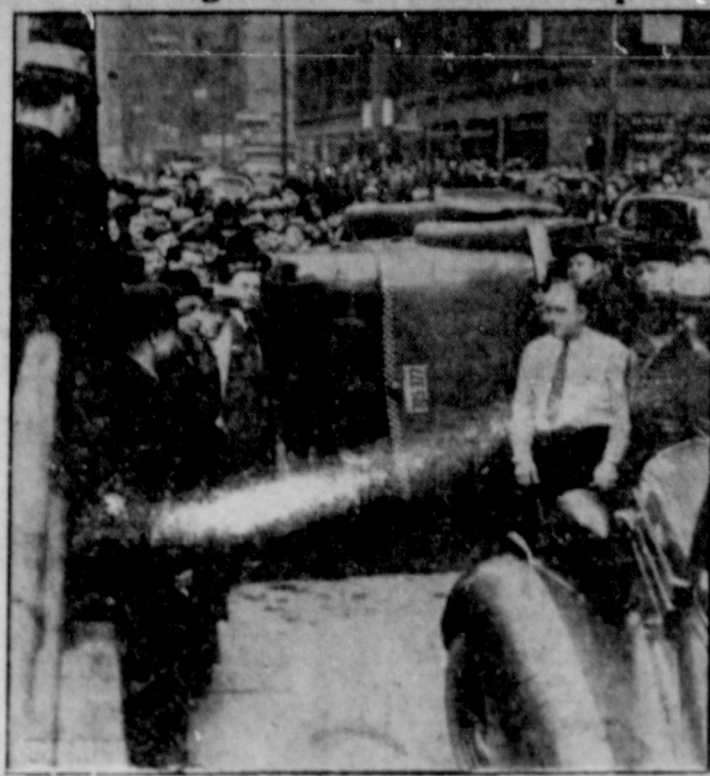

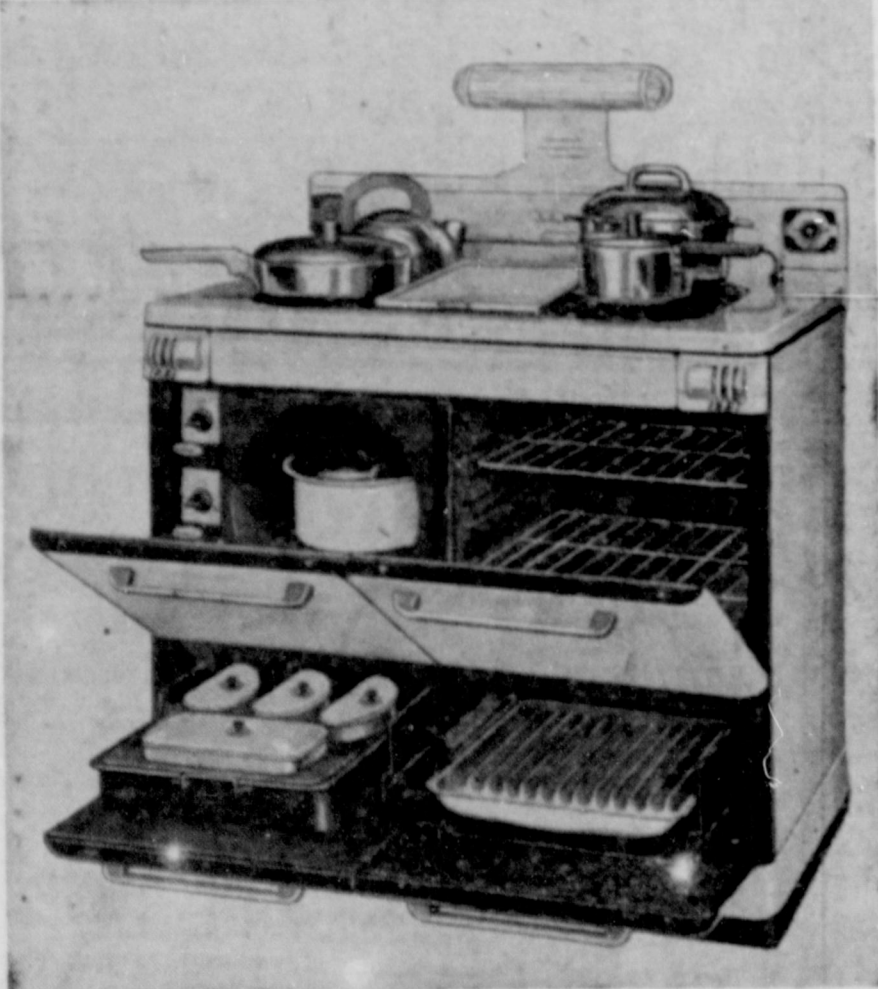

Medical Journal Says Aged Woman Reverts to Infancy

RICHMOND, Va.—A medical journal has produced a bizarre story of a 61-year-old woman whose mental growth was upset to such an extent by her husband's death that she reverted to adolescence, childhood, "babbling infancy," and died four years after her "second childhood" began.

Dr. Beverly R. Tucker, a psychiatrist, described the case in the Virginia Medical Monthly. The woman entered his sanitarium in 1931 when her children were in their early twenties. They had watched in amazement while their mother slid backwards in life.

Dr. Tucker described his patient as a strange, "childish" figure, hunched unnaturally in bed from a shortening of cords in her legs which gave her limbs the bows appearance of a baby's.

First signs of the regression, which he said was due entirely to psychological causes, occurred when her husband died and she, daughter of a "good southern family, became suddenly overwhelmed with a sense of responsibility toward her three children.

"She began to feel that she should be younger in order to understand her children and be more companionable with them," Dr. Tucker said. "So when the usual period of mourning was over she dressed and decorated herself as a young woman.

"She sought companionship of younger married couples and attempted to take up their activities."

This attempt to revert to her children's way of living apparently failed, he said, and the mother then started going out with them, adopted their friends and dressed like her daughter.

The children found themselves growing older as their mother grew "younger," he said, and she

discovered that she could not halt her regression and grow older with them.

"It was not long before she gave the children considerable anxiety," the physician continued. "They had to direct her goings and comings and try to persuade her to converse less flippantly.

"The mother continued to get younger at the rate of a year every few months."

When she entered his sanitarium, he said she was "a nice little girl in short dresses. She read simple things but rather badly; she craved attention; she talked childishly and pleasantly; she

would play with objects as if they were toys."

The woman did not respond to treatment. She continued backward in mental age finally reaching a "state of infancy."

"In several months she was in bed moving her hands and feet aimlessly often whining and cry-

ing like a very young child" Dr. Tucker said. "Her only articulation one could understand was her frequent calling for 'Mama.'"

"The patient would take a towel or any cloth roll it up and hug it

as if it were a rag doll. She now required liquid nourishment because she could not chew and soon she had to be fed liquids with a spoon taking them in with a sucking movement."

Later she returned to a hospital, an almost motionless figure "in the foetal posture, breathing gently." She died a few months later.

L. J. Plesner, third mate aboard the freighter Scottsburg, is the authority for that belief, for he abdicated from the throne of the Isle of Huahine.

"It was a soft life, as the French ruled the island, but let the natives have their own royalty as sort of a favor, Plesner said.

The Scottsburg's third mate, a heavyweight boxer when he went to Huahine in 1913, found the life too soft for his inclinations.

Plesner said he visited Huahine, a member of the Leeward Island group, after winning the boxing championship of Tahiti.

He defeated the best boxer the island, with a population of 7,000, had to offer before an audience which included the dowager queen and the princess.

"I met the royal family who were high type Polynesians," Plesner related, "and in a short time had won the princess, Tiane Veatua—which means Royal Flower."

Princess Tiane and Plesner shared the throne until 1914 when a dysentery epidemic hit the small island and many died, including

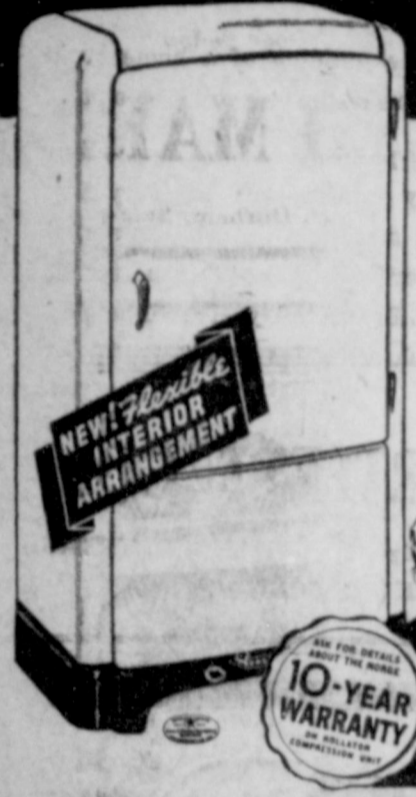

Origin of Tabasco Sauce Dates Back To Mexican War

In 1847 the United States and Mexico were at war. Toward the close of the year General Scott led his victorious troops into the City of Mexico. After peace was declared, and the soldiers from the north country had been ordered home, quite a few of the army followers remained in Mexico to seek their fortunes.

One of these men by the name of Gleason worked his way south from Mexico City and took up his residence in the state of Tabasco, where he found conditions to his liking. Later he decided to come back to the states, and in 1852 took ship at one of the gulf ports, landing in New Orleans. While

there, he was brought in contact with Mr. McIlhenny, a banker, and gave to him some pepper seeds which he stated would produce a pepper pod of especially fine flavor. These pepper seeds were planted by Mr. McIlhenny and, eventually, some of the plants were taken to Avery Island, Louisiana, near New Iberia, and there grown in the kitchen garden of Mr. McIlhenny's father-in-law, Judge Avery.

We now come to the War of the States, when the north and the south were engaged in a death struggle, which for the perpetuation of our great country, ended disastrously for the south. It was primarily due to the defeat of the southern cause that Tabasco sauce came into being. Due to the fact that both Judge Avery and Mr. McIlhenny took prominent parts in the southern cause, they were when General Banks captured southern Louisiana, banished from

the state, and with their families went across country by wagon train from south central Louisiana to south central Texas, where they remained until peace was declared.

After the war, these banished people returned to the old home plantation and found their sugar-houses, salt works and homes had been burned; their slaves liberated; and themselves impoverished. With their families and such of their old slaves who had remained faithfully on the plantation, the work of building a new home and fortune was begun.

Both Mr. McIlhenny and Judge Avery had been fond of the highly seasoned foods, peculiar to southern Louisiana, and, as on their return to the plantation, the funds with which to purchase other than the bare necessities were unavailable, Mr. McIlhenny began experimenting with the making of condiments and seasoning for the

family's use. Finding in the shrubbery growing about the place some bushes of pepper similar to those he had previously raised from seeds brought to him by Gleason, from Mexico, Mr. McIlhenny experimented in mixing a hot, pungent sauce from these peppers, which at once, due to its high flavor, met with the approval of his family and friends.

Among those who tried this sauce was General Hazard, who had been appointed federal administrator for South Louisiana. General Hazard became a warm friend of Mr. McIlhenny's and induced him to give him a number of bottles of this sauce so that he could take it north with him.

In 1867, General Hazard showed the sauce to his brother, E. C. Hazard of New York, who—at that time—was head of the largest wholesale grocery house in the United States. E. C. Hazard thought the sauce had such fine qualities that he persuaded Mr. McIlhenny to make and pack a small quantity and send to him by steamboat from New Orleans to New York, and to give him the agency for the distribution of the sauce in the north. All of this he accomplished, E. O. Hazard and company began the introduction of the McIlhenny Sauce.

When a name to designate the sauce became necessary, Mr. McIlhenny called it Tabasco; that being the name of the state in Mexico from which the seed of the pepper originally came.

This pepper, at that time and for many years thereafter, was not known as a distinct variety of pepper, but in 1886, Dr. Sturdevant, a botanist of Geneva, New York, described this pepper as a

new variety, calling it Tabasco pepper, and stating in his description that he had received the specimen from which the variety was described from Mr. E. McIlhenny of New Iberia, Louisiana. Dr. Sturdevant's original herbarium specimens, with description

SCHOOL HEAD IS QUESTIONED ABOUT BLAST

NEW LONDON, March 22.—William C. Shaw, 61, superintendent of the New London School, admitted before a military board of inquiry today that the gas which apparently exploded, killing 426 persons last Thursday, was taken without permission from the pipelines of a private company.

Just before he had completed his testimony, Shaw virtually collapsed. He was assisted from the witness chair to an anti-room, while additional witnesses were summoned.

This testimony was given after a 16-year-old survivor of the explosion sat before the court and showed that his hair had been singed in the blast.

The youth, John Dow, testified the explosion, accompanied by a flash of flames, came from the sub-basement when a manual training instructor threw an electric switch to a sanding machine. Shaw, his hands bandaged and wearing new spectacles to replace those broken in the explosion, admitted that the Parade Gas Company's natural gas pipeline, that passed under the campus of the school, was tapped without the company's permission.

Senate Defeats a Rural School Bill

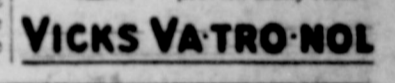
