Norris Case Stresses Tardiness of Justice

The Supreme Court did a number of things when it had that field day on decisions recently. One job which almost escaped attention in the rush of bigger things was its disposal of the case of Mr. George W. Norris, grocer, of Broken Bow, Neb.

The court's ruling in this case proved that it is possible, after all, to punish a man for perjury in this country-if you don't care how long it takes you or how much money

The fate of Norris as an individual is not particularly important. He was just a well-meaning man who was played for a sucker by the big boys and was left high and dry on a sandbar when the waters receded. First and foremost, it was his name that got him into trouble.

If you remember the case, you will recall that in the early summer of 1930 Nebraska's famous Senator George W. Nerris was running for renomination in the Republican primary. The party big-wigs, who had been keeping a rod in pickle for Senator Norris for many years, hit on one of those ultra-slick ways of beating him-too slick, as it

They hunted around until they dug up this innocent grocer, George W. Norris, and they persuaded him to file for the Senate. Thus, when the voter got to the polls, he would find two George W. Norrises on the ballot, and would have no earthly way of tellnig which was which. In that way Senator Norris' vote would be split and the "regvlar" candidate might slip in.

The people of Nebraska gagged at this bit of slickness, the state supreme court ruled Grocer Norris off the ballot, and Senator Norris went on to renomination and re-

Meanwhile the Senate campaign committee began investigating. It held hearings in Nebraska and summoned Grocer Norris as a witness. Norris first told the committee that he received no money from anybody for offering himself as the sacrificial lamb; later, he changed his story and admitted that he had been paid \$550.

For this he was indicted for perjury by a federal grand jury in June, 1931.

After long delay the case came to trial, and in the late fall of 1935 Grocer Norris was convicted of perjury, fined \$100, and sentenced to three months in jail. Nearly a year later an appellate court reversed the conviction and ordered a new trial. The government took the case to the U.S. Supreme Court-and now, nearly seven years after the offense was committed, the Supreme Court has sustained the conviction and ordered Grocer Norris to take his medicine.

This little case tells you much about the tricks of American politics; it tells you even more about American

criminal court procedure.

Perjury strikes at the very foundation stone of justice. If men can lie under oath and get away with it, the courts are crippled. Yet in an open and shut case, it took six and one half years to convict a man of lying and make the conviction stick!

GIRLS, LIQUOR, AND COLLEGE!

In 1936 1,350,000 girls enrolled in liquor-serving institutions against 439,640 to raroll in our colleges and universities, in 1934, the last year for which figures are available at the Bureau of Education, Interior Department.

The proportion of per capita expenditure for liquor as compared to that spent for education in the public elementary and high schools of the United States is three to one—three for liquor and one for education.

With repeal the per capita expenditure for education has steadily declined, while the per capita spent for liquor has steadily increased. Yet there are those who tell us we must have revenue from the sale of liquor to finance our schools. The greatest progress this nation has ever made in education was made during the years of prohibition.

In 1936 we spent \$5,000,000,000 for liquor, that is bottled in bond, we have no statistics on the amount of bootleg that was sold at the same time by liquor stores labeled as bottled in bond.

According to an impartial survey, \$10,000,000 was expended in liquor advertising in 85 of the principal cities of the United States the first year of repeal. A national advertising agency recently announced that a single distillery would increase its budget for advertising by \$1,500,000 during 1937.

Liquor and "Wreck-Creation"

The liquor traffic is emphasizing more than ever before that alcoholic beverages taken in moderation afford relief and enjoyment to the user, besides the recreation and entertainment provided by the retail dispenser of liquor in tavern, restaurant, road house and night club.

That the contribution of the liquor traffic to society is a menace rather than an aid to its happiness and wholesome entertainment is revealed in two facts:

GAMBLING

Since repeal, gambling has again become "big business" with an estimated cost to the American people of \$6,600,000,000 in the year 1935.

PROSTITUTION

An even more serious development the past four years has been the almost prairie-fire swiftness with which the scourge of prostitution has spread throughout the nation, especially in cities where the liquor traffic affords both equipment and encouragement.

Bascom Johnson of the American Social Hygiene Association, Commentator Magazine, March, 1937, page 49, says: "Since repeal of federal and state prohibition laws, the old alliance between prostitution and the saloon has been renewed with enthusiasm on both sides. The intoxicated man is easiest victim for a wily prostitute. . . .

"The latest available data on prostitution conditions indicate that during 1936 the downward trend continues... Of 25 cities in 19 states recently studied, nearly all are believed to have fost ground (in their fight against spread of commercial prostitution)."

"The Philippines is not a new market for the United States, but an already established going market,' valuable and capable of much expansion," he said.

"The Philippine market is probably the most profitable single market for American exporters. They might ship to Argentina, Brazil or other countries for volume of transactions, but sales there would be competitive with German, Japanese and other traders. In the Philippines, American exporters can sell for profit, due to the fact that they enjoy a protected market. American fines made money even during years of

He thought it important that the Philippines should learn soon whether their sugar trade with the United States is to be permanent or must eventually be liquidated. In the latter event he commented upon the necessity of allowing a fair period of readjust-ment in the islands to care for existing investments.

Weakness in the present Phllipines independence law, Elizalde believes, lies in the fact that the commonwealth lacks power to readjust its economy during the preparatory period before inde-pendence. "The commonwealth government," he said, "lacks powed to conclude treaties and agreements with other governments. 
