

Oceans Are Called A Weather Index

 LA JOLLA, Cal.—The weatherman of the future who hopes to escape blame if a sudden storm spells the family picnic or rains out a baseball game, will do well to search the depths of the ocean, instead of scanning the skies as is the practice today.

That is the conviction of Dr. Harald U. Sverdrup, director of the Scripps Institution of Oceanography here, whose studies have convinced him that deep down in the sea is to be found the secret of accurate long-range weather forecasting.

"Consider the atmosphere and the ocean as two huge machines," he said. "They are kept in operation by the sun, run with varying speeds, and one affects the other in their continual exchange of heat and water vapor."

"If in the future, after we have more complete knowledge of the surface and sub-surface currents in the ocean, we can show there is a lag between the machines, the key to indisputable weather predictions will be hours."

Dr. Sverdrup is convinced, he said, there is a strong inter-relationship between oceanography and meteorology.

"To prove that a certain change in the sea makes itself felt later in the atmosphere would be one of the most important scientific accomplishments of the generation," he added.

Seven years ago Dr. Sverdrup began his study of the mechanics

of the Pacific Ocean, and now he is convinced the contrast between the Pacific and the Atlantic is most discernible at extreme depths, rather than the surface.

"Below 1000 fathoms the Pacific really deserves its name," he said. "This very deep water is

moving so slowly it is practically at rest. In the Atlantic, contrarily swift currents extend to the very bottom.

"The reason for this is that while the Pacific is shut off on the north by the Aleutian Islands the Atlantic reaches sub-Arctic latitudes.

"At 78 degrees, North Latitude, the surface waters cool, sink to the bottom and flow away to create deep currents."

Dr. Sverdrup speaks with authority on Arctic conditions.

He was a member of the staff of the famed Norwegian exploration ship, Maud, which cruised the Arctic for six years, and when the vessel was ice-locked off the Siberian coast in 1919 and 1920 it was Dr. Sverdrup who made an ethnological study of the little known Nomadic tribes of that section.

He was the first white man to spend an entire season with the strange inhabitants of that seldom visited tundra.

Snake Takes Long Trip In Bananas

RUSTON, La.—A 30-inch baby boa constrictor, with a yen for travel, came to a bad end here.

The Nicaragua-born reptile embarked on a tour of the Western Hemisphere by attaching himself to a stalk of bananas. When the banana plantation harvested its crop, "Snaky" went with the banana stalk. He was stowed away on a fruit boat, shipped to New Orleans and then taken to Ruston aboard a produce truck.

The snake was discovered enjoying a snooze by R. C. Lyons, groceryman. Lyons promptly whacked the boa to pieces with a butcher knife.

Identification of "Snaky" was not established immediately. Dr. John R. Fowler, head of the zoology department at Louisiana Technological College, first expressed the opinion that the snake was a "bush-master," one of the most poisonous of all snakes.

Closer examination revealed the snake to be a young boa constrictor.

Dr. Fowler said that the snake probably had been with the stalk of bananas since it was cut on the plantation. Refrigeration under which the bananas were placed to prevent ripening too quickly, apparently had caused the snake to go into "hibernation," from which he aroused only after having hung in the higher temperature of the grocery store.

Campers Warned Of Outdoor Danger

AUSTIN, Tex.—As the summer season approaches, a word of warning is timely to prospective campers, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, summer vacationists, fishermen, and others who enjoy getting out into the open, relative to the possible dangers that may be encountered from the standpoint of contracting infection under the changed environment. This is especially true of diseases that may be transmitted through food and water supplies.

Typhoid fever is a disease the amount of which is greatest, as a rule, where there is the least sanitation. It is an unnecessary and preventable disease. It is spread from person to person by water, milk, fingers, flies and food. Every case is contracted by taking into the mouth some substance contaminated with typhoid organisms, and these occur only in nature in the bowel and bladder discharges of persons sick with typhoid or from carriers, persons who have had typhoid and who after recovery still harbor the germs in their systems.

Persons planning a vacation or trip where sanitation may not be rigidly enforced or where food handlers are not regularly examined should protect themselves against this disease by being vaccinated. Three inoculations with typhoid vaccine, a week apart, are

VAN DEVANTER ANNOUNCES HE IS RETIRING

Senate Judiciary Reports Unfavorable On Court Changes.

WASHINGTON, May 18.—The Senate judiciary committee, by a vote of 10 to 8, today approved an unfavorable report to the Senate on President Roosevelt's judiciary program.

The vote came three hours after announcement by conservative Justice Willis Van Devanter that he will retire from the court June 2.

The judiciary committee vote and the Van Devanter retirement, effective June 2, heightened indications Mr. Roosevelt's program is headed for compromise revision or outright defeat.

Senate supporters of the court plan, however, refused to concede the announcement of the dean of the court conservative group would have any effect on the outcome of the controversy.

The judiciary committee vote, announced by Sen. William Borah of Idaho, had been forecast in unofficial polls. Borah said the committee also voted to reject all compromise amendments.

It was admitted too early to determine the sweeping implications of Van Devanter's retirement. Mr. Roosevelt was represented, unofficially, as halting the retirement as making the score "one up and five to go," a phrase referring to the fact the President's program was designed to add six justices to the supreme court bench if members over 70 failed to retire.

The Van Devanter retirement gives Mr. Roosevelt one appointment. Because of the supreme court's frequent five-to-four decisions, appointment of a jurist sympathetic to the New Deal is expected to have wide effect on closely disputed issues.

The announcement of Van Devanter's intention was made in a note to President Roosevelt. Van Devanter, who celebrated his 78th birthday April 17, will quit the high post he has occupied since Jan. 3, 1911, on June 2, the day following the supreme court's final decision of this term.

Only Justice James Clark McReynolds has voted against more New Deal measures than Van Devanter. In 22 vital New Deal tests Van Devanter voted to condemn 13 Roosevelt enactments.

That is a suggestion by Mrs. J. L. Mims of Fort Worth, well-known conservationist. She suggested that the vacation begin sometime between April 19 and 26 because "that's when Texas wildflowers are blooming their most gorgeous colors."

Mrs. Mims also suggested that somebody open a "pilgrimage bureau" to direct visitors—and natives—to the places where flowers are most beautiful. Most persons seeking the sites of beautiful wildflowers fail to go to the right places, she said.

Oh yes—there was an added suggestion regarding the two-week spring vacation for school children to enjoy "Texas in bloom." The two weeks would be added on the regular term before it ended for the summer!

AMENDMENT TO RETURN FEE SYSTEM URGED

AUSTIN, May 18.—Submission of a constitutional amendment allowing the state legislature to prescribe a uniform basis for paying district, county and precinct officers, was voted today by the House of Representatives.

The amendment would allow the legislature to restore the old fee system, abolished by constitutional amendment. Governor Allred told legislators this morning the fee system was better than the salary system, adopted as a "reform."

The fee system was denounced by a Senate investigating committee several years ago. Its reports led to filing of numerous charges against Texas sheriffs and an attempt to impeach one judge.

Allred's message said: "I cannot too earnestly urge you to suspend all rules and submit this proposed amendment to a vote of the people. I think the abolition of the fee system, with all its faults, was one of the biggest mistakes we have ever made. The cost to the state under the salary amendment is 70 per cent over what it was and it is absolutely bankrupting the counties. I voted to abolish the fee system, but I must confess error. It has not only proved a costly financial failure, but has utter failed to produce as good a type of service as we had under the old system."

Scotland Yard Is Seeking Women to Serve On Police

LONDON.—Scotland Yard once more is advertising for women police.

Although applications have been pouring in from all types of women, including university graduates, most of these have been discouraged by the stiff requirements.

A woman candidate for the Metropolitan Police Force must be a paragon of virtue, intellect and beauty.

The qualities she must possess include a sound heart and lungs, good sight, hearing and speech, fine teeth, clear complexion, free from all physical defects, an alert mind, grace of character and disposition, with emphasis on cleanliness, tolerance and sense of humor, and the ability to wear well any type of clothes from rough country tweed to the most elaborate evening dresses.

Educational Aid Measure Passed In The Texas House

AUSTIN, May 18.—The House of Representatives moved swiftly today and passed the educational appropriation bill, next to last of the five major money measures. Only appropriation bill remaining is the rural school aid measure. The education bill must go back to the Senate.

Appropriation for the fiscal year 1938-1939 for state supported colleges and universities, as approved by the House, is \$14,785,563.

Big Pecan Crop For Texas Forecast

GONZALES, Texas.—C. Pape, pecan orchardist of Monthalia, has predicted a bumper crop in Texas this year.

He based the forecast on the small crop harvest last year, plenty of moisture last year, early blooming and the fact that trees are loaded with small pecans.

"The wet year last year gave the trees an opportunity for strong growth, especially for the improved varieties," he said. "Last year there were comparatively few blossoms."

Midwives' School Has Been Formed

SAN ANTONIO, Texas.—A school for midwives was established recently by the San Antonio Health Department as a guard against still births and miscarriages.

Instruction is given more than 100 women once a week. Dr. W. A. King, city health officer, explained that most of the midwives were Mexicans among whom still births and miscarriages were becoming more numerous.

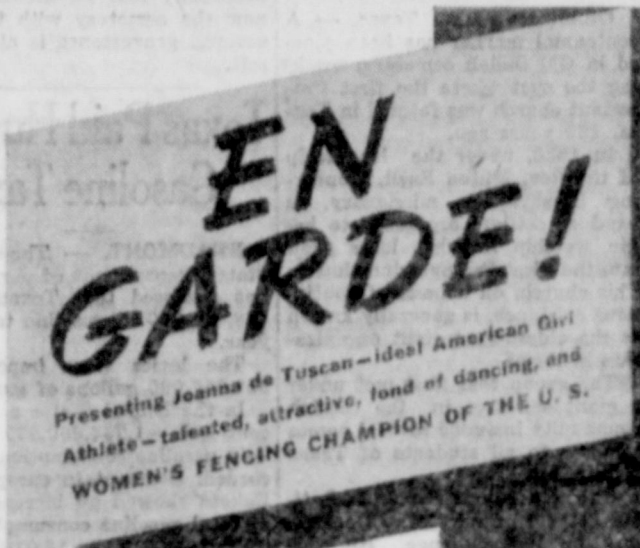

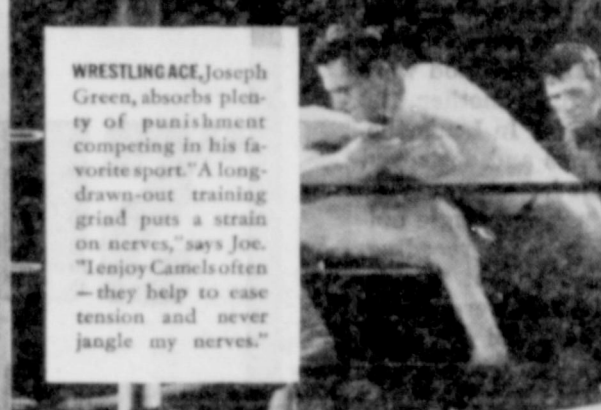

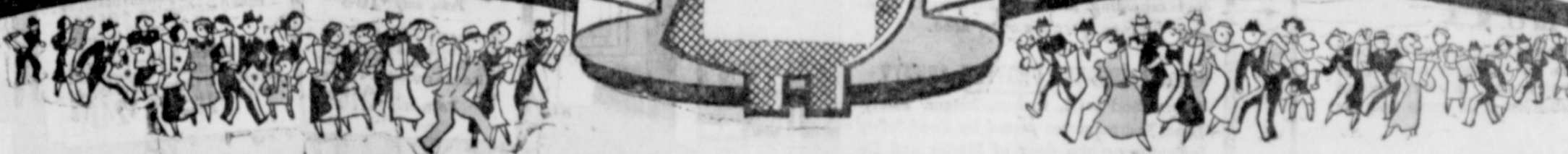

'Swollen Bureaucracy' Does Have Its Uses
The federal bureaucracy is a fearful thing, as everybody knows. It is a swollen organization of political appointees, engaged in officious meddling, which consumes the taxpayer's substance and straddles the neck of Uncle Sam like the Old Man of the Sea.

As soon as the waters started rising, inspectors for this branch of the bureaucracy started down the great river valley. They had a thousand-mile beat to cover, from Marjatta, O., to Cairo, Ill., and their object was to destroy all fruits, vegetables, medicines, flour, and other foodstuffs that were contaminated by the flood waters.

This was tough on the local storekeepers, manufacturers, and wholesalers. Most of them co-operated without a whimper, though, and those who whimpered had to co-operate anyway. The inspectors were thorough and unyielding.

In one town, 200 carloads of flood-damaged food were hauled off to a stone quarry and destroyed. In another, 120 tons of water-soaked coffee were destroyed. In Louisville, the inspectors went through 95 drug stores and destroyed all commodities that the water had touched.

And the result of all this was that not one single epidemic occurred while the flood waters were receding. Typhoid, dysentery, and the other maladies that "inevitably" take their toll after a flood disaster were distinguished by their absence. The bureaucracy had got there ahead of them.

It is interesting to measure this activity against the standards of, say, 50 years ago.

At that time no one would have dreamed that it might be a proper function of the federal government to keep flood-polluted foods and medicines away from the people. It would have been argued—if anyone had been visionary enough to raise the point—that those things were best left to local management.

To have urged that Uncle Sam keep a staff of trained men on the payroll to snoop around the shelves of the corner grocery store would have qualified a man for immediate admittance to the booby hatch.

WASHINGTON.—Rex, a bright eyed pup with an affectionate muzzle for friend and enemy alike and a tail which would not stop wagging, has achieved the distinction of being the first dog to influence congressional legislation.

When Rex marched sedately down the marble halls of the House office building at the heels of his master, six congressmen, headed by Rep. Alfred L. Bulwinkle, D. N. Officially that was the end of the hearing. Really it was just the beginning. Dr. Claus unhooked Rex's leash and Rex bounded immediately to the head of the table. He licked Bulwinkle's hand. He strained upward and licked the congressman's chin.

As Bulwinkle put it, and as his conferees on the Interstate Commerce subcommittee agreed, no such legislation as that proposed by Rep. M. F. Smith, D. Wash., was necessary. They said the railroads would be glad to accommodate the dogs of blind men without being forced to do so by law.

Bulwinkle's frown long since had changed to a grin. Now it turned to a laugh as Rex frolicked around the room and pawed the knee of almost every man in it. Finally chairman Bulwinkle called his daughter in from the next office and introduced her to Rex.

Rex, and Rex alone, caused them to change their minds. Here is how:

Rex politely gave her his paw. By then the congressmen were smiling almost until tears were in their eyes. Rex returned to Dr. Claus and placed his head gently on his master's knee, while congressman Bulwinkle announced to the press:

His master was Dr. Harry P. Claus, distinguished young consultant-engineer, who lost his eyesight in a plane crash three years ago, and who was the first witness to appear in favor of the bill. Rex sat quietly at his feet.

"Gentlemen, we have changed our minds. (thump, thump, thump, went Rex's tail), you may rest assured that this committee will report the bill favorably."

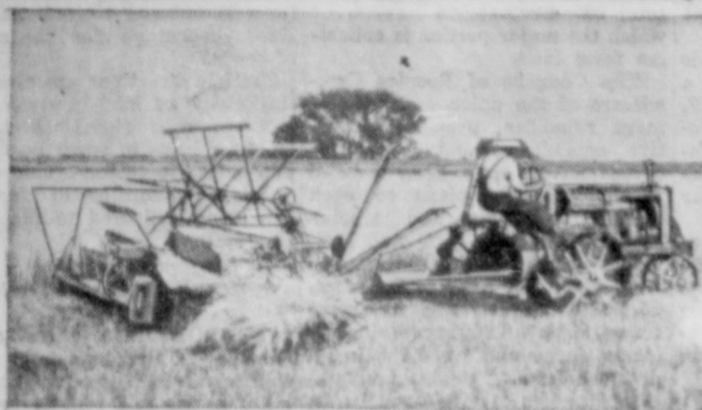
