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Spain's Fascist Trial Leads Only Downward

Someone once remarked that the true measure of a civilization is the way it treats the helpless—racial minorities, paupers, children, and others who are forever at society's mercy.

If that is true, then what we are seeing in Europe is the rise of a civilization which is down somewhere on the level of that of Attila the Hun.

Making all due allowances for propaganda and inaccurate reporting, it is impossible to read the dispatches from Spain without feeling that Fascism—as revealed by its method of making war—is nothing less than a throw-back to those dark ages in human history which we had hoped were forever behind us.

Read the accounts of the evacuation of helpless children from Bilbao—and try to remain unmoved.

"The rebel government had refused angrily to grant safe conduct to the children," says a United Press dispatch, "asserting that evacuation of non-combatants would make Bilbao harder to capture."

If you will reflect for a moment on the philosophy implied by that refusal you will get a glimpse of something too dark and horrible for a decent society to put up with. The obvious, unmistakable implication is that these Fascist commanders are intentionally striking at their enemies through the bodies of children—striking at them that way on the theory that, unable to endure the sight of murdered children, their enemies eventually will lose the will to go fight.

This is borne out by past performances. The assault on Guernica, where military objectives went untouched while airplane squadrons bombed and machine-gunned helpless noncombatants penned up in a burning city; the repeated shelling and bombing of Madrid, where thousands of noncombatants have been slain for no military advantage whatsoever—these things prove beyond the shadow of a doubt that Fascism, when it fights, strikes down the weak and helpless, wilfully and by design.

What are we to make of this? What, except that Fascism simply represents an utter collapse of everything that we understand by the word civilization?

This does not mean that we must at once "take sides" in this foreign war. It does not mean that we must prepare to take up arms ourselves to destroy this lower form of civilization. We have had one experience in the matter of "making the world safe for democracy" by force, and it ought to be enough.

But it does mean that we must recognize facts. We must know this thing, Fascism, for what it is—for what it has convicted itself of—and understand, once and for all, that no matter how had a fix civilization may get itself into, the road blazed by the Fascists in Spain can lead nowhere except downward to something worse.

Knight was champion cowboy in the 1936 show here and tied for second place in 1937. A local founder signed the pledge after wandering by mistake into a surrealist exhibit.

'SECOND DILLINGER' TO GET REPLICA OF GANGSTER'S DEATH, POLICE HOPE

BY NEA SERVICE LOGANSPORT, Ind.—Indiana state police, ranging central Indiana in a frantic search for Al Brady, who deliberately seeks to duplicate John Dillinger's career in banditry, are determined to oblige him by providing an exact replica of Dillinger's ending.

Up to now, Brady has done an amazing job of fitting himself to the title of "The New Dillinger." The parallels are striking. Brady was an Indiana farm hand, like Dillinger. The farm bored him, and he stole an auto. That put him in the state reformatory, just as Dillinger went there for breaking into a store.

Brady, in the early months of 1936, recruited himself a "gang" in an Indianapolis poolroom and started out deliberately on a career that "would make Dillinger look like a hick."

Terrorized Same Town They began the same type of roving bank and jewelry store robberies as the Dillinger gang. They even turned to the same town, Lima, O., where Dillinger was liberated from jail when his thugs cold-bloodedly killed Sheriff Jess Sawyer. The Brady gang robbed a jewelry store there.

Elmer Martin, one of the Brady boys, was shot in the escape from the Lima robbery. The group rushed to Indianapolis and demanded treatment of Dr. E. E. Rose, much as the Dillingers had done several times. Someone tipped police, who surrounded the doctor's house. The Brady thugs shot their way to freedom, leaving

Sergeant Richard Rivers dead as they fled the scene.

Now there was murder on their hands, and like Dillinger, they felt the desperation of men in the shadow of the electric chair.

Jail Break Similar But Chicago police captured Brady promptly when he ventured there to dispose of some of his jewelry-store loot. It looked as though the three-month attempt

to emulate Dillinger was washed up. James Dalhove, another of Brady's gang, was seized the next day, and several of the fences who had helped dispose of the gang's loot were also caught and promptly charged with larceny of receiving stolen property, some \$50,000 of which was recovered.

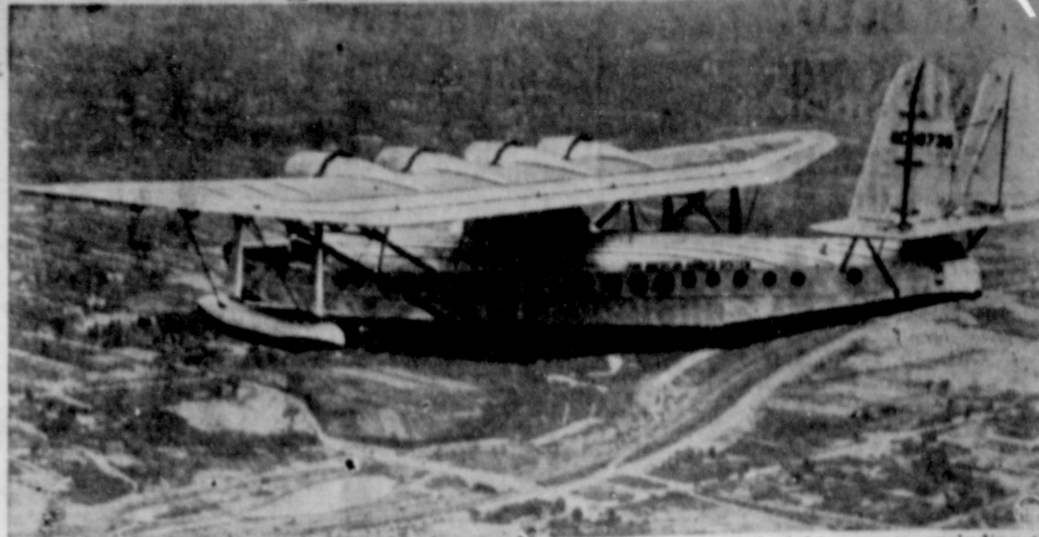

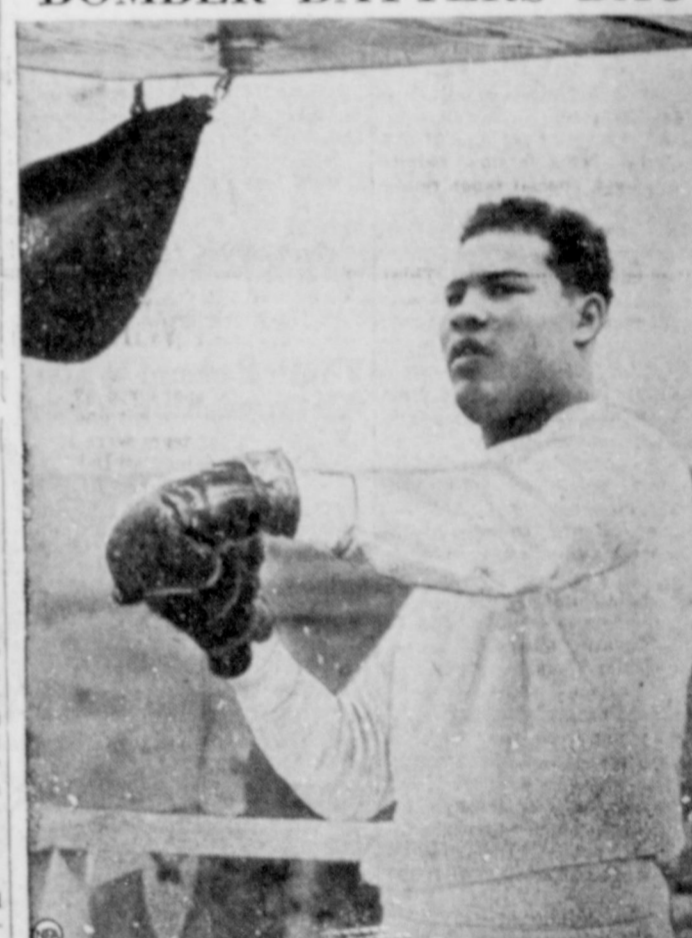

U. S. TO ALLOT SHIP SUBSIDIES OF 450 MILLION

WASHINGTON—Chairman Joseph P. Kennedy of the U. S. Maritime Commission believes that the new Federal agency will be able to settle claims for \$450,000,000 by American shipping lines by June 30 without need for requesting further funds from the treasury.

Kennedy said the commission, by a series of negotiations with the heads of the shipping companies, had entered into arrangements to pay off the claims which arise from cancellation of mail contracts under the 1936 Merchant Marine Act.

The contracts will be replaced with the new operating differential subsidies formulated under the law. Kennedy said he expected a large part of the settlement would be effected by substitution of subsidy allotments.

"One thing is certain," the former Securities and Exchange Commission chairman said, "with the money we now have we will be able to put up sufficient cash. We are conducting an audit of our books now."

Kennedy, who was instrumental in starting the machinery of New Deal securities regulation, was drafted from private business again by President Roosevelt to initiate sweeping reforms in maritime administration. He has until July 1 to substitute the complex subsidy structure for existing ocean mail contracts.

The tall, broad-shouldered business man outlined the objectives of his drive to give American shipping a "shot in the arm." They included:

1—Study of present trade routes with a view to realigning them to "stress those which will do this country the most good and under which the steamship lines will best prosper."

2—Through analysis of the condition of the American merchant marine with accent upon its financial status and its possible use as a military auxiliary in times of war.

3—Study of labor conditions in American shipyards and merchant crews in order to adjust subsidy bases to foreign living scales.

4—Examination of the powers of the commission in settlement of labor strife. This is now being conducted by a special labor relations department recently created by Kennedy.

5—Analysis of commission authority over air commerce. This will be included in a report to the next Congress and will cover both heavier-than-air and dirigible transportation.

Kennedy indicated that the commission at some future date "might" request Congress to enact legislation giving it authority over maritime labor similar to that enjoyed by the National Mediation Board over carrier workers, under the Railway Labor Act.

"The whole thing is a vast job," he said, "larger than any I ever had in private business. The time limitation makes it tough. The law provides that we can't handle any mail pay after June 30. If we don't do something—and do it fast—we are all washed up."

"The major shippers have been in to see me in conferences every day for the past several weeks. Our own staff is working day and night."

"I have no intimation yet as to how we will proceed in the future or what recommendations we may make to Congress. My ideas change constantly. One thing is sure—we have to learn to swim—just a few strokes at a time—before we can make any predictions."

Human Ears Will Be Imported By Chinese Scientist

WASHINGTON—The Bureau of Customs has authorized importation of a half a dozen human ears from China.

This meant no relaxation of the immigration laws. The owners can't come along with their ears. They must remain in China while their carefully wrapped and refrigerated ears make the long journey to Indianapolis, Ind.

There they will be used by a pharmaceutical house for experiments in plastic surgery technique, as developed by a Chinese servant. He said he needed six ears of his countrymen to continue his work. He also arranged to get the ears. The customs bureau never did learn how.

Whether these ears still are being worn, or whether they already have been unattached and packed for shipment, is something else the customs bureau didn't discover. The bureau is a little weary of the ear problem. It has had an ear-full.

The questions were these: Is it legal to import three pairs of Chinese ears without the usual Chinese joined thereto? If so, how much is the duty?

The collector of customs at San Francisco, to whom these inquiries went first, tugged at his own ear, but the longer he tugged the more confused he became. He couldn't classify ears as antiques, nor medicine, nor as household furnishings. He couldn't even call them hearing devices.

He was about to get an earache. He forwarded the query to Washington, which wrote to Indianapolis for more information about ears. The reply told how the Chinese physician needed them and about how they were to be used for legitimate experimentation.

The customs bureau phoned Dr. Thomas Parran, chief of the Bureau of Public Health, and asked him if he had any objections to six Chinese ears (minus Chinese) being imported. He said he didn't.

Then the bureau called the postoffice. "Yeah, ears," replied the customs bureau cheerily. "Chinese ears. Any objections to them being imported?"

The Postoffice Department said it didn't mind, either, but by all the ears in China, it was not going to carry any ears in the mails. It said it guessed the importer would have to figure out

Historical Precedent Shows Justices Appointed To Supreme Court Have Habit of Crossing President

WASHINGTON. — President Roosevelt will have little assurance that whomever he picks to succeed Justice Willis Van Devanter when the latter retires from the Supreme Court bench will follow his ideas, a survey of historical precedents reveals.

From the time of Thomas Jefferson to the days of President Hoover, supreme court appointees have had the habit of "walking out" on the ideas of the chief executive who named them.

Four members of the present bench developed, in the atmosphere of the high court, tendencies hardly expected at the time they were named to office. They are Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes, and Justices Owen J. Roberts, Harlan F. Stone and James C. McReynolds.

In Jefferson's administration, William Johnson, whose ideas were believed to approximate those of his President, was named to the bench. Much to Jefferson's chagrin, Johnson was one of those who voted to condemn the embargo laws enacted under Jefferson.

Later, in the administration of President Theodore Roosevelt, Oliver Wendell Holmes, Chief Justice of the Massachusetts supreme judicial bench, was named to the court.

Holmes sat on the bench nearly 30 years and is hailed as one of the most important contributors to legal history and progressive judicial opinion. But one of his first decisions was against his chief executive in the Northern Securities case, involving questions of "trustbusting" dear to the earlier Roosevelt.

Hughes took office only after the Senate, forgetful of his rise to political fame as a liberal reformer in New York State, was torn asunder over his confirmation. Liberals of that body opposed him as a "corporation lawyer."

Hughes on the bench has been responsible for the liberal majority in cases involving five to four decisions. On humanitarian questions particularly, and often on economic questions, he votes with the liberals.

Roberts, on the other hand, was hailed as having decided liberal tendencies when named to the vacancy which Judge John J. Parker of North Carolina failed to get. Roberts since has indicated that he leans less to the liberal side than Hughes, while Parker has since become known as a very liberal judge.

McReynolds was regarded as having liberal tendencies when named to the bench by President Wilson. One of his first votes was against the removal of a postmaster by Wilson. In recent years he has become more and more noted as a conservative than any other justice.

Stone, schoolmate of President Coolidge, who appointed him, and medicine ball companion of President Hoover, has been the greatest surprise of all. He is the most energetic of the court's three regular liberals. He often writes the dissents in which Brandeis and Cardozo join.

Can You Swim? If Not Read How It Can Be Done

There is nothing hard or difficult about learning to swim. There are some things that you must understand and take into consideration, and when this is done you will find the learning easy.

The first thing that you must know is that the fear of water is a natural thing. It is an instinctive thing. We are born with it, and if we do not have it, or have not had it there is something unusual. It is nothing to be ashamed of. It is just as natural as the fear of high places, the fear of caves, or close places, or any of the other natural fears. They are protective instincts.

The fear of water is a smothering fear. A beginner in swimming feels if he should jump or fall into deep water, he would go to the bottom and the water would hold him down and smother him. Now, strange to say, this is not actually the case. The average person when fully submerged floats in the water. Only one in about every hundred people can hold their breath and sing to the bottom in deep or shallow water, but a beginner does not know this. Now, a person cannot float with his head above the water. A full half of the head must be submerged and to do this we must stop the breathing process, which is automatic. We must also learn to keep the water from entering the nose, and become accustomed to the water pressure on the chest and ears.

Another big factor in the learning of water ways is that when we are floating in the water we are in a flexible medium and we must learn to balance in it. To the unskilled persons floating in the water a movement of an arm or leg will cause the body to move in the direction of its long axis, and you can go down as well as in any other direction, depending on the body position at that time.

The finest thing in learning to swim is to replace the fear of the water with confidence. This must be done by easy steps and some people can move faster in that direction than others, and remember you can enhance fear as well as remove it. The old system of throwing a person into the water has been discarded. It worked in some cases and in others it did not. You can remove the fear of water by learning to do the thing on which the fear is based. Simply learn to go under the water. Learn to do it by degrees and with comfort. In shallow water, where you can hold on to the pool sides if you desire, learn to completely submerge the head. Practice this until you can remain under the water with comfort and ease. The shallow end of a swimming pool is the best place. You can hold on to the sides and there are no currents to take you out to deeper places.

The second step is to learn to float. In waist deep water submerge the head completely and with your hands pull your knees to your chest. This is an easy floating position and is one from which you can easily and naturally regain your feet. When you can float in this manner with confidence, learn to float with the body fully extended face down, drawing up the knees to the first floating position when you get to your feet. Now you will find that while floating in a fully extended

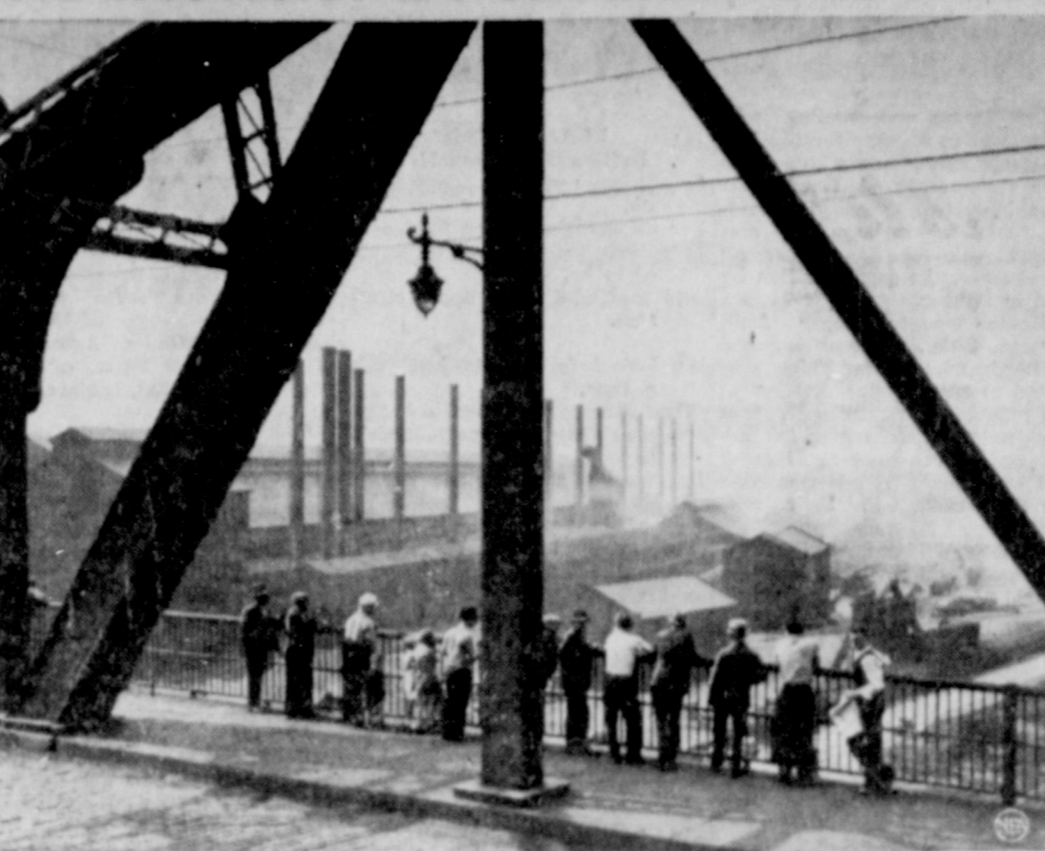

HIGH COURT IN RULING ON UTILITY CASES

The court ruled: 1. That it would not, as requested by the government, consider a lower court ruling which ordered the Tennessee Valley Authority to trial in an attack brought by the Tennessee Electric Power company.

2. That it would not, as requested by the government and the utility, hear the Electric Bond and Share company test of the utility holding company act until the circuit court of appeals has first heard the case.

3. That it would hear then, despite protests of the government, an appeal by two utility concerns, which denied their right to challenge constitutionality of PWA power loans to municipalities.

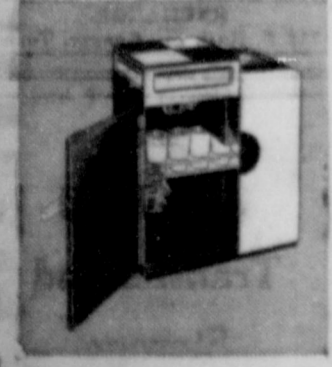
