



Evils End as People Want Them to End

The greatest cure for pessimism in this country is the fact that no part of the American scenery ever seems to stay put. Our social life flows into some pretty distressing forms every now and then, but it always remains fluid. Bad as things may get, they never get beyond the reach

It is interesting to find a striking example of this by looking back a few years at conditions in New York City.

That peculiarly American form of highly organized, commercialized and protected lawlessness which goes by I the name of "racket" was enjoying the high noon of its heyday, then. Every big city had its rackets, but in New York they had been elevated to the stature of big business. Nobody had ever seen anything like it, nobody had ever dreamed of anything like it, and hardly anybody was hope-I ful enough to suppose that anything could be done about

Bad as they were, the prohibition rackets were only part of the picture. Once-respectable labor unions had come under the control of gangsters. Almost every carrying and servicing trade imaginable was paying its regular tribute to the muscle men. There was protection for all of the big shots; the prosecuting machinery would not function, the alliance between politics and crime was airtight, the police department was effectively shackled, and people were beginning to accept racketeering as an unavoidable evil, like traffic congestion.

And the point is, not so much that things were very bad, but that there was not the slightest reason to hope That they would ever be bettered. SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

another batch of candy and cooky recipes and use them for making delightful gifts.

In the old, almost forgotten Christmas card Germany, in the land of "Holy Night," they used to show their Christmas good will by serving Pfeffernuess or German Peppernuts with fine wine when good friends come around to wish them "froehliche Weihnachten."

Pfeffernuess (German Peppernuts)

(Makes about 3 Quarts) One-quarter cup butter, 1-2 cup lard, 1-2 cup white sugar, 1-2 cup brown sugar, 1 1-2 cups maple syrup, 1-2 cup cold coffee, 6 cups flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1-4 teaspoon cloves, 1-4 teaspoon black pepper, 1-4 teaspoon cinnamon, 1-4 teaspoon allspice, 3-4 teaspoon anise seeds, 1-2 cup chopped Brazil nuts.

Cream shortenings and sugar.

Cream shortenings and sugar.
Add maple syrup and coffee. Sift flour, baking powder and spices together and add to liquid ingredients with nuts and anise seeds, working the last portion of the flour in with the hands if necessary. Cover and let ripen over night in refrigerator. When ready to bake, roll dough into long rolls, not more than 3-4 inch in diameter. Cut off in short bits, place or ungressed cooky sheet chocolate and rolls. sary. Cover and let ripen over night in refrigerator. When ready to bake, roll dough into long rolls, not more than 3-4 inch in diameter. Cut off in short bits, place on ungreased cooky sheet and bake 5 to 7 minutes in a moderately hot oven (400 degrees F.). These may be kept for a month or more, the flavor improving with age, when kept in a covered container.
