Every once in a while the erratic progress of city life torus up someone like that aged recluse who died in New York the other day, his apparent poverty contradicted by bank accounts totaling \$92,000.

Ham Butt With Sour Cream (4 to 6 servings)

Two pounds smoked ham butt, 1-2 cup clear vegetable stock, 2 tablespoons cider vinegar, 1 ta-blespoon heavy molasses, 1 cup

Soak ham butt in cold water for 2 hours. Dry carefully, and place in large baking dish. Mix vegetable stock, vinegar and molasses thoroughly, then pour over the meat in the baking dish. Cover and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 13.4 hours, basting with the molasses mixture every one-half hour. When ham butt is done, remove and slowly add sour cream to liquid. Stir over a low fire until blended, about 2 minutes. Then pour over the cooked ham butt. A roaming appetite will settle down to do things to a ham cooked with this gypsy recipe:

Gypsy Ham

(4 to 6 servings)

One and one-half pounds ham

Stank, 3-4 inch thick, 1 No. 3 can tomatoes, 1 teaspoon broken bay leaves finely crushed, 1 teaspoon sait, little black pepper, 1-4 teaspoon paprika, 1 tablespoon butter, 1-2 cup brown sugar, 2 small white onions.

In a saucepan, combine tomato, bay leaves, seasoning and butter. Break up the tomato pulp with a fork. Place the ham in hot, heavy skillet and sear on both sides. Cover with brown sugar and onion finely sliced. Pour a little of the tomato juice over the ham, but just enough to moisten the sugar. Pour the remaining tomator to around the ham, but not over it. Cover and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 1 hour. Baste only once. Remove ham to plater, boil the sauce quickly for 5 minutes to cook down a bif, and pour over the meat. 
