Man Hurt In Wreck Here Mon.

George Amador, 19, was injured seriously in a car-truck accident four miles east of Bovina on Highway 60 at 1:30 a.m. Monday, September 29.

Amador, of Friona, was driving a 1976 Ford travelling northeast on Highway 60 when he crossed the center stripe and hit a 1980 White Freightliner driven by Junior Houston Moore, 50, of Amarillo, who was travelling southwest, according to Jim Bishop, Department of Public Safety spokesman.

Moore was treated by the Bovina Ambulance personnel for minor cuts and Amador was taken to Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona for treatment and transferred to Hereford in very serious condition with internal bleeding, possible concussion and internal injuries.

Bookmobile Program Faces Termination

For several years a Bookmobile Program has been operated in the four County area comprising Bailey, Cochran, Lamb and Parmer Counties. The program has enjoyed public support during those years, and has, in general, been very successful. But it now appears that it will have to be phased out and terminated about the end of this year—principally for economic reasons.

The Commissioner's Courts have, informally and reluctantly, agreed that such action has become necessary.

In the past the participating counties have shared the operating expenses, with minor deviations, on a population basis. And the operation budget for 1981 would require combinations as follows: Bailey, \$6,095.25; Cochran, \$4,353.75; Lamb, \$10,594.12; and Parmer, \$7,981.88.

But recently the Lamb County Commissioner's Court voted to withdraw from the program entirely, and they did not include the Bookmobile in their 1981 county budget.

The other three counties then had to decide whether to continue the program on a three county basis, or terminate it. Because of fixed expenditures, such as salaries,

insurance, etc. the budget could not be reduced nearly enough to offset the loss of Lamb County's \$10,594.12 contribution.

Therefore, as accurately as we can project, to continue it would require additional contributions from the three counties of Bailey, \$3,428.01 for a total of \$9,523.26; Cochran, \$1,201.49 for a total of \$5,555.24; and Parmer, \$3,393.13 for a total of \$11,375.01.

It appeared to the counties that this is simply too much, especially since costs will probably continue to increase. Also counties are experiencing serious financial difficulties and in some cases are having to impose severe tax increases. And the courts just don't believe they can afford to assume additional

MSgt. Simmons Earns AF Airman's Medal

MSgt. Roger Simmons was awarded the Airman's Medal for heroism on September 12, 1979, in a ceremony, recently at Keesler AFB, Mississippi.

MSgt. Simmons distinguished himself by heroism involving voluntary risk of life on the night of September 12, 1979. On that night the Mississippi Gulf Coast was in imminent danger of being struck by Hurricane Fredric. After evacuating his family to another city for safety, MSgt. Simmons returned to Gulfport, Mississippi and worked through the night at the Orange Grove Volunteer Fire Department. After responding to a house fire at approximately 11:20 that night, the firemen returned to the station and learned that Harrison County Sheriff's deputies were trying to reach a woman who was in advanced labor and in serious trouble.

The deputies were unable to rescue the woman due to winds in excess of 110 MPH and torrential rains. All roads into the woman's home were blocked and telephone communications had been disrupted.

Although the firemen had been told to remain in their station due to the extremely dangerous conditions, MSgt. Simmons and three other volunteer firemen decided to try to rescue the woman.

Since all electricity and radio communications were out of order at this time, MSgt. Simmons walked approximately 3/4 of a mile through

the force of the hurricane, to the home of a Mississippi Highway Patrol Officer and asked him to relay by his car radio that the firemen were going to try to rescue the woman. This was done, and the firemen set out to clear the road.

By using two pickup trucks and a front-end loader, the men were able to clear the road successfully enough to enable a car to pass through. Upon reaching the Little Biloxi River, which was enroute to the woman's home, MSgt. Simmons had to walk each vehicle across the bridge due to the high water and unstable condition of the bridge.

After reaching the woman's home, MSgt. Simmons then accompanied the woman and her husband to an awaiting ambulance, which was blocked by a fallen tree, approximately eight miles away. After caring for the woman during the trip to the ambulance, MSgt. Simmons assisted in the transfer of the lady to the ambulance where the

baby, a healthy little girl, was born less than ten minutes later.

The Airman's Medal is the nation's ninth highest military award, and is the highest non-combat medal for bravery awarded. MSgt. Simmons' other decorations include the Meritorious Service Medal; Air Force Commendation Medal; Presidential Unit Citation; Outstanding Unit Award (Air Force); Air Force Good Conduct Medal; National Defense Ribbon; Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal; Vietnam Campaign Medal; Air Force Longevity Ribbon; Non-Commissioned Officer Professional Military Education Ribbon; Small Arms Expert Marksman; Vietnam Cross of Gallantry with Palm Leaf and Vietnam Service Medal.

MSgt. Simmons and his wife, Patricia, reside with their three children, Linda 12; Becky 9; and Kathy 4; at 511 Lynn Avenue, Rt. 12, Gulfport, Miss. Patricia is the granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. French Crook of Bovina.

A motion was made by Anthony, seconded by Tarter and approved unanimously that the following soil conservation work be approved and ratified:

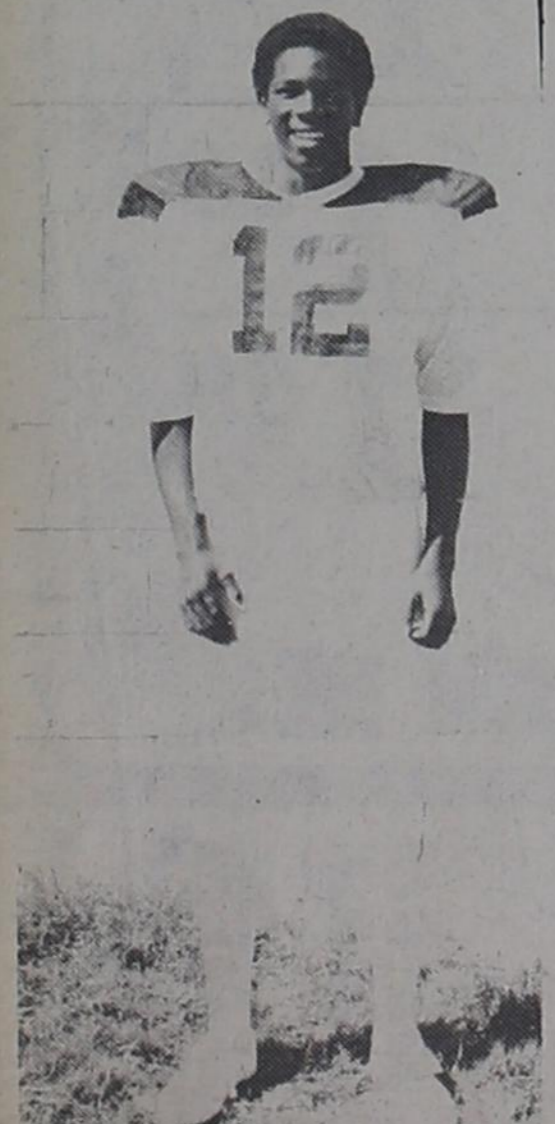

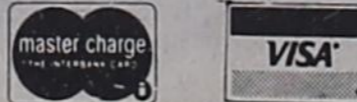
