She worked one day as a member of a mob in a Fox picture and two days in a Richard Dix picture at Paramount. Hal Roach then offered her a part in one of his comedies. She played in two-reelers at the Roach studio and signed a five year contract with that company.

In Kansas City her grandfather went to the movies one night. In addition to the feature there was a Roach comedy. He saw Jean for the first time on the screen wearing only a pair of lace black underthings. He immediately got in touch with his granddaughter and on the next day Jean asked for her release from the Roach contract. It was given to her.

Believing her career in pictures to be at an end she spent the next eight months doing nothing in particular. Then she decided to try her luck once more. She played with Clara Bow in "The Saturday Night Kid" and was given a second lead in a Christie picture.

At the Christie studio she met Ben Lyon and James Hall, who were making "Hell's Angels." They took her to the Caddo studio for a test and introduced her to Howard Hughes. As a result she was given the feminine lead in "Hell's Angels."

When she came under the management of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer she became a star with her first picture, "The Secret Six," released April 18, 1931. Toledo Board Has Settled 52 Disputes

TOLEDO—The Toledo Industrial Peace Board, established July 5, 1935, has mediated 52 labor disputes during the last year. Only 18 reached the strike stage, a survey reveals.

Nine thousand workers were affected by the controversies in which Director Edmund G. Ruffin, of the peace board, and his colleagues took a hand.

Settlement of even small disputes in many instances has saved

ed workers more than \$7,000 budget on which the board operates. Seventy-five other American cities have requested information about the Toledo plan for industrial peace. Many have created similar agencies.

The "Toledo Plan" was set up by Edward F. McGrady, assistant U. S. secretary of labor, who was called here in the summer of 1935 to aid in settling several strikes.

The peace board reports that 73 per cent of those who might have suffered loss of employment on account of strikes have been kept on the job through mediation efforts.

Oil Rises After Test Hits Sand Near Desdemona

Operators of the Hickey et al No. 1 W. M. Martin, two miles southeast of Desdemona, were reported Thursday to have set 6 1/2-inch casing at 2,835 feet in preparation for the completion of the test which hit what was declared the Desdemona pay sand at 2,835 feet.

Oil was reported to have risen 1,000 feet in the hole following penetration of a few inches into the sand. Drilling in will be by Monday, it was stated.

Since the well found the pay at what observers estimated nearly 70 feet higher than the pay in the old Desdemona pool, it was believed an extension of the pool had been registered or a new one found.

Approximately 1,000,000 cubic feet of gas was registered prior to striking the pay.

Location of the well is 530 feet from the north line, 165 feet from the west line of subdivision 5 in the D. J. Miller survey, Erath county.
