How Cities Test Water Supplies for Taste and Odor

NEW YORK. — Hundreds of cities in the United States now test their water supplies regularly for tastes and odors so that the water will be of satisfactory palatability when delivered to the taxpayers, reports the American Institute of Sanitation.

These tests are usually conducted by chemists or others in the water department and do not involve any highly developed factory powers. Any person, says the institute, who has a normal sense of smell and who has fairly keen powers of observation can become an expert water smeller with a little training.

To conduct a test of the palatability of any water, the tester must first have a bottle of odor-free water. This is obtained by allowing a large bottle of water with some activated carbon in it to stand for a time, conveniently overnight. After being deodorized the water is filtered off.

The tests are conducted by diluting the raw water with the odor-free water until the odor can-

not be detected. For example, if one ounce of water requires dilution with 10 ounces of odor-free water to make the odor disappear then the water is said to have an odor value of 10. If only five ounces are required for the dilution, then the water has a score of five. Many cities regard a score of three or under as satisfactory.

These standard tests are utilized to determine the amount of activated carbon that must be used to remove objectionable tastes and odors from municipal water supplies. Activated carbon is a remarkable purifier, about 100 times as powerful as charcoal. One pound of the substance, costing only a few cents, will remove the tastes and odors from about 100,000 gallons of water. More than 1,000 cities in the United States are using it to safeguard the palatability of their water.

Japan May Keep Mandated Isles

SAN FRANCISCO — Japan's intention to keep permanently its mandated islands in the Pacific have been manifested again by the financial organization of the New South Sea Co., to develop them, according to the Institute of Pacific Relations.

In the same manner that Formosa was developed by the Formosa Development Company, Jap-

an has proceeded to the organization and financing of the South Seas Company, which will colonize and develop the resources of the mandated islands.

The essential difference between the two enterprises, however, is the fact that under the Treaty of Versailles, Japan does not possess the islands. It was granted a mandate on all former German colony islands lying north of the Equator to be administered under the guidance of the League of Nations. Even the League mandates are not supposed to be permanent, much less than to confer the sovereignty of the territories in question on the mandatory power.

At the time Japan withdrew from the league it would ordinarily have forfeited the mandate, but Tokyo openly announced the intention of retaining the islands. Japan's next step was to proceed to colonization and development of the islands. Many of them lie near to Guam and other American island possessions in the Pacific and afford possibilities for naval and airplane bases.

The development company which has been organized for the mandated islands, according to the institute, will be capitalized at 20,000,000 yen, of which 10,546,000 yen will be furnished by the government and the remainder taken up by the people. This was the system employed in the development of Formosa.

The main industries to be developed are mining, forestry, fishing, shipping and agriculture. At the

start 1,500 families will be sent to the islands.

On Angua Island the company will undertake the development of phosphate ores. On Fuais Island, it is estimated that a production of 50,000 tons a year can be attained. Japan will emulate the United States experience in the Hawaiian Islands by endeavoring to create a pineapple industry, a special company having been organized for this purpose.

Still another subsidiary has been organized to further the fishing interests of Japanese industrialists.

Financial affairs of all the mandated islands which will be organized under what is known as the South Seas government.

Co-Ops Are Held As Non Injurious To Towns, Trade

Are cooperatives a threat to private business and injurious to financial interests of a city?

County Agent Elmo V. Cook, one of 16 men interested in the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, organization in forma-

In Amarillo a \$500,000 grain elevator was inspected. It is maintained by the Texas Wheat Growers Inc., affiliated with smaller elevators. Also inspected was the Consumers Cooperative Association retail store.

A 15-year-old creamery operated by the Plains Cooperative Creamery was visited at Plainview. At Lubbock the Plains Cooperative Gin was inspected.

Next on the itinerary was the state experiment station at Spur where soil conservation methods on field and pasture land were explained.

Most cooperatives in one town were at Quanah. Cooperatives were a filling station, lumber yard, feed store, farm implement store, grain elevator, all owned by the Farmers Cooperative Society of Quanah.

Indians Boast They Are Canoe Makers

TORONTO, Ont. — The art of building birch bark canoes is not lost. New evidence of its survival was provided by the launching recently of the big vessel to be used in the Indian production of "Hiawatha" at the Canadian National exhibition now in progress here. Nearly all the 650 Indians on the Garden River Ojibway reserve at Sault Ste. Marie were present for the launching, a colorful ceremony presided over by Chief Shawanoe.

Speaking in the Ojibway language the chief remarked that the canoe was probably the largest built on the reserve in more than half a century. He explained that birch bark canoes would be built at the Indian Village, which is being set up here under the direction of J. W. Curran. He assigned to skilled members of the tribe the manufacture of various Indian handicraft at the exhibition.

The last big regatta in which birch bark canoes were used ex-

clusively was held at Orillia, Canada, July 1, 1876, according to Chief Shawanoe. In general, such canoes are no longer built outside of Algoma and a few other Indian areas. For the last few years nails have been used by builders for the gunwales ("makwind," rim), instead of tamarac roots as formerly.

Chief Shawanoe had some remarks to make about words that have generally been considered Indian. "Canoe" is not an Ojibway word. It was originally picked by the Spaniards from the aborigines of the island of Haiti, who called the vessel "canoe." The French and English got it through the Spaniards. In the same way the words "tobacco" and "hammock" were taken from the Arawak Indians of Jamaica.

The chief explained that the Ojibway word for canoe is "jeemawm," usually spelled "cheemawm." It signifies a load carrying vessel on water, otherwise a boat. A steamship in Ojibway is "ishkoday jeemawm" or "fireboat." And a locomotive is a "fire sleigh" for the old Indians were not able to express the idea of a wheeled vehicle.
