### Bull Town Bulletins By Bill Ellis

BOWIE, TEXAS, has one of the most well-known and successful "Trades Day" programs of any place we know of.

My parents were from Montague County, and had told us for years about the event, which is known as "Second Monday" in the Bowie area.

When the swap-meet idea was started before the turn of the century, horses, mules and other farm livestock were the main item of exchange. Farmers would take their horses to the Second Monday event, and see if they could be successful in

"trading up." In the more than 80 years of the monthly sales spectacular, the field of merchandise has expanded to include almost anything which can be bought and sold. And, today's participants use cash instead of the original swapping idea.

Dogs have also been a big item at Bowie's Second Monday trade event. During the 1950s, it was not uncommon for the sale to draw as many as 600 hunting dogs, as owners from as far away as Oklahoma, Arkansas, New Mexico and Missouri congregated for the sale.

Bowie merchants have taken advantage of the tremendous crowds of people which are drawn into town by the monthly event, and schedule sales and promotions to lure some of the out-of-town customers.

Although our grandparents had participated in the event for years, and some of our relatives in that area still do, this past weekend was the first opportunity for us to get to see a Second Monday in operation. We were impressed.

It is true that the merchants have everything from soup to hay to offer to the bargain-seekers. Second Monday is sort of a giant garage sale. But it is more.

Yes, it could be described as a sprawling flea market. But it's much, much more.

You can get new or used clothing; farm tools, almost any type of farm animal, fruits, vegetables, antiques, hardware, books, knick-knacks--you name it, and they probably have it. The merchants display their wares in pickups, trucks, and on tables set up in rows at the sale location.

Bartering is still a major factor at Second Monday. We personally heard one customer open with "That's a nice looking hammer." The merchant replied "Yep. I've got it priced at \$6, but why don't you give me \$5 for it so I won't have to take it back home?" "Sold!" the buyer replied.

The biggest turnout at the sale is usually in August, September and October. They told us that the crowd, both of buyers and sellers, was much better for the October sale than it had been earlier in the year, probably due to the hot summer weather earlier.

Many of the merchants live in Bowie or nearby. Others come from far and near. They now arrive as early as Thursday and begin vollying for the best spots. Saturday and Sunday prior to the "Second Monday" are now the big days, and most of the sale is actually gone by Monday.

Food vendors have caught onto the act in recent years. Mobile hamburger joints now have sprung up among the vendors. People used to take a sack lunch, if they were manning a stand at the sale.

There were even a couple of carnival-type items for the young folks, including a Shetland pony ride. This keeps the small fry busy, and

creates yet another business prospect. We had been to two state fairs, one world's fair, a Major League all-star game, and to NFL football games. But after seeing Bowie's Second Monday in full-bloom, we decided that these other things were second-

That's a great thing the folks down there have going. Wish our towns had

something like it.





## City Gives New Rates

The City Council of the city of Bovina has established a new utility rate, which will be effective on the December 1 billing.

Water rate shall be a minimum of 4000 gallons at \$3.35 and 60° per thousand thereafter with no "irrigation rate." This is an increase of 30° per thousand with the minimum rate staying at \$3.35.

Sewer rate will be \$3 per month, an increase of 50° for residential and \$4 per month for businesses, an increase

of \$1. Trash rate shall be \$5 per month, an increase of \$2 for residential and \$6 per month for businesses, an

increase of \$2. Rates for members of the fire department shall remain at \$1 per

### Mail Service To Chad Suspended

The U.S. Postal Service announced recently that it is embargoing all mail to Chad in Central Africa due to a lack of transportation into the country.

The embargo means no mail for Chad will be accepted at any U.S. post office. Mail in the postal system bound for Chad will be returned to the sender. Refunds of postage for returned mail will be available.

The Postal Service advises customers that once the suspension is lifted and service is restored, they can cross off the endorsement "Postal Service temporarily suspended" on returned mail for which no postage has been refunded and re-enter it into the mails at no extra cost.

## M.C. Osborn Elected To Board

McFarland C. Osborn of Friona was recently re-elected to the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District board of directors on October 7. Osborn represents Zone 2 of the district.

The purpose of the Parmer S.W.C.D., with headquarters in Friona is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

## Sales Totals Given For Parmer Co.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday reported that gross sales in Texas during the first quarter of 1980 totaled \$60.9 billion.

He said first quarter sales this year passed 1979 first quarter sales by \$12.4 billion.

Bullock said the sales tax analysis of gross sales for January, February and March show that 250,681 outlets

reported gross sales.

The Comptroller's office also released a computer analysis showing reported sales for each of the state's 254 counties and a sales tax analysis broken down by the state's 25

Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas.

First quarter sales in 1980 for Harris County were \$15.9 billion as recorded by 40,987 reporting outlets compared to \$12.4 billion reported in the first quarter of 1979 by 41,727

Parmer County's gross sales for the quarter amounted to \$16,751,724.

Neighboring Bailey County, reported gross sales of \$19,025,539, and Castro County's sales for the same period were \$27,208,602.



## Food For Thought

By GERALD McCATHERN A recent presidential citation originating in the Department of Agriculture has many agriculture producers up in arms.

It seems that Howard Hjort (Yort), chief economist for the Department, has been awarded a cash bonus by the government of twenty thousand dollars for his contribution in changing the scope of the Department of Agriculture from an agriculture oriented to a consumer oriented branch of the government!

Farmers who have invaded the Washington scene for the past three years in an effort to change the "consumer-oriented" policies of the present administration, remember Mr. Hjort as the ever-present shadow of Secretary Bergland at House and Senate Agriculture hearings. When difficult questions were posed by members of the committees to the Secretary, he would always turn to Hjort who would tell him what to say. Consequently, farmers began referring to Hjort as "the ventriloquist" and to Bergland as "the dummy."

Apparently, Hjort was the mastermind of the 1977 Farm Act which established floor prices on all basic agriculture commodities at levels equal to less than 50 per cent of parity, and ceilings equal to approximately 65 per cent of parity. Farmers strongly disagreed with the economic philosophy of Mr. Hjort, and have had a running battle with him for the past three years.

The wording of the recent presidential citation, "Mr. Hjort has successfully made the shift in USDA policy from producer-oriented to consumer-oriented in policy and budgetary matters," has caused the rupture of a festering sore in the minds of the protesting farmers. They say this is proof-positive that the present administration has sold agriculture down the economic drain, and that they no longer have a forum in the Federal government. Some are even advising that the name of the Department of Agriculture be changed to the "Department of Consumer Affairs," to better describe the function of that department.

With only five weeks left before the presidential elections, this could be the most costly twenty thousand dollars spent by the Carter administration if rural voters have their way about the outcome of the election.

#### Foreign diseases seen as threat to American animals

COLLEGE STATION -Smuggling frozen semen from high-powered Brazilian bulls is daily increasing the risk of economically devasting foot-andmouth disease in Texas, says a top federal scientist.

Foot-and-mouth disease, eradicated in Texas 55 years ago, and African swine fever, unknown in this hemisphere until 1971, are two of the foreign animal diseases most worrying scientists, Dr. Jerry Callis said at Texas A&M Uni-

Callis, director of the Department of Agriculture's Plum Island Animal Disease Center in New York, said ordinary pasteurization and hide and cheese processing do not eliminate foot-and-mouth virus from products of infected animals. He also said completion of the Pan American Highway from South America would dramatically boost the chances of eventual invasion of foreign animal diseases.
