## OTHER OLD WELL WILL BE DEEPENED IN AREA NORTHWEST FROM CISCO

Completion of the Ellenburger well nine miles northwest of Eastland county continues week as Lone Star Gas company made preparation to No. 1 Van Farmer, 800-foot to the east from the farm's No. 1 Cozart, commencing for 288 barrels per day.

The Cozart, the No. 1 farmer (different lease name) than that on the Hickok producing and present company drilled the well in an old gas well years ago at a lesser depth.

Section 477, S. P. R. R. surface well to be deepened by Star on the Farmer is 3,000 feet and slightly west of the Hickok pool opened on the Van Farmer lease.

The Star Gas company No. 1 well, 1,341 feet west of the discovery, was drilling to 900 feet.

Chastain was plugging from 4,079 on the No. 1 section, three and a half miles southeast of the Hickok Van, to shoot in the Caddo 1,307-3,410 feet where a pool of oil had been encountered.

Prior to plugging the test had drilled 85 feet. Ellenburger line (total 4,079) which was unsaturated.

Stephens county, four miles of Ranger, Graham was preparing to acidize 1,000 gallons their No. 1 well, John Carter survey ray limestone, 3,575-3,590 total depth. Two-inch tubing was run. Swabbing of 20 to 25 feet of oil daily was reported.

Approximately 200,000 cubic feet of gas had been produced, operators stated.

Johnson et al No. 1 Mary one mile south of Carlsbad county, was reported to be out around 460 feet.

McNurlin Pleads Guilty to Charge Of Mail Robbery

ABILENE, Feb. 16.—Rufe McNurlin entered a plea of guilty when arraigned here Tuesday on a charge of theft from the mails.

He appeared before U. S. Commissioner Ida M. Jones, who fixed his bond at \$5,000.

McNurlin was arrested Monday at his home six miles south of Ranger by a posse of federal, county and city officers. It was headed by Sheriff Loss Woods and Chief of Police Ingram.

The prisoner was brought here from Eastland by Deputy U. S. Marshal C. S. Brown.

He was the seventh person to be charged in connection with theft of a registered mail pouch containing \$28,950. It disappeared November 4 from a railway mail car between Dallas and O'Donnell. The money shipment was consigned to the First National Bank of O'Donnell from the Federal Reserve bank at Dallas.

Postal Inspector L. W. Morris signed the complaint naming McNurlin. It was filed Monday at Lubbock with U. S. Commissioner Olive Fluke, in whose division the mail theft occurred.

Agreed Judgment In Case Entered

A jury was waived and judgment entered by agreement Wednesday morning in 88th district court in the case of B. W. Martin against Lone Star Gas company and others.

The judgment provides for partition of a lease involved in the case, payment of court costs by Lone Star, and payment of \$1,000 by the defendant to Martin. Pleadings of Martin at origination of the case alleged that Lone Star had failed to develop a lease and that production from adjoining land was draining production from his land.

### Two Road Projects Financed by WPA Started In County

Two WPA financed projects, involving over \$38,000 in expenditure, began Friday and Saturday, according to County Engineer A. F. Taylor.

Started Saturday was work on the Ranger-Spring road by Cross Roads to the precinct line south. Costing \$31,425.39, the project will employ 159 men for four months. It provides 51,152 man hours of labor.

Work on the project includes widening of the road, grubbing, regrading, rebuilding drainage structures, surfacing with gravel.

Marvin Hood is project supervisor and Joe Duval timekeeper. Improvements will cover 5.3 miles.

The other project, which began Friday, is for construction of a new \$16,858 road from Bear Springs to Kokomo, east from Carbon. The road will have a gravel surface. Eighty nine men will be employed for four months and 28,800 man hours will be provided. Frank Gryder is supervisor and Walter Gray is timekeeper.

# SMITH TELLS VETERANS IN DISTRICT OF TWO DANGERS FOR NATION

Two "enemies" of the United States, "without and within," were described by John Lee Smith of Throckmorton at a gathering of 170 veterans of the district at a meeting Wednesday night in 88th district courtroom at Eastland.

Smith, prominent in veterans' affairs many years and himself a veteran with overseas service, was principal speaker at the meeting, sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Cisco post, which was in observance of national defense week and in commemoration of the sinking of the Maine in Havana Harbor, an event which precipitated the Spanish-American War in 1898.

Japan, "with millions of efficient men," was pointed as the "without" menace. Smith asserted that Japanese plans are threatening the world's peace. He stated that Japan has challenged the United States (by bombing of the Panay and other events) and Great Britain (shooting of an ambassador) in recent months, "things which would not have been tolerated 20 years ago."

The speaker pointed out that Japan has aptly demonstrated its desire to rule Asia by already making a puppet state of Korea. Smith declared that pacifism as preached by some will not stop by Japan has aptly demonstrated its

2,500 years had been a peaceful nation.

Smith stated that it was the belief of many that Japan intends to attempt to control the trade and industry of the world and prophesied that the next 20 years will show the truthfulness of the assertion.

The enemies within the United States were described as the profiteers of wars, both in peacetime and warfare. He stated that in times of war the rich and poor should share alike the expense. Reminding that class hatred should not be fanned, he stated that the rich should give their share and "nothing more." Taking profit out of peacetime defense would be remedied somewhat by the government building its own ships, Smith recommended.

The greatest sacrifice of all in war is given by the soldiers, "the rank or file of whom never declared war," he continued.

Smith paid glowing tribute to the veterans at the meeting—Spanish-American, World War

and Veterans of Foreign Wars— and stated that by their sacrifices and those that died the U. S. had gained much.

"I don't know why it is, you don't know why it is," said Smith, "but no liberty or privilege of life was ever vouchsafed without the shedding of blood."

"Life is so constituted it is a warfare," the speaker said. Being a veteran is one of the most exclusive rights attained by men, said Smith, who stated that the sacrifices would not compare to the rituals of fraternal organizations.

P. L. Crossley of Eastland was master of ceremonies. Obligations were administered recruits of three organizations at the meeting. Captain K. K. White of Eastland administered obligations to Ed T. Cox, Sr., Eastland, who is becoming a member of the Sam McKinnon post No. 59, United Spanish-American War Veterans.

Earl Francis, Eastland, administered obligations of the American Legion post to H. M. Hart, Eastland. Obligations of the Veterans of Foreign Wars post 3359, were administered by C. E. Garmann of Abilene, department chief of staff of the VFW of Texas, and K. K. White to C. W. Hoffmann of Eastland, M. P. Herring of Eastland and Smith of Throckmorton.

Salutation of colors was directed by Major Joseph W. Timmons of Eastland. Singing was led by A. E. Herring of Eastland and Francis Hoffmann introduced the speaker of the evening and Harry Schaefer and Ernest Hitson of Cisco and their orchestra furnished music. Invocation and benediction were given by Cox.

# Select Location For Deep Well In Ellenburger Area

G. Willard Rich of Albany has announced plans for the drilling of a 4,250-foot or Ellenburger lime wildcat test in the extreme southwest corner of Stephens county, about five and a half miles east of Moran, which is slated for spudding with cable tools this week-end.

The wildcat will be on a block of about 2,000 acres assembled in the northwest corner of Eastland county and including land in Stephens and Callahan counties. It was taken by R. N. James of Eastland.

Location for the No. 1 M. and J. W. Andrews is slated 330 feet from the west and 450 feet from the south line of the northwest quarter of section 39-7-T&P survey.

The projected test follows an Ellenburger lime play which has extended from the Van Farmer deep discovery north of Cisco in Eastland county where two wells have been completed.

# Dangers of Kite Flying Explained By Tesco's Head

With the kite flying season at hand, Texas Electric Service Company issued Wednesday its annual appeal to parents to warn children flying kites to keep away from electric power lines.

"That the innocent pastime of kite flying can be exceedingly dangerous is brought out forcibly by the fact that many fatal accidents occurred in the year just past because of children getting their metalized kites tangled in power lines," according to J. E. Lewis, district manager of Texas Electric Service Company.

"Too often children use metal wire in the place of string on their kites and when this wire comes in contact with a power line the result is instantly disastrous. Even plain kite strings sometimes carry current, especial-
