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Medicare Recipients To Benefit

Attention--Medicare recipients--this story is JUST FOR YOU!

"Knowing how older people worry about hospital bills, and the fact that they are afraid they cannot afford hospital care, and Low bills worry them, West Plains Medical Center has come up with a new plan--for Medicare patients only," said Bobbie Bryant, office manager for WPMC.

Now, when a Medicare recipient needs to go to the hospital, if they have a Medicare supplemental policy that pays 100 percent of the \$400 deductible NOT paid by Medicare, they do not have to pay anything on release from the hospital--nothing at all--and they will never receive a bill at all for their hospital stay, assured Mrs. Bryant.

Collecting for the bill becomes West Plains Medical Center's concern, said Mrs. Bryant. All the patient will have to do on entering the hospital is to present their Medicare card, along with the Medicare supplemental card, and the hospital does the rest.

Also, Mrs. Bryant said they no longer have the private room difference for Medicare patients, another factor to make the stay more pleasant and easier for the Medicare recipient.

She did remind that if a patient has a Medicare supplemental insurance policy that pays only a portion of the \$400 deductible for Medicare, then the patient will be responsible to pay ONLY the part of the deductible not covered by the supplemental policy, then they will never receive a statement from the hospital for their stay.

This covers the hospital portion of the bill only, as the doctors now do their own billing for radiology, EKG interpretation, and other charges.

"We care for our older patients and want to make their stay with us as pleasant and relaxing as possible, without them worrying about receiving bills after they leave," added Mrs. Bryant.

Late Week Rains Soak Young Crops

Except for some minor inconvenience to motorists who became stranded after crossing water or for school buses trying to pick up and deliver school students, and farmers who had to stay out of fields temporarily, the rains Thursday night and Friday in the area were most welcome.

Delighted farmers watched from 7 to nearly two inches of rain accumulate in their rain gauges, as heavy clouds lingered with a promise of more moisture to come.

Officially, in Muleshoe, the rain accumulation was 1.43, with nearly two inches being reported in the West Camp community.

Mrs. Lewis Scoggin of the West Camp community reported 1.3 inches, with more rain reported to the north of her location.

Also good amounts were recorded in the Y-L area. Mrs. R. T. Atchison said they had received 1.75 inches since the rains began on Thursday night.

At Bula, 7 was recorded around the Claunch Gin. A spokesman at the gin said just about all crops were in the ground there, and farmers were thrilled with the moisture that had been received.

Birdwell Cattle Feeders near Coyote Lake on Fm1731 said they had received one and one half inches of rain.

In the Lazbuddie area, Foster Fertilizer, three miles east of Lazbuddie reported one inch of rain.

The late week rains "fell just right" according to almost all reports, and was not accompanied by severe weather.

At presstime on Saturday, mostly cloudy skies were noted, and a promise of more rain was expected to carry through the weekend.

Saturday's forecast called for a 40 percent chance for thunderstorms through the day, with a 20 percent chance of more rain in the forecast for today, Sunday.

Friday morning, Dr. Tracy Harris, who currently resides and works in Austin, agreed to move to Earth to become the doctor for the clinic there.

A native of a small town near Houston, Dr. Harris said he is "tuned to the small community," and does not like the stress and unrewarding aspect of working in a urban area.

Dr. Harris did his undergraduate work at Rice; then attended the University of Colorado and completed his medical training in Denver, where he graduated in 1981.

Mrs. Arms said they are very grateful to the persons who have come forth and have contributed items to the family who has only lived here for a month and a half.

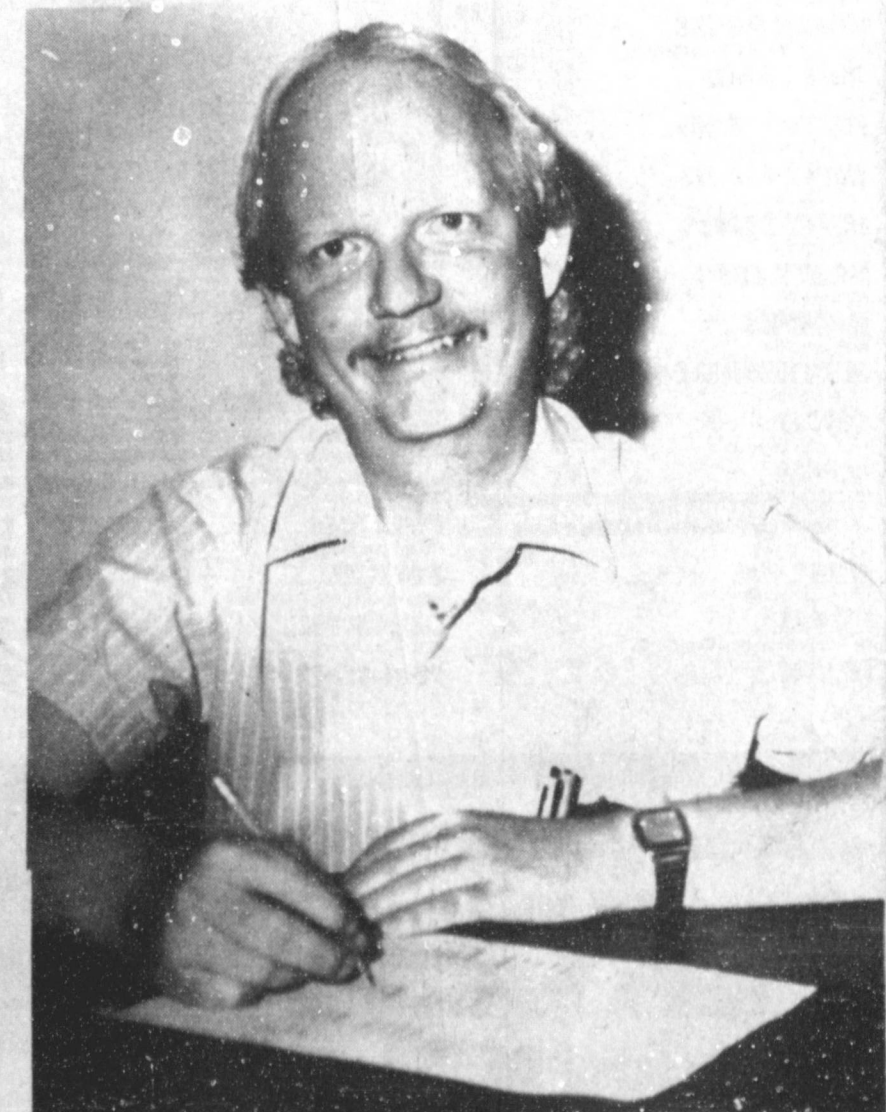

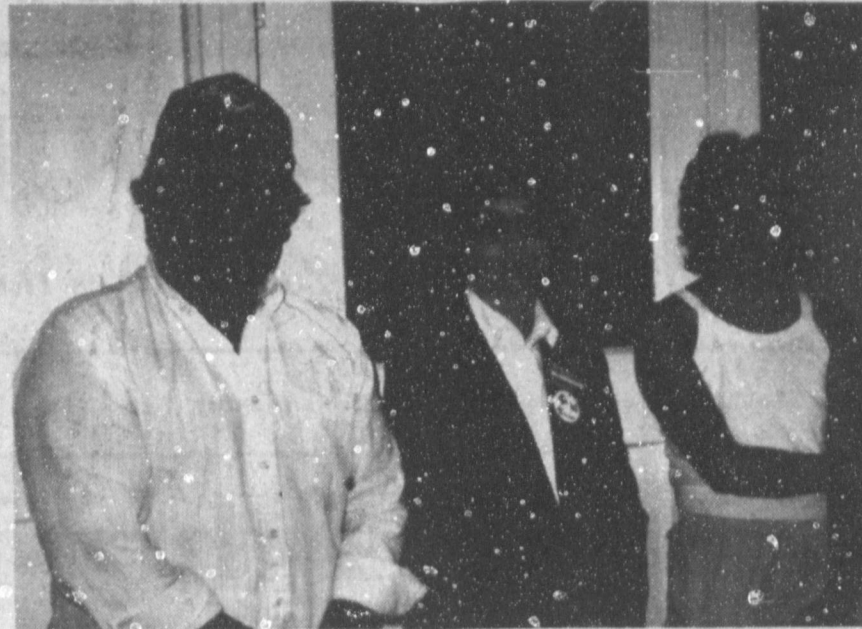

If you have a business, and haven't been contacted, but would like to help, please call the library...we will need a lot of small treats for the kids to earn throughout the program.



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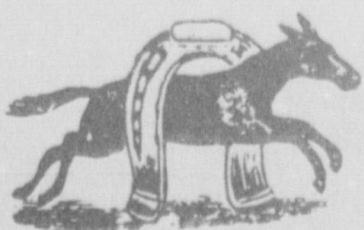


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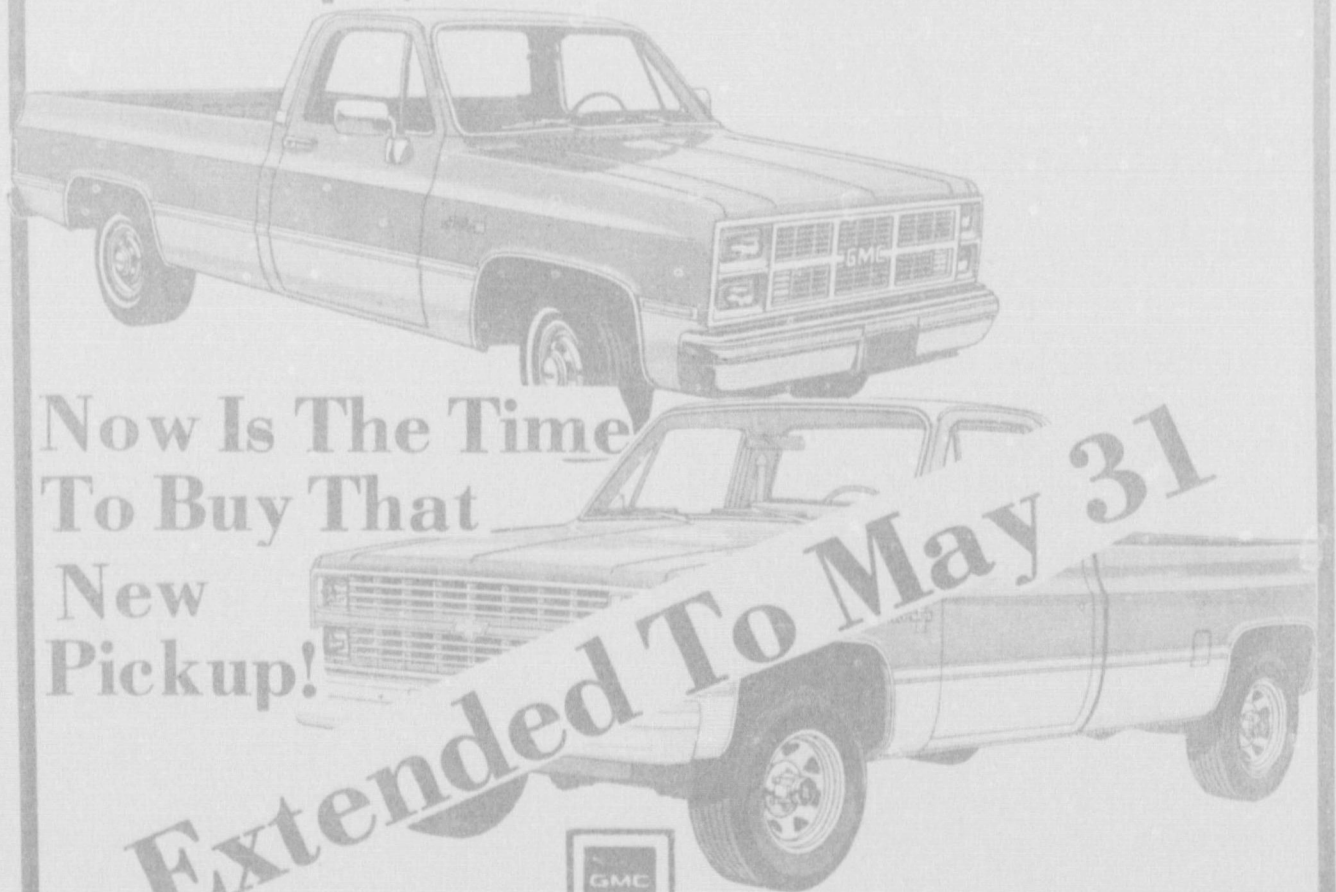


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Nursing Home Youngest, Oldest Mothers Honored

Mrs. Edith Bruns and Mrs. Lois Ethridge were recognized as the oldest and youngest mother, who are residents of the Muleshoe Nursing Home, recently when the Lazbuddie Church of Christ honored all the mothers with a party in the day room of the nursing home.

Each mother was presented a corsage and Mrs. Bruns and Mrs. Ethridge received gifts. Refreshments were also served.

The oldest mother, Mrs. Bruns was born Maggie Edith Bracken near Jamestown, Indiana on Aug. 1, 1889. She is of Scotch and Irish decent and the fourth child in a family of eight children (three sisters and four brothers). Two sisters died in early childhood so she was actually raised in a family of six children.

Her family moved to Snyder, Okla. in the early 1900's where an aunt introduced her to a young bachelor neighbor, Fred Bruns, a farmer from Missouri.

In 1912, at the age of 23 years, she and Bruns were married on Christmas Day at the home of her parents.

They moved to West Texas and settled 16 miles north of Muleshoe in July of 1929. Mrs. Bruns remembers that a big sand storm, one of many, welcomed them to their new home. They were always farmers so many hard times followed. The same problems the farmers are having now, plus irrigation had not been developed here then. The best wheat crop brought 25 cents per bushel. Many who came to West Texas did not stay but they stuck it out and better days did come. Bruns died in 1969, at the age of 90.

They were the parents of five children, Les, Don, Ruth and Jack, the youngest son died at birth. Jack died of Leukemia in 1906, his family and the other children still live in the area. She has 17 grandchildren and 30 great grandchildren.

It was reported that she always loved to cook, therefore she was a good cook. She made many gallons of hand turned freezer ice cream, baked wonderful bread, raised big gardens and canned a lot. She also quilted a number of quilts.

They both enjoyed company and church was understood, you never missed if you could help it, sick, muddy roads or the car wouldn't start were reasons, not excuses. They were both members of the Church of Christ.

They celebrated their 50th anniversary in 1962, at their home north of Muleshoe. Over 200 friends and relatives called during the afternoon. Their children hosted the event.

Mrs. Bruns hosted an old school chum reunion at her home years later. There were approximately 10 there and the youngest in their late 70's.

She has also served on the school board.

Mrs. Ethridge, next to the youngest mother at the nursing home, was born August 22, 1917. She had five sisters and two brothers, and came from a musical family.

She married Ralph Ethridge on Nov. 2, 1935, in Dickens County. She met Ethridge at school. He came after school to play marbles. He noticed Lois and commented that if she were older he would like to date her. He was told that she was older than she looked, she just wasn't very big.

They had three children, a daughter deceased, and two sons, Wayland Ethridge and Ronald Ethridge. They moved to West Texas in 1944, and started farming Southwest of Muleshoe. Ethridge died in December of 1979.

Mrs. Ethridge has five grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

Her hobbies were sewing, working in the yard, canning and cooking. Her cooking specialties were chocolate roll up cake and red beans. Her recipe

for red beans were soak beans overnight, use hot water, cook the next day 40 minutes in the pressure cooker, take the pressure off and continue to cook slowly for two hours. She added two tablespoons dark Karo syrup, sometimes a bud of garlic, ham hocks if she had it, if not, bacon drippings.

Mrs. Wenner is the next to the oldest mother who resides at the nursing home. She was born on Valentine's Day, Feb. 14, 1890, in Nebraska and moved to a farm with her parents near Norman, Okla. as a child.

She married Frank Wenner and they lived there until 1927, when they moved to the YL area.

Five of the Wenner's children were born in Oklahoma, Deola, Reaford, Delter, Ralph and Dorris. A sixth child, Gilbert was born after they moved to Texas.

Reaford now resides near Lazbuddie, Delter and Dorris (Mrs. Ance Ashford) lives in Muleshoe and Ralph in California. Deola (Mrs. Earnest Merriott) and Gilbert are deceased.

Mrs. Wenner moved into Muleshoe in 1953, after the death of her husband and she lived alone, taking care of her home and driving her car until age 90 when she moved into the nursing home.

She stays busy, covering coat hangers with colorful yarn and visiting with friends who drop by.

The youngest mother residing in the nursing home is Clara Weaver, who was born on March 24, 1919, in Arkansas. She had two brothers and two sisters.

She married Quinn Weaver April 14, 1936, by a country preacher. They lived with her husband's parents. Weaver worked with his dad on the farm. Later he worked at a sawmill.
