"As illustrated by the way the present program has taken care of the thousands of railroad workers and men thrown out of employment by the Dallas Ford plant, I believe that unemployment insurance is a success in Texas," Davison said.

"It is mockery to have such laws as, aid to the blind, aid to crippled and dependent children and aid to mothers, and not provide funds. Such funds should be raised as soon as possible," he said.

Davison is also author of the present oil proration law and is an active supporter of this form of legislation as a means of keeping small operators in business and as a method for conservation of natural resources.

In addition to old age assistance, Davison has supported firemen's pensions and the teachers' retirement act.

McCRAW DRIVE FOR OFFICE IS MOVED AT MEET

The gubernatorial candidacy of William McCraw of Dallas county was brought to Eastland county citizens and others from visiting cities Tuesday night at a rally on the south side of the courthouse square.

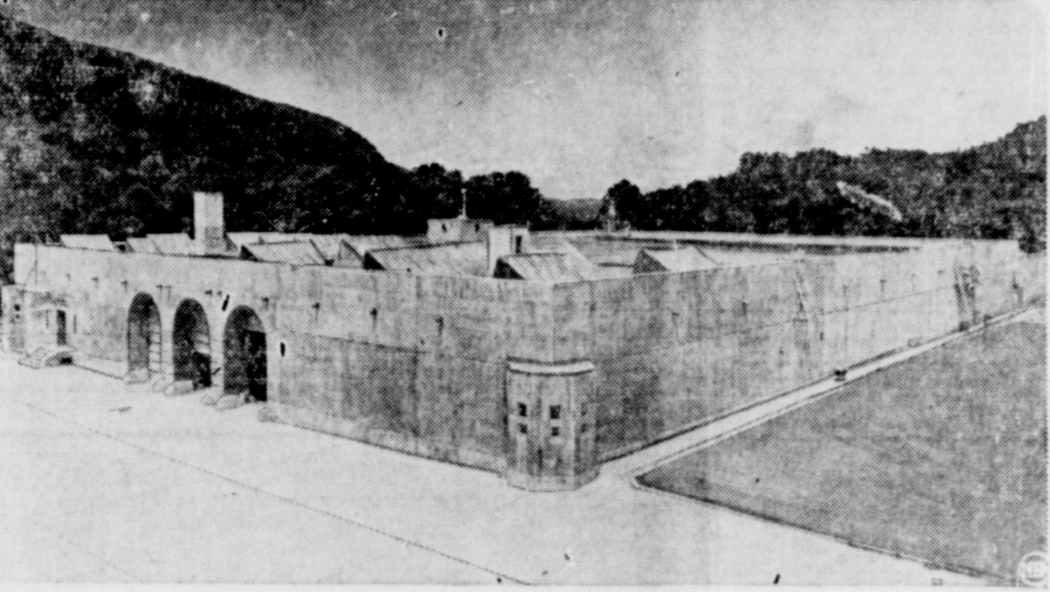
The candidate was introduced by B. A. Butler of Cisco, who said if McCraw is elected "we will get rid of all this comic opera stuff that's been going on at Austin."

Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins, Eastland clubwoman, commended the candidate to the audience. Likewise did Rufus Higgs, Stephenville. Other speakers included Oscar Lyster, county Democratic executive chairman.

Band music was furnished by the Eastland high school group. A quartet composed of Dolph Hull, Glenn Burnam, Roy Lee Williams and Keith King, accompanied by Mary Alice Burnam, all of Putnam, sang.

The red-haired attorney general presented a program of modernizing the state government whereby he said \$5,000,000 a year could be saved without sacrificing efficiency. With this money, together with large increases in revenue from present taxes due to growing business, and amounts his department has put into the treasury in successful litigation, he said Texas' social security obligations would be met fully and the budget balanced without any more tax burden on the people.

'Cold Storage' for Uncle Sam's Silver



The grim-looking one-story concrete structure pictured above is the new federal silver repository at West Point, N. Y., built to receive the overflow of silver from the New York Assay Office. Mrs. Nellie Tayloe Ross, director of the Mint, after inspection of the structure, said silver would be moved in for "cold storage" at the rate of more than \$3,000,000 a day. The building has room for 70,000 tons of the metal, and will be about half filled when the accumulated bullion of the Assay Office, totaling \$64,400,000, is stored. The concrete strong box will be guarded by the latest scientific devices.

He outlined constructive plans for law enforcement, highway development, public utility control, labor, industrial development, and public health. "Better pay, better hours, more leisure, more purchasing power and more security against the hazards and vicissitudes of life shall be the abiding aim of my administration from the moment I take office until I turn it over to my elected successor," McCraw declared.

Texas Employment Declines Slightly

AUSTIN.—Employment in Texas during May declined moderately from the preceding month and substantially from the corresponding month last year, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. Total pay rolls, however, were moderately above the preceding month but slightly below May a year ago.

Reports to the bureau from 2,521 representative Texas establishments, employing 103,609 workers, showed a decline from April of 1.2 per cent in the number of employes and a decline of 5.8 per cent in the number of workers from May, 1937. Total weekly payrolls of these establishments were 1.4 per cent larger than in April but 0.8 per cent un-

Lowered Interest Rates Extended by Federal Lawmakers

The reduced interest rates on Federal Land Bank and Commissioner loans have been extended by Federal legislation for a period of two years, according to word received Wednesday from the Federal Land Bank by Claude Strickland, secretary and National Farm Loan Association.

On Federal land bank loans through national farm loan associations the temporarily reduced rate of 3 1/2 per cent per annum will be continued for all interest installments payable prior to July 1, 1940.

More Milk Urged By Health Officer

AUSTIN.—In view of the fact that Governor Allred has proclaimed the month June 9 to July 6 as Milk and Dairy Products Month, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, urges with this more extensive use of milk, that both producer and consumer be concerned as to its quality. The use of clean safe milk is a health measure.

Local interest in improved methods of producing wholesome milk has increased greatly in the past two decades and the striking advance in milk control has been responsible for the enormous saving in infant life.

Milk is perishable and especially during hot weather. To insure milk of good quality requires cleanliness, sterile utensils, protection against flies, careful bottling and maintenance at low temperature. The presence in fresh milk of large numbers of bacteria, due to insanitary methods of production, is a health hazard.

Among the diseases which may be transmitted through milk are tuberculosis, typhoid fever, scarlet fever, diphtheria, septic sore throat, undulant fever, diarrhea and enteritis. Numerous milk-borne outbreaks of disease occur every year in this country and from the use of milk that might have been safe with proper care.

We should firmly insist that the milk we drink be carefully produced, so that we will have the maximum protection along the line from cow to consumer.

To insure milk of good quality requires cleanliness, sterile utensils, protection against flies, careful bottling and maintenance at low temperature. The presence in fresh milk of large numbers of bacteria, due to insanitary methods of production, is a health hazard.

EL PASO.—Swapping automobiles for livestock is the latest idea of Sam Watkins, automobile dealer, for beating the depression. Watkins started the "trading post" when salesmen working in rural areas reported that they encountered farmers who were short of cash but would not mind putting down a few animals as first payment on a car.

"Why not?" Watkins asked. "Livestock is worth money." So far, Watkins has handled 150 head of livestock in connection with his automobile business. "It's an experiment, but I'm satisfied with the results," he said.

If the cattle taken in are fat, Watkins sells them to packers. If they are range cattle, they are sold to feeders. Horses and mules are sold to farmers or anyone else who will buy them.

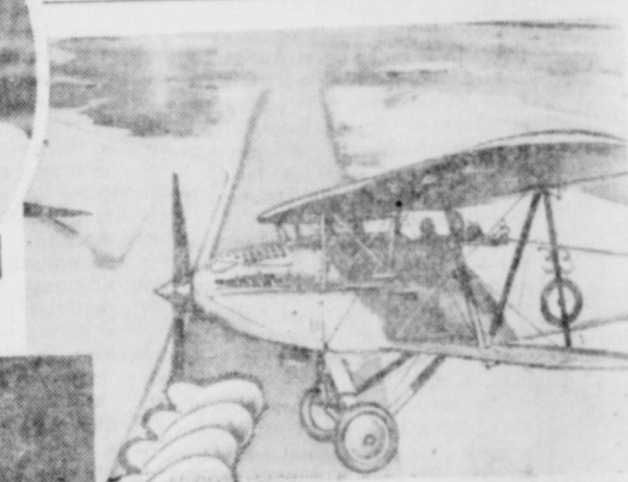

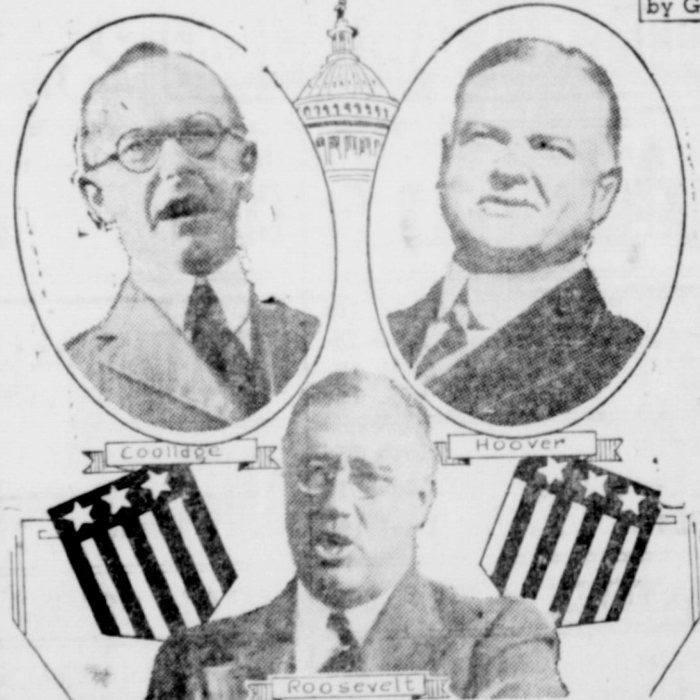

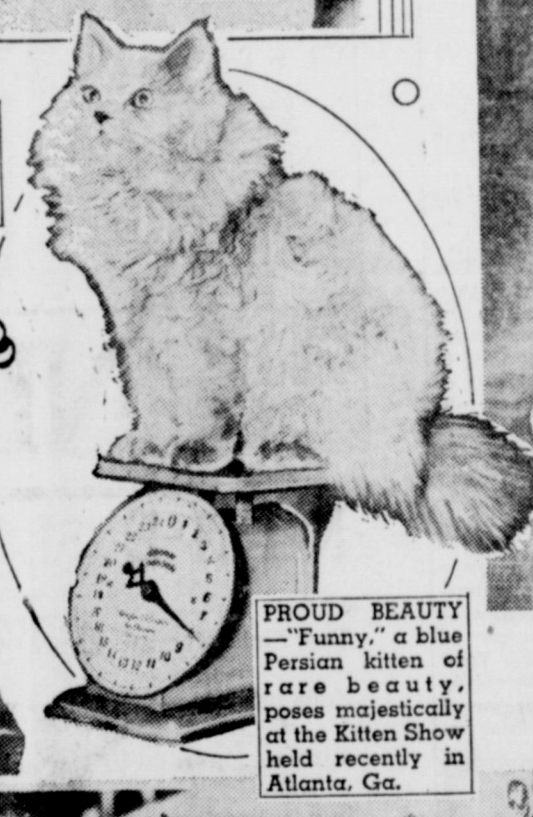

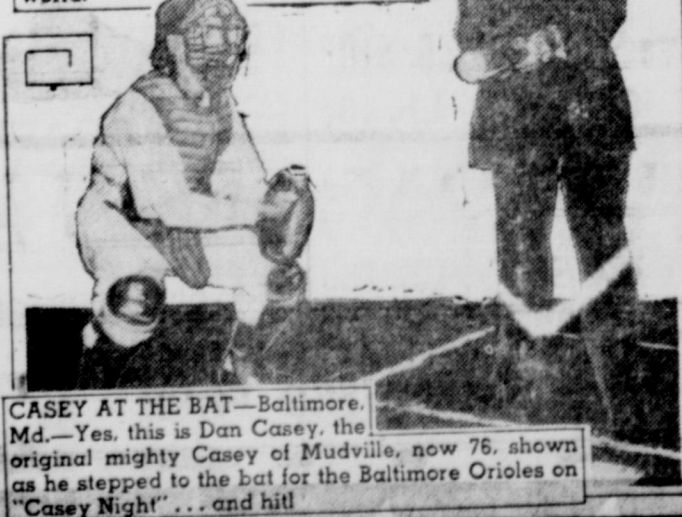

in backwoods America, Jivaro people go to their medicine man for advice, as well as for healing, and he is the wise man of the tribe.

The wishnu must undergo a long education—at least a month long—which, according to the institution, is a lot of education for Jivarolanders.

There are, however, certain differences, the report of Dr. Matthew Stirling, who lived a year with the Jivaros, reveals, in the methods employed by the wishnu and by the early-American practitioners.

The wishnu effects a cure by sucking the afflicted part until the evil spirit is finally drawn out into his own mouth. Then he expectorates and with many gesticulations orders the evil spirit not to enter the house again.

Stirling says there are six of these disease spirits, the worst of which is Minura, spirit of the ray fish. Others are identified with snakes, woodpeckers and ants.

But aside from these spiritual treatments, the wishnu is often a skillful bone-setter, using casts of chicle, basis of chewing gum, after the bones are put in place. He has an extensive knowledge of jungle herbs, too, with which he treats colds, fever and dysentery, which are regarded as arising from merely natural causes.

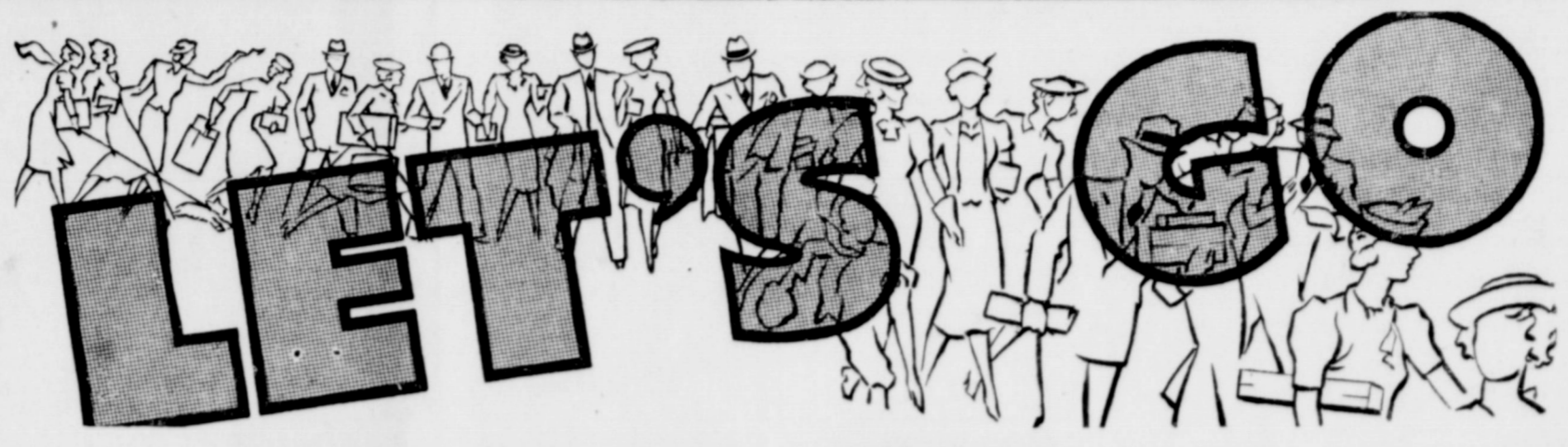
