Members of commissioners court announced Wednesday that two common school district elections on proposals to increase maintenance taxes have been called.

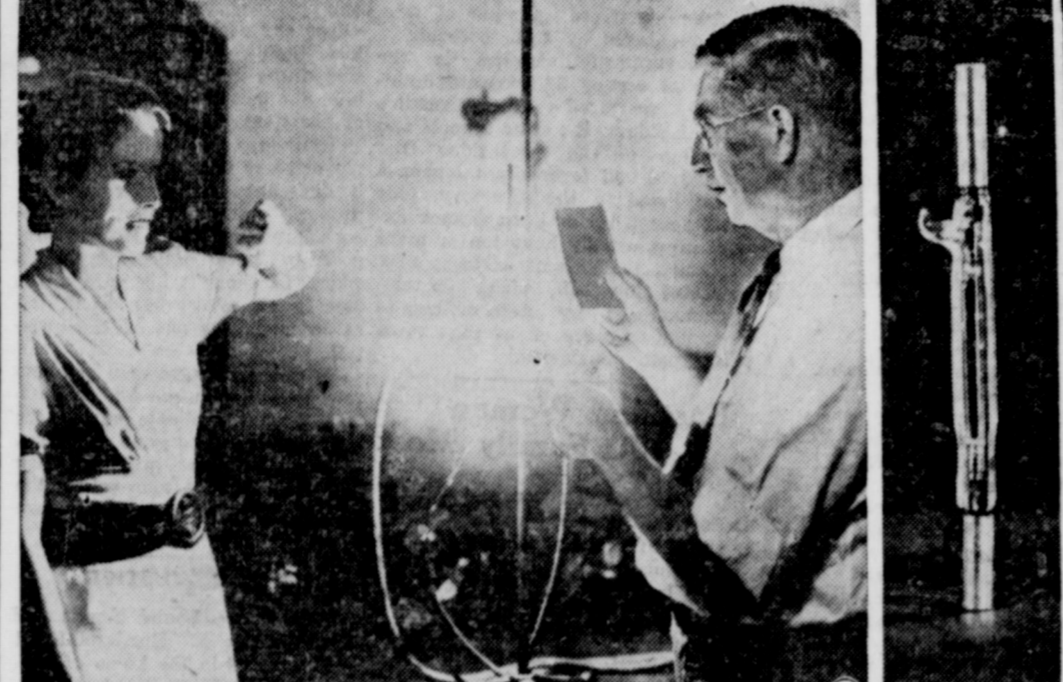

## FUNERAL HELD FOR VICTIMS OF ACCIDENT

Funeral services for Miss Ovada Mae Anderson, 17, and Herald Nelson Hesson, 21, who were killed when their car collided with a Wichita Falls, Ranger and Southern freight train in Ranger early Sunday morning, were conducted from the First Baptist church of Ranger Monday morning at 10:30, with Rev. Charles T. Tally, Jr., pastor of the church, conducting the services, assisted by Rev. K. C. Edmonds.

Miss Anderson was buried in Evergreen cemetery, following the church services and Hesson was buried at Strawn Monday afternoon.

Jim Everetts of Olden, whose car crashed into the same train as the bodies of the two accident victims were being removed from their car, was in the West Texas hospital, suffering a badly broken leg, cuts and bruises. His condition was reported as not critical.

Patrolmen G. C. Love and Johnnie Boyd, who were on night duty when the accident happened, had stopped at the railway crossing on the new Strawn highway when the train approached, and the car driven by Hesson passed their car and crashed into the front of the train. Apparently the driver did not see the train, nor hear the whistle, until the car was within a few feet of the train.

Love assisted the engineer in removing the bodies from the wreckage of the car, while Boyd returned to town to get an ambulance. He drove the ambulance to the scene of the accident, and while he was gone the second car approached the tracks, and ran into the side of a tank car.

The three were placed in an ambulance, which Boyd drove, and were taken to the hospital. Miss Anderson is believed to have died instantly, while Hesson died upon arrival at the hospital.

## PAY IN LIME IMPORTANT TO COUNTY AREA

Highlight in the oil week for this immediate section was the Hickok Producing and Development company No. 4 Cleveland, which loomed as a highly successful mile and one-fourth northeast extension to the Van Farmer discovery well northwest of Cisco in Eastland county.

The well, awaiting potential production test, had been rated from 100 to 800 barrels daily. It had been reported as having flowed 200 barrels in six hours after swabbing off acid water. Total depth was 4,052 feet. Lime was topped at 4,000 feet and saturated lime at 4,017 feet.

J. F. Baker No. 2 N. T. Mulloy, section 1-Ahrenbeck, five miles north of Rising Star, Eastland county, was reported to have rated for 48 barrels daily in an official test. The pay formation, lime, was from 3,018-94 feet. Another well was planned by the operator.

Other well showing favorable in the district was Sells Petroleum company No. 1 Smith, section 15-2 H&TC, which was reported to have 1,450 feet of fluid in the hole, total depth of which was 2,730 feet. Pipe was set at 2,610 feet. Acidization was believed probable.

Near Gorman, Christmas, Halle and Kirk S. A. Eison, T. Tyler survey No. 51, Eastland county, was drilling at 1,110 feet.

In the Carbon vicinity, Eastland county, W. J. Dobbs had resumed drilling on No. 1 Greer, and was at total depth of 1,100 feet. He had again taken control of the property from Erin Petroleum Co., formerly contractors.

Fundamental Changes
Force Themselves

The old order changes constantly, as Tennyson's King
Arthur remarked; and the interesting thing about it is
that it changes in spite of us, and brings us up against
problems that we would dodge if it were humanly possible.

A symptom of the universal change is now making
another of its perennial appearances in the Mississippi
delta region, in the shape of a mechanical cotton picker.

This machine has been in the news for several years,
now, and some fantastic things have been predicted for it.
To date it has not got out of the experimental stage; but
apparently it will do so before long, and when and if it
does, the whole economy of the cotton belt will undergo
a change of almost unimaginable extent.

There is a big "if" attached to it, of course. But if that
"if" works out—

Well, a group of white cotton growers gathered in a
Mississippi field the other day to watch a demonstration.
In one hour they saw the mechanical picker pick more
cotton than 50 or 60 good Negro hands could have picked.
They heard a Mississippi editor remark that within five
years or so the Negro cotton picker would be permanently
out of a job—some millions of him. And one planter, mus-
ing on this change, remarked: "God a'mighty—le's throw
it in the river."

Fortunately or unfortunately, we can't solve the prob-
lem that way. The entire south is at the mercy of this ma-
chine. If the thing fails to work, of course, the problem
solves itself. But if it does work, and does the things ex-
pected of it, the southland—and, indirectly, the entire na-
tion—will suffer a change more prodigious and funda-
mental than anything that has happened since the aboli-
tion of chattel slavery.

Now the point of all of this is that this change which
is coming upon us is not the work of any government, any
reform organization or any uplifter. Nobody "planned it
that way." A man invented a machine; the inexorable
progress of machine-age logic will do the rest. The most we
can do will be adapt ourselves to the change.

That is the way change most often comes. Earnest peo-
ple plan and scheme and hope and agitate—and accom-
plish little or nothing. Then some unobtrusive little eco-
nomic fact bobs up—and a change more sweeping than
anything the planners had aimed at comes into being au-
tomatically.

Change, of course, is not necessarily change for the
better. That is where our responsibility comes in. The dif-
ference between progress and the reverse depends largely
on the intelligence and the spirit with which we meet these
changes that we cannot avert.

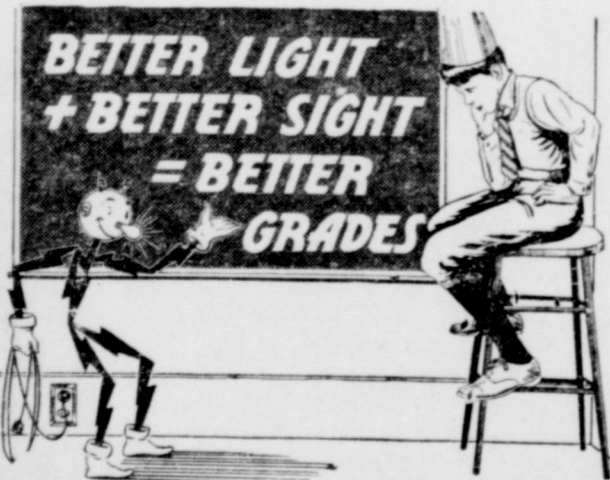

PARENTS, CHILDREN
PREPARE FOR START
OF SCHOOL SEPT. 12

Parents and children were to-
day preparing for opening of
Eastland schools which has been
set by the school board for Mon-
day, September 12.

P. B. Bittle, beginning his
tenth year as superintendent of
the Eastland schools, expects 1-
060 students to enroll, although
the approved state census list for
1938-39 lists 1,039 students.

Bittle denied a rumor "floating
around that the Eastland schools
will discontinue some of the high
school subjects that were taught
the past session."

He declared "this report is un-
founded and untrue. There will be
the same subjects taught both in
the high school and the ward
schools that were taught last ses-
sion, except an addition of one or
two subjects possibly in the high
school will be added this session
that were not taught last session."

For the first time, all "fifth"
grade students will report to
Junior High school. Other grades
in the junior high will be the
sixth and seventh.

All children in grades one, two,
three and four living east of
Daugherty street must attend
South Ward school and those liv-
ing west of Daugherty in the same
grades must attend West Ward.

Bittle declared that the division
line for Ward school attendance
will be closely enforced. "Here-
tofore," he said, "on account of
conveniences and accommodations
granted by the school officials,
pupils have been given permission
to attend the school most conveni-
ent to their residence, but this
will not be permitted the ensuing
session."

For those pupils living outside
the city limits, Daugherty street,
continued north and south, also
will be the division line determin-
ing Ward school attendance.

First holiday on the school slate
this session will be November 11.
Students will receive November
24 and 25 as Thanksgiving holi-
days, Christmas holidays begin
following close of school Decem-
ber 23 and continue until January
2.

Date of close of school this
year will be May 26.

Principals of high school and
junior high will announce time for
registration later.

By recommendation of officials,
a fire escape will be installed at
the rear of the high school build-
ing. It will be of the slide, tube
type.

The teacher staff for Eastland
schools is practically the same for
this year as last. One new teacher
at the high school will be
Horace Virgil Harrison of near
Electra. Married and 26 years of
age, Harrison has the bachelor of
arts degree from Trinity Universi-
ty at Waxahachie. He has seven

of the necessary 21 hours toward
a master of arts degree from the
University of Texas. At Trinity he
majored in history and has 46
semester hours in that subject and
government.

In 1932 Harrison received a
medal for the highest average in
the social science department of
Trinity. Having five years expe-
rience in high school teaching,
Harrison in 1938 coached the
Harold Class B track and field
team to a state championship.

Telephone System
Of Capitol Is Large

AUSTIN — Texans frequently
become impatient with the end-
less miles of red tape, the time,
trouble, effort, cost, and compli-
cated methods involved in con-
ducting state business. Just how
complicated the Texas state gov-
ernment is might be judged
roughly by the number of build-
ings the government occupies in
Austin and the number of tele-
phones used by state officials.

Government officials in the
capital occupy 33 separate build-
ings, scattered from Austin's
south side to the state schools and
asylums on the northside. One
hundred and forty-nine telephones
are listed in the directory, plus
22 branch systems. As branch ex-
changes usually have ten or more
phones, that means at least 220.
These, plus 149, make 339 tele-
phones used by state officers—
enough to serve an average town
of 1,845 population.

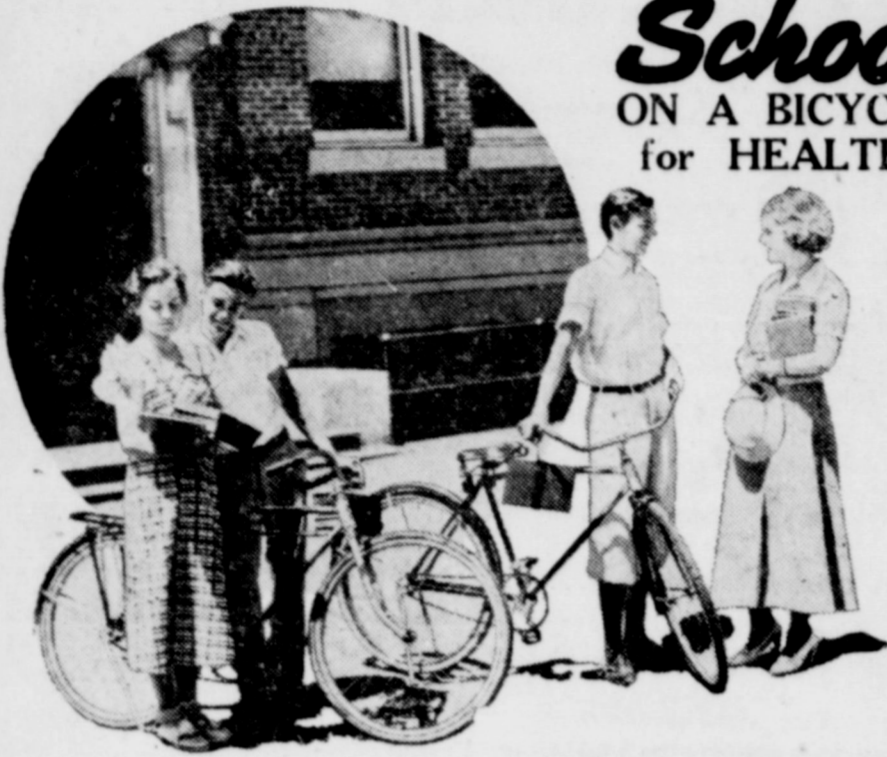

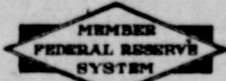

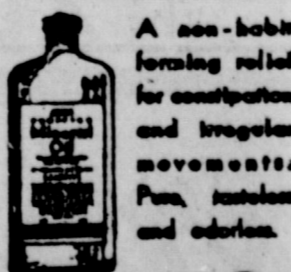

Among the outstanding examples of street correction are those of Seattle and Oklahoma City. Both cities have used federal relief funds, and the initial projects have been so successful they plan to continue the work.

In three years Seattle has rearranged some 50 intersections, paving the rounded turns with concrete to match existing pavement. The city is continuing the process with an annual appropriation of \$25,000 for the purpose.

Oklahoma City plans to set back all corners in the city with 800 already adjusted to make turning easier and safer. Nearly every corner in the city had a 10-foot radius which in laymen's language is almost a right-angle turn. The corners are now being given a 40-foot radius which enables the turning driver to keep to the right, away from oncoming cross traffic.

# SAINT RITA'S SCHOOL WILL OPEN SEPT. 6

Announcement was made today by Rev. Fr. S. E. Byrne, principal, that St. Rita's Parochial school in Ranger will be opened for the 1938-39 sessions on Sept. 6, the Tuesday following Labor Day.

As usual, a full curriculum of studies from the first through the seventh grade will be offered. The school is fully accredited and has furnished for its student body in past years a number of honor graduates from Ranger and other high schools.

Father Byrne states that the school buildings have been painted and remodeled and will be in first class condition for the coming term.

St. Rita's school this year lost the services of Mother Superior Patricia, who has been transferred to a larger institution, but she is succeeded by Mother Superior Mary Agnes, another most capable member of the sisterhood who is devoting her life to the teaching and rearing of children in a Christian atmosphere. The new Mother Superior comes here from the Blessed Sacrament Academy at St. Louis, Mo., where she was in charge of instruction of over 750 children of all ages.

Mother Superior Mary Agnes will supervise instruction of the advanced grades, with Sisters John Michael and Evangelista teaching elementary students. Sister Kieran will have charge of music instruction. Catechism classes are to be taught by Father Byrne.

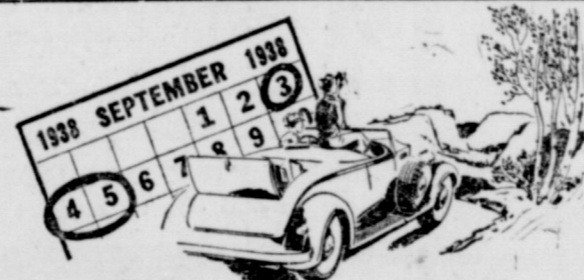
Sister Evangelista is also a newcomer here, having been transferred from a large parochial school at Jefferson City, Mo.

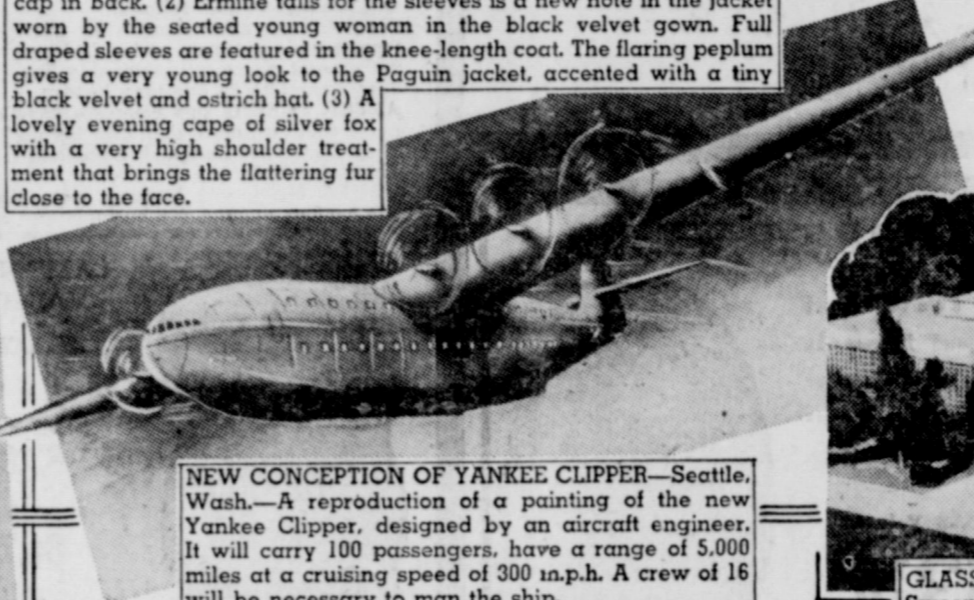

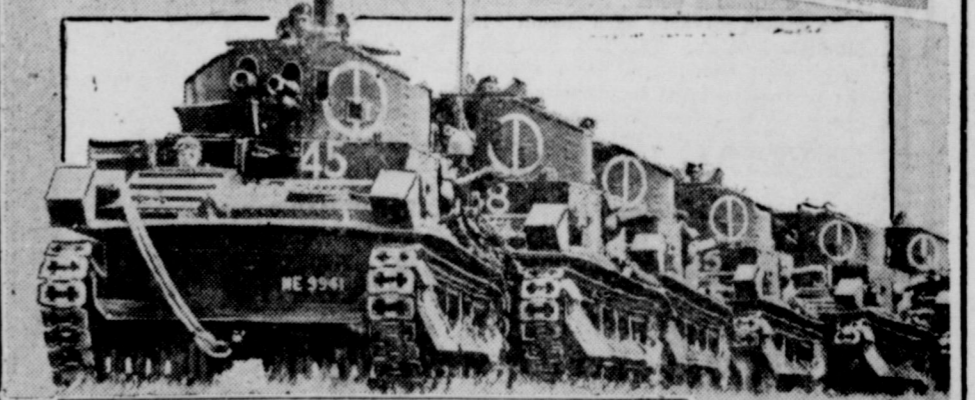

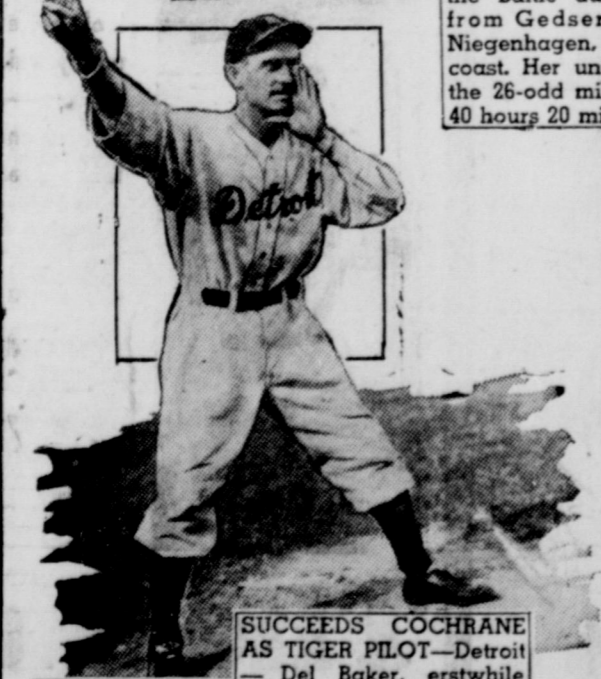
