INTEREST IN EVENTS HIGH DAYS OFFICIALS

A successful exhibition was in progress Thursday morning as the 11th annual Eastland County and Dairy Show opened at the fair grounds.

The morning was marked by the opening of exhibits in the exhibition building and was expected to be completed at an early hour. Exhibits are at the former Pickens Lumber Company building located on South Seaman street. T. Cox, Sr., general superintendent of the fair, was optimistic of an outstanding fair, stating that he has already been assured of the great interest.

J. Tanner, secretary of the group and the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, likewise reported interest in exhibits at the fair greater than in past intimate years.

Friday was designated as "Citizens' Day" and will be "Ranger Day." Programs are to be given each day at the Fire Department building at Eastland on North Main street.

Dairy show of the fair was to show more animals than any other exhibit since 1935. Cows, heifers and bulls, including the admiration of men and dairymen, were to be in the exhibit stalls by Thursday.

Dairy show is to be judged on Friday by Dr. V. Scott Johnson, head of the dairy department of John H. Agricultural college.

Exhibits at an early hour were placed in the boys' 4-H department. These showed pig feeding, the making of binder twine, a cooling tank for Eastland farms, home tanned leather collection, different pens, a miniature maker and others telling of the 4-H work.

The Miss Clara Brown, Baird, county home demonstration will be assisted by other community agricultural booths expected from 12 communities as many as registered for the fair.

Club Boy Shows How Fertilizing Is Boon to Profiting

Hugh F. Barnhart, assistant county agent, reported Monday that L. V. Mauney, 33-year-old Gorman 4-H club member, in an one and one-half acre peanut demonstration has shown the value of fertilizing.

Mauney from the one and one-half acres averaged 56 bushels of peanuts per acre. Yield on peanut hay was 51 bales.

The peanuts were of the Spanish variety.

The club member had fertilized with 250 pounds of commercial fertilizer at a cost of \$2 per acre.

J. L. Mauney, father of L. V., stated that in the Gorman territory 20 bushels is the average yield per unfertilized acre in peanuts and 20 bushels of peanut hay is the average acre yield. On that basis the lower yield would give a farmer approximately \$22.80 per acre while the club boy's method brought him an average of \$61.84 per acre.

The boy's peanuts are to be exhibited at several fairs.

Workings of 4-H Club Activity Is Related by Agent

So that a better understanding of 4-H club girls' exhibits at the county fair Thursday through Saturday of this week at Eastland may be realized, Miss Mabel Caldwell, assistant county home demonstration agent, prepared the following explanation of "What 4-H Club Work Means to Eastland County."

"The 4-H represents equal training of head, hand, heart and health of every child enrolled in 4-H club work in Eastland county. In every community where there are as many as five girls interested in doing the work the home agent meets with the girls and a club is organized.

"The organization of clubs in Eastland county began in September and at present 15 clubs have been organized in the following communities: Kokomo, Flatwood, Okra, Rising Star, Morton Valley, Colony, Scranton, New Hope, Gorman Ward, Gorman High, Desdemona, Bullock, Ranger Ward, Alameda, and Lone Cedar. Over 200 girls are being served through this organization.

"In 4-H Club work we train the head (a) to think, (b) to plan, (c) to reason; the hand (a) to be useful, (b) to be skillful, (c) to be helpful; the heart (a) to be kind, (b) sympathetic, (c) true; and the health (a) to resist disease, (b) to enjoy life, (c) to make for efficiency.

"Every girl who becomes a member of a standard 4-H club is asked to subscribe to the following pledge: In support of the motto, 'To make the best better,' I pledge,

"My head to clearer thinking, "My hands to greater service, "My heart to truer loyalty and finer sympathy,

"My health to efficient living, in service to my home, my community, my country and my God.

"This year's club program will include problems in clothing and poultry. As a correlated program, correct posture, being well groomed, efficient storage for clothing, poultry in the diet, serving of poultry products, and marketing good quality products will be some of the things Eastland county 4-H club girls will become more familiar with."

ESTIMATE \$500,000 MORE REALIZED BY GROWERS OF PEANUTS THROUGH 'CO-OP'

The AAA's peanut diversion program, announced on Sept. 14, will again be handled in Texas through the Southwestern Peanut Growers' association, C. E. Dowles, cooperative marketing specialist of the Texas A. & M. extension service, has announced at College Station.

Bowles has just returned from a meeting in Washington, D. C., at which details of the program were worked out. The plans, as in 1937, contemplate the diversion of surplus farmers' stocks peanuts to the manufacture of oil. Payments to associations of producers for the difference between the purchase price and the sale price for diversion, plus an allowance for the cost of handling the peanuts, are provided. The 1937 program handled only No. 1 and No. 2 nuts.

The price schedule for southwestern Spanish peanuts is 94.5 cents a bushel for No. 1, 88.5 cents a bushel for No. 2, and 81 cents a bushel for No. 3, or slightly higher than the schedule of 1937 and considerably above the local market in many parts of the state.

The need for the diversion program, Bowles said, became apparent when the Sept. 9 crop estimate of the U. S. Bureau of Agricultural Economics placed the supply of peanuts at 10 per cent above estimated edible needs. Experience has shown that a surplus of this size reduces the market to the oil mill level.

The 1937 program, also handled in Texas through the Southwestern Peanut Growers' association with Conrad Schafer of Rising Star as president, resulted in an extra income of more than a half million dollars to peanut growers, it has been estimated.

RANGER GETS PROJECT FOR BOY'S SCHOOL

H. A. Ziegler, district supervisor of the National Youth Administration, has announced that J. C. Kellum, state director, had approved a resident training project for Ranger, and the project will be started in a short time.

Under the proposed project youths from all over this section of the state, numbering about 60 boys from five counties, will be brought to Ranger, where quarters will be provided for them, similar to those now provided for girls under another National Youth Administration setup.

A workshop, where the boys will be given practical training in several trades, will be set up, and the boys will work under actual shop conditions, with a competent teacher being provided by the state department of education.

Approximately \$3,000 worth of machinery, which has never been used, and which includes all kinds of motor-driven woodworking tools, are to be furnished the school, and to this will be added equipment owned by the Ranger school system, making one of the most complete shops anywhere in this part of the country, and the most completely equipped project of its kind in the state.

Material is to be furnished locally and the boys can build anything needed by any public organization, such as the schools, the city, churches and other like organizations over the area.

A dormitory is to be provided for out-of-town boys, where they will live during their training period, and where they will be given proper supervision.

It is planned to add metal working equipment to the school as soon as possible, so that a wider range of training can be provided.

Boys who attend the school, and who apply themselves to the work, will be graduated as experienced craftsmen, it has been stated, and efforts will be made to obtain jobs for them in their line of work.

Cooperation of Farmers Is Asked In Improving Land

County Agent Elmo V. Cook invited farmers Monday afternoon to cooperate in pasture improvement demonstrations which will be initiated soon.

Means by which improvements may be achieved include through reseeded and winter protection of crop land by planting Italian ryegrass, Southern Giant bur clover, Rescue grass or Hairy Vetch legume.

For permanent pasture land improvement planting of Rescue grass, Bur clover, Black Medick planting is recommended.

Planting will start this fall as soon as it rains, according to plans.

Hairy Vetch was planted last year by several farmers, Cook said.

Three of Eastland Pledged at Austin

TESTS ARE GIVEN TWO LIME WELLS

Twenty-four hour testing through two-inch tubing resulted in flow of 129 barrels of oil and 276 barrels of water in the Hickok Producing and Development company No. 4 Cleveland, northeast extension to the Ellanburger pool northwest of Cisco.

Flow was natural in the Eastland county well. Means have been devised to separate successfully the water from the oil. Producing strata was in lime 4,000-4,050 feet, two feet from total depth of 4,052 feet.

In the same area, Lone Star Gas company No. 3 Cozart, was reported to have rated for 16 barrels of oil and 872,000 cubic feet of gas at pressure of 370 pounds from producing zone of 4,028-4,038 feet. Flow was reported through 6 5/8 inch casing. The well, however, is not completed and further tests are scheduled, it was stated.

Hickok No. 1 Penn, section 468, SPRR survey, in the same area, 4,000 feet northwest of the pool opener on the Van Farmer land, was ready to be spudded, it was indicated as derrick had been erected.

Shutdowns were reported on other Eastland county wells. W. J. Dobbins No. 1 Greer, ETRR survey, near Carbon, was reported idle at 1,725 feet while Christmas, Hable and Kirk No. 1, S. A. Eison, T. Tyler survey, No. 51, was shutdown below 1,160 feet.

Production of 4.78 barrels of oil was reported from Texas Producing Wells, Inc., No. 20 Bassett Blakely, Dewey survey, at total depth of 390 feet.

Rush Oil company announced plans to plug No. 6 and 7 Guy and J. M. Houser, D&DA survey, the former at total depth of 265 feet and the latter at 255 feet. No. 8 Guy and J. M. Houser, same survey, has been rated at three barrels from depth of 238 feet as has No. 9 Guy and J. M. Houser at total depth of 243 feet.

Coleman County

After drilling to total depth of 1,085 feet, E. L. Hanson decided to plug No. 2 Bun Yarbrough, section 244, 17 miles south of Santa Anna, Frazier survey.

Brown County

Encountering sulphur water at 2,462 feet, Brown-Tex Oil company abandoned No. 1 I. C. Browder, eight miles west of Brownwood, ETRR survey-2.

Likewise abandoned was R. R. Morden No. 1 Kilgore, block 153, six miles east of Cross Cut, Mitchell survey, at depth of 554 feet.

Grace Eakin No. 1 Williams estate, five miles southeast of Cross Cut, Pruitt survey, was given up at 1,020 feet.

All plans were arranged by Palmer, with the cooperation of Mieres, as a surprise to their "brides."

The two couples met in Desdemona and drove to the former home of Rev. L. E. Stewart, pastor of the Desdemona Baptist church who performed the double marriage ceremony for them 30 years ago. However, when Mr. and Mrs. Palmer and Mr. and Mrs. Mieres went in, they found the Tom J. Nabors family there instead. Memo All Armies Consist of Personalities

As the threat of war deepens in Europe people naturally are trying to figure out which of the rival nations is likely to be the strongest in a knock-down and drag-out fight.

The easiest way to do this is the obvious way—count noses among the opposing armies, and assume that the side with the most troops has the advantage. But the fallacy in this is the fact that not all soldiers are the same.

This was touched on by Major John H. Burns in a recent article in the Infantry Journal. Major Burns suggests that we pay altogether too much attention to the "genius" of famous military leaders, and not enough to the qualities of the humble footsloggers who do the actual fighting.

Major Burns points, as an illustration, to the way the famous Swiss infantry of a few centuries ago broke up the cavalry charges of the armored knights.

The French decided to adopt the same tactics, and trained their men accordingly. But what the Swiss did perfectly the French troops were unable to do at all.

The armies of the Central Powers in the World War gave equally striking examples of the same sort of thing.

In connection with the most modern of all weapons, the airplane, the same truth is evident. Students of the war in the Far East, for instance, report that although the Japanese are vastly superior to the Chinese in air power they are likely to run into real trouble the first time they face an air fleet equal in size to their own.

That "next war" we are all dreading may well be won by just some such difference—some little quirk in psychological make-up or racial background which no one was able to figure on in advance.
