FRESH FROM HIS impressive victory on the tax cut bill in Congress, President Reagan is again facing a hot issue this week, in the strike by the air controllers across the country.

The walkout by the controllers on Monday virtually crippled the nation's airline industry.

We were glad to see the president respond so quickly in warning the controllers to be back on the job by Wednesday morning or they were fired. After all, as federal employees, they each sign an oath not to participate in strikes.

It's about time that the residents of our nation realize that strikes never really solve anything.

A good case in point is the strike this summer by the major league baseball players. Spokesmen for both sides in the strike admit that neither side won—not the players, and certainly not the owners.

And the bad thing is that the public, the baseball fans, were deprived of their sport for the summer, and most of them are saying that when play resumes, that they (the fans) will be the ones on strike.

So, it appears that professional baseball, which was fighting pro football for the attention of fans spending their bucks for entertainment, may have shoved itself backwards and have a long, uphill fight on its hands.

Certainly the fans have lost their interest in the current season, and the World Series, if it is played, may be the most anti-climactic ever played.

If the pro football players had any ideas about going on strike, they might wait a while and see how professional baseball fares, following its first mid-season strike.

Of course, the strike by the air controllers is much more vital to the nation than was the baseball strike. It involves human lives, in addition to jeopardizing the nation's economy.

We saw some figures earlier, when the strike was threatened, to the effect that the strike and the resulting cancellation of flights, could cost the nation's economy around \$200 million per day.

In a nation which is fighting a daily battle against runaway inflation, any action which causes the economy to make a further slip should be viewed as anti-American. It's a shame there aren't enough trained air controllers so that those who walked off the job Monday could be permanently terminated—without so much as a 48-hour notice.

The best thing that could happen to our country would be a law outlawing strikes of any kind. We have stated before that strikes are the main tool which can be used to completely cripple this nation.

In recent years, this would not have been possible. But now that we have seen the work by the conservative alliance, which bucked the liberal elements to get the tax cut bill passed, perhaps the strike syndrome would be a good target.

PLANS ARE MOVING forward toward the city's annual Bull Town Days celebration. Everything seems to be moving along nicely.

It sounds as though the BTD parade may be one of the better parades the celebration has had in recent years. Other improvements also are in the works.

Please support the celebration if you are called upon to work. The Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture needs the help of everyone to make the event a success.

Bull Town Days Plans Shaping Up

Plans for the annual Bull Town Days celebration, August 14 and 15 are being finalized, according to sources from the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

The schedule is set and the posters with the schedule on them have already been printed and are to be distributed soon.

According to the schedule, on Friday, August 14, there will be a Fashion Show, held in the Senior Citizens Building, which will be

sponsored by the Browsabout. It will begin at 6 p.m.

At 8 p.m. on August 14, there will be a Rodeo, which will be sponsored by the Bovina Roping Club and it will be held in the Bovina Roping Arena.

On the following morning, Saturday, August 15, a Chuck Wagon Breakfast will be held in the City Park, starting at 6 a.m.

Following the breakfast, there will be an American Quarterhorse Association Show, sponsored by the

Roping Club, which will start at 10 a.m. and be held in the Roping Arena.

The Old Timers Luncheon will be held on Saturday at noon, and will be held at the Senior Citizens Building and the Bovina Women's Study Club will serve as hostesses for the affair.

At 4 p.m., the Bull Town Days Parade will be kicked off and several more entries have come in, according to Suezzy Smith.

The Shriners Motorcade and Marching Band will be featured and the Corvette Club of Clovis will also be present.

Leading the parade will be the Color Guard of Cannon Air Force Base, Clovis, N.M. and there will be floats from the Young Homemakers, who will feature the Little Miss Contest winners on their float, First Baptist Church, Bovina Roping Club and some of the school organizations, including the FHA chapter, and either the National Honor Society or the Student Council.

Mrs. Smith wants to remind everyone that the deadline for the parade was to have been the first of August, but she said that arrangements will be made for those entries who did not get in at that time.

A parade judge has been appointed but officials are not sure who she has not been named at the time we talked to Mrs. Smith.

Other activities following the parade include a barbecue dinner on the City Park grounds beginning at 5 p.m.

Chairman Billy J. Charles, of the food committee, says that they are geared up and ready. His group will begin cooking the barbecue Friday, August 14 at about 1 p.m. for the dinner the following day.

The meal will consist of barbecued beef, home cooked beans, peppers, pickles, onions and possibly cantaloupe, but Charles says they have yet to get the fruit. The charge per person per plate will be \$2.00.

Steve Sherrill, who is in charge of getting a carnival, says they are not having much luck finding one and at the present time, chances are slim of getting a carnival together.

Following the barbecue meal, there will be a High School Rodeo which will be held in the Bovina Roping Arena and a softball tournament which started August 13 will continue throughout Bull Town Days. It will be sponsored by the Bovina Jaycees.

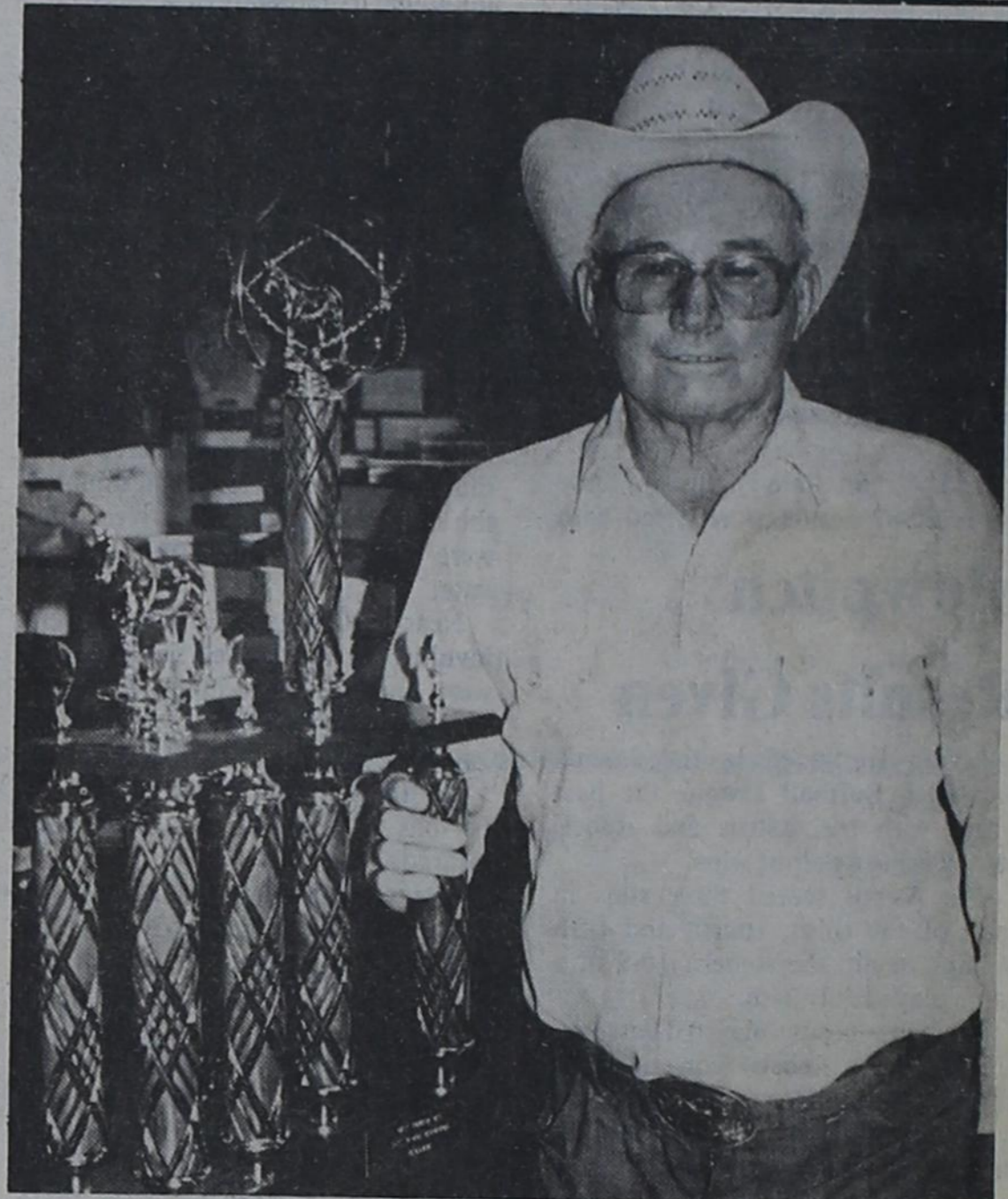
Four-Lane Facility Is Meet Topic

Law Enforcement, Emergency Reports

As grim as they are, Department of Public Safety statistics show that seven per cent more Texas residents died in traffic accidents for this period of time than they did last year.

Through June 1981, 1,718 traffic fatalities were reported. Last year at the same time there were 1,605 deaths attributed to traffic mishaps.

This year, to date, there have been 80,126 injuries reported in traffic accidents in the State, and last year at the same time there were 73,202 injuries reported, which is an increase this year of nine per cent.

Over 27,000 accidents involving motor vehicles in traffic were reported, and 142 of these were fatal. Over 7,400 persons were injured in those accidents and 19,603 escaped injury.

On U.S. and State Highways, there were 10,987 accidents reported with

144 of these severe enough to cause death and there were 3533 injuries associated with those wrecks.

On farm-to-market roads in the State, there were 2854 accidents reported with 52 of these fatal accidents and injuries which amounted to a total of 980.

On County Roads, so far this year, 18 persons have died and 572 were injured. There were 1,615 accidents reported occurring on these roads.

In cities under 2,500, 7,028 accidents occurred with 184 of them fatal and 2,502 persons receiving injuries.

The largest number of accidents occurred between the hours of 4 and 5 p.m. and on Friday.

More persons between the ages of 25-34 died as a result of accidents in this state and this more than doubled the number of teenaged drivers who were killed in accidents this year to date.

Nearly 10,000 persons who were involved in motor vehicle accidents were involved in accidents in which the automobile was entering at an angle.

Of these types of accidents, 35 persons were killed and 2500 were injured.

The second highest occurrence of accidents involved rear-ending, which accounted for about 1973, and the third highest incidences of accidents occurred when one car was leaving the driveway and was hit by another car.

In 1981, more males died and were injured in traffic accidents than females. Some 40,000 men were involved in accidents where there were 19,000 females involved.

Most often, accidents occurred on normal road conditions with no defects reported wrong with the vehicle and they happened most often on clear days on dry surfaces.

Most of the accidents involved a car and the second most accidents involved trucks with motorcycles coming in as third in this category.

We realize that statistics are boring and most of the time they are not too interesting or informative. But, we do hope you will take the time otherwise, you might become a statistic.

New Map Details Ground Water Supply

Parmer County's Hydrologic Atlas
 is now available to area irrigators,
 landowners, and residents of the
 High Plains Underground Water
 District service area. This atlas is the
 most detailed and complete ground
 water mapping investigation ever
 made in Parmer County. The atlas
 consists of a packet containing a text
 describing the county's hydrologic
 conditions and a set of four maps
 covering Parmer County.

The text is short, concise,
 illustrated, and includes an
 explanation of how to read and
 interpret contour lines. Points
 discussed in the text include the older
 geologic formation in relation to the
 Ogallala, the composition of the
 Ogallala, its volume of water in
 storage, chemical quality, recharge,
 movement and water-level changes.

In all, 15 county atlases are being
 published by the Water District for all
 or those portions of the following
 counties served by the High Plains
 Water District: Armstrong, Bailey,
 Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Deaf
 Smith, Floyd, Hale, Hockley, Lamb,
 Lubbock, Lynn, Parmer, Potter and
 Randall.

These atlases are being prepared to
 help local landowners and operators
 and other county residents to better
 understand the fresh water resources
 available under their towns, cities,
 farms and industries. They should be
 a valuable planning tool to confirm
 available water resources and for
 locating future irrigation well sites.
 The maps are intended for use
 primarily in providing general
 information to the public served by
 the District and are not warranted for
 use in real estate transactions or other
 legal matters.

Copies of the atlas are available
 upon request and at no charge from
 the High Plains Water District. To

The four maps illustrate (1) the
 elevation of the land surface; (2) the
 elevation of the water table in the
 Ogallala Formation in 1980; (3) the
 elevation of the base of the Ogallala
 Formation; and (4) the saturated
 thickness of the Ogallala in 1980. The
 maps were developed using twenty
 foot contour intervals. The data for
 each map describing this information
 is printed on a county highway base
 map at a scale of two miles per inch.
 Legal descriptions are also illustrated
 on the maps to assist landowners in
 proper identification of their
 property.

 p.m.

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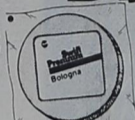


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
