Food for Growing Chickens Is Subject Of Kokomo Meet

"A good growing mash should be fed after the chicks are six weeks old," Miss Mabel Caldwell told the Kokomo 4-H club girls in a meeting March 22, at the school-house.

"A good growing mash consists of the following ingredients: corn meal (yellow), 36 pounds; wheat bran, 20 pounds; wheat gray shorts, 20 pounds; meat and bone scrap, 5 pounds; cottonseed meal, 10 pounds; alfalfa leaf meal, 5 pounds; oyster shell, 2 pounds; bone meal, 1 pound; salt, 1 pound.

"The chicks need all these ingredients for their bodies to develop properly. A balanced ration will develop stronger bodies and greater disease resistance."

Worth Of Silage Told By Dairyman

"Silage which I bought from my neighbor when my green pasture was all gone kept my dairy cows in full production," said Henry Hamilton, Ranger dairyman, while recently discussing plans with County Agent Cook for digging a trench silo of his own this year.

Hamilton had no silage but was milking 12 dairy cows. His neighbor, S. O. Montgomery, had more

silage in his trench than he needed. Hamilton bought silage and fed it to his cows when the green pasture failed, giving each cow all she would eat. He found that his cows were eating 20 pounds per head per day of the silage. He said he could tell no difference in milk production when he made

the change.

Hamilton plans to start digging his trench silo soon, doing the work during spare time so that it will be ready to fill when his feed gets ripe this summer. His plans also include walling the trench with rock and cutting up his feed with a hammer mill.

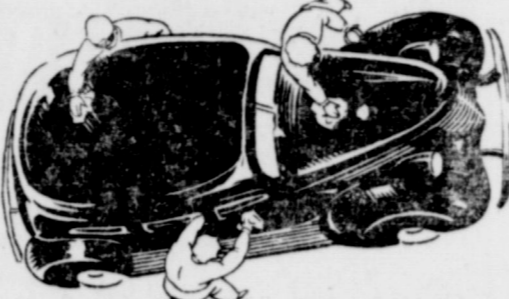

Bids Now Required on WPA Trucks and Other Equipment

SAN ANTONIO.—Owners and operators of 2,000 teams, trucks, and other pieces of equipment currently being used on WPA projects in Texas, and other persons interested in renting such equipment to WPA, must submit competitive bids to the United States Treasury Procurement Office before April 7, it was announced today.

Such equipment was formerly rented to the Government at schedule rates on a pay roll basis but in conformity with a recent decision made by the Comptroller General, the competitive bid system of obtaining equipment is being adopted.

The State Procurement Officer, Treasury Department, Smith-Young Tower, San Antonio, will mail invitations to bid immediately to owners of equipment who are now registered with his office.

These bids will be opened at 10 o'clock Friday morning, April 7, by the Procurement Officer. All persons interested in offering their trucks and who have not received an invitation to bid should write the Procurement Officer for such invitation or request invitations from one of the 42 WPA area offices in Texas, it was explained.

All bids are being accepted on an indefinite quantity of open end contract, on a broken time basis, with operators. Any driver or operator employed by a truck owner must be paid the prevailing wage on WPA projects.

George S. Morgan, state director of finance for WPA, stated that it is desired that every person who owns a truck of the type used on WPA projects be given an opportunity to bid.

"Although the filing of the bid is the sole responsibility of the truck owner," he said, "every assistance will be rendered owners in securing invitations to bid so that they may submit them before bids are opened."

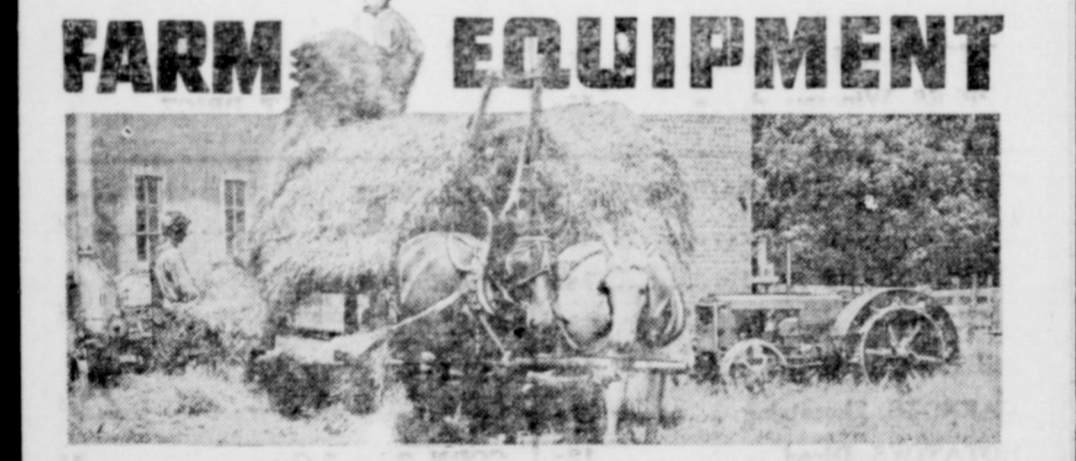

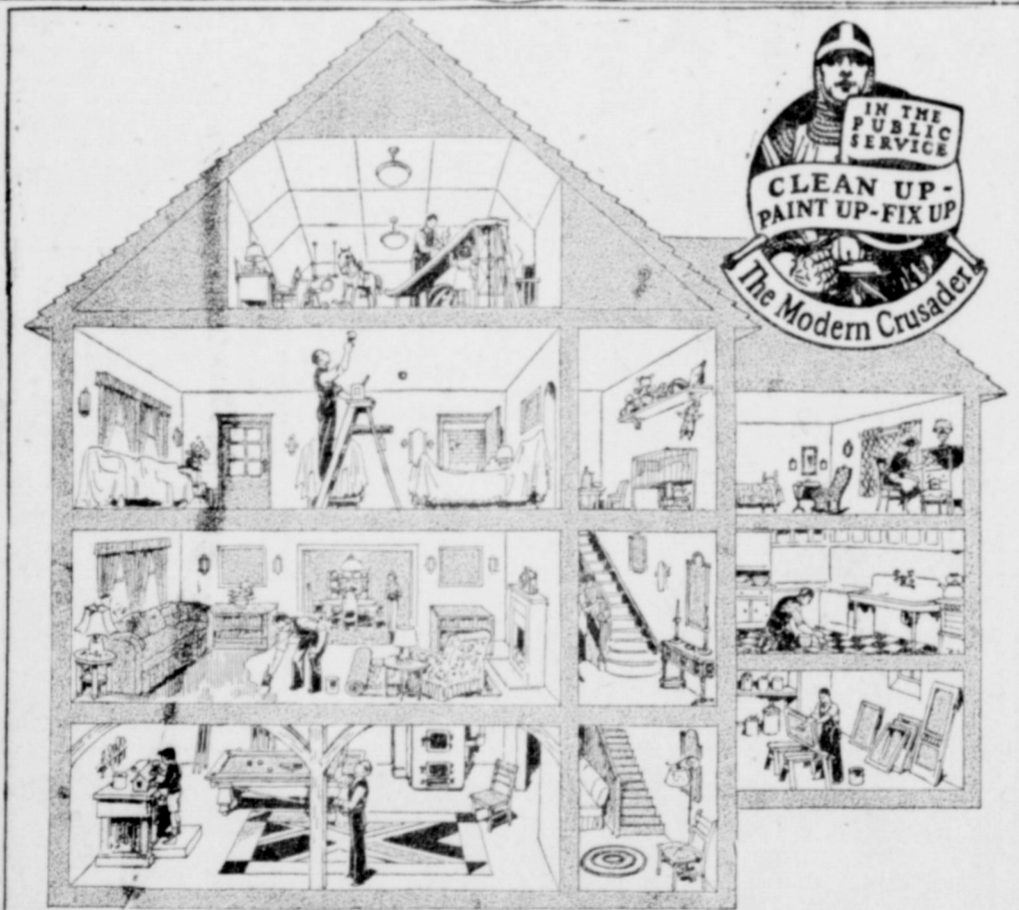

A Tragic Light on Czecho-Slovakia

The other day the editorial desk received a "hand-out" of prepared publicity which went the way of so many others—into the wastebasket.

But today the contents of that "hand-out" come back with terrific impact. The recollection of its causes the kind of shock that follows when one comes upon a prized personal possession of some dear one only recently dead.

It was from Czecho-Slovakia. That already-dismembered republic had hired a high-powered American publicity man to help it in its comeback. We can't quote exactly the "hand-out" which was thrown away, but its plea, pathetic in view of events since, comes back like this:

"We don't want pity, we Czechs. We have had a hard blow, but we are hardy people, and we are trying to bob up, smiling. Instead of pitying us, help us. We are ready to work to hold our place in the world's trade, all the harder because of our dismemberment at Munich. But we will work harder, produce better goods. You can help us most by buying them."

That was the general tone of the message. And now, a few short days later, that rather brave little appeal has gone whistling down the wind.

No longer is there any Czech nation, proud and independent, trying against odds to hold its place before the world. It has been bound to the German chariot-wheel, and any money sent for its goods will go, not to help a struggling Czecho-Slovakian nation, but simply to add power to the next German drive to overrun the next small country.

For years the cry has been that Czecho-Slovakia as a nation was unjust to minorities, to Sudeten Germans, to Slovaks, to Ruthenians, to Hungarians and Poles.

Now Germany assumes those minority problems. The Czechs are now a minority under German domination, so are the Slovenians and Magyars and Poles within the areas that have been pulled into the German orbit. Gradually Hitler is assembling a patchwork of racial minorities that is something like the one pinned together by the old Austro-Hungarian empire, and which plagued every moment of its life.

Hitler, as he gains advantages, is also taking on responsibilities and troubles.

I Give You Texas

Shall 1,500,000 acres of land, worth untold millions of dollars and belonging to the taxpayers of Texas, be given to major oil companies?

That is the question involved in certain land bills now before the Legislature.

A vacancy is a piece of land that the State has never sold. It therefore, still belongs to the State—to you and me and all the other 6,000,000 citizens of Texas—and we have decided that it shall be set apart for the State Permanent School Fund to help maintain our schools.

The only way a vacancy is ever discovered is by a vacancy-finder. Let someone name a single instance in which an oil company has ever come forward voluntarily and said, "Folks, we made a mistake; we thought we had a lease to this land and we drilled a 10,000-barrel gusher on it, but the land really belongs to the State?"

The vacancy-finder expects the State to reward him because he proves that the State owns a rich piece of land that it didn't know about. These certain major oil companies don't dare to have a bill introduced with the announced purpose of giving those companies the land that belongs to all the taxpayers but, instead, these corporations sponsor legislation to place the reward of the vacancy-finder so low that he will have no incentive to find a vacancy and so the oil companies will be left in undisturbed possession to take the oil that belongs to all of us.

The pending bill allows the vacancy-finder a 1-24 interest. Under present proration (supposing there was a well on the tract), it would take him almost a year to get back the \$250 filing fee that he will be required to pay; four more years to get back the \$1,000 surveying fee, and, if he paid an attorney no more than \$1,000, it would take four more years to get that back. Would you risk your money when the courts might say after all your trouble and expense, that there was no vacancy and you wouldn't get back a penny and, even if you proved there was a vacancy, it would take you nine years to get back the money you were out? No, there would be no more vacancies found.

Those back of this legislation talk about the occupant; they say nothing about the oil companies. Yet the occupant is receiving only 1-8th of the oil; the oil companies are getting 7-8ths so they

have seven times as much at stake as he does.

But let us consider the occupant for a moment: As we stated, a vacancy is land that the State has never sold; it is land on the outside of the boundaries of the land that has been sold. Therefore, the occupant has never paid for the vacancy; he has never paid any taxes on it and he has never paid the State any rent on it though he may have used it for 40 years. But nobody wants to be unfair to him. When he took possession, 40 years ago, he had no thought of oil; he wanted the land to raise crops on and to run cattle on. Why not give him, without any charge whatever, full ownership of the surface? In addition, give him a share in the oil, give the State a share and still leave enough for the vacancy-finder to reward him for his effort? The only real loser under such an arrangement would be some rich oil corporation that has lawyers and surveyors and was bound under the law to find out who really owned the land, anyway.

There are abuses under the present law. Make the filing fee \$250 so that legitimate land-owners will not be blackmailed by unfounded claims. By the way, investigation will show that many such groundless claims were inspired by oil companies that wanted to discredit the whole law.

If the proposed legislation is passed, it can never be repealed—a majority in either House or a Governor can block repeal.

Amend the present law and protect legitimate land-owners, yes; but let's not have the taxpayers of Texas pay Santa Claus, to the tune of \$100,000,000, to foreign-owned oil companies when the taxpayers are digging as deep as they can for school taxes and yet many teachers are under-paid and many boys and girls are receiving only six-months' schooling. If you think I'm right, let your legislators hear from you today.

How about this one as the oldest joke of all? A negro, after hearing a candidate make a speech said, "He sho' did recommend hisself mighty high."

Civil Service—The giving of a Civil Service examination to my mind means just what the intent of the law happens to be. It is based on merit and the qualifications which a person shows for that particular place. No letter of endorsement or recommendation is needed until the Commission calls for one. No one has a chance for appointment until they have made the eligible list and nothing can be done by any one but the applicant to make the right grade for an appointment. A review can be secured on any paper on request but it is seldom that a material change is made in the results. Civil Service aims at merit only and when they get through with an examination and investigation they usually know all that is to be known about an applicant.

Congress at Work—Most of the Congress' time last week was spent in clearing up the so-called supply bills so that action could be taken on the more pressing national problems. There are now three supply bills that have become law, six have been approved by the House and five by the Senate. There are a half a dozen more to be taken up by both Houses.

Social Security—The House Ways and Means Committee voted unanimously to defer any action on the inclusion of farm labor, domestic help, and employees of religious, charitable and non-profit institutions in the Social Security System. It had been recommended by the Social Security Board that these workers be put into the system, but because the proposals raised problems which could not be solved before the end of the present session, the Committee would not approve.

Sale of Warships and Arms—A resolution introduced jointly by Senator Pittman of Nevada and Rep. Bloom of New York has commanded much attention. Senator Pittman, chairman of the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations is author of this resolution which would permit the President to sell warships and arms of United States manufacture at his discretion. It would also permit him to give the secrets concerning their manufacture and operation to Latin American countries in an effort to sustain continental solidarity.

Spring Rise for Farm Products—The Bureau of Agricultural Economics looks for moderate improvement in the domestic demand for farm products this spring and summer. A slight change for the better in the outlook for foreign demand is also noted. Farm products prices in domestic markets declined about 4 per cent during the past winter, but recently have been holding relatively steady. The demand outlook for farm products depends largely upon industrial activity in this country.

Navy Gifts—Men of Uncle Sam's Navy, now returning from fleet maneuvers in the Caribbean, are said to have stowed aboard their battleships, destroyers, submarines and bombing planes a \$3-472.26 assortment of cocktail napkins, finger-tip towels, baby bibs, and baskets, according to reports from the Virgin Islands Handicraft Cooperatives.

Aviation and Works Progress—The Works Progress Administration advanced civil and military aviation during the three and one-half years ended December 31 with construction of 154 new airports, extensions of improvements to 494 others and the placing of hundreds of navigation aids. WPA expenditures for aviation facilities in 1933 totaled \$35,440,894 as the program extended to 53 additional airport sites and individual projects were completed at the rate of approximately one a day. With the beginning of 1933, 37,986 men were at work on 164 sites providing additional facilities essential to the rapidly expanding aviation industry and the Government's airplane fleets.

Crop Insurance Not New—Although 1933 sees the principle of "all-risk" insurance extended to wheat growers on a nation-wide scale, the idea of crop insurance is not new. Benjamin Franklin was one of the first to advocate the use of insurance to protect farmers against crop losses. In 1788 the crops over a large portion of France were destroyed by a severe storm and Franklin wrote to a friend in that country: "I have sometimes thought it might be well to establish an office of insurance for farms against the damage that may occur to them from storms, blight, insects, etc. A small sum paid by a number would repair such losses and prevent much poverty and distress."

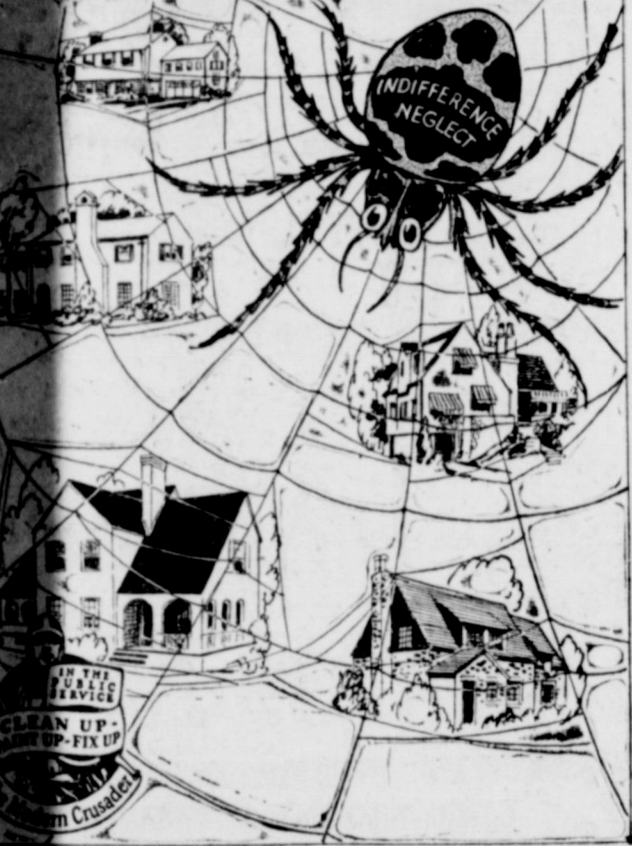

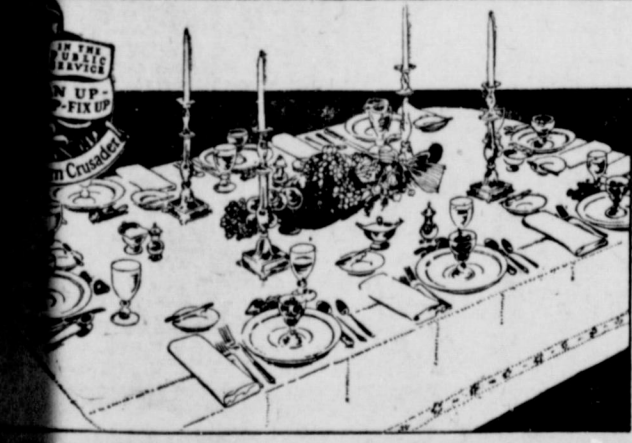


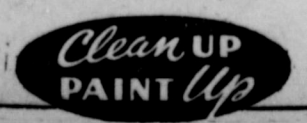

An American Wife of a Nazi Picks U.S. Castle On the Rhine Or Cottage Here?

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich.—Katherine Landman Tonnis married a Nazi, doesn't regret it, but prefers a simple home in the United States to a castle on the Rhine.

Mrs. Tonnis, a resident of Grand Rapids since childhood, will fall heir to a family castle at Dusseldorf upon the death of an aunt, its present owner. It was while visiting her aunt at Dusseldorf several years ago that Mrs. Tonnis, then Katherine Landman, met her husband-to-be, a German aeronautical engineer in a military aircraft factory. They were married after a whirlwind courtship and for two years Mrs. Tonnis resided with her husband in the militarized industrial town of Gotha near the Czech-Slovakian border.

She returned to America last November. Her husband promised to join her, to see if he preferred the United States to the totalitarian regimentation of his native Reich. According to Mrs. Tonnis, the agreement is for a two-year trial, at the end of which her husband will decide whether to seek American citizenship or return to Germany.

"If he should decide to return, I shall go with him," Mrs. Tonnis said, "but I believe that he will like it better here.

"America has a higher standard of living, my husband will earn a higher wage and he likes life free and easy."

Although Tonnis now works in a German plane factory, Mrs. Tonnis said he was a peace-loving man.

"If he comes to the U. S., he said he would prefer working in transport aviation," she explained.

Although Mrs. Tonnis "likes America better" and will give up her claim to the ancestral castle by remaining in this country, she does not dislike Germany. She said she likes the German people, admires many things in the land and has a deep respect for Adolf Hitler. Reared as an American, however, she prefers its traditional freedom and hopes her husband will as well.

HALE CENTER, Texas—The champion blue-ribbon winning family of West Texas has been discovered. In fifteen years of exhibiting registered livestock, purebred poultry, canned goods, field crops, 4-H and F. F. A. club projects, as well as home demonstration club handiwork, the father, mother and six children of the E. D. Heath family in the Center Plains community, eight miles west of here, have amassed 637 ribbons, from eight to first place awards—and grand championships, too.

They estimate their cash winnings to be in the neighborhood of \$5,000 for this period of time. Plus that cash and ribbons, practically every member of the family has won trips offered for superior club work.

Their winnings began back in 1924 when they won a second place ribbon for poultry, entered in a 4-H club show in the Washington county fair at Akron, Colorado, by a daughter, Opal. She has since married and is now Mrs. Richard Simpson of Akron.

Other members of the family, Frances, another daughter, and four sons, Raymond, Robert, Eugene and Harold, have continually earned honors for their agricultural projects every year since.

Principal winnings by this family have been with registered hogs. They have just completed their most successful year, when they won \$1,050.50 in cash premiums, and 210 ribbons, by exhibiting Chester White hogs in eleven fairs and five Southwestern States.

Their first experience with hogs was in exhibiting registered Hampshires. That was when they lived on their farm near Odessa, Colo. They still own and operate that farm, but have made their residence in Texas since 1935.

In 1936, at the Texas Centennial Exposition in Dallas, the Heath hogs broke into the big money and fancy awards, then repeated in 1937 and 1938 in outstanding fairs and in the Southwest.

Last fall, the fairs they entered included Topeka, Hutchinson and Dodge City, Kansas; Oklahoma

Six Foot "Weevils" Injuring Cotton

EL PASO, Tex.—Six-foot "weevils" in a bale of cotton are more responsible for the decline in American exports of cotton than are the weevils in the bolls, F. E. Lichte, gin specialist for the Texas extension service, told El Paso valley farmers.

Lichte described the "bale weevils" as "five and a half to six feet tall, either white or black, and using a sharp cotton knife."

"They hack a bale of cotton, to pieces, cutting samples from between every tie," he said.

"There are too many delivery boys handling our cotton. At each place it goes, from gin to warehouse to compress or concentration point to shipside, somebody cuts out another sample."

"They are responsible for us delivering to foreign spinners the sorriest looking package of cotton of any nation in the world."

Lichte said the cutting which are kept by samplers represent a pound or more of cotton from every bale and amount to 140,000 bales a year.

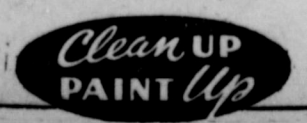
