Tax Problem Begins to Yield to Study

All taxes are unpleasant.

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Everybody thinks the best way to solve the tax problem is to cut out the particular taxes which bear most heavily on him.

But that is scarcely the way to go at it. With taxes, as with tariffs, it is dangerous to frame a system as a haphazard balance between conflicting claims of individual interests. Only the most disinterested study on the highest plane will produce results today.

Fortunately such studies are being made, and they have points on which they singularly agree.

Both the Fortune Magazine Round-Table discussion and the Brookings Institution, in studies made separately, agree that it is not the size of the tax burden that is holding up the parade, but the particular kind of taxes.

Both agree that present taxes tend to keep money from flowing into new investment enterprises, and both agree on several changes which, without reducing the tax "take," might help to get investment money flowing back into productive channels. Both agree that this is the only answer to unemployment.

Both reports condemn tax-exempt securities as a refuge in which potential investment funds can hide without risk, and without heavy taxation. Such exemption removed, they believe this money will be forced into more productive channels.



Adjournment-Leaders in both houses are predicting adjourn ment of Congress to be around the latter part of July or the first of August. Obstacles to early adjournment are major bills and proposals to be taken care of. Included in these are the President's reorganization plans, relief ap propriation of \$1,750,000,000 for the net fiscal year; revision of So. cial Security Act, National Labor Relations Act, and the Neutrality Act.

Toll Highways-A rather definite decision was reached by the Bu reau of Public Roads on the subject of toll highways. The Bureau stated that the cross-country toll Mexico when renewed campaigns highways in the United States, which have often been suggested, were underway to improve an ould not be economically feasi pave the highway between E ble. A suggestion was given, however, that this country needs a carefully planned system of express highways in the big cities to peed traffic. 90 per cent of the traffic on main highways near the entrances to large cities is bound to or from points in the cities themselves and cannot be routed around with by-passes. The plan was referred to by the President as providing a "master plan for the deevlopment of all of the highway and street facilities of the Nation.

Deficiency Bill - Congress has sent the second deficiency appropriation bill to the President for his approval. The bill's total \$162,000,000 includes \$153,000,-000 for army ordinance and sup plies, sea-coast defense, construct tion and machinery in replacing naval vessels and armor, and nav al armament and ammunition.

Social Security Tax - Chairman Doughton, of the House Commit tee on Ways and Means announce ed that the Committee will recom mend that Congress hold social se curity pay-roll taxes at the pies ent level for the next three years One percent is the present pay roll tax for old-age benefits, but under the present law, the tax would increase next January to one and one-half per cent. cording to the committee, the d cision to keep it at one percent would save employers and employees a total of \$825,000,000 in tax payments during the three year period.

Air Bases-Congress was asked by the President to appropriate \$31,621,000 for an immediate start on construction of a chain of air bases in the Pacific Ocean and in addition, authorization of other work in connection with the air program. The House Appropriations Committee will consider the requests in connection the \$688,00,000 regular Naval Appropriation Bill. In the meantime, the House Military Committee favorably reported a bill authorizing \$5,000,000 for enlarging land areas of ten military posts and to create an anti-ai craft target range in the Mohave desert in California.

Penalty-Under a bill reported by the House Judiciary Commit tee, penalty for conviction of es pionage during peace times wou'd be increased from two years im onment to ten years. Another bill, reported by House Military Affairs Committee would bar al persons convicted of desertion from military forces in past wars from returning to the United States.



WASHINGTON, May 11 .- Attorney General Frank Murphy said today that Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins has asked his opinion on government powers to deal with the stopping of soft coal mining.

Murphy declined to discuss de tails of his discussion of the legal, phase of the coal deadlock, except to say that he had not given Miss Perkins a formal legal opinion on the government's powers.

He said he had not been asked to participate in discussions seek-ing to break the coal deadlock and denied that the question of government operation of the bitumi ious mines had been raised during his conference with Miss Perkins

Murphy's statement came afte the white house said President Roosevelt is hopeful of settlement of the coal deadlock, but is considering further steps to be taken in event mining is not resumed.
