Ten Years of the Higher Hypocrisy

It is just 10 years ago that President Hoover proclaim- were awarded with the eagle scout ed effective the Kellogg Pact, designed to outlaw forever war as an instrument of national policy among the 59 nations which signed it.

With Aristide Briand, France's great postward peacemaker, Kellogg hoped and believed that they had helped put the nations of the world on a new track toward peace

The world hoped so, too, weary with postwar wrang- Bobby Furse of this troop also ling and the failure to make good on the war promises that means would be taken to make it the last war.

But what was ushered in with the Kellogg-Briand pact was not the higher statesmanship, but the higher hypocrisy. What was outlawed was not war itself, but the world war.

In 1931 when Japan seized Manchuria and turned it into Manchukuo, the United States, Britain, China, and other powers called Japan's attenton to the fact that they Bashain, John Halkias, Coope had all signed the Kellogg-Briand pact. Japan returned a diplomatic shrug and grinned that this was not war; this was merely the suppression of unreasonable opposition to Japanese influence in Manchuria.

When Italy invaded Ethiopia in 1935, the attention of Rome was called to the fact that both nations had signed the Kellogg-Briand treaty. But this wasn't war, the Italians Mickle, Collen Satterwhite, Bobinsisted. This was a mere colonial expedition aimed at pacifying Ethopian tribesmen who could not understand the benefits of Italian influence in their country.

By the time Germany and Italy were sending their troops to Spain, and China and Japan became locked in a three-year death struggle everybody was too tired to call attention to the fact that they had all formally renounced war as an instrument of national policy. The million dead in Spain, and millions dead in China had died in something, but not in a war.

Thus the high spot of all time in international hypocrisy has been quickly and neatly achieved. The 59 nations solemnly agreed not to wage war, and not one of them has dared to denounce the pact or withdraw its signature. They just go on waging war, and calling it something else.

It is the higher hypocrisy in action. Yet there is something significant in the fact that none of these warring powers has formally denounced its signa- of a Congressman as having ture or formally withdrawn from its agreements. It is because they all know that deep in the hearts of their people Andrew Mellon. lies the wish for peace. And while they do not give the peoples peace, they dare not formally and officially say that they care nothing for this desire.





Makes it a crime for any person to "deprive, attempt to de-prive, or threaten to deprive, by any means" any person of "any employment, Position, work, compensation or other benefit provided for or made possible by any act of Congress appropriating funds for work tollef or tellef purposes, on account of race, creed, color or any political ac-

SUPPLEMENTAL PASTURE. -Having one graing crop to tare up where another leaves off such as Korean lespedeza following Kentucky bluegrass in mid-summer when the bluegrass becomes dormant, means more and better beef cattle gains as shown by experiments carried out by the United States Department of Agriculture. As the bluegrass started its midsammer dormancy, 30 head of steers were taken from the bluegrass pasture and allowed to graze on Korean lespedeza for 8 weeks. Another group continued to graze on bluegrass for the same period. The group of steers pastured on lespedeza graded one grade high-er than those remaining on bluegrass, Department pasture specialists report. In addition, the steers on the supplemental pasture produced 38 per cent greater liveweight gain.

GENERAL OUTLOOK. -- Net contributions of Federal spending have been running rather stead by at about twelve million dollars per business day, while those of State and municipal financing have averaged about four million dollars a day. It now seems reasonable to expect that there will be a well ustained inflow of funds from Federal spending from State to municipal financing during the remaining months of the year. but there is little basis for judging how large the contribution from new corporate issues will be. Agricultural prospects are good. Rear' trade is holding up we'l, and particularly in rural districts. Building construction is making a distinctive better record than last year or the year before, aithough, here was a decline in resdence building. War Threats are still the greatest business deterren's.

F.S.A. HOUSES COST LESS THAN \$1,500-The Farm Security Administration announced that contracts were awarded during the past fiscal year from the con-struction of 2,784 of its specially designed low-cost farm homes for an average cost of only \$1,474.20. The Farm Security Admiinstrator, characterized this as the lowest cost at which substantial homes of comparable quality had ever been built in this country either by public or private agencies. This is the culmination of our four year effort to develop a really substantial, low-cost farm house. We have shown that liveable farm houses can be built in the South for less than \$1,400 and in the North for less than \$2,500, including profits for contractors and suppliers of materials and paying prevailing wages to labor. The 2,784 homes contracted for by the Farm Se-curity Administration during the year included 1,645 Southern farm buildings of frame construction, without bathrooms, costing an average of about \$1350. It also included 800 fully modernized units, with bathrooms, costing clightly over \$1500 each. Prefabricated steel houses in the South, and northern farm buildings, fully equipped for heating raised the average cost. The steel units, built on an experimental basis in the South, in cooperation with a load-

Eastland Man Is Given Suspended Term In Forgery


Roy Stalley of Eastland has been given a two-year sentence, suspended, on a charge of forgery, according to 88th district court records Saturday.
