

Cook, County Agent, who reports that several have already made their seed selections for next year for this purpose. Southern blight of peanuts reduced the yield of nuts an estimated ten percent this year.

Hull indicated that similar strong representations are being made to Berlin, as a result of the Flint's seizure by a German war-ship, which took it to the Russian port of Murmansk.


