



Who Pays U.S. **Operating Expenses?**

Don't gloat too hard if you were one of the people who didn't need to pay any federal income taxes this year. Don't for a minute think you're getting away with something. You're not. This means that only one out of ev- | rector. ery 38 persons pays an income tax, or one out of every 15 voting citizens. Uncle Sam will collect about two billion dollars from this form of taxation and from inheritance taxes put together-but the expenses for the year will total nine billion.

The income tax, in fact just about pays for WPA, with very little or nothing left over. The number of persons on WPA has varied between two and three million since 1935. A year ago there were nearly three million collecting WPA checks-almost as many persons as were paying income taxes. The federal government spent \$2,065,000,-000 for this form of work-relief alone during the fiscal year ending in June, 1939; and the year ending next June will have cost about 1 1-2 billions.

Who pays for the rest of the governmental expenditures? You do, of course. It comes in various indirect ways -customs, corporation taxes, undivided profits taxes. taxes on checks and on safety deposit boxes, taxes on cigarets, liquor and amusements processing taxes and taxes on gasoline.

Painless taxation? At the moment of extraction, yes, because you don't notice it; in the aggregate, no. In a year's time, the pennies and nickels add up to incredible amounts. And remember, what Uncle Sam doesn't collect in taxes, he borrows. That's a little matter which your children, who have had nothing to say about it, will have to settle







Canad an People Are Baffled by the Cromwells S. Ŭ. 0 Ottawa Reserves Judgment on Jimmy and Doris Anti-Nazi Speech Brings Speedy Repercussions

OTTAWA .--- A world record for the free-style plunge into hot water has been achieved by James H. R. Cromwell, since early January American minister to Canada.

Aheady heavy fire, including acrid demands for his recall, is being directed at him from congressional trenches on the American side. And on the Canadian end, official and social Ottawa is baffled by his wife, the former Doris Duke, whose activities as official hostess have been notable by their absence.

She reached the high point of her brief diplomatic career recently when a Toronto paper carried in Ottawa dispatch which said of her:

"She confessed to Hon. C. D. Howe, minister of transport, when asked how she liked Ottawa, "Well, all I've seen of Ottawa so far is a haze of cigaret smoke through cocktail glasses."

Cromwell, whose life has been marked by an avid desire to make something of himself and who wants to rise above the position of a rich man married to "the world's richest woman," buckled down to a valiant effort to live up to demands of his post.

HARD-WORKING DIPLOMAT STICKS HIS NECK OUT

He is at his desk every morning, denying audience to no serious person, evidently bent on being 'human" and democratic. He has worked hard under the able coaching of a veteran career staff headed by the level-headed John Farr Simmons.

There was a brief flutter of excitement when Ottawa got its first glimpse of Doris, preceded by world-wide publicity. The reception was formal and polite. Then people sat back to wait and see.

Lavish entertaining was expected. But it didn't follow. Mrs. Cronwell appeared as hostess at only three social functions, all minor.

Ottawa has seen little of her. She has been spending only about two days a week in Ottawa. On other days she is off on skiing expeditions to Quebec and other sports centers. Once she flew to New York in her private plane.

The same paper which made public her "eigaret smoke through cocktail glasses" version of Ottawa. said that she spends most of her time gallivanting about and that, "as yet she has no social secretary."

This was followed by hints that the Cromwells were not taking kindly to their jobs. These became so prevalent that Cromwell felt that he had to deny them-a strange and unenviable position for member of the diplomatic service.

So Cromwell said, publicly:

"Nothing could be farther from the truth. Both Mrs. Cromwell and I have liked Canada and Canadians from the beginning." Official Ottawa is patient and realizes that the

American representatives were green when they took the job and could hardly be expected to turn into model diplomats in two months. Canadians as a whole seem determined to wait and see.




