## Townsend Clubs Of District Meet In Ranger Sunday

The Townsend Clubs of the congressional district, held a mass meeting at the Odd Fellows hall in Ranger, Sunday. B. Creamer, district chairman of Comanche, presided, assisted by District Secretary Jeter de Leon. The meeting was represented by members from Mineral Wells, De Leon, Comanche, Eastland and other clubs. At 3 p. m. a large crowd gathered to hear the address of Miss Martha Schmeale, of Garden City, Texas, one of the speakers sent from the Townsend headquarters in Chicago. The meeting was presided over by B. O. King, chairman of the Ranger Township Club. In the absence of the speaker, or any of the city officials, E. A. Ringold was asked to introduce the speaker of the evening. Miss Schmeale spoke for one hour and twenty minutes, explaining the Townsend movement, what it means and how it is working to affect the country if it becomes a law. Her address was delivered in a careful manner and held the divided attention of the audience from start to finish. Miss Schmeale advised the people that the bill now pending in Congress was almost sure to receive favorable consideration at session, and that practically all representatives have promised to support the bill to make passage assured during this session. After Miss Schmeale had finished her address, a short talk was given by the district chairman, Creamer, who insisted that everyone interested in this movement become a member of a Townsend club and lead their assistance in helping bring this movement into law. ## Special Caution Of Motorists In Summer is Urged

With warmer weather children may be found playing in front of their homes in the street, more often, local safety authorities said today in pointing out that motorists should use more caution in their driving in the city. "While parents should make every effort to see that their children play in yards and playgrounds it is seldom the children always obey. For that reason motorists should be extra careful in driving in the warm months. "During the winter not so many children play out of doors and the warmer months bring about an extra hazard. Motorists should continue to exercise caution in driving on streets in front of and near schools," it was declared.

## Dates Are Assigned For Rising Star's Free Fall Exposition

RISING STAR, April 2.—At a meeting of the directors of the Chamber of Commerce, Sept. 12, 13 and 14 were set as the dates for the Free Fall Fair—about one week earlier than usual. The earlier date was set in order to get certain entertainment attractions that could be had only on the dates given. It was also believed by the Chamber of Commerce officials that exhibits would be in better shape at that time. It is hoped that the new fair building, now in prospect, will be ready for the occasion.

## Showing Of New S S Cards Urged

"Workers looking for employment should carry their Social Security number cards with them," W. O. King, manager of the Abilene Social Security Board office, said today. Furthermore, the worker should be sure to show the card to the employer immediately upon being hired. "This procedure is very important," King continued, "as the Social Security number is the means of identifying the worker's wage account with the Federal Government." If the employee does not show his card to the employer, the latter might report the wages without an account number. In this case, the wages cannot be posted to the worker's account by the Social Security Board. Since the benefits payable under the Old-Age and Survivors Insurance provisions by the Social Security Act are related to the worker's wages, the importance of having all wages posted to worker's account is obvious. "The new benefits under the Social Security act amendments are of vital importance to workers and their families. Therefore, we urge each wage earner to assure for himself full credit for his wages by showing his card to each employer," King said. If any worker does not have a number, he should go to the Social Security Board office, Room 205 Alexander Building, Abilene, where he will receive a number in a very few minutes.

## German Picture of Welles Brings Out Waves of Protest

Germany today published what was purported to be a picture of Undersecretary of State Sumner Welles, in the office of Premier Paul Reynaud of France, with the background formed by a large map of Europe, showing a greatly reduced Germany. At Paris it was claimed that the photograph was a bad job of retouching, done by German artists. Sumner Welles, at Washington, was quoted as saying that he did not even notice that the map was on the wall when the picture was taken. Senators and representatives have suggested that an investigation be made of the whole matter, and that Welles be brought before an investigating committee and made to tell the facts he found in Europe.

## EASTLAND DEBT IS REDUCED AT COMM'R PARLEY

Tenders, for which the City of Eastland had advertised on Eastland's general bonds, were opened at a meeting of the commission Tuesday night and the city paid interest on all outstanding general bonds and bought \$51,000 in general bonds. The general bonds were bought at a price of approximately 24 cents on the dollar. The present city commission of Eastland during its administration has paid all interest on the city's general debt and retired a total of \$186,000 in principal, which members of the commission consider very satisfactory up to this time. The commission is planning to continue purchasing additional bonds.

## Good Water Need Of Chickens, State H. D. Club Woman

Chicks need good water as well as good feed and care should be taken in supplying this and keeping the containers clean according to Mrs. J. J. Hamilton, poultry demonstrator for the Morton Valley home demonstration club. Water is a very important part of the chick's diet and should be supplied fresh several times a day, for the mash will wash off of the beaks and settle in the bottom of the water containers, she declared. If the water is clean and pure enough for human consumption then there is no need for adding any kind of disinfectant or tonic to the water. Skim milk is excellent for chicks and should be supplied when available. Milk should never be fed in metal containers, and containers must be cleaned each time milk is fed. Milk attracts flies and for this reason the poultryman may find it convenient to feed it only for a few hours in the mornings. Moisture accumulates around feed and water containers and if neglected may bring about an outbreak of disease. Move the containers to a new location in the brooder house each day. These suggestions may seem simple, but should be followed in order to have your chicks in the best condition, Mrs. Hamilton declared.

## Power Consumption In Texas Is Up

AUSTIN, Tex.—Electric power consumption in Texas continues to climb over last year, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports, citing a February increase of 6.3 per cent over February, 1939. Commercial use of electricity was 10.2 per cent higher, industrial 0.9 per cent, residential 7 per cent and other use 21 per cent higher than February, 1939. Slight declines were registered in commercial, industrial and residential as compared with January.

A sincere invitation for everyone to attend again was extended. The free cooking school each year is regarded by women of Eastland as one of the main events of the year. In the lectures Mrs. Burbank is showing short cuts in the preparing of meals and at the same time is introducing new ideas which makes each meal an occasion, it was shown.

Mrs. Winnie R. Grady, supervisor of the Eastland WPA Recreation project, announced today that the craft shop located at the Safe-Haven Community Center in the basement of the Eastland National Bank building will be open for adult instruction each Tuesday and Friday morning from 9 a. m. until noon. Instructions will be given adults in leather-craft, wood craft, metal-craft, jewelry-craft, basketry and needle-craft. There will be no charge for the instructions but the participants must furnish their own materials, explained Mrs. Grady. ## Chicks Should be Kept Warm, One Club Woman Says

These days are getting much warmer, but the nights are still cool and the chicks must be kept warm to be in good shape, Mrs. Irene McKinnerney, poultry demonstrator for the Romney home demonstration club declared today. Enough heat must be supplied to keep the chicks warm and comfortable. The action of the chicks rather than the thermometer is the surest guide toward the correct temperature. When the temperature is right, the chicks when resting will lie or spread out in a circle around the outer edge of the hover. When they crawl under each other, or gather next to the stove, they show that more heat is needed. When they crowd out from under the hover and pant they are too hot. Be sure you test the brooder at least two days before you are ready to put the chicks in and then check several times daily to be sure that the chicks are alright. A temperature of 98 to 100 degrees F. two inches above the floor at the outer edge of the hover is desirable during the first week. Under ordinary conditions the temperature may be lowered to 96 degrees the second week, 92 the third and 88 degrees the fourth. These changes are made gradually and the chicks watched carefully. A few minutes chilling or overheating may result in many deaths or stunted birds and poor layers.

AUSTIN, April 4.—Adversaries of Governor O'Daniel, who announced for re-election last night on a platform calling for \$60,000,000 social security taxes, began sniping at him today. The Dallas Journal said that the governor now is far ahead of all opponents, but Ernest Thompson, who will run against him, said O'Daniel was "firing too early." Two Fort Worth legislators said O'Daniel's tax request was "too high" and another demanded to know who paid for his broadcasts. The El Paso Herald-Post said O'Daniel's speech was a "confession of abject failure."

**Spread Of War Is Factor In Hike Of Tire Business**

The rapidly swelling volume of export business in the rubber industry is attributed to the spread of war in Europe by many tire men, according to Jim Horton, Eastland distributor of Seiberling Tires.

**Recipe on Cheese Making Is Given Women at Meeting**

A dairy thermometer is necessary when making quality cottage cheese at home, stated Miss Ruth Ramey, county home demonstration agent, at a meeting of the Morton Valley club women who gathered at the home of Mrs. J. J. Hamilton.

A recipe was given to the women present and each was asked to try it out before the next meeting. Each home demonstration club has been asked to send two samples of cheese, two of cream, butter and milk to the official Dairy Day in Eastland April 23.

The next club meeting will be at the home of Mrs. Clint Jones, April 16. Mrs. Homer White, poultry demonstrator for the club, and Mrs. J. J. Hamilton will have charge of the program on poultry diseases, records and scrap books.

The cottage cheese recipe given the women is as follows:

1. Adjust the temperature of one gallon of fresh, clean-flavored skim milk to 75 degrees F. by placing the container of skim milk in a larger vessel of water. The temperature of water will depend upon whether the milk is to be warmed or cooled.

2. Add 1-2 cup of cultured buttermilk or clabber milk free of gas holes and off-flavors. Stir the milk thoroughly so that the cultured buttermilk or clabber is well distributed.

3. Hold the milk at a temperature of 75 degrees F. for 12 to 14 hours.

4. Cut the curd when sufficiently firm. Insert a thermometer obliquely into the curd and lift gently. When the curd makes a clean break the cheese is ready to cut. Cut the curd into 1-2 inch cubes with a horizontal curd knife and spatula to allow the whey to separate.

5. After cutting the curd allow cheese to set undisturbed for ten minutes before stirring or applying heat. This will help prevent the cubes from breaking during the cooking process.

6. Add one quart to 1-2 gallon of water at 110 to 120 degrees F. directly to the cheese. The addition of water furnishes a media in which to stir the cubes and helps prevent their breaking.

7. Place the pan containing the cubed cheese in a bath of warm water and heat slowly to 120 degrees F. Allow approximately 30 minutes to reach this temperature and stir very carefully while heating.

8. To test the curd for sufficient cooking place a few of the cubes in cold water. If the cubes are firm, hold their shape and contain little whey, the cooking is complete.

9. Drain the whey and wash the curd twice with cold water. Handle carefully to prevent breaking the cubes.

10. The cubes should be drained in a colander, sieve, or cheese rack until all excess water is removed.

11. Salt cheese to taste. Add sweet cream if desired and store in a cool place until ready to consume or market.

**AN ORDINANCE**

Be it ordained by the City of Eastland, Texas, as follows:

**CAPTION:** An ordinance prohibiting persons operating hotels or other public sleeping or eating places or transporting food or drink within the City of Eastland from employing or keeping in their employ any person infected with transmissible, infectious or contagious disease or condition; requiring a certificate signed by the City Health Officer of the City of Eastland, Texas, certifying such employee has been examined by such physician and that such person is free from such disease or condition; requiring such examination periodically; requiring such certificate to be displayed; providing a penalty for violation of this ordinance, and declaring partial invalidity shall not affect valid portion of the ordinance; repealing ordinances in conflict herewith, and declaring an emergency.

**SECTION 1. Physical Examination and Health Certificate:**

No person, firm, corporation, common carrier or association operating, managing, or conducting any hotel or any other public sleeping or eating place, or any place where food or drink or containers thereof, of any kind, is manufactured, transferred, prepared, stored, packed, served, sold or otherwise handled in this city, or any manufacturer or vendor of candies or manufactured sweets, shall employ, or keep in their employ, in, on, or about any said place or vehicle, or have delivered any article therefrom, any person infected with any transmissible condition of any infectious or contagious disease, or work, or employ any person to work in, on or about said place, or to deliver any article therefrom, who at the time of his or her employment, failed to deliver to the employer or his agent, a certificate signed by the City Health Officer of the City of Eastland, Texas, attesting the fact that the bearer has been examined by such Health Officer within a week prior to the time of such employment, and that such examination disclosed the fact that such person to be employed was free from any transmissible condition of any infectious or contagious disease; such examinations to be made with or without laboratory tests at the discretion of the Health Officer; or fail to institute and have made, at intervals of time not exceeding three (3) months, examinations, essential to the findings of freedom from communicable and infectious diseases, of all such employees, by the City Health Officer of the City of Eastland, Texas, and secure in evidence thereof a certificate signed by such physician stating that such examination has been made of such person, disclosing the fact that he or she was free from any transmissible condition of any communicable and infectious diseases.

**SECTION 2: Health Certificate— Displayed.**

All health certificates called for by this ordinance shall be displayed for public inspection at the place where the person named thereon is employed, and shall not be removed from such place during continuance of such employment except by a public health officer. No duly appointed agent, or upon valid court order. All such certificates shall bear the employee's signature, the name of the physician executing examinations and date of issuance, and shall be valid for three (3) months only. The said registration card must bear the signature of the person named thereon and shall be displayed for public inspection at the place where such a person is employed.

**SECTION 3: Failure to Comply With Ordinance.**

The failure of any person, firm, corporation, common carrier or association engaged in any of the businesses described in this ordinance, to display at the place where any of the operations of such businesses are being conducted, a valid health or registration certificate, as required by this ordinance, for each person employed in, on or about such place, shall be prima facie evidence that the said person, firm, corporation, common carrier or association, in violation of requirements called for by this ordinance, failed to require the exhibition of the pre-employment health certificate, of such person and failed to institute and have made of such person, examinations necessary to the findings of freedom from communicable diseases at intervals of time not exceeding three (3) months.

**SECTION 4. Penalty.**

Whoever violated any provision of this ordinance shall be fined in an amount not exceeding one hundred (\$100.00) dollars. Each act or omission in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense and shall be punishable as hereinabove prescribed.

**SECTION 5. Partial Invalidity.**

If any provision, section or part of this ordinance is declared unconstitutional or held invalid or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid the validity of the remainder of this ordinance and the application thereof to the persons and other circumstances shall not be affected thereby, and to this end the provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable.

**SECTION 6. Repeal of Conflicting Ordinances.**

All ordinances and parts thereof in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

**SECTION 7. Declaring An Emergency.**


It is declared by the City of Eastland, Texas, through its Board of City Commissioners that the fact that the City of Eastland has no existing adequate ordinance protecting the health and welfare and security of its citizens, and the fact that there are many employees serving drink and edibles to the public without being first actually examined to determine whether or not they are carriers of infectious and contagious diseases, creates an emergency requiring that this ordinance be not read at three (3) separate meetings of the City Commission, but that the same be enacted and take effect immediately upon the passage thereof and the publication thereof as provided by the Charter of the City of Eastland, Texas.
