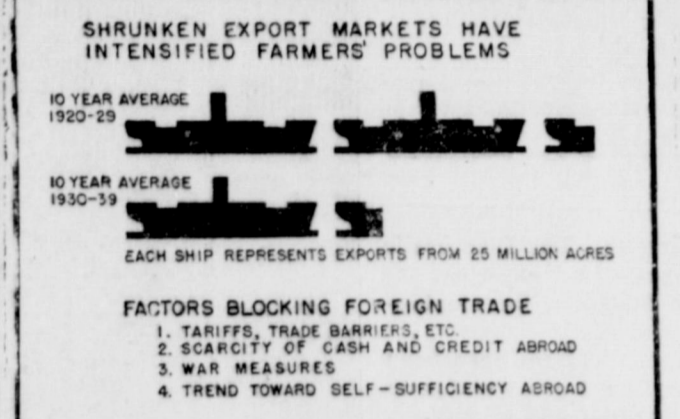
Nearly 200,000 Make Application For Mattresses

### It's Undignified, But—

The Republican convention is over. The Democratic convention is soon to come. The organized cheering, the bands, the banners, the parading delegates, the monkey-shines and noisy hullabaloo will subside.

The usual crop of outraged-dignity" pieces have been written. This is no way, insist some, for a great nation to conduct its affairs. There should be order and dignity.

Perhaps. And yet—

There is something about these great quadrennial political circuses that is really American. They are gusty and hearty, as our great land is gusty and hearty. They throb with a certain lusty vitality. And so does the country they represent.

William Philip Simms, veteran foreign correspondent for the Scripps-Howard newspapers, dropped in on the Republican convention. Literally dropped in, we mean, for he came to it direct from the clipper which brought him from Europe. Simms, a citizen of the world, had always looked on these conventions with faint distaste, just a little ashamed that his country should function in a way so crude as compared with the sedate procedure so often seen abroad.

But this time it was different. The contrast, only one day by air from the bloody fields of Europe, was overwhelming. "I was no longer ashamed," wrote Simms. "I was proud. I was proud of the roistering good-natured crowd; proud of that solid acre of newspaper correspondents telling 13,000,000 other American citizens exactly what they saw . . . proud that we are not forced by fear of a firing-squad to take ourselves and our candidates for office so seriously."

There is dignity and dignity. There is perfect order, no doubt, when the dummy legislature of some European dictatorship sits solemnly at the feet of their Supremissimo to be told what is to be what for the coming year.

But as for us, we'll continue to stick fast for less dignity and more freedom, for the rough-and ready American method of registering, even through gaudy hullabaloo, some approximation of what the people want.

There is a real dignity there that can never be found in a country that is not free, however sedately it may operate.

It is said the Nazis have no ambassador of good will because the original premise is wrong to begin with.

### Boys To Govern Mythical State

 INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. — Boys under 21 may not decide the national election this year but that doesn't mean they will not wield a powerful political bat in the future.

For before summer is over, boys in 34 states will have held political elections of their own, waging heated campaign that will culminate in election of administrative, legislative and judicial officials in a mythical 49th state.

Sponsored by the American Legion, the "Boys' State" idea is designed to train youths in civic responsibility and leadership and instruct them in the mechanics of American self-government.

The boys start their 7- to 10-day regime with formation of political parties. These nominate candidates and announce platforms. The boys select all their officers from governor to constable, including the state legislature and judges of courts. After officials are installed, laws are enacted, taxes assessed and administrative details are worked out.

### Agriculture's Part In Defense Plan Can Be Arranged

COLLEGE STATION — Agriculture's part in the national defense plan will be carried out without the establishment of new federal agencies.

This was pointed out in a letter received by H. H. Williamson, director of the Texas A and M. Extension Service, from Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace.

Agriculture is represented on the Council of National Defense by Secretary Wallace and Chester Davis of the Federal Reserve Board.

The Council, reestablished by the President, is composed of six cabinet officers and seven advisory commission members. Its function is to correlate efforts of industry and the government.

The letter stated that the Secretary and Mr. Davis, after thoroughly exploring the relationship of agriculture to national defense, wanted to report immediately that:

"It will not be necessary to set up new government services, or new organizations of farmers, to carry on agriculture's part in the national defense program. Farm people themselves, through county extension organizations, AAA committees, land use planning committees, and so on, and government agricultural services, both in the Department of Agriculture and in the Land Grant Colleges, are set up and staffed to do what ever needs to be done."

### LETTERS FROM OUR READERS

THE GOLDEN RULE  
(By Mrs. L. R. Burnside)

Since Hitler started his triumphal entry into the lowlands, people of our country have started a hoarding campaign, which will throw our country into an economic chaos almost as deadly as the one caused by Hitler. Business among competitive firms is the life-line of our nation, and depends solely on the buying public. Regardless of what we have to sell, it is of no value unless people wish to buy it.

Our salaried citizens prefer to talk and think war, and build up their bank accounts, while not taking into account, the chaos, of small firms, whose existence depends upon their sales. May we appeal to you that have a steady income, to come to the aid of your neighbors, and buy the things you really need, and feel able to pay for. We cannot live alone, either in our small cities, our counties, or our nations. We are dependent upon each other to a greater degree than any of us likes to admit.

Should Hitler win, money and property will be worth very little. If he does not win, people who work and try can build up reserves in less perilous times than these. Unless the Golden Rule is put into practice, and people that have steady incomes, or reserves, start buying, the small firms that do not have a reserve to tide them over, will fall by the wayside, and the result will be—more unemployment, and people who have their investments made in these enterprises, will lose it. So, let's live and let live, and start the ball rolling, so if we go down, it will be together.

### Price Fixing Is Again Urged By Special Interests

AUSTIN—The issue of price-fixing, one of the most bitter controversies of the last regular session of the legislature, was revived here by news that the Federal Trade Commission is almost ready to release its survey of the effects of the so-called Fair Trade law in other states.

Militant Texas housewives and an aroused Texas press in 1933 arose against the Fair Trade and Anti-Discrimination Laws but the group of lobbyists supporting the two price-fixing laws had done their contact work so early and so thoroughly that the Fair Trade law was passed. After an opinion by Attorney General Gerald Mann, Gov. O'Daniel vetoed the law, which would have invalidated the Texas anti-trust laws by legalizing "price maintenance" contracts between a manufacturer and one retailer by which all retailers in the state would have been bound.

The Anti-Discrimination law would have fixed selling price of all items at about ten per cent above the wholesale cost of the merchandise.

The newspapers and the housewives both are watching this year for a resumption of the "contract work" done by the price-fixing lobbyists. Recently reports began trickling in from all sections of the State that the candidates are again being approached and that the lobbyists are trying to make all of them agree to support the laws regardless of what they do to the state's anti-trust laws or to the consumers of the anti-trust laws are designed to protect.

Next major development in the price-fixing campaign will come when the FTC makes its report. In 1934, the FTC made a survey and reported that the Fair Trade Law had resulted in raised prices without any compensation in the form of higher wages or increases in raw material costs.

Apparently to be used as an antidote against the government's survey, a national druggists' association is conducting a survey of its own, results of which obviously are being withheld until the FTC survey is released. The druggists' association says its survey will not be prejudiced.

The Fair Trade Act has been passed by 44 states, but is not being enforced in that many, Texas,

Missouri, Vermont and Delaware have not yet succumbed to the Fair Traders, and the law was invalidated in New Jersey. About 12 states have the Anti-Discrimination law in varying forms. The Fair Trade law has been chiefly applied to drug items and whiskeys, but recently the principle of "price maintenance" has been applied to food in Ohio. Any item which carries the name of its manufacturer, whether branded or trademarked, can be governed by Fair Trade contracts.

The Anti-Discrimination act's "cost plus" principles are reportedly most effective on fast-selling, low-profit staple food items which sell in bulk such as rice, sugar, flour, shortening, and salt pork. This bill did not even pass the House last session while the Fair Trade sailed through the House and wormed its way eventually through a most determined senate filibuster.

### Eastland Names W. G. Womack As Head of Schools

W. G. Womack, principal of the Eastland High School for the past five years, has been elevated to the position of superintendent of the Eastland schools, succeeding the late P. B. Bittle. This was by action of the board of school trustees which has been considering applications for the place since soon after Bittle's death.

K. B. Tanner, president of the school board, stated that no decision has been reached as to Womack's successor.

The Eastland Recruiting office is located in the Eastland Post Office building, where anyone wishing to join the army, or wishing to secure information about joining, may contact the recruiting officer in charge between the hours of 8 a. m. and 5 p. m. each week day.

There are vacancies in all branches of the army at this time, the recruiting officer said. Before the office in Eastland was opened it was necessary for anyone wishing to join the army to appear personally at the recruiting office in Fort Worth.
