We have had a few reports of jar breakage during the process of oven causing. Sometimes this can result in serious consequences. Therefore, we wish to stress to all Home Canners the importance of following to the letter the rules governing oven canning. Like anything else, home canning, particularly oven canning, has very definite rules which must be followed if safe and successful results are to be obtained.



#### Don't try oven canning unless you are absolutely positive that the oven on your range

## DO





will maintain a constant, even temperature of 250 degrees.

Don't use jars made just for storing or handling food such as mayonnaise. The glass will not withstand steam pressure or high heat.

Don't use a cracked jar or one nicked around the rim.

Don't screw or tightly set jar tops until after removing from oven.

Don't guess at processing time.

Don't allow cold air to strike hot jars.

Don't crowd oven with too many jars.

Don't fill jars too full.

Don't begin oven canning until you thoroughly understand the method and know each step.

Do use only jars of TEMPERED glass, that is, jars made expressly for canning purposes.

Do check carefully all jars before you use them and make sure each is sterilized.

Do follow manufacturer's instructions in the use of jar tops. Complete seal immediately upon removing jars from oven, if necessary and according to the kind of top used.

Do count processing time from the time oven door is closed on an oven that has been preheated. Use approved time chart.

Do shield hot jars when they are removed from the oven from cold drafts. Place them on several thicknesses of towel and cover with towel out of draft.

Do leave enough space between jars and between jars and oven wall to permit good heat circulation. It is best to arrange jars two inches apart on shallow tray for easy handling.

Do allow, in filling jars, at least one-half inch head-room at top for expansion and avoiding boil-overs.

Do go by instructions from a reliable source such as Lone Star's Wartime Canning Booklet.

Bear in mind that the U.S. Department of Agriculture recommends, as in the water bath method, that only fruits and tomatoes, and tomato mixtures containing at least 50 per cent tomatoes, should be processed by the oven method. And then only IF you are positive and absolutely certain the oven temperature can be maintained constantly at 250 degrees.






