. Child's benefits Payable to children under 18. or 16, if not in school, of a retired worker or of a deceased

worker and amounts to one-half Payable to widow of any age child under 18 in her care and

amounts to three-fourths of his benefits. Payable to parent who was wholly dependent upon deceased gift she and her good husband worker if no widow survives, or f no child who would be elig-

Lump-sum payments are paid monthly benfits are payable. The single lump - sum amounts to six times the monthly benefit. Where no such relative survives, payments to reimburse funeral expenses in an amount not to exceed the total payment may be made to the individual who paid the costs of burial.

The total monthly benefits that may be paid on one workers' acccunt may not be less than \$10 a month nor more than twice the primary benefit, or 80 per cent of the worker's average wage, or \$85, whichever is the least.



to Clarify Fats:

Use potato slices to "take up the slack." To one cup of fat, use half of mediumsized potato cut in one-quarter-inch slices, added to the cool fat. Heat gradually until fat stops bubbling. Strain through cheesecloth or a fine sieve. If strained and stored in refrigerator, and NOT SCORCHED, fat can be clarified again, even after frying fish. (SCORCHED fat is not good enough for dynamite, even.) Keep in gas refrigerator.

To Render Raw Fats: Cut suet and other fats in small pieces. Boil in water. Let chill, and lift the white cake to store in refrigerator.

Fats for Ammunition:

One pound fat = 11/2 lbs. gunpowder Two pounds fat = 1 pound dynamite Two pounds fat = five 37-mm. shells





Don't cut down circulation of businesses can do something like air by covering shelves with pafood on top of freezing unit. All liquids and moist foods should be covered before they are put in re frigerator.

Place milk and cream near chil ling unit on upper shelves. Keep butter and cheese wrapped in waxed paper or in a covered dish on top shelf near chilling unit.

Meat and poultry should be wiped off and stored in the meat keeper under the chilling unit. If there is no special meat tray, wrap meat lightly in waxed papand place in defrosting pan under freezing unit. Cooked meat can be stored on any convenient shelf in a covered container. Fish should be wrapped lightly and stored in a freezing compartment or evaporator.
