THIS IS THE ENEMY-- RINGED BY BAYONETS, YOUNG ALLIED FLIER BEHEADED ON NEW GUINEA

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Southwest Pacific, Oct. 5-The beheading of an Allied Flier captured by the Japanese in New Guinea last March was revealed today in a diary on the body of an enemy soldier in the ruins of Salamaua.

The sport of the atrocity, the first known instance of an Allied prist of war to be executed in the Southwest Pacific, was written by a soldier who witnessed with faint pity the unknown airman's death at the hands of a Japanese swords-

He described the victim as a captain or flight lieutenant in the air transport corps, one of two members of the crew of a Douglas plane shot down near Salamaua on March 18. Authorities would not permit identification of the flier as American or Australian.

ENTIRE JAPANESE GARRISON ASSEMBLED TO WATCH COMMANDER SWING SWORD

The only other known case of its kind was the execution of

several American fliers who were taken prisoner by the Japenese after the April 18, 1942, raid on Tokyo and other Jap-

The Japanese said at that time that every American participating in future raids on their territory "has a special pass to

The entire Japanese garrison at Salamana assembled to watch their commander wield the Samurai sword on the 23year-old flier, bound and surrounded by the fixed bayonets of enemy guards.

A verbatim translation of the itary, made public at Gen Douglas Mac Anhur's headquart rs, gave this partial account of the execution.

"March ?9; we are all assembled in front of headquarters at 1500 hours. Che of two members of a Douglas plane downed by anti arreraft fire on March 18 has been returned to Salamana under guard of a Tai (generally applied to an officer with the rank of captain or higher).

"The time has come. The prisoner of war totters forward with his arms tied. His hair is cut close. I feel that he suspects what is afoot, but he is more composed than I thought he would

"We arrive at the execution ground. The Komai Tai commander faces the prisoner and says:

"You are to die. I am going to kill you with this Japanese sword according to Samurai code."

"When the Tai commander says he will allow the captain two or three minutes to prepare himself for death, I hear him (the prisoner) mumble something which sounds like 'one.'

'The Tai commander draws his favorite sword, the famous come. The prisoner of war is made to sit on the bank of a bomb crater which is full of water. The precaution is taken of surrounding him with fixed bayonets.

"But the prisoner remains unshaken to the last. When I put

"Shh-it sounds at first like the poise of the cutting, but it is actually made by blood spurting from the arteries. The body

"A superior seaman from a medical unit receives the sword from the surgeon, He rolls the body onto its back.

"Here's something for the other day. Take that," he says and with one sweep he lays open the abdomen,

"These thick-headed white bastards are thick-bellied, too,"

"There is not a drop of blood left in the man's body. The seaman gives it a kick and then buries it."
