During this birthday year there are many ways to help



Due to laundry requirements and durability, we have picked items which will last a long time." Because the Ronald McDonald House has provided


services to numerous local families, the Board of Directors hopes Friona/Bovina residents will consider participation in the birthday gift giving.

### **Clinics Set** Sept. 2, 15

The Women's Center of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and Baptist/St. Anthony's Health System will conduct Breast Cancer Screening Clinics at Parmer County Hospital, 1307 Cleveland Avenue in Friona on September 2 and 15.

Breast cancer affects one in eight women. The key to winning the battle against cancer is early detection by having an annual breast mammogram and performing breast self-exam each month. Participants will receive a low-cost screening that includes a mammogram and instruction in self-examination by a Registered Nurse. The total cost is \$75. A minimum of fifteen women need to register in order for the mobile mammography clinic to come to area towns. Funding is available through the Texas Depart-ment of Health for Texas residents who qualify for assistance. All exams are done by appointments only. IDLE HANDS ARE the devil's workshop. . .another one of those pithy maxims designed to make us feel guilty about ourselves. So we scurry about our leisure activities with the same frenzy that drives our working days, turning our favorite sports into weekend marathons of sun, sweat, and



strain, sore muscles and dirty laundry. It seems like we all feel that if we enjoy life too much, something must be wrong.

I am amazed at people who spend their spare time cycling, jet-skiing, para-sailing, four-wheeling, rock climbing, rapelling, mud bogging, hang gliding, bungee jumping, and just about anything else designed to cause bodily injury. I guess you could say that the Good Old Boy and I are not outdoorsy type people.

Once when we were younger, we let some friends talk us into going camping with them and it ranks as one of the worst experiences of my life. Sleeping on a skimpy one-inch foam "mattress" and sleeping bag, head pointing downhill, in a tent with lots of wildlife noises going on outside, is not my perception of a restful evening.

Badgers invaded our campground. You could hear them snapping and snarling at each other while they tried to gnaw their way into our food boxes. They have a horrible asthmatic breathing sound. On a previous occasion, I had seen the result of a badger vs boxer bull dog encounter at Bill's family farm home near Muleshoe. Not a pretty sight!

We heard them tip over the ice cream freezer and slurp up the melted cream left in the bottom. It was then that I realized there was just a thin layer of tent fabric between me and those bad-tempered, steel-clawed badgers just a few feet away. After the critters left to inspect and destroy other camps nearby, I laid awake listening to the coyotes howl for the rest

of the night. We Americans spend a lot of money getting our homes fixed up nice and comfortable with all the latest in expensive labor-saving devices, and then we try to "get away from it all" by going out into the wilderness to reside in the rough. The only purpose for this that I can figure out, is to make us appreciate what we have back at home. The Good Old Boy and I sometimes try to get away in

mid-August for a long weekend in the high country for a few days of R & R and S & S (rest and relax, snooze and snore), which we did last weekend. Folks here in the panhandle are fortunate to live just six hours or so from the mountain resort areas of New Mexico.

Our idea of roughing it is to rent or borrow someone's cabin up in the hills where we can sit on the front porch, watch the hummingbirds and spot an occasional deer. No phones, no newspapers, no television. Just the two of us, peace and quiet, a deck of cards, a couple of board games and plenty of food. Of course, about once each day we'd drive down to the settlement to check out the tourist traps, art galleries, antique shops, and try out the restaurants. Now that's my idea of some quality leisure time.

#### Tax Rebates Delivered

State Comptroller John Sharp has delivered a total of \$255.8 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,094 Texas cities and 118 counties, a 12.4 percent increase over the \$227.6 million allocated in August 1997.

The August payments include local sales taxes collected by monthly filers on June sales and by quarterly filers for April, May, and June and reported to the Comptroller in July. Parmer County received \$28,848 compared to \$27,972 in the some period of years

in the same period a year ago

The breakdown showed Bovina received \$3,511, Farwell, \$5,288, and Friona \$20,048. The amounts represented increases for Bovina (18.11%) and Farwell (61.8%), and a slight decrease for Friona (-7.74%).

The 1998 payments to date to the county total \$236,449, an 18.98% increase over the same period in 1997.

# Bovina Firefighters Will 'Fill The Boot' For MDA







# **No Trespassing Sign Deadline Is Nearing**

According to Texas A&M University, "No Trespassing" signs may soon disappear from the Texas landscape. A new law effective last

year allows landowners to replace signs with vertical purple stripes. However, until September 1, 1998, landowners are required to post another sign explaining the purple stripes. After that date, no signs of any kind

will be required. The law allowing landowners to use a vertical purple stripe on a tree or post three to five feet above the ground was effective September 1, 1997. For the past year the stripes had to be accompanied by signs at every vehicular entry point explaining the significance of

the purple paint. "Because of the required same thing. But then George just Sign at entry points, many Texas landowners apparently have postponed using the

purple paint marks until the explanation signs are no longer required," says Judon Fambrough, attorney and senior lecturer with the Real Estate Center at Texas A&M

University. The purple stripes must be at least one inch wide and eight inches long. They must be placed every 1,000 feet along the property line, except in forests where they must be every 100 feet. They must be readily visible to anyone approaching the property.

Entry-point signs must be two by three feet with block lettering at least two inches







#### **Drip Irrigation Field Demonstration Is** Set

Efficient water management is a necessity for the operation of a profitable irrigated farm in today's agricultural economy. Area producers interested in using drip irrigation to improve irrigation application efficiencies are invited to efficiencies are invited to attend an August 27 field demonstration day sponsored by the High Plains Underground Water Con-servation District No. 1. The field day will be from 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at the Bonnia Owens form located

Ronnie Owens farm, located six miles east of Hereford on Highway 60 and one mile north on County Road E. Producers are invited to stop by at their convenience any time during the day for a one-on-one discussion of drip irrigation and other water

conservation techniques. The field demonstration day will focus on the day will focus on the installation and management of drip irrigation systems, according to High Plains Water District Assistant Manager Ken Carver. "Drip irrigation is the above frequent application of

slow, frequent application of small amounts of water to the soil area directly surrounding plant roots. Water losses caused by evaporation, deep percolation, and runoff are virtually eliminated. Using drip irrigation can improve water use efficiency by 30 to 40 percent when compared to conventional fu irrigation," said Carver. furrow

The drip tape is installed on 20 acres at this site and has been in operation since February 1997. Owen's system operates in a series of three stations.

High Plains Water District personnel will be on

hand to answer producers' questions and demonstrate various water conservation techniques, including soil moisture monitoring with gypsum blocks and resistance meters, use of Potential Evapotranspiration (PET) data to schedule irrigation, and design and installation of drip irrigation system, as well as pump plant energy use

efficiency testing. A dealer display area will be set up at the site to show various drip irrigation products. Netafim Irrigation representative will discuss the drip tape, emitters, and other hardware installed at the site.

A noon lunch, sponsored by Franklin Electric Motors, Netafim Irrigation, Inc., Paymaster Cottonseed, Watermaster Supply, and Wilbur-Ellis Company, will be available on a first-come, first-served basis.

Carver encourgaes local producers to stop by. "This is not a formal field tour. Producers can drop by whenever they have time to see all the demonstrations or when they have just a few minutes to see the demonstration they are particulary interested in ," he said.
