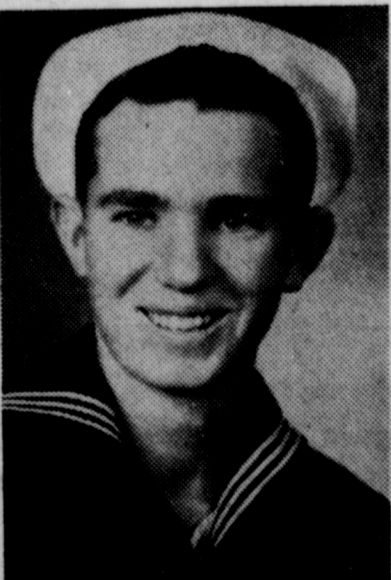

Lieutenant Galloway went overseas in January, 1945, and while in India had 29 missions over Burma. He now is at a rest camp awaiting further assignment.

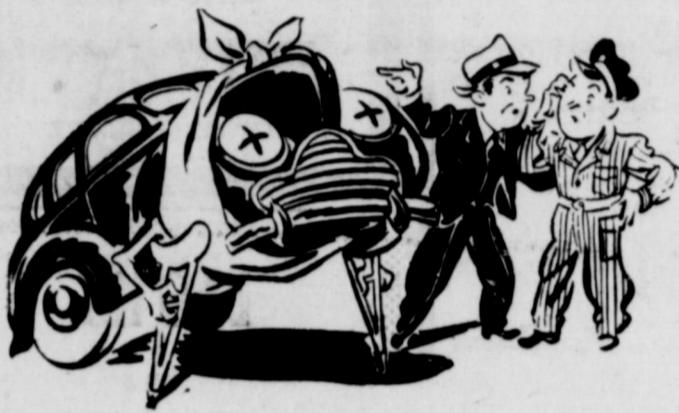



the brim, by the way—and he told me of an experience Earl Bender and an unidentified property owner had, that I believed was interesting.

It seems that this property owner had some stuff in Eastland—business property and residences—that he was contemplating improving and was thinking of borrowing about \$15,000 to improve.

Big insurance companies make some of those kind of loans, so Bender on behalf of this third party called the loan representative of one of the big insurance companies in Dallas or Fort Worth and asked him to come out and look over this deal to see whether he could make the loan.

The representative refused in some such words as, "We wouldn't lend a penny in Eastland, or Cisco, or Ranger, or Eastland County. Why, those old oil boom towns are the deadest things in the country."

So Bender gave up on him.

But some time later the insurance man showed up in Eastland, said he was going on west and just stopped in because he was asked to. Bender and the man he was representing drove all over town, taking the visiting man with them—drove slowly around, not saying a word, but keeping on paved streets all the way, and it took three hours without any retracing of the route to speak of.

When they returned to Bender's office, the man was the most enthusiastic of the trio about Eastland. "I'm sold," he said in effect. This is the best-looking small town I've ever seen. Our company will lend money on your business structures, your homes, your garages and filling stations, your churches, your lodges, or whatever you have."

That's about the end of the story, except that it's hard to get any insurance firm to lend money on churches or lodges. The pay often is too slow.

It seems awfully ironic to me that the Vermillion family should move into the land of fruit and berries in the year when sugar for canning is the shortest since the war began.

Last year, we could get more sugar, but almost nothing to can or preserve. This year, it's virtually the other way around.

There's nothing I like so much or have had so little of as peaches, grapes, berries, and the other fruits this section produces so plentifully.

We lived in Winkler County which is one of only two or three counties in Texas, I believe, which does not have a single farm or acre of tillable land in it.

## Grasshoppers Gain Ground In County, Says Agent's Office

Severe grasshopper infestations are appearing in various parts of the county, according to reports from the county agent's office.

Some farmers report more 'hoppers than for the past 20 years, and poisoning of the crop destroying pests has started, it was said.

Areas where the 'hoppers seem to be doing the greatest damage are north and west of Cisco, the Leon River bottom, Alameda, Staff and around Ranger.

White arsenic mixed with bran and moistened with water is the best poison mash, said the county agent's report.

A supply of white arsenic has been ordered by dealers in Cisco, Eastland, Ranger and Gorman out of Kansas City, the nearest source of the poison.

The proper procedure in mixing is to spread a sack of bran evenly and thin on the floor. Five pounds of white arsenic is spread over the bran and it is mixed dry by thoroughly cutting back and forth with shovels or hoes. After it is thoroughly mixed in the dry state, it is sprinkled with water and cut again. It is necessary to keep putting water on it and cutting, as the bran absorbs several times its weight in water.

When the mixture is wet enough to be squeezed into a ball yet will fly apart when thrown, it is moist enough. It is then spread early in the morning by hand in the same manner as sowing wheat or oats by hand.

The species doing the damage is called the differential. The first crop of the 'hoppers will become fully grown about the middle of July.

Those who expect to poison were urged to start now and not wait, as better kills can be secured now than later.
