He said he believed the airport will be self-supporting and even will pay out the construction cost over a period of years. The airport is atop a hill northeast of downtown Eastland, and can be reached by going out a short way on the Breckenridge highway and turning right at the first road after crossing the creek just outside Eastland.

No plans had been made for a formal dedication of the airport, but Tanner said he believed it would be a good idea to plan such a dedication, and hold an open cause this is your city, and your house so the people of Eastland can be invited to come and see The airport in its final state will have four runways, the longest being the 4,200-foot north-south landing strip. There will be a 3,-700-foot northwest-southeast runway, and two shorter east-west strips. All will be grass surfaced. Tanner said the native sod already on the field will be permitted to stay, since it offers almost an ideal landing surface for a sodded landing field. The hangar, shop and office building, bought from Lone Star Gas Company at Sipe Springs for \$3,200, will have cost about \$5,200 when erection is completed, Tanner said. The 115 acres of land cost about \$40 an acre. A water pipeline to supply the field will have to be laid for about a mile at a cost of around \$1000. The city is paying cash for the airport work, but Tanner said. "It's going to strain us a little." Large delinquent tax collections last year helped form a fund that is going into the airport construction.



ticle 5 of the Constitution of the said ballot: State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

the State of Texas:

"Article 5, Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall the voters cast are in favor of said constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; provided, that when the business of the court may require, the court may sit in sections as designated by the court published and said election held as to hear argument of causes and to consider applications for writs of error or other preliminary matters. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate . LEGAL NOTICE Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this state, and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty-five years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer, or a lawyer or judge of a court of record together at least ten years. Said Justices shall be elected (three of them each two years) by the qualified voters of the state at a general election; shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified; and shall each receive such compensation as shall be provided by law.
