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## Side Issues

Those now alive probably never will see a peach crop like that of this year in Eastland County, a farmer whose name I didn't get told me the other day. He lives south of Okra and was in Eastland selling peaches.

He said his small orchard was bearing like it never had before, and he had lost about 100 bushels, with the fruit dropping off the trees to rot for lack of someone to pick them.

This seems to me to be a tremendous shame, with so many people in so many places over the globe hungering for food.

This old fellow—he must have been well over 70—said he had lived in Eastland County for over 50 years, and that during all that time he had never seen a peach crop to equal that of this summer. And what's more, he said he didn't believe anyone alive will ever see another one like it.

Thus it appears that I moved to Eastland in the right year, with last week's paper indicating a record peach crop, and this week's telling of a record peach crop. Peaches don't mean money like peanuts, but they do mean many an extra dollar in a farmer's jeans, ready to be put where it will do the most good, whether for War Bonds or for necessities.

The peach growers, though, are about ready for the peach season to end. They've picked and handled so many peaches that they are tired of anything to do with them.

I may have picked the wrong town to move to, much as I hate to admit it, because the fellow who writes a column for the DeLeon paper is always telling about how his farmer friends bring him watermelons, cantaloupes, snap beans, huge cucumbers.

## Tax Collections Climb In County As Drive Nearing

Delinquent tax collections in Eastland County, apparently spurred by the drive now in the making to collect all delinquent taxes, rose sharply in July, Tax Collector C. S. Karkalits said this week.

Collections of delinquent taxes rose to \$10,662 in July, compared with a normal collection of less than half that much, even in the recent war-inflated years.

So far this year, beginning in January, \$62,009 in delinquent taxes have been collected, Karkalits reported, compared with a total of \$47,091 at the same time a year ago.

This year's collections were \$18,017 in January, \$4,200 in February, \$6,979 in March, \$7,907 in April, \$8,128 in May, \$6,298 in June and \$10,662 in July.

The July spurt came after it was announced that a delinquent tax collection contract had been awarded to Horace Walker, who is directing the working up of delinquent tax statements.

No concerted effort has been made yet to get in the delinquent taxes by Walker and his crew. He said most of the tax statements will be mailed about Sept. 1, with payment expected in September.

The figures given by Karkalits include both county and state taxes. The county's portion is about two-thirds of the total.

### Thermometer Hits 103 For Year's High, Then Drops

Temperatures in Eastland hit a new high for the season last week, levelled off, and then dropped at mid-week this week.

The high mark for the year thus far reached was Thursday of last week when the thermometer inched up to 103, said Weather Observer J. A. Beard. Friday was much cooler with 93, and then for three days—Saturday, Sunday and Monday—the maximum levelled off to 100 even.

Tuesday, the maximum dropped to 96, and Wednesday went on down to 95.

Cooler nights than usual caused resurrection of blankets and quilts this week.

The highest temperature recorded before Thursday of last week was an even 100.

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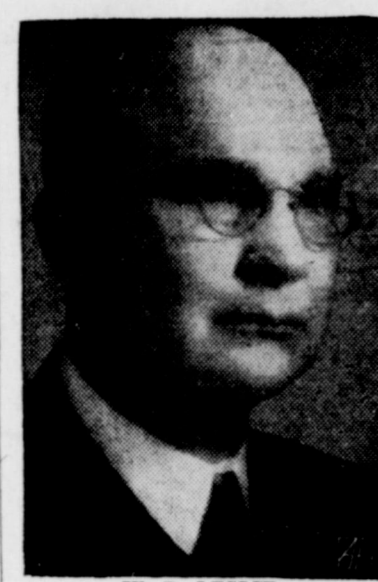

## Funeral Service For Noted Jurist Held Thursday

Chief Justice William Pharmed Leslie of the Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals in Eastland died suddenly Tuesday morning after becoming ill in his office in the Courthouse.

Judge Leslie was 66. He had been on the appeals court since January 1, 1928, and was appointed chief justice in May, 1935.

He became acutely ill in his office after taking some medicine for a milder feeling of illness, and was taken by ambulance to the local hospital, where he died in about 45 minutes with his wife, who herself has been ill, and his son, William A. Leslie, at his side. His son recently was put on inactive Army duty with rank of captain.

Judge Leslie is survived also by another son, Navy Lt. jg. Robert Leslie, serving in the South Pacific, who was unable to come for the funeral, and by a daughter, Miss Rosalie Leslie, social director at the University of Maryland, who arrived Wednesday night.

Funeral services were held in the First Methodist Church in Eastland at 6 p.m. Thursday after the body had lain in state in the church for an hour. Rev. Durwood Fleming conducted the services.

Burial was in the Eastland Cemetery under direction of Hamner Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were Earl Conner, Jr., Jack Frost, Fred Brown, W. B. Pickens, Homer Smith, Turner Collier, Frank Sparks and Donald Kinnaird.

Judge J. E. Hickman of the Commission of Appeals of the Texas Supreme Court in Austin, who was succeeded by Judge Leslie on the appeals court in Eastland, arrived Wednesday to be with the Leslie family and attend the funeral.

Judge Leslie's death ended a long and honored legal career that began with his graduation from the University of Texas Law School in 1907. Born in Kentucky, he came to Texas as a young man and attended Mayo College, then operated by his uncle at Commerce.

Following a period of teaching school in Texas and Kentucky, he attended law school and then began the practice of law in Odessa. After a year or so he moved to Colorado City, and it was there that he made his legal reputation, serving as county attorney, district attorney and district judge before his appointment to the appeals court.

In a survey made some while ago it was found that 97 per cent of the opinions rendered by the appeals court under Judge Leslie and appealed to the Supreme Court have been upheld by the superior court.

Judge Leslie was a substantial citizen of Eastland. He was prominent in the work of the Methodist Church, and in work of the Masonic Lodge.

He owned a good deal of property in Eastland, including some downtown buildings.

## Veterans Service Committee Set Up For Entire County

An organized campaign to help returning veterans has begun in Eastland County with the organization of a Veterans Service Committee, it was announced by H. E. Bennett of the U. S. Employment Service, chairman.

Other members are City Manager K. B. Tanner of Eastland, representing the Selective Service system, and H. J. Tanner, manager of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce and brother of K. B. Tanner, representing the Veterans Administration.

The committee has established a Veterans Information Center at the Eastland U. S. Employment Service office at 311 West Main Street.

Main purpose is to assist veterans in making a successful transition from military to civilian life.

An advisory committee made up of representatives of service clubs, civic organizations, governmental agencies and others from all over the county has been set up, and will meet with the service committee soon, it was announced.

Named to the advisory committee so far:

Eastland: American Legion, American Red Cross, Chamber of Commerce, U. S. Employment Service, Selective Service, Reemployment Committeeman, Lions Club, Rotary Club, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Eastland County Record, Weekly Chronicle and Mayor Victor Cornelius.

Ranger: American Legion, American Red Cross, Masonic Lodge, Lions Club, Rotary Club, Elks Club, 1920 Club, Columbia Study Club, New Era Club, Mayor Kelley, Hall Walker, and The Ranger Daily Times.

Cisco: American Legion, Chamber of Commerce, Cisco Junior College, Rotary Club, Lions Club, Veterans of Foreign Wars, American Red Cross and Cisco Daily Press.

Immediately afterward, a nice big general rain to give the peanuts that last spurt toward top production.

would affect a few weedy and grassy patches, a rain right now would be highly welcome.

Farmers continue highly optimistic. One with 280 acres in peanuts said he needed one more rain to have a crop that could net him and his two sons over \$30,000 this year.

If everything turns out favorable from now on, he said, his fertilized land might produce as much as 75 bushels of peanuts to the acre, although he did not expect that much.

Average production in the county is about 15 bushels to the acre. Top price is about \$2.40 per bushel.

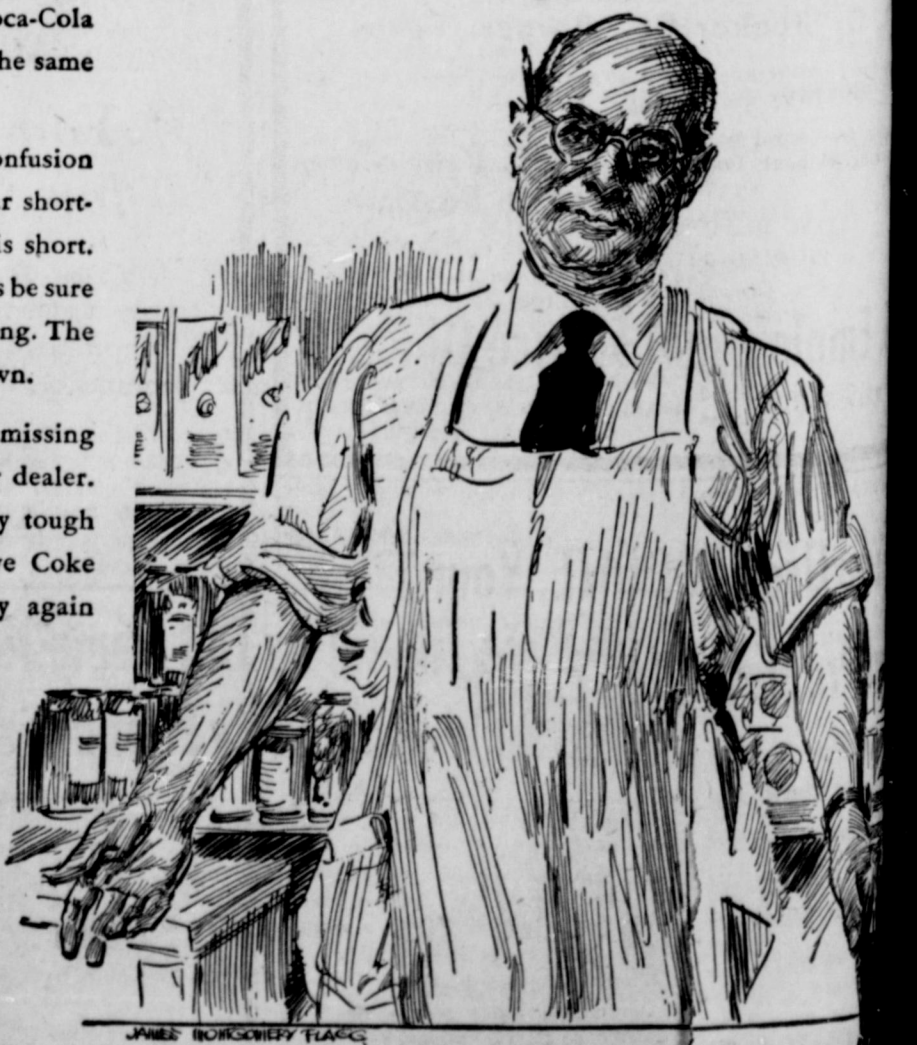

## NO MORE RATIONING OF NEW 1942 CARS

Removal of the remaining small supply of new 1942 cars from all rationing restrictions was announced by the OPA. "Beginning July 18, 1945, dealers who still have new 1942 cars in stock may sell them to any buyer without rationing restrictions," Max McCullough, Deputy Administrator for Ration, said.

## More Feed Bags To Be Made Of Dress Prints

The farm woman who likes to have animal and poultry feed delivered in bags she can make into dresses and household articles will be permitted a continuance of this wartime aid, WPB said. A ceiling approximating the 1944 peak-year "cut-up" of such material, has been established on the use of dress prints for making new commercial bags.

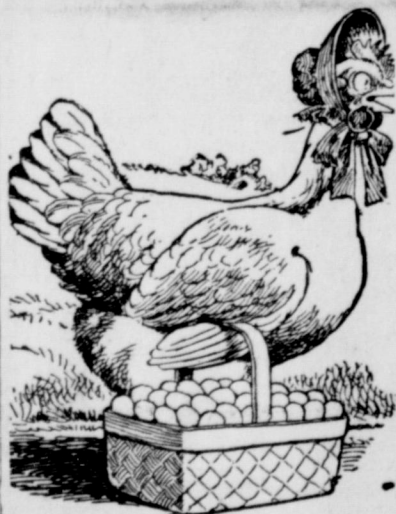

WITH THE 28th INFANTRY DIVISION IN ASSEMBLY AREA — Pfc. Troy A. Taylor of 308 West White Street, Eastland, is en route home from the European Theater of Operations with the veteran "Bloody Bucket" Division, which in eight months saw vicious combat action from Normandy's hedgerows to the heart of the Reich.

The 28th quit its occupational duties in Germany July 5 and moved to Camp Pittsburgh, one of Assembly Area Command's 17 redeployment camps near Reims.

Entering action July 30, 1944, at St. Lo, the "Bloody Bucket" men battled across Normandy, paraded through Paris, proceeded east through Belgium and Luxembourg, and smashed into the Siegfried Line September 11 — the first troops to enter Germany in

After its November fight in Hurtgen Forest, the 28th moved to the "quiet" Luxembourg sector. On December 16, it caught the full force of Von Rundstedt's Ardennes offensive. Quickly recuperating, the 28th moved south to help liberate Colmar in Alsace and drive to the Rhine. Within a month it was again at the Rhine near Coblenz.

Pfc. Taylor is the husband of Mrs. Troy A. Taylor, 308 West White Street, Eastland. He holds the ETO ribbon.

Pfc. Charles Burkett has written his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Burkett, 220 South Oak Street, that he has been awarded the Purple Heart, Bronze Star, three campaign stars and Presidential Unit Citation for action in the European Theater.

Burkett is serving with military intelligence in Paris, France now.

WITH THE 324 DIVISION IN NORTHERN LUZON, P. I. — The Air Medal has been awarded to Sgt. B. L. Donaldson of Eastland, for meritorious achievement while participating in aerial flight over enemy territory during the fighting along the Drinumor River, it was found that the only method of supplying these troops was the "plane drop" in certain open places in the dense, muddy New Guinea jungle. Miles inland from supply tempt to deliver ammunition and dumps, it was impractical to at-supplies by carrier train as the route was long and difficult in addition to the constant threat of ambush.

A small clearing was chosen as a "dropping ground" and the C-47 transports flew in low over the area where rations and equipment were parachuted to the fighting Yanks below. Donaldson, as a crew member made many flights help-

ing with the loading and unloading of the vital cargo.

The citation reads in part: "... These men made repeated flights in unarmored transport planes, risking, and at times encountering, the fire of enemy ground forces in order to drop supplies which were urgently needed by ground troops in combat with the enemy."

Since this operation, Donaldson has returned to the United States under the Army redeployment plan. Donaldson entered the Army in Nov. 1941, and began overseas duty in April, 1942. Veteran of four major engagements in the Southwest Pacific, he holds the Distinguished Unit Badge, the Good Conduct Medal, the Combat Infantryman Badge, the Asiatic-Pacific Ribbon and the Philippine Liberation Medal. His grandfather, A. F. Loftis, lives on Route 2, Eastland.

Leonard Todd Jr., RM 3rd Class, who has been in the Navy for 18 months, has returned to the United States from sea duty in the Pacific and recent called his mother, Mrs. Obara Todd of 412 S. Connellie Street, from San Diego, informing her that he expects to

arrive home early in September for a 27-day leave.

Todd had been on duty in the Pacific since last October and returned to the States while his ship undergoes repairs. He participated in the Luzon and Okinawa invasions. His ship was damaged in the Okinawa operation.

Lt. Frances J. Brock, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Brock of 301 North Ammerman St., is home on leave from the Pacific, after having completed 58 combat missions with the 38th Bombardment Group, famous "Sun-Setters" of the Fifth Air Force. Brock, pilot on a B-25, has been overseas for eleven months.
