## Does Your Water Taste Different Lately? Something New Is Added

Does your water taste different lately?

That peculiar taste and appearance of the Eastland city water the last few days has been due to a "turning over" of the water in Eastland Lake, where the water originates, City Manager K. B. Tanner said Wednesday.

The water already was clearing up, and in a few days, he said, it should be back to normal.

Tanner explained that almost every year the lake water "turns over"—that is, the water at the bottom of the lake rises to the top, and vice versa. But usually the event happens in September, and the results are not so noticeable.

The results are that the water has a flavor and color because of the fact that the surface water recently has been in contact with the reeds and other vegetation at the bottom of the lake.

However, the water's sanitary qualities are not affected, Tanner said. Eastland water is tested

twice weekly from samples taken at various points over the town, and Tanner said that no sample has ever shown contamination.

Why the lake "turns over" is a question. Tanner said his own explanation is that the lake water, being comparatively shallow, is warmed throughout by summer heat. Then cold nights come along and cool the water at the top, which proceeds to sink to the bottom in the same way that cold air descends and warm air rises.

One bonus of this phenomenon is to fishermen, who have had unusual luck at the lake recently. So much so, in fact, that city officers have had to clear them off the bridge across the lake so traffic could pass.

The theory here is that the food-laden bottom water attracts the fish to the surface when it rises.

Tanner said that a couple of extra cool nights a few days ago probably cause the lake water to turn over early this year.

## Waste Paper Drive Comes To Close, City Announces

Eastland's phenomenal waste paper collection campaign, which has resulted in the gathering of six freight carloads of paper since last October, has ended. City Manager K. B. Tanner said this week.

Tanner said the price received for the waste paper has dropped to the point that it is too much financial burden on the city to gather and ship it.

Eastland has been commended as being at the top of the list among the towns of Texas its size in gathering waste paper. The drive here was handled by the city, and householders cooperated by putting out bundles of the paper to be collected.

Tanner said he very much regretted having to cut off the collection, but that he felt the people of Eastland were to be commended for doing their end of the job well.

## Cooler Weather Stops Heat Wave; Light Rain Comes

A welcome cool spell that brought along some rain to cheer farmers and stockmen had ended at mid-week a heat wave that sent temperatures soaring in Eastland County.

The rain early Wednesday varied greatly over the county, with some communities, especially in the western part, reporting heavy downpours, while others got little more than a sprinkle.

Eastland itself had about one-fourth inch of rain, not as much as was needed by farmers, but enough to do some good.

The season's high thermometer reading of 103 was equalled Sunday, the third of four straight days when the mercury climbed to 100 or better.

The high reading Thursday of last week, said Weather Observer J. A. Beard, was 98. Friday, his thermometer rose to 101; Saturday to 102; Sunday to 103, and Monday to 101. Then the weather moderated and Tuesday and Wednesday both had highs of 90.

ZAMBOANGA, PHILIPPINE ISLANDS (Delayed) — His flying mates will tell you there are few records better than that of Marine First Lieutenant Ivan Neal Samuels of Eastland, pilot of a medium bomber in the First Marine Aircraft Wing.

Samuels has 28 combat missions against Jap forces on Mindanao and hasn't received a scratch on his B-25 Mitchell bomber.

His strikes have been against Malabang, Del Monte, Davao, and Sarangani Bay on Mindanao, the Sulu Archipelago and Borneo. All have been in support of Army ground troops.

"The most fun I had was not when dropping bombs," said Samuels. "It was at the invasion of Del Monte. I was spotting targets and then leading Marine dive-bombers in for the kill."

Samuels would sweep in over levels as he picked his targets, enemy positions at 300 and 500 feet. Then he would come back with SBD dive-bombers following close behind in dives from 12,000 feet.

"The SBD's were hitting everything that day," said the Texan. "One target—a cave in the side of a mountain—proved to be a big storage dump. It went higher than a kite."

Samuels is the son of Mr. and Mrs. D. Samuels of 503 South Mulberry, Eastland. His wife, Nancy Samuels, lives at Olden, Texas.

His brother, Tommy Samuels, former Howard Payne College football star, is serving in the Pacific with the Navy.

## Back Collections Cause Bigger Drop Than Expected

Because of higher property valuations that were anticipated, and because of "unprecedented" delinquent tax collections, Eastland's County tax rate has been set at 90 cents on the \$100 valuation instead of \$1 on the \$100, it was announced this week.

Announcement of the change was made in a statement released through the office of County Judge P. L. Crossley.

The \$1 tax rate was proposed in a tentative budget for the 1945-46 tax year filed with the county clerk by Judge Crossley. Since then, however, the Commissioners' Court, sitting as a board of equalization, maintained county taxable property values at just under \$19,000,000, when a considerable drop had been anticipated.

Also, since the \$1 figure was arrived at, taxes have been pouring into the county tills at a record rate, despite the fact that a delinquent tax collection drive still is in the making, and few statements have been mailed out.

Judge Crossley said the budget as proposed showed general decreases in expenditures for the coming year, despite some salary increases. The decreases generally are in moneys set aside to pay off bonded indebtedness, and reflect the improved condition of the county in respect to funded debt.

The statement issued by Judge Crossley pointed out that the 90-cent rate is the lowest in the county in 30 years, and will mean savings to taxpayers of about \$50,000.

It was predicted privately that as a result of the current delinquent tax drive, next year's rate may drop to 60 cents or lower.

The present rate is \$1.16 on the \$100, making the new rate 26 cents lower. On a home assessed at \$2,000, this would save the taxpayer \$5.20 on the year's taxes.

The statement said in part: "The County has collected \$60,000 in delinquent taxes from January 1, 1945 to August 1, 1945, of which more than \$11,000 was collected during the month of July. This is several times more than the usual July delinquent collections."

"The Commissioners' Court has had many compliments from all over the county lauding their efforts to collect delinquent taxes, because it is generally known that our tax rate has been double the amount it would have been if the taxes had been collected in prior years. Most everyone will admit that they can and it is their duty to pay their taxes now. It is believed that most everyone will pay their back taxes, thereby helping themselves by helping the County to reduce the tax burden."

"A public hearing will be held on the county budget in the Commissioners' Court room at the Courthouse Monday, August 20, at 2 p.m. The entire budget will be discussed at this meeting and the public is earnestly and cordially invited to attend."

## FARM TELEPHONE SERVICE...



### ...over electric power lines

You've heard about a way to send telephone conversations over electric power lines, called "power line carrier." It's just one of the many ways the telephone company plans to extend and improve telephone service to farmers when the wartime job eases up. Here's how it works:

A talking current from the telephone central office uses the same wire that carries current for power and light. Near the farmhouse, a "carrier coupler" takes the telephone current off the power line, and standard telephone wires carry it to the house.

The telephone itself is a modern handset instrument. It's attached to a special equipment box that looks like a small table radio.

In many cases, power line carrier may prove more practical than building new telephone lines. In other cases, other methods may be more suitable—such as the use of new high-strength steel wire which takes fewer telephone poles and has greater resistance to storms. Telephone men are exploring every means of making farm telephone service better and easier to get.

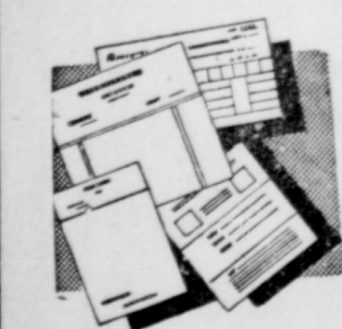
