Some Of Flocks Many Eastland County ranchers received a stunning economic blow last week end when the cold norther and chilling wind killed thousands of newly shorn goats in the county.

County Agent J. M. Cooper said he had no way to estimate the total loss in the county, but that it was tremendous.

With each goat valued at an estimated \$5, there were numerous ranchers who suffered losses of from \$1000 to \$2000, and Cooper said he had heard that one ranch near Gorman had lost nearly all of 2000 goats, which would mean a financial loss of nearly \$10,000.

The only ranchers who did not suffer heavy goat losses were the ones that could and did provide. cover for their flocks.

Dan Childress, clerk of the 11th District Court of Civil Appeals, who is president of the Eastland County Livestock Association and has a ranch near Morton Valley. said he knew of numerous men who had lost heavily, but that his own losses were zero. That was because he got his animals into shelter, he said.

Another rancher who has two places lost almost none on the home place, where he got his goat herds into shelter, but suffered almost a hundred per cent loss on the other place where the goats had to fend for themselves.

The heavy goat losses were spread over almost all of central and north central Texas, where the state suffered an economic loss totalling probably millions of dollars.

Fluorescent Bulb Is Atomic Bomb, Lions Are Told

A fluorescent light bulb is a sort of slow working atomic bomb, W. B. Pickins of the Texas Electric Service Company told fellow Lions Club members at the luncheon Tuesday.

The light given off in the fluorescent bulb is caused by the release of energy through the action of mercury atoms, Pickens said. He also explained other details of the light, which he said was invented by Thomas Edison in 1896 but was not commercially produced until 1938.

### **Rising Star Man** Hurt In Explosion

Carl Martin, operator of a shoe and harness shop at Rising Star, was seriously injured early Monday when an explosion wrecked the building occupied by the shop. It was reported that Martin had just started to light a stove in the morning when as he struck a match the blast occurred, apparently from gas that had escaped during the night.

Martin fell under a large machine, and it saved him from being crushed by the roof when it fell in a moment later. The roof's fall put out a fire which had sprung up after the blast, except that the paper in a waste basket still was blazing.


The store will be operated as a candy and notions store on a wholesale and retail basis, the new owners said.
