The barbecue will begin at 5:30 p. m.

If the weather is bad, the affair will go on as scheduled, but will move inside the American Legion building at the park, it was announced.

Speakers are scheduled to include Boyce House, famous Texas author and story-teller who now lives in Fort Worth but once was a newspaperman in Eastland, Ranger and Cisco, Virgil Seabery, Eastland attorney, Frank Austin of Abilene, an official of the West Texas Fair Association, and Mr. Fry, a rancher who lives and has interests in Eastland County and who helped organize the Brown County Fair Association.

Committees were busy this week working out all details of the barbecue. Committee assignments were worked out at a meeting last Friday night in the Chamber of Commerce office.

## State Highway 67 Through Eastland Redesignated As 6

The former State Highway 67 going north and south through Eastland now is State Highway 6 all the way from Waco to a point south of Throckmorton, it was announced last week end by the Texas Highway Commission.

The change of designation was made after H. J. Tanner, manager of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, had written State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer asking for the change and pointing out that the Highway 67 designation was confusing inasmuch as there is an entirely separate U. S. Highway 67 in Texas.

Tanner said it is hoped that the Highway 6 designation eventually can be extended to a route all the way across the state, when a federal designation may be asked for the highway.

Highway 6 now goes from Waco through Meridian, Dublin, DeLeon, Gorman, Eastland, Breckenridge, and on nearly to Throckmorton.

## Fluorescent Bulb Is Atomic Bomb, Lions Are Told

A fluorescent light bulb is a sort of slow working atomic bomb, W. B. Pickens of the Texas Electric Service Company told fellow Lions Club members at the luncheon Tuesday.

The light given off in the fluorescent bulb is caused by the release of energy through the action of mercury atoms, Pickens said. He also explained other details of the light, which he said was invented by Thomas Edison in 1896 but was not commercially produced until 1938.

## Rising Star Man Hurt In Explosion

Carl Martin, operator of a shoe and harness shop at Rising Star, was seriously injured early Monday when an explosion wrecked the building occupied by the shop.

It was reported that Martin had just started to light a stove in the morning when as he struck a match the blast occurred, apparently from gas that had escaped during the night.

Martin fell under a large machine, and it saved him from being crushed by the roof when it fell in a moment later. The roof's fall put out a fire which had sprung up after the blast, except that the paper in a waste basket still was blazing.

Martin was taken to a hospital in Brownwood.

## Stockmen's Goat Losses Run Into Many Thousands Of Dollars

Wet And Cold Nearly Finish Off Some Of Flocks

Many Eastland County ranchers received a stunning economic blow last week end when the cold norther and chilling wind killed thousands of newly shorn goats in the county.

County Agent J. M. Cooper said he had no way to estimate the total loss in the county, but that it was tremendous.

With each goat valued at an estimated \$5, there were numerous ranchers who suffered losses of from \$1000 to \$2000, and Cooper said he had heard that one ranch near Gorman had lost nearly all of 2000 goats, which would mean a financial loss of nearly \$10,000.

The only ranchers who did not suffer heavy goat losses were the ones that could and did provide cover for their flocks.

Dan Childress, clerk of the 11th District Court of Civil Appeals, who is president of the Eastland County Livestock Association and has a ranch near Morton Valley, said he knew of numerous men who had lost heavily, but that his own losses were zero. That was because he got his animals into shelter, he said.

Another rancher who has two places lost almost none on the home place, where he got his goats herds into shelter, but suffered almost a hundred per cent loss on the other place where the goats had to fend for themselves.

The heavy goat losses were spread over almost all of central and north central Texas, where the state suffered an economic loss totalling probably millions of dollars.

It was estimated that every available truck in the area was engaged in hauling carcasses to rendering plants in the larger cities.

The ranchers receive nothing from the rendering plants, but do get rid of the dead animals.

Cooper said it was possible the rain that started Thursday would kill more goats. Wet weather seems much more fatal to freshly shorn goats than cold alone, he said.

## Clubs To Sponsor Used Clothing Collection Locally

Eastland Rotary and Lions Club members this week voted to sponsor the local used clothing collection drive in connection with the United National Clothing Collection from Jan. 7 to Jan. 31.

The call for the collection was made by President Truman and Henry J. Kaiser, national chairman for the collection.

National sponsors of the drive have pointed out that since the first clothing collection last spring, many more millions of people have been liberated and are in dire need of clothing to protect them from the cold.

All of the clothing in the first collection will be overseas and in the hands of the needy people there by Christmas, it was said.

## Employers Urged To Give Work To Handicapped

Eastland employers this week were urged in a statement issued by Victor Cornelius, chairman of the City Commission, and Manager H. E. Bennett of the U. S. Employment Service to give physically handicapped workers "an equal job opportunity."

The call was made prior to the opening of National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week, Oct. 7-13.

In a proclamation, Cornelius said, "During the war, thousands of handicapped workers performed jobs vital to victory and many other men and women became disabled in the service of their country in the fighting forces. All of these Americans deserve not only our appreciation but an equal job opportunity. It is hoped that all Eastland employers will cooperate fully with the U. S. Employment Service in its efforts to find satisfactory jobs for the disabled workers of this city."

Bennett asked that employers file specifications of job opportunities at the USES office here, and indicate a willingness to employ qualified physically handicapped workers.

A short program will follow the dinner.

Since McGraw is the Dodge dealer in the county, this looked as if someone were horning in on his territory.

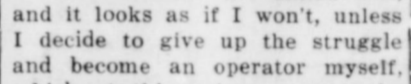
