### **Christmas Sales Totals Up Despite** Many Shortages

Eastland retail businesses were nearing the end of another Christmas shopping season Thursday apparently with a dollar volume of business that surpassed anything on record.

With more businesses here catering to the retail trade, the older established stores still in many cases were equalling or beating previous high sales records for Deecmber.

This was in spite of the fact that merchandise shortages in many cases were worse than at any time since the war began causing shortages.

The end of tire rationing will cancel all rationing except sugar, and it was believed the sugar pro-gram will be under the Department of Agriculture, leaving the local board to handle only price control problems.

Some local tire dealers have received in recent days the largest shipments of casings since the war began, but inner tubes, already ration free, still were scarce.



### **Social Security Outlay Is Large** In This District

ABILENE .- Over a quarter of a million dollars annually is being paid in 16 Texas counties under the retirement and survivors insurance provisions of the Social Security Act, Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene Social Security Board field office, said in connection with the observance of the sixth anniversary of the opening of the office. This total includes payments of some \$55,000 a year being made in Eastland County.

Approved caims in the 16-county area served by the Abilene office total \$23,321.15 monthly, or \$278,-\$53.80 annually. An estimated 14 per cent of the claimants have, however, requested that their payments be suspended temporarily; these suspensions were requested because of employment or for other reasons. The net annual total of monthly payments actually being made is thus approximately \$240,000. In addition to these monthly amounts, lump-sum death payments of some \$16,000 per year are being made.

Monthly payments go to the retired worker after age 65, with supplementary payments for his children under 18 and for his wife at 65. Survivors payments are made to children under 18, to the widow with such children in her care, to the widow at age 65, and in some cases to dependent parents at age 65. Approximately 65 per cent of these payments go to women and children.



Eastland County cattlemen and dairymen this week were being urged to treat their animals in order to cull the hell fly "grubs" now showing up in their backs in large numbers.

J. M. Cooper, county agricultural agent, said that when infested cattle are slaughtered, the meat around the encrusted grubs on the back must be trimmed out and vigorous health are naturally more discarded. Such trimming gives it a bad apearance and the entire carcass brings a lower price, which means that the cattle are bought for less to allow for this damage. Hides too are discounted one cent per pound if there are as many as five hole per hide. It is impossible to determine the

**VICTORY LOAN BONDS PROVE** SOUND ECONOM By TED R. GAMBLE

National Director, War Finance Division, U. S. Treasury

The Victory Loan, now under way, is the crucial test of our war finance program. We must not only raise the \$11 billion required by the Treasury but we must do it in such a manner as to avoid the danger of inflation and to make secure the Peace for which over a quarter of a million of our men have given their lives. That is why we are asking for \$4 billion from individuals, \$2 billion of it from the sale of Series E bonds.

Why is this money needed? Briefly, the reasons may be summarized

as follows: to bring our veterans home and give them their mustering-out pay, to maintain our armies of occupation, to take care of our sick and wounded veterans, to make prompt settlement of our cancelled war con-Ted R. Gamble tracts, and for

manager of the Eastland store temmated total Federal Expenditures for the 1946 fiscal year at \$66.4 billion, or \$33.7 billion below 1945. Receipts were estimated at \$36 billion, but these may be reduced somewhat by the new tax bill. This leaves a deficit of \$30.4 billion, which must be met by Treasury borrowing. It is in order to help meet this deficit that the Treasury decided on the Victory Loan, the last big public drive for funds.



One of the most significant achievements of our program is the widespread distribution of the public debt. Millions of people who never before saved a penny in their lives. now own savings bonds. It is estimated that three-quarters of the Series E bonds sold to individuals were acquired by persons earning \$5000 a year or less. Today, individuals hold almost one-fourth of the total Federal debt outstanding. An even larger proportion of the interindividuals. Obviously, this will have a tremendous impact on post-

war purchasing power. Investing in Victory Bonds will build a second economy for the future. We cannot afford to slump back into indifference and selfishness if we are to keep faith with those who have paid most dearly so that we could live in a free and peaceful world. We can and should buy Vic-

Although a staff of a half-dozen employees has been maintained throughout the war by the Association of Former Students, it was found impossible to keep accurate account of the alumni who held rank below that of general officer. The same difficulty was experienced in attempting to tabulate the decorations won by Texas Aggies in the armed services, however Congressional Medal of honor was awarded to six of the school's former students.

The only surviving Medal of Honor men are Lt. Eli Whitely of Georgetown, Class of '41, and Sgt. William George Harrell of Mercedes, Class of '43. Approximately 650 Texas A. & M. men were killed or are reported missing in action to date.

Texas A. & M. College furnished more trained officer personnel than any other college in the nation, with more than 17,000 in the service and some 13,000 of them officers.

#### "CTC" gives the green light

"The Texas and Pacific operator sitting before the CTC (Central Traffic Control) board flips a tiny lever and the green light appears on the wayside signal notifying the engineer the track is clear-or he may receive a signal to take the siding at the next passing track to let the Eastbound train speed by.




