#### WE HAVE PAID A BIG PRICE, BUT OTHERS HAVE PAID MORE

This country has paid a big price be-cause of the war, but notwithstanding all the shortages and inconveniences imposed, we are still the most fortunate nation on earth now engaged in the war. We have not had a single city or a single home devastated by bombs. We have not had a sing le industry destroyed in a night raid. We have not had families by the thousands broken up, the members carried off by invaders and put to work in foreign munitions plants or worse. We have not been or called upon to crawl out of the ruins of a bombed home and discover that one or more members of the family have been buried lifeless in its ruins. True war has brought its hardships and its sacrifices, but ours has been a small sacrifice compared to that of millions of others.

#### END OF THE WAR

And it is a fact that all of the vidence is now on the side of an early finish of the struggle in Europe-and in the Pacific. We even join in the prediction. But let us keep our powder dry. And let us remember that, when the firing coases on the battle fronts, we will face new and possibly greater problems. There will be no place for camplacency in this world for many years. Not if we are going to win what we are fighting this war for.


