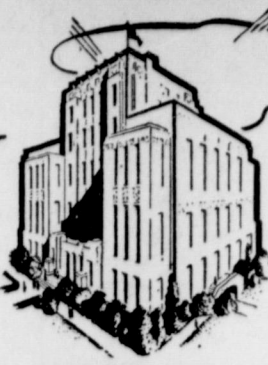

First Tax Suits Are Filed In County Collection Drive

Early Renditions On Property Asked By Tax Officials

County officials this week urged property owners of Eastland County to render their property this year instead of letting it go on the unrendered roll as many have in the past.

Rendition property will help taxpayer and the county too, they said.

County Judge Lewis Crossley said that in the past about 40 per cent of the property in the county has gone on the unrendered roll. Since there are estimated to be over 36,000 pieces of property on the tax rolls, this makes a sizeable number.

Deadline for property rendition is May 1, said Tax Assessor-Collector Clyde Karkalits.

Members of the Commissioners Court, meeting as the Board of Equalization each summer, have a tremendous problem facing them in setting renditions on property which taxpayers have failed to render, Crossley pointed out. In the past, to encourage renditions, equalization boards of the county have set an arbitrary valuation of \$10 an acre on all farm and ranch lands of the county that were not rendered, while rendered acreage was accepted at \$9 for cultivated land and \$4.50 for pasture land.

The flat valuation may be lowered somewhat on unrendered property to bring it more in line, he said.

Also, on all rendered and unrendered property, the court has said it will follow the law closely and refuse to make adjustments in later years on property valuations.

In the past, a taxpayer whose property has been on the unrendered and delinquent rolls for a number of years frequently could go to the court and obtain a reduction by offering a settlement on a lower basis, but it was said this practice will be stopped.

The only adjustments, it was said, will be through the courts.

Rain In Eastland Totals 1.60 Inches

Rains which started falling Friday of last week and have continued intermittently have brought 1.60 inches of moisture to Eastland, Weatherman J. A. Beard said Thursday evening.

Ranchers and farmers, many with tanks and ponds drying up before the rains started, welcomed the moisture.

Another rain or two before March will put the ground in first class condition for planting, farmers said. Ranchers welcomed the moisture for the growth it would give winter and spring pastures.

Heaviest rain, said Beard, was the first, which brought 1.10 inches in less than 24 hours. Since then, the measurements were .10 inch Tuesday, .25 inch Wednesday, and .15 Thursday.

Tuesday Deadline For AAA Reports

Farmers of Eastland County have only until next Tuesday, Jan. 15, to report soil-building practices carried out since last Aug. 1, if they are to collect payments for the practices, Emmett Powell, AAA administrator, said this week.

Practices such as applying phosphate to winter legumes or pasture, or seeding small grain on the contour, must be reported by that date, he said, for payment to be made.

However, before any payments can be made for practices in 1946, prior approval must be obtained at the county AAA office, Powell said. He estimated that payments for planting winter cover crops would total about \$20,000, at the rate of about \$1.50 per acre planted.

Over 200 Pieces Of Property Listed In Ten Actions

First tax suits in the county's current tax collection drive were filed Saturday in district court, seeking to take over about 200 pieces of property for delinquent taxes.

Horace Walker, special tax attorney employed by the county, worked out the suits. Ten suits were filed, incorporating numerous pieces of property in each suit.

The property sued on all is located in Ranger. Walker said he had intended to file at the same time on some Eastland property but the suits were not prepared in time.

Numerous more suits will be filed before his tax collection campaign is ended, Walker said.

First action is being taken against owners of unimproved property, largely vacant lots in subdivisions.

Walker said that when and if the suits come up for trial and the property must be sold for taxes, a sales technique will be worked out. Property in such a case may be sold at a sheriff's sale, or the Commissioners Court could bid it in for the county and sell it all in a sale of its own with less rigidly defined times and procedures, he said.

Legal notices giving the names of owners and description of the property involved are carried in this issue of The Record.

Navy Recruiters To Visit Eastland

H. F. Lindsey, chief boatswain mate, U. S. Navy, representing the Abilene Navy Recruiting Station, will be at the Post Office in Eastland at 1 p. m. each Wednesday, they said this week.

They said that parents of boys between 17 and 18 years of age must sign consent papers in the presence of a Navy recruiter before such youths may enlist, and the presence of the recruiters here would save a trip to Abilene in such cases.

New advantages to Navy recruits, it was pointed out, include benefits of the GI Bill of Rights, benefits of dependency or family allowances, two, three or four-year enlistments, 30 days leave with pay per year, and advantages of service schools.

Outlook Is Dark For County Fair

Stock raisers of Eastland County apparently are not responding very well to the proposal made by an Eastland Chamber of Commerce Committee, to the effect that Eastland businessmen would raise \$5000 toward a permanent county fair grounds here if the stock raisers would sign up for another \$5000, Virgil Seaberry, chairman of the local committee, said Thursday.

Seaberry reported at a luncheon meeting of Chamber of Commerce directors that the outlook was not very bright at this time for the fair here. Stockmen seem divided in their sentiments about the fair, and apparently have raised less than one-fourth of the \$5000 figure, he said.

Poll Tax Payments At Half Way Point

As the end of poll tax paying time drew nearer this week, County Tax Assessor-Collector Clyde Karkalits estimated that the approximately 3360 poll taxes paid in the county are about half the total that will be paid by the deadline Jan. 31.

Karkalits also reminded discharged servicemen that they do not have to have a poll tax to vote in any election that comes within 18 months of their discharge.

Karkalits said that he expects about 6500 poll taxes to be paid, with probably the greater part of the remaining 3000 or so to be paid as usual in a last-minute rush.

30 Veterans Get Local Approval For Job Training

Applications of about 30 veterans of World War II have been cleared through his office for Veterans Administration assistance under the new veterans training program in Eastland County M. D. Fox, counsellor, said Thursday.

Most of the veterans are at work in the places where they will obtain on-the-job training under the program, Fox said.

Another 40 or 50 veterans have applied for certified copies of their discharges so they may apply for subsistence grants and obtain benefits of the program, Fox said.

As it stands, there is a wide time lag between the time a veteran applies and the time he receives his first Veterans Administration check, Fox said, but news stories have said that a program has been worked out to cut this time to a month or less.

Fox said he is quite pleased with the way the program has started out. In Goldthwaite County, a test program was started early last fall, and at Christmas only about 60 veterans were receiving training under it, he said.

As the program is working here now, a veteran is expected to line up an employer who is willing to give him on-the-job training and an apprentice salary, then go to Fox's office on the second floor of the Sinclair-Prairie Building to work out the details of federal assistance.

However, Fox said he would be glad to hear from employers who wish to train men. But his office will not seek apprentice jobs for veterans at present, he said.

"A Finger in the Pie"?

Which is the UAW-CIO really after? Is it seeking facts—or new economic power? Does it want to know things—or run things?

3. Basis of Collective Bargaining is Defined

The Wagner Act lays down the rules for collective bargaining. These cover such areas as rates of pay, hours of work, working conditions.

No mention is made of earnings, prices, sales volume, taxes and the like. These are recognized as the problems of management.

4. Something New has been Added

The obvious fact is that the UAW-CIO has gone beyond its power under the law—and is reaching not for information but for power—not for a look at past figures, but for the power to sit in on forecasting and planning the future.

A "look at the books" is a clever catch phrase intended as an opening wedge whereby Unions hope to pry their way into the whole field of management.

It leads surely to the day when Union bosses, under the threat of strike, will demand the right to tell what we can make, where we can make it, and how much we can charge you—all with an eye on what labor can take out of your business, rather than on the value that goes into the product.

5. This Threatens All Business

If the Union can do this in the case of General Motors, it can do it to every business in this land of ours.

Is this just imagination? Union spokesmen have said, "Union has stated time after time that this issue is bigger than just an ordinary wage argument, that it is bigger than the Corporation and bigger than the Union."

For Labor Unions to use the monopolistic power of their vast membership to extend the scope of wage negotiations to include more than wages, hours and working conditions is the first step toward handing the management of business over to the Union bosses.
