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8 Veterans Approved County Training Program

New Staff Members Named Advise Ex-GI's

Commission of the veterans training program in Eastland County under way this week as it was announced that two new members have been added to the training staff and that applications of 128 ex-GI's for training had won approval.

Added to the staff, which formerly had consisted only of M. D. Harry Kelsey, former patrol drivers' license examiner here, who is now general secretary and counsellor of distribution in the veterans' office, and Walter S. Glenney, former in trade and industrial training.

In the latter phase of the program, most popular so far, said the co-ordinator of the program, and counsellor on agriculture, he estimated that of veterans who have applied for training, 40 per cent want trade training, 35 per cent want agricultural training.

There are more who want to be mechanics than any other, he said. Money begins to come back from the federal government under the program, an event expected in two or three months, more will be added as counsellors, until perhaps ultimately will be a counsellor for each of the men in training.

Those who are taking advantage of the program also must wait for money. However, the first check, perhaps 90 cents now, will be for two or three months' pay, Fox said.

Applications of Glenney, a former technical training leader, outstanding, Fox said. He has practical work, technical teaching and administrative experience in machine and welding work of almost any type.

In Eastland, he set up the shop in school which helped thousands of GI's learn machine shop building practice, Fox said.

Jack W. Brown of Eastland, son of Dr. and Mrs. L. C. Brown, recently was promoted from rank of lieutenant to lieutenant commander in the U. S. Naval Reserve, according to a release from New York, where he is engineering officer of Air Ferry Service Squadron One of the Ferry Wing of the Naval Air Transport Service.

Brown entered the Navy in September, 1942, and after training and service at various points in the United States, went in April, 1944 to the Marianas. Later he was engineering officer for the first Navy squadron of Vega Veterans based on Iwo Jima in March, 1945.

In June, 1945, he returned to the States, and served at St. Louis until assigned to his present station.

His squadron is the one which has had charge of ferrying all Navy planes to war theaters from the United States.

Commander Brown is a graduate of Texas Tech in mechanical engineering.

Choyce Brock, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Brock of Eastland, who is on terminal leave from the Army Air Forces, has been promoted from major to lieutenant colonel, according to word to his parents. Side Issues

When I looked outside for the first time Wednesday morning and saw the yellow-brown haze all around the edge of the sky, I could hardly believe my eyes, because it had been just about 10 years since I had seen the yellow dust of Kansas and Oklahoma drifting along.

The last time was in Bisbee, Ariz., where I was living at the time, and to get there the dust cloud had to drift just about a thousand miles. It floated on a very light wind, just as the one here in Eastland did Wednesday.

Before that, when I was living in El Paso in the real Dust Bowl days, it was not infrequent to wake up in the morning and wonder whether it was cloudy or just another duster.

Those were days when they were wondering whether the Dust Bowl area would ever produce crops again. Since then the rains have come, conservation programs have been born and matured, and crops in abundance have been grown in the yellow, loose soil of the high plains.

But now the dust is drifting again, and even though the soil conservation scientists say it can't happen again, and the soil is tied down too well for there ever to be another Dust Bowl disaster, I wonder. The papers say there's been plenty of damage to winter wheat in the last few days, and this after only a comparatively short time of dry weather. Back in the old days, there were several years when it rained very little up there.

We've had good moisture in Eastland, but further west they've been crying about the drought for a good while, and unless heavy rain or snow or something comes along, I'm afraid we'll see yellow dust drifting in again more than once.

The bumper-to-bumper traffic on Highway 80, the increasingly frequent stories of traffic accidents, and the kind of driving I see almost daily combine to scare me almost every time I get out on the highway to drive.

Like most drivers, I've always considered myself a better than average driver, and my past driving record bears that out. But the best driver in the world is helpless if a car looms up in front of him out of control at night, or over the crest of a hill, or in a number of other circumstances.

Ten years ago J. C. Furnas wrote an article on "And Sudden Death." He described the horrible way people are hurt and die in motor accidents. Rarely to the people who are to die have any premonition of it beforehand, he wrote; a happy group one minute may be a bunch of corpses, or groaning, screaming derelicts the next.

Having seen a lot of accidents as a reporter and driver, I can testify that it is not pleasant to be on the scene after one and see the corpses whose heads have torn through the windshield; to witness the injured whose gashed flesh and shattered bones make their misery almost too much to bear.

Think of these things when you start out to drive. Think of them every time. One slip can be the last one.

Eastland County politics are certainly going to boil this year, from every indication, and it would surprise few if a record vote is cast.

But I heard a couple of politicians arguing the other day over the soldier vote, which could be very decisive this year, although it likely will not be in many of the county races unless dark-horse ex-GI candidates show up later.

These politicians were wondering just how many soldiers would use their free votes, and just how interested the soldiers are in politics.

One was saying he didn't think the rank and file of ex-servicemen particularly gives a hoot about politics, while the other said he believes they are more interested than any other single group in the country.

All will be told, perhaps, after the votes are counted next summer. Either the veterans will turn out and vote, or they won't.

Shorty Ellis Dies In Derrick Fall; Rites Held Sunday

Funeral services for M. E. "Shorty" Ellis of Eastland, who was fatally injured at noon last Friday when he fell 40 feet from a derrick he was helping dismantle, were held Sunday afternoon in the Hamner Funeral Home with Rev. J. W. Ford, officiating. Burial was in the Eastland Cemetery.

Ellis was working for Dewey Cox of Ranger on the derrick job. It was reported a board on which he was standing broke.

He was brought to Eastland for emergency treatment, and then taken to Ranger, where he died in a hospital.

Survivors include his widow, five children, Conrad Neal, Donald Roy, Harold Dean, Joyce and Leona, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Ellis of Harlingen, three brothers, Ruel and Noel Ellis of Houston and Hansel Ellis of Harlingen, and a sister, Mrs. Norbert Waters of Harlingen.

The Ellis family lives at 1008 West Patterson Street.

Firemen To Have Annual Dance Here February 14

Members of the Eastland Volunteer Fire Department will hold their annual dance in the Eastland Legion Hall next Thursday, Feb. 14, from 9 p. m. to 1 a. m., members said this week.

The fire department is made up of three paid regular firemen and 27 unpaid volunteers, who drop their regular business when the alarm is sounded to answer fire calls.

Ticket sales for the dance will begin with an intensive campaign beginning Monday, it was said. An orchestra from Radio Station KBWD, Brownwood, will play.

The dance is almost the only way the department has of raising funds with which to carry on its activities.

Fire chief is A. W. Hennessee, and other full-time firemen are Pack Kilbourn and Jake Sparr. Secretary-treasurer of the department is Wade Overby.

At one time Eastland fire insurance rates were raised by a 15 per cent penalty inflicted after a bad year or two, but members of the department are proud now that Eastland's rates are cut as low as possible with a 25 per cent credit.

Church To Have First Services In New Building

The congregation of the Eastland Church of the Nazarene will move to its new church building at West Main and Connellee Streets Sunday for the opening service, Rev. F. F. Fike, pastor announced this week.

The church was erected within less than 90 days after ground was broken, and the opening service will beat the expected date by several weeks. All details of finishing the structure have not been completed, and work likely will go on for 30 more days, but the edifice has been nearly enough finished so services may be held, Mr. Fike said.

Mr. Fike will preach at the morning service, and the evening sermon will be preached by Evangelist Harold McClain, former pastor at San Benito, at 7:30 p. m.

After the construction work is completed, Mr. Fike said, a real dedication of the church building will be announced, with a guest speaker and special program.

Mr. Fike said that visiting ministers have said that the new church, while not the most expensive, is among the most beautiful of the churches of its denomination in this district.

Blanton Announces For Congress; Raps Labor Heads

William W. Blanton, county judge of Shackelford County and recently an Army staff sergeant, has authorized The Record to announce his candidacy for Congress from the 17th District which his father, Thomas L. Blanton, represented for 20 years.

Judge Blanton, 35, married, a resident of Albany, graduated with high honors from Princeton, attended law school at the University of Texas, and practiced law in Albany, where he was elected county judge in 1940. He was re-elected without opposition in 1942, but waived his judge's exemption to the draft to enlist as a private.

Following basic training, he was assigned to the Counter-Intelligence Corps, the Army unit combating enemy espionage and sabotage, and after service in Florida, served for 18 months as special agent in Burma and India. He was discharged as staff sergeant with two battle stars in November, 1945 and returned to Albany, where the county judge resigned and Judge Blanton was appointed to his old job.

Dead was Richard Cluck, war veteran of Tulsa, Okla. Injured were Capt. Ormond F. Fochtman of Virginia, driver of the car in which Cluck and a friend John A. Dismang of Tulsa were riding; Dismang hurt only slightly; Mrs. Jean Hamilton Boling of Hamlin and Homer Burleson of Temple, Okla., the latter two occupants of the other car.

Tax Suits Won By County, State

Judgment was entered Tuesday in 91st District Court on behalf of the state and county in 10 tax suits filed by Horace Walker, special tax attorney hired by the county, on about 200 pieces of property on which taxes had been long delinquent.

The 200 pieces all are lots located in Ranger.

Under regular process of law, the lots will be sold later at a sheriff's sale from the Courthouse steps in Eastland.

Walker said more suits will be filed later on property in various parts of the county.

Clothing Shipped In Drive Here Totals 3297 Pounds

Eastland directors of the Victory Clothing Collection have shipped 3297 pounds of clothing and shoes, destined ultimately to be used in clothing the people of Europe and Asia who need clothing, C. W. Geue and Clyde Karkalits, local directors, said this week.

It was estimated that 500 pairs of shoes and 1100 articles of clothing have been donated locally in the drive.

Geue said the drive will end Saturday, Feb. 16.

Boy Scouts he said, have been very helpful in the drive, and on Saturday again will go to homes and pick up boxes or bundles of clothing. Persons who have clothing to donate should call the Chamber of Commerce before 9 a. m. Saturday, he said.

Clothing also still may be left at collection stations in downtown grocery stores, the Courthouse lobby, and lobbies of the Exchange Building and Eastland National Bank Building.

Voluntary Parking Change Is Asked

Members of the Eastland City Commission Monday decided against a downtown parking limit right now, and instead agreed on inviting all-day parkers around the square to leave their cars elsewhere so shoppers may use the space during the day.

However, the voluntary parking plan has a threat behind it of a city ordinance to set a parking limit unless the voluntary plan works.

Also, said City Manager K. B. Tanner, "The police have been ordered to be doubly alert for infractions of the speeding laws and double parking on the square. Tickets for these infractions are being freely given. First offenders are given a warning with the threat of a fine if repeated. Speeding seems to be disregarded by the younger drivers who must be warned to keep their speed down to the legal limit of 30 miles per hour."

Tanner said the city is preparing free parking lots near the downtown area, and all those who have been leaving cars parked on the square for long periods during the day were asked instead to use the parking lots.

About \$600 Raised In Campaign On Infantile Paralysis

Eastland's drive for funds with which to fight infantile paralysis has been quite successful so far, Victor Cornelius, local drive chairman, said Thursday.

Approximately \$600 has been raised in Eastland in the drive so far, he reported, with approximately \$200 taken in collections by the local theaters and about \$400 derived from other sources, including the dance sponsored by the American Legion last Friday night.

The dance was pronounced a marked success by Legion officials and infantile paralysis drive sponsors.

'First Work Begun On Locker Plant And Funeral Home

Commercial building around Eastland was on the uptrend this week as two major building enterprises were started and several others were contemplated.

Foundation work had begun on J. O. Earnest's new frozen food locker plant and grocery in the block just south of the Eastland square. The new building will extend in an L shape around the building now occupied by the Rushing Motor Company.

A section of the new building will extend across the entire block, facing Lamar Street on one side and Seaman on the other.

Earnest had secured almost all of the construction materials before the recent freeze went on.

Diagonally across the street corner from Earnest's new building, at Olive and Lamar Streets, Ben Hamner started workmen to clearing off a group of lots on which he will erect his new funeral home.

Holding up the project was lack of permission to raze the old ice-house that stands on the corner.

Hamner said he will build a frame type building with asbestos shingle siding. Incorporated in the funeral home will be a 24x50 foot chapel with lounge chairs and divans instead of the more conventional formal benches.

Bob Vaught, who recently sold his building on Seaman Street, also was clearing the site for a building he will erect a block south on Seaman Street, and across the street from his former location.

He will erect a 35x50 foot tile building on the front of the lot, he said, and at the rear will join on an iron building.

Vaught has closed out his feed business, and said that for a time at least he plans to restrict his business activities to peanuts and peanut sacks.

Pat Murphy, who recently built a tile building on White Street for his radiator shop, this week was building another beside it to house C. W. Caudle's Eastland Appliance Company, which will specialize in butane equipment and appliances.

The new shop joins Murphy's shop on one side, and that of E. M. Anderson on the other. Anderson also recently completed his new tile building.

Various other Eastland businessmen have projects in mind for construction of various kinds, but are holding off activity until materials and labor are easier to obtain, or their business situation is different.

H. L. King, who has title to the entire block in which the King Motor Company is situated, last week had a steel mesh fence put around the northern part of the block, after building a corrugated iron building at the northwest corner of the property, and said that later he will use the enclosure for a yard for used cars, tractors, farm implements and so forth.

next Congress, and there are going to be some changes made in this labor union situation. I believe the Case bill before Congress is inadequate because it does nothing to protect the rank and file of union members from the tyranny of the union leaders.

"As long as professional union officials can take a man's job away from him by taking away his union card, or can have him fined, abused or beat up, and as long as he is helpless before such oppression, they can control his speech, actions and vote, and can tax his pocketbook at will," Judge Blanton stated. "They can silence all organized opposition within the union and dispose of all trouble makers," he added. "so that a strike vote or any other vote within the union is only a deceptive farce. Like a vote in Germany under Hitler."

He believes that the key to nearly all our labor troubles lies in the lack of democracy and freedom within the unions.

It is his conviction that if the men who actually do the work were in control of their own unions, strikes which are against the interest of both the employer and the employee, and to the interest only of the professional union officials,

It was only a question of time until the modest statements of us Texans about our State would get the rise outta our friends who dwell elsewhere and recently that's just what happened. An individual, calling himself as Rattlesnake Roberts went to bat for New Mexico in the New York Herald-Tribune. Actually, he is the noted poet and short story writer, S. Barker; and the Herald-Tribune and Mr. Barker have given permission to quote his kidding article:

"Despite a profound reverence for the self-confessed colossality of Texas, I feel that the Lone Star's tall shadow should not be permitted unduly to adumbrate the modest merits of her nearby neighbor to the west.

"I refer to New Mexico, forty-seven star in the flag, not to be confused (though it generally is) with Mexico—the good neighbor reliable which supplies via the southwest wind, 50 percent of the sand in every Texan's pants. New Mexico, of course, supplies the rest.

"Actually, Texas is no bigger than New Mexico. It only appears to be bigger because it is spread much thinner. The mean average thickness of New Mexico from sea level to sea level is 5,600 feet. The higher you go into the mountains the meaner it gets. Straight from the snow-capped crest of Mt. Wheeler, New Mexico is 10 feet thick, and a little left of center. Mashed down and rolled out to the same thinness as Texas, New Mexico would reach all the way from Yalta to the Atlantic Ocean with enough lap over to wrap up in the Texas wind. On the other hand, at the thickest point of Texas, an average New Mexico worm-billed angleworm could bore through to the bottom in one wiggle.

"New Mexico is the sunshine state because its scenic beauty is so entrancing that even Old Sol must let a day pas without taking a good look at it.

"Compared to New Mexico, Texas is a newcomer. A million years before Tex Columbus fourteen-nineteen-ninety America, an early settler known as the Folsom Man was practicing point rationing in New Mexico. He used arrow heads for points. No points, no buffalo meat.

"Fourscore years before the first Texas cowboy suffed a high-heeled boot on Plymouth Rock, a Coronado of Spain, was eating corn off the cob in New Mexico and mailing home pictograph postcards of five-storied Pueblo towers marked 'X-My Room-X.' 'Come on over, the climb is fine.'

"Speaking of climate, New Mexico is where all Texans who have their tires come every summer to get off and brag about the Texas climate.

"New Mexico has plains so flat that the State Highway Department has to put up signs to show water which way to run when it rains; yet its mountains are so steep that the bears which inhabit them have all developed cork-tail so they can sit down in a while without sliding off to Texas.

"There is no place in New Mexico from which on a sunny day (which means every day here) you cannot see a mountain, smell a pine tree, or hear a Texan. Snow falls deep in New Mexico's mountains and it takes 40,000 automobile loads of Texas hot air each summer to melt it.

If all the deer horns in the state were clustered together into one giant hatrack, it would make a good place for Texans to hang their hats on when not talking through them. Combine all the mountain lions' tails in New Mexico into one and you could brush all the heel flies out of Texas in one brush.

"Speaking of oil, all you have to do in southeastern New Mexico to get a filling station is to stick a garden hose down a gopher hole. New Mexico raises every conceivable crop, including cotton, corn, beans, buckaroos, wheat, deep chili con carne and the hopes of Texans who hanker for some place to go trout fishing.

"There are more writers, artists, jack-rabbits and political assassinations to the square inch in New Mexico than there are bureaus in Washington.

"And the sun shines 365 days of the year, and twice on Sundays."

So says Barker of New Mexico.


