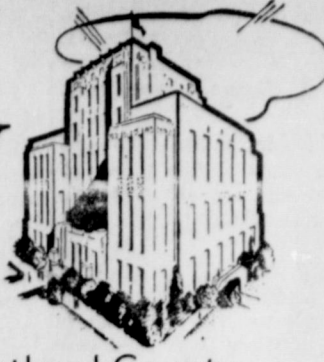

Cross Drive Response Is Slow; \$100 Reported

Eastland's Red Cross drive, apparently with much less response during the war years, closed the \$1000 mark Thursday, it was reported. E. Woody, chairman, said the goal of \$2500 still is far away, and workers who are making their rounds to get campaign leaders to get as soon as possible and to get the job done.

For Gorman, other towns in the county were slow getting started. It was reported. Cisco did not begin its drive until Saturday, and Ranger reported slow results.

Stephan stepped out fast and raised more than \$800 of its \$1000 goal Wednesday night, only to drop after the drive began.

Smaller communities of the county also reported quick success. The south, Comanche staged a drive to become the center in this area to go over the top.

How Show Set Connection With Livestock Event

are complete for a horse show to be held in connection with the Eastland County Livestock Show at Ranger on Saturday.

Weston McMinn, superintendent of the horse division of the show, said this week.

Purpose of the horse show, McMinn said, is to demonstrate the different types of horses in this county and adapted to present conditions.

The regular classes in the show, an additional seven exhibition classes have been arranged. Class No. 1 is of parade horses, each entry consisting of a pair of four horses and riders; Class 2 is most typical western riding; Class 3 is for three-gaited saddle horses; Class 4 is for action or reining; Class 5 is for the three-gaited pony class for boys and girls under 15 years of age, and Class 6 is for pleasure live-gaited horses, and for popular all-around horse show.

Entries are to be judged principally on way of travel style, accuracy, willingness of performer and gentleness.

Gridsters To Step Out In New Uniforms On Lighted Field In Eastland Next Fall

Eastland's football Mavericks will be high-stepping next season under new lights, in new uniforms, and with a well-rounded 10-game schedule, it was disclosed this week.

School Business Manager Curtis Hertig said arrangements are being made to put up lights at the Maverick stadium. Later, he said, it is hoped to improve the stadium with new stands, but at present lack of good lumber for seats, needed even on steel stands, is stalemating the program.

Coach John Little said the fancy new uniforms already have been ordered, and also announced the complete schedule for next fall.

The uniforms, perhaps the slickest and gaudiest yet worn by a Maverick team, will have scarlet and white stripes on the side, white nylon pants with white inserts and white stripes on the side, white shirts with red shoulders and red numerals, and the familiar black and red headgear like those worn by Maverick teams of the past.

New shoes also have been ordered. Twenty-four of next year's Maverick team will have the new outfits. Cost of a complete suit, Little figures, is close to \$54.

Football enthusiasts in Eastland long have been clamoring for a larger, better stadium with lights. Eastland now has just about the only unlighted Class A stadium in this section of Texas.

The complete schedule, as announced by Little, shows that Eastland will play every team in District 10-A next season, as well as four strong non-conference teams.

Norther Blows In Worst Dust Storm In Recent Years

Possibly the worst dust storm since the early 1930's invaded Eastland County Thursday from the northwest and interrupted a spell of spring weather that had fruit trees blooming earlier than they should.

As the pall of dust from the Panhandle moved in and limited visibility to a half mile or so, a lot of people were saying, "I'll bet it's rough in Pampa."

Peach, plum and even some pear trees were blooming merrily all over the county, causing fears for the coming fruit crop.

The average date for the last killing frost in the northern part of the county will not arrive for several days yet, and the north wind that blew the dust in Thursday was an ominous reminder of what might come.

Meanwhile, farmers of the county were preparing their fields for planting as rapidly as possible, taking advantage of the unusual spell of warm, dry weather that left the ground in good condition for working.

The body of Mrs. Snow Frost, long time resident of Eastland, was found hanging in the garage of the family home here Friday evening of last week after other members of the family had found a note which led them to the garage.

Survivors include her husband, a daughter, Nell, son, Truman, and a sister, Mrs. J. F. Burkhill, all of Eastland.

City And School Elections Coming Early In April

Eastland voters who paid poll taxes in record numbers recently will get a chance to use them twice early in April.

Two City Commission members will be elected Tuesday, April 2, and two members of the board of the Eastland school district Saturday, April 6.

City Commissioners whose terms will expire are Charles T. Lucas and John W. Jackson, according to a notice issued this week by Victor Cornelius, chairman of the Board of City Commissioners. Named in the order as election judges are P. L. Parker, E. C. Satterwhite and Mrs. Maud Braly.

Voting will be in the City Hall. The board of the school district is scheduled to meet next week to order its election. School board members whose terms will expire are Frank Sparks, board chairman, and Ernest Halkias.

It also was announced that one function of the club will be the purchase of a movie camera so motion pictures can be made of all Eastland Maverick football games next season.

The pictures then would be shown to members of the Quarterbacks Club, along with pictures of outstanding college and professional athletes.

The organizations here would be similar in purpose and formation to many that have been successful in other communities of West Texas. Interest in local athletics, low for many years, has increased so rapidly in the past two or three years that a group of Eastland men, feeling the time had come to organize for action, met this week and decided on the meeting Tuesday.

Discounting the pleasure the men of Eastland will gain from the organization, chief purpose, it was said, will be to promote good, clean athletics among the youth of Eastland.

Clean-up Drive Last Step In Contest On Beautification

Eastland's months-long clean up and paint up drive which has been sponsored by the Civic League and Garden Club as its work in a state contest will end with the contest deadline April 1, and the members of the contest committee which met Tuesday expressed hope that the annual spring clean-up drive which will end March 15 will get the best possible results.

Members of the committee expressed gratification at the way businessmen and others have cooperated in the campaign. Since it was launched last summer, it was pointed out, almost every store front in Eastland's downtown district has received a new coat of paint, and numerous other steps have been taken to insure Eastland in retaining its reputation as one of the nicest looking and cleanest small cities in Texas.

As the last part of the drive, householders, business operators and property owners were asked to make the spring clean-up drive a success by looking over their property for trash or any kind of unsightly objects, and get it out of the way before March 15.

On that date, city trucks are scheduled to begin removing all such trash that has been stacked by curbs or alleys.

Tax Office To Stay Open Saturday

The Eastland office of the Internal Revenue Bureau, in Room 10 of the Sinclair Prairie Building, will be open all day Saturday, March 9, to give assistance to taxpayers filing income tax returns, it was announced this week by Ben M. Smith, in charge of the office.

With income tax jitters prevalent among many Eastland money makers this week, the March 15 deadline for filing 1945 returns was looming larger and larger. However, one segment of the population viewed the date as just another number on the calendar, since farmers had filed returns by Jan. 15.

Side Issues

Efforts are being made to obtain a Soil Conservation Service office in Eastland, and if it will do as much good as it could, nothing could benefit Eastland and this portion of the county more.

There is an SCS office in Rising Star now, the only one in the county. Many farmers who have followed the advice and had the help of the men from the Rising Star office are reaping the benefits in increased yields and increased land values.

There are many who shout loud and long against our rising federal bureaucracy, and I've done some hollering too, but when it gets down to cases, some of the federal agencies that have grown up in recent years seem more necessary than a lot of older ones.

I don't know who said that our civilization rests on a few inches of topsoil, and in a way the saying is wrong, in that washed-out farms with almost all the topsoil gone have been restored to fertility by lots of hard work and the proper soil-building practices.

But the SCS is dedicated to the principle that keeping topsoil on the land and building more is the best way for farmers to make money and for our nation to keep its soil fertility.

When you think of how much of our nation's population depends on farm products for its economic welfare, it is hard to say that any movement to help farmers produce more and better is wrong. Think of all the towns and cities, such as Eastland, Gorman, Ranger, Rising Star, Cisco, that exist largely because of the money the farmers and ranchers make and spend in them.

Think of the countless groceries around the nation; the thousands of wholesale food companies; the tremendous food processing plants of various kinds.

It's pretty complex, this business of getting food out of the ground with the aid of air, water, sunshine and plenty of hard work, and getting it in finished form into the kitchens of the nation. And we don't fully realize how fortunate we are in being the only large nation, with two or three exceptions, with plenty to eat.

There probably are more people in the world as you read this who are hungry than well fed. Almost certainly more who are ill clad than well clad.

And the reason we have all this food and clothing is our marvelously fertile land, plus to some extent our growing chemical industry.

There will be more and more chemical production of textiles, probably, but it probably will be a long while before the science of hydroponics, the growing of plants in water with chemical additions, amounts to a great deal. And the synthetic production of food in large quantities seems to be a long while off.

So we'd better look to our soil for our future. And saving it is our best bet.

Day Of Prayer To Be Observed Here

An inter-denominational meeting will be held in the First Christian Church in Eastland at 3 p. m. Friday to observe the World Day of Prayer, it was announced this week by pastors of the Eastland churches.

Persons of all faiths were asked to be on hand at that time for observance of the event.

In the call for the meeting at the church, the ministers said in part, "If the duties of some are such as to make this (attendance of the meeting) impossible, we do then ask that these people pause in their work for one minute of prayer to ask that God give us light to guide us, courage to support us and love to reunite us, in the world of unrest of today."

Pullman Begins Business Structure On East Main St.

Preliminary work was under way this week on a fourth major business structure in Eastland as foundations were laid for a new home for the Pullman Store on East Main Street.

Henry Pullman, owner, said the new building will be 60 by 65 feet. It will take in the space occupied by the present building occupied by the store.

The new building will have double concrete tile walls, with the exterior wall left the natural color of the tile and the inside walls painted.

Under an unusual plan, walls and ceiling of the present building will be torn down in sections and the new walls and roof built in sections so as to let the operations of the store continue as long as possible on an uninterrupted basis.

"We're going to keep on selling our merchandise just as long as we can while the work is going on," said Pullman.

The floor of the present building will be incorporated into the new structure.

Other large building projects under way in Eastland now are a food locker plant and grocery store by J. O. Earnest, a building for a sack and seed business by Bob Vaught, and a funeral home by Ben Hamner.

Recruiters Fail To Make Quota During February

The Eastland U. S. Army Recruiting District, which surpassed its January quota handsomely and had its quota increased proportionately for February, made 77.4 per cent of its February enlistment quota, Lt. Jay H. Mehaffey, commander, said this week.

The February enlistment total was 24, compared with 31 in January, Mehaffey said.

Original enlistments by draft age youths still outnumber re-enlistments by servicemen, he said. Men enlisting on reaching their 18th birthday obtain the full benefits of the GI Bill of Rights, including college and mustering out pay section, the officer said.

San Antonian Held In Ranger Car Theft

Billy McDonald of San Antonio indicted for theft of an automobile in December from Ray Campbell of Ranger, was returned to the Eastland County jail from Kerrville Monday by Deputies Maurice Vaughn and Ott Hearn.

McDonald was arrested in Kerrville after Campbell's car was wrecked near there. The youth was charged with stealing a laundry truck in Kerrville, tried and sentenced to a two-year prison term. He will be tried here for the Ranger theft, authorities said.

Officers Investigate Man And Woman

Eastland County authorities Thursday were investigating the case of a man and woman arrested in a Cisco tourist cabin on suspicion of a number of law violations.

When arrested, they had a Cadillac car, a large amount of luggage, jewelry of various kinds, and other articles. Unmarried, the young couple asked officers to permit them to get married while the investigation was under way.

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Typhus Control Measures Asked By Health Head

AUSTIN.—Inasmuch as typhus fever is, even this early in the year, showing an increased incidence over the state, Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, issued a urgent appeal to every Texan to cooperate in rodent control measures.

"The conquest of typhus fever in Texas is far from complete," Dr. Cox declared. "There is still entirely too much of this disabling disease."

"Concentrated effort and close cooperation from every citizen of Texas is urgently needed if typhus fever is to be brought definitely under control, and this certainly must be done if our public health in Texas is to be protected."

Inasmuch as typhus is spread by the flea which feeds on typhus infected rats, control measures, according to Dr. Cox, depend on rat extermination through means of starving out and building out rats as well as trapping and poisoning them. He stated that regardless of what a fine garbage collection and disposal system a community maintains, it is practically worthless in rodent control unless garbage is put into (and not beside) a garbage pail and the pail kept covered at all times.

Rat-proofing of all homes and business houses should be undertaken as quickly as possible and

the local health departments are usually able to assist in overcoming the obstacle of obtaining materials and labor. They can also assist in trapping and poisoning campaigns and will gladly do so upon request.

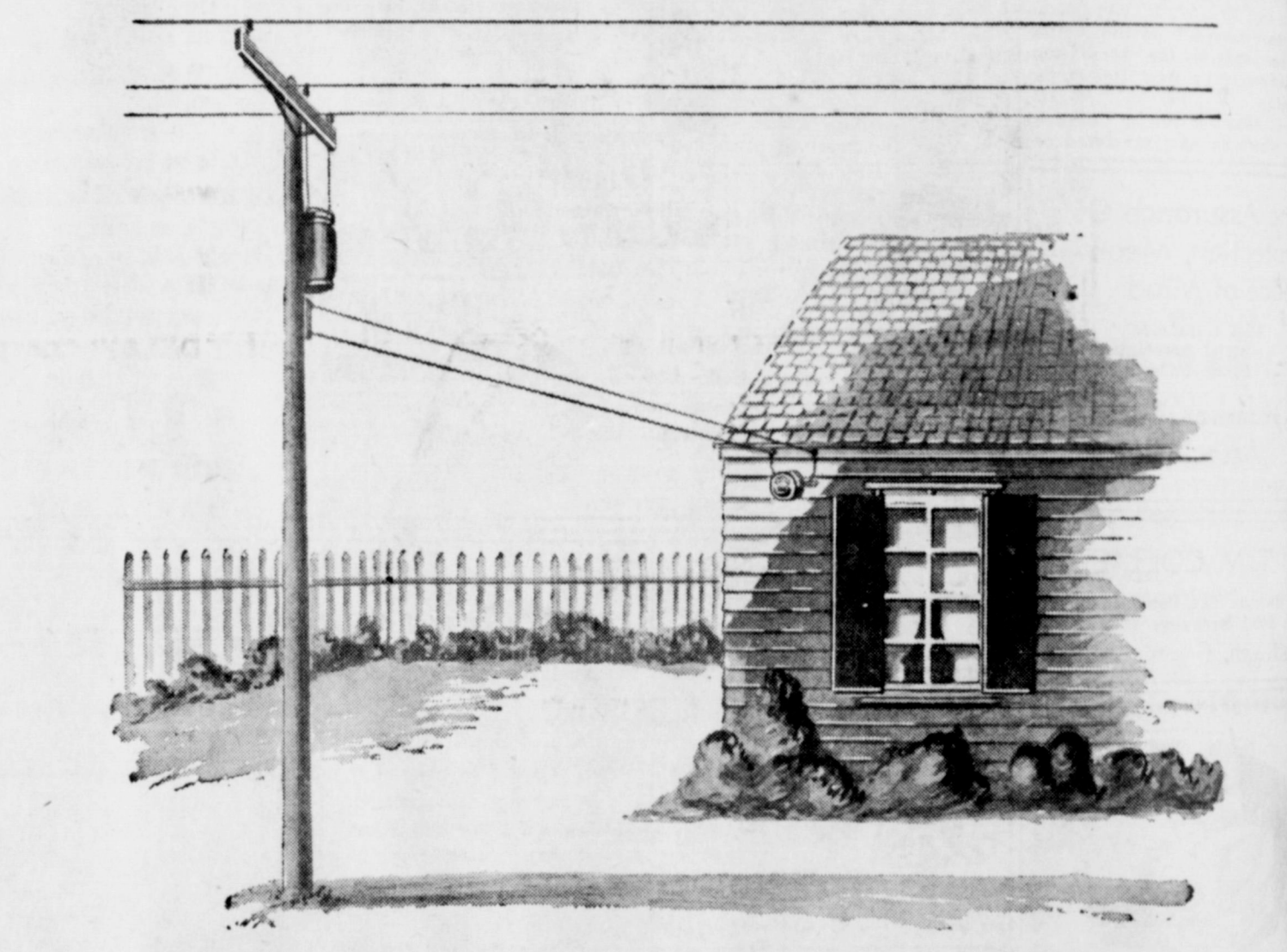

Orchard Field Day Set At Alexander Place March 13

An orchard field day, to demonstrate and advise on spraying of orchards in Eastland County, has been set for Wednesday, March 13, on the Doss Alexander place 10 miles west of Rising Star, County Agent J. M. Cooper said this week.

Cooper said it was his personal opinion that Eastland County fruit growers must learn to spray right before the county can become as prominent as it should as a fruit growing area.

The program will begin at 1 p. m. There will be talks on how and when to spray, the types of spray mixtures to use and a demonstration of spraying in Alexander's 60-acre orchard.

Control of scale, leaf curl and scab on peach and orchard trees will be a principal topic, Cooper said.

In charge of the demonstration will be J. H. Rosborough, extension horticulturist from Texas A. & M. College.

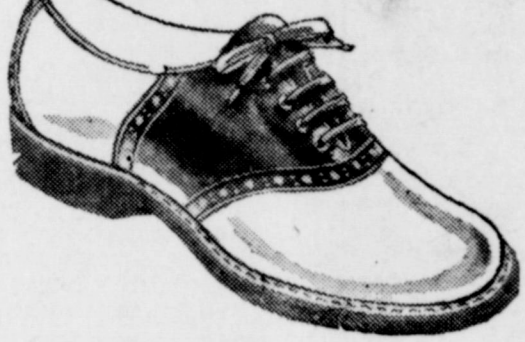
