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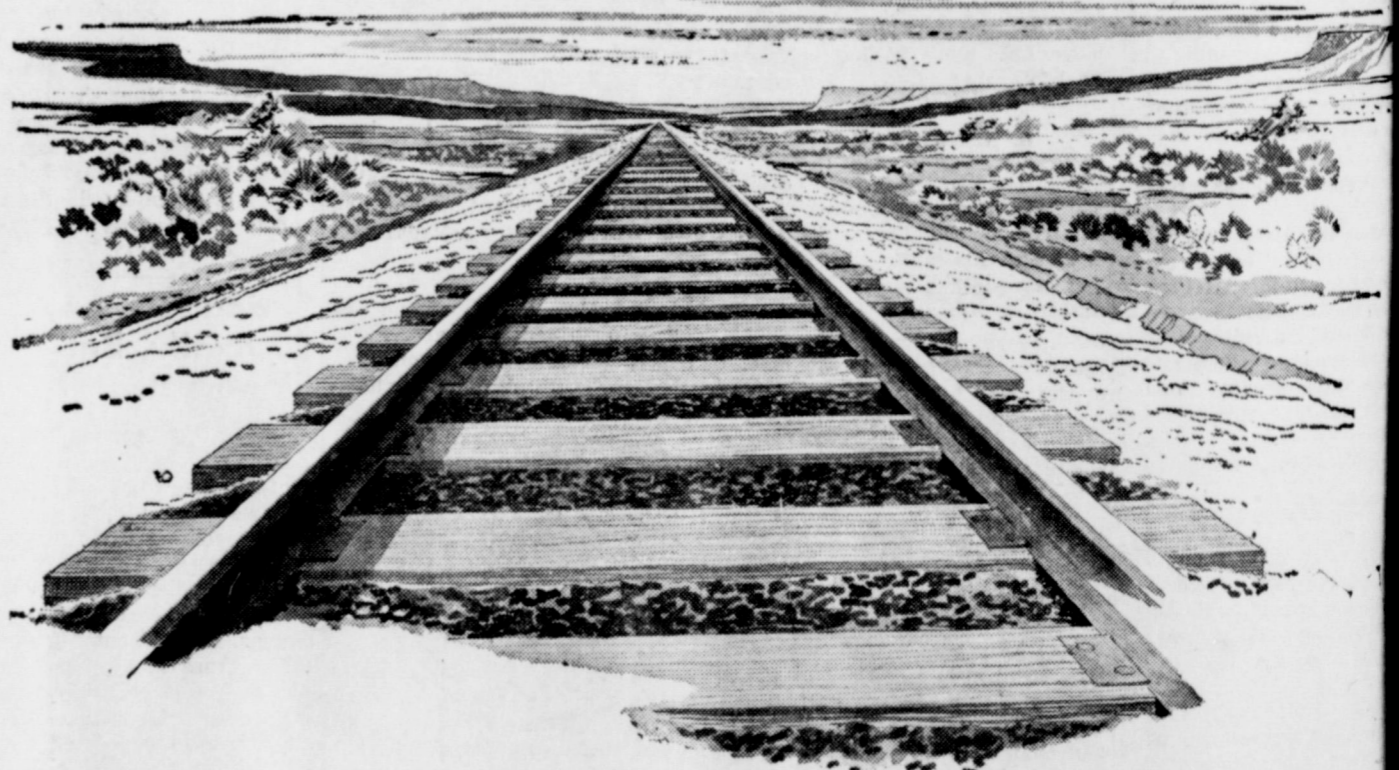

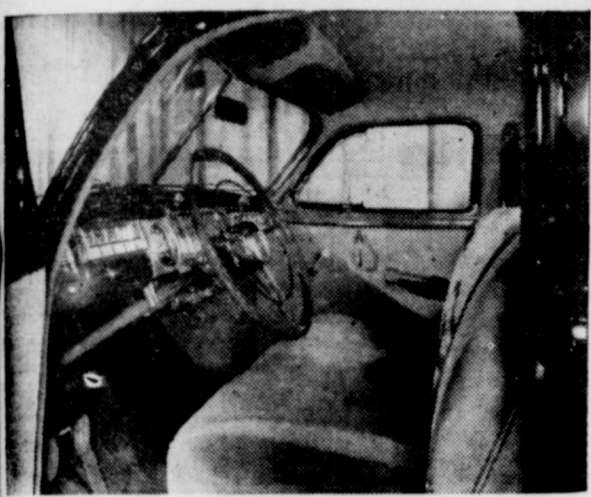

DEARBORN, Mich.—Something new has been added in designing and styling at the Ford Motor Company—the woman's touch.

A sculptor, a former art teacher, an interior decorator, a former designing manufacturer and an advertising artist combine their talents to bring the woman's viewpoint to cars manufactured by the company.

Miss Carroll told of a letter received recently from a woman who

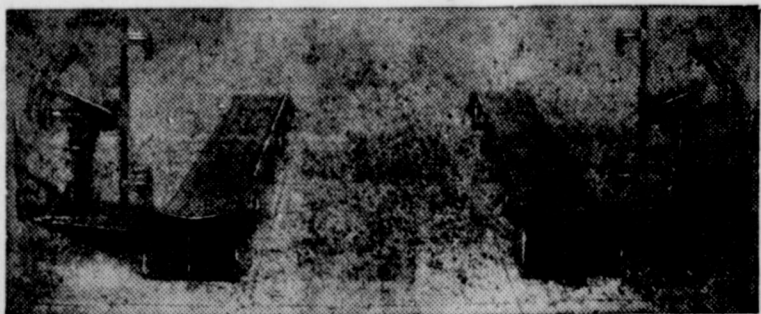

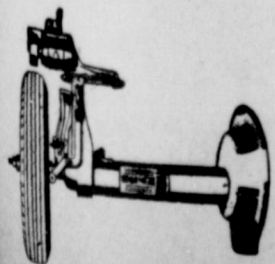

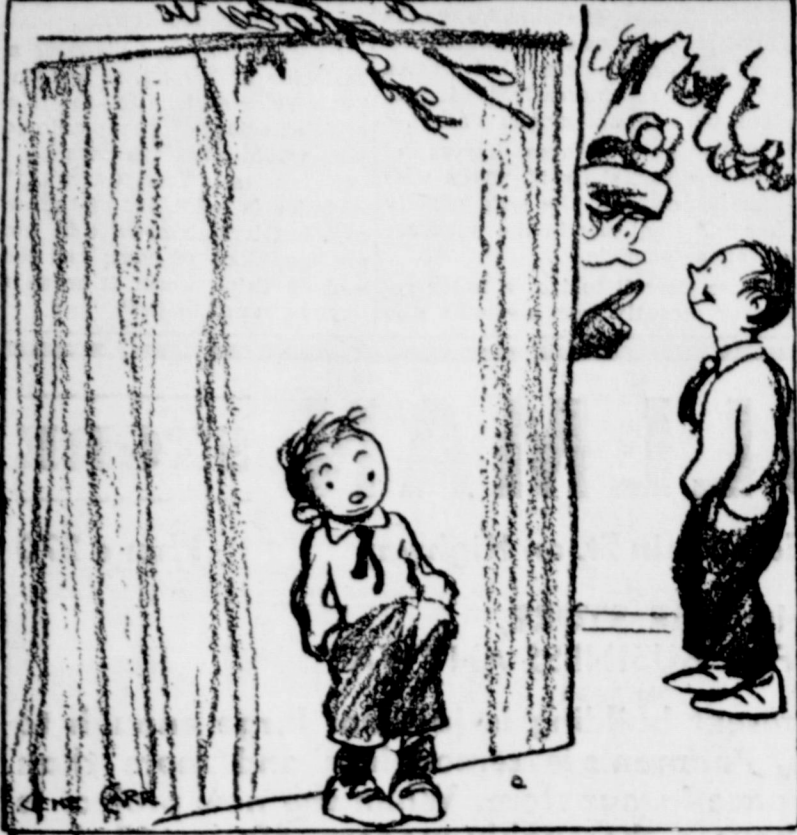

THE ONLY DIAMOND MINE IN NORTH AMERICA IS IN ARKANSAS.

The only diamond mine in North America is in Arkansas. Your columnist visited the mine, back in 1925. I hired a service car and drove over from Nashville, Ark. The highway passed through a huge peach orchard, said to be the biggest in the world. Folks said it was divided up into streets, and avenues so it was no trouble to find any particular worker during the picking season as a record was kept in the office and they knew he would be working on 23rd Street near Avenue M, or something like that.

The diamond mine is near Murfreesboro. The field was discovered by a farmer in 1907. As the story was told to me, the farmer was recovering from a fever and was sitting under a tree when some of the children, who were plowing, turned up a peculiar stone, which he noticed. The rock proved to be a diamond which sold for \$2,500.

On the day of my visit, as we approached the town, the driver crossed a railroad track without looking in either direction. At my exclamation, he said, "Oh, they don't have but two trains a week."

Surrounding the diamond mine was a solid fence and the gate was opened by a man who had a rifle. Our credentials proving satisfactory, we were admitted and walked about the place with a guide. There were armed men pacing up and down close to that high board fence like sentinels. There was a sifter through which the rocks were run and the diamonds were sorted out. Your observer was shown 20 or so and had the privilege of letting them trickle through my fingers. I sorter thought they might give me one as a trifling souvenir of my visit but they didn't—of course, I wasn't expecting a diamond of the headlight size, just a modest little half-carat one.

These were really diamonds in the rough and it would take a trained eye to see that they were precious stones just waiting to be

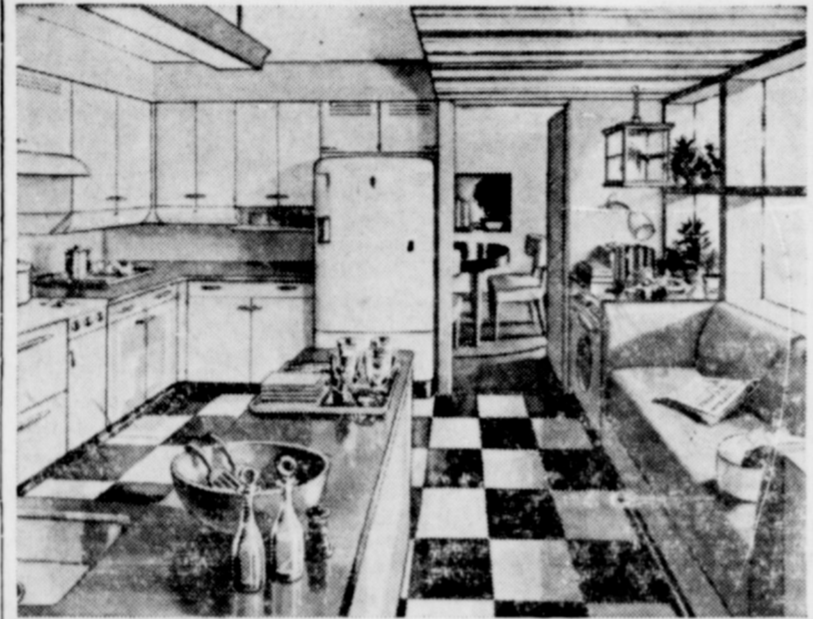
cut and set into rings and bracelets.

No accurate figures on the total output have ever been published but the Smithsonian Institute reported in 1928 that 10,000 diamonds with a conservative value of \$150,000 had been taken from the field.

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11-point program including the following features:
To help preserve state and individual rights;
To try to balance the Federal budget while reducing taxes;
To encourage public works if they are really needed and will not compete with private industry or take too big a slice of the Federal income;
To establish between labor and management a permanent basis for settlement of disputes, possibly by a court of arbitration;
To promote federal aid for education while promoting state educational benefits;
To protect and strive to improve on existing social legislation;
To encourage removal as soon as possible of governmental wartime controls and to resort to temporary subsidies to protect small economic groups in the unsettled times to come.
To remember that we must keep enough armed power to protect our armed power without becoming a militaristic nation.
To observe the State Department in its promotion of foreign relations, and to promote the development of the United Nations.

Coach Allen of Gorman pledged cooperation of high school baseball players on the junior baseball teams the Legion is sponsoring. Mayburn Harris is chairman of the baseball project.
Dr. Brandon in his talk on "Good of the Legion," stressed that all veterans of World War II should get into a good veterans organization, preferably the Legion, so they will be able to accomplish any desires and aims which should arise politically or locally.
Earl Lowery reported plans formed to raise \$12,040, Eastland County's share of the national enrollment fund of the Legion.
A rising vote of thanks were given to V. A. Hurst, chairman of arrangements, for the hospitality to the meeting.
About 65 members attended, with the auxiliary well represented.

State Asked To Take Over Road To Caddo

A group of Eastland County officials and Ranger civic leaders were in Austin Thursday to petition the State Highway Commission to take over and improve the Ranger-Caddo road which has been the subject of some agitation recently.
Those who went included County Judge P. L. Crossley, County Auditor Don Parker, County Commissioner Henry Davenport, and from Ranger, Mayor J. J. Kelley, Eubanks, L. R. Pearson and Paul McDonald.

Tenders To Be Asked On School's Bonds

Members of the Board of Trustees of the Eastland School District this week laid the groundwork for calling for tenders on more outstanding school district bonds.
The board has about \$9500 for buying bonds, or about \$2000 more than last year. So far, each year since the program was started, bonds have been bought in at least than par, starting at about one-third of par, and last year selling for about 76 cents on the dollar.
