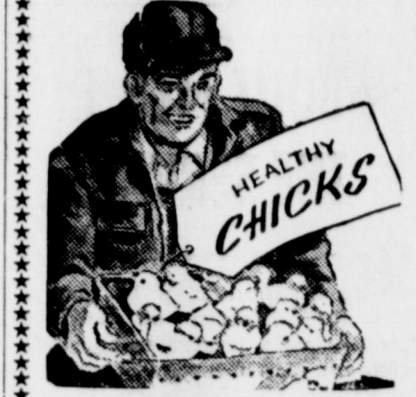

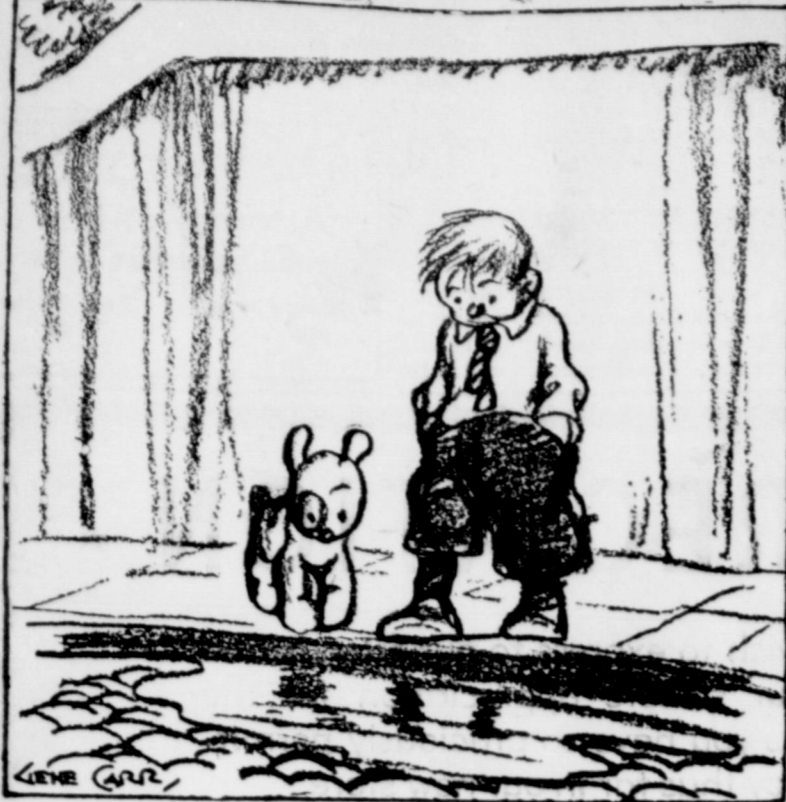

County Committee Urges People To Grow More Garden Foods At Home

World-Wide Need Is Urgent, Says U. S. President

Plan to grow more food and feed crops this year, is the appeal to Eastland County farmers, ranchers and gardeners from the County U.S.D.A. Councils, who met recently at the courthouse to discuss plans as to how to meet the present worldwide food emergency.

Not only is the council stressing the importance of growing more food and feed but is also asking that present food supplies be conserved as much as possible.

The County U.S.D.A. Council is composed of representatives from the P.M.A. F.S.A. Extension Service, Production Credit Association, Soil Conservation Service, REA and other agencies working directly with rural people over the county.

"For the world as a whole a food crisis has developed which may prove to be the worst in modern times," President Truman said in a speech recently asking that we do our share in saving millions of humans from starvation.

More people now face death from starvation from lack of food than in any war year and perhaps in all the war years combined, it was said.

In comparison to the average American diet, 125 million European people have only two meals a day, with 28 million who have only one meal a day.

A decided loss of interest in gardening, both among rural and urban people is very much in evidence this spring, several of the agricultural workers said at the meeting.

All gardeners are asked to continue to produce as much as they did in any of the war years, for as one person put it "Food is still a vital weapon in securing a stable and lasting peace."

Meat, wheat, fats and dairy products are badly needed, both at home and for export, but vegetable should not be neglected for home use, it was said.

FARM FACTS
WORTH KNOWING

- Q. Are weed seeds normally long-lived?
- A. It is hard to believe, but nevertheless true, that weed seeds may produce plants as long as forty years after the seeds ripened. For this reason, the fight against weeds must be continuous and unrelenting.
- Q. What causes some turkeys to develop a crop which is excessively long, flabby, and pendulous?
- A. A pendulous crop may be due to heredity, to climatic conditions, or both. Gorging water after going without it during hot, dry periods, or the consumption of coarse dry grass or other high fibrous materials are contributing factors.
- Q. How much does it cost the farmer for each pig that dies?
- A. Considering the feed cost to be 2 cents per pound, the U. S. Department of Agriculture estimates that the money-loss for a dead pig is as follows:
Pig dead at birth.....\$2.50
Pig dead at weaning..... 5.20
Pig dead 8 weeks after weaning..... 7.20
Adding the cost of labor and overhead, the cost of each dead pig reaches an even higher total. Fortunately, scientific management and sanitation practices have substantially reduced losses from cholera and other preventable diseases.
- Q. Does the feeding of wheat germ oil boost the fertility of dairy bulls?
- A. No; this conclusion was reached after extensive research at the Research Farm of Purina Mills in 1936, and has since been confirmed by work done at Cornell University.
- Q. Does the presence of large and numerous "milk veins" in the udder of a cow indicate that she will be a heavy milk producer?
- A. Probably not, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. These external veins assist in carrying blood away from, and not to, the udder. Moreover, the internal veins are apparently large enough to return all the blood from the udder.

Facts On Hospital Given By Parker To Rotary Club

Details of operation and history of the Ranger General Hospital, formerly the City-County Hospital, at Ranger were given to members of the Eastland Rotary Club Monday by County Auditor Don Parker.

Parker said that the hospital is more than breaking even on expenses now for the first time since it was built as a joint project by the City of Ranger and Eastland County in 1923.

During the depression, it cost the county about \$6,000 a year to operate it, and later about \$3,000 a year, he said.

After Ranger's oil boom faded, the city failed to meet its obligations on the hospital, and the county to all practical purposes took over operation and financing of the institution, Parker said.

He paid high tribute to Miss Annabelle Kinney, who came to the hospital as superintendent in 1928 and has been there since. Under her guidance, the hospital equipment has been built up until it is outstanding, he said.

Parker also praised the work of the late Dr. Walter L. Jackson of Ranger, who was a member of the five-man hospital board until his death recently. Dr. Jackson did thousands of dollars worth of free charity surgery in the hospital, he said.

Present board members are Dr. C. L. Jackson, brother of Dr. W. L. Jackson, E. E. Crawford and Lloyd Bruce, all of Ranger, and Dr. J. H. Caton and Dr. F. T. Isbell of Eastland.

Parker said that under a federal program for matching dollars, it is contemplated adding 20 or more rooms to the present hospital building.

The present building has 16 rooms, two wards, and 32 beds.

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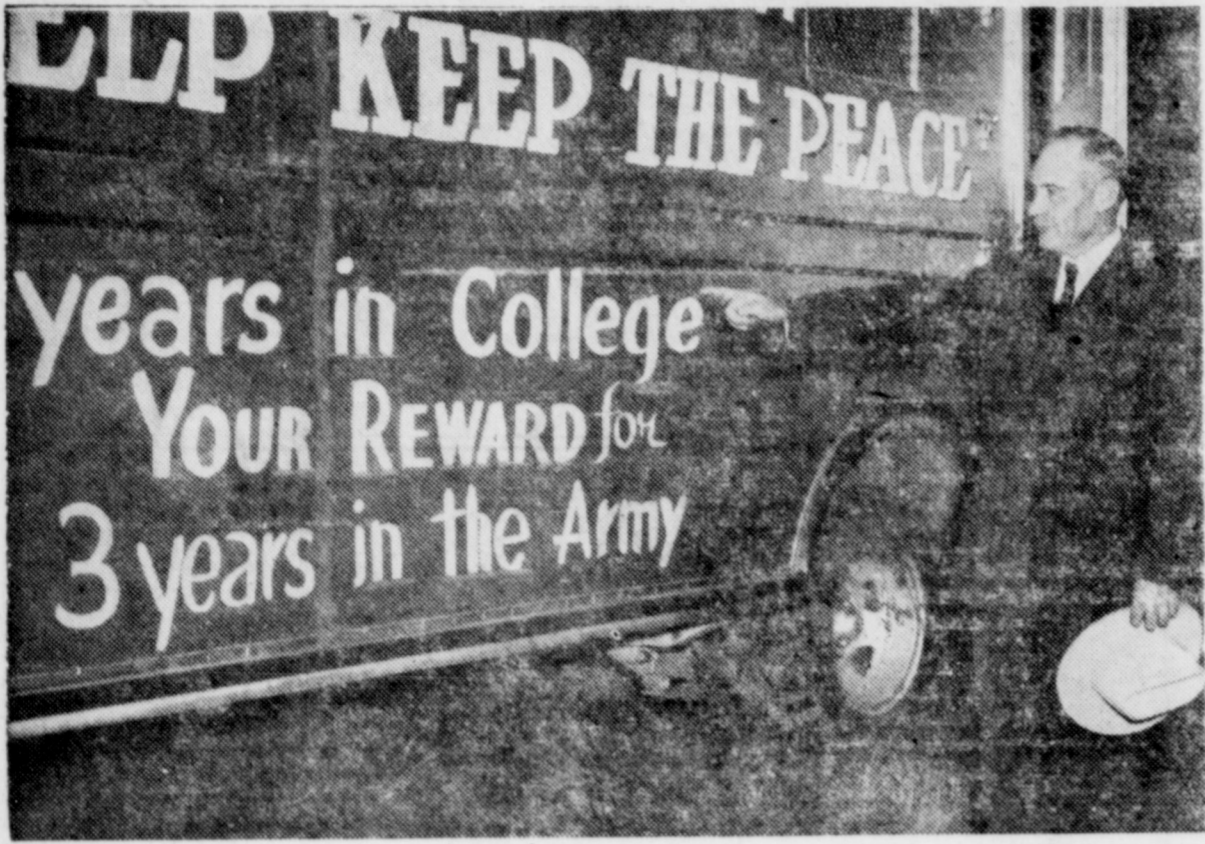

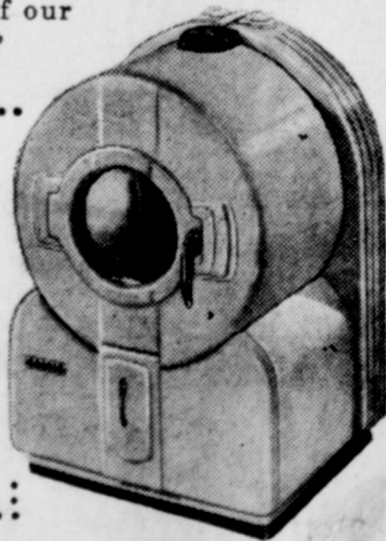
