Eastland Takes Highest Honors School Meet

Eastland school students took honors on an over-all basis in the district Interscholastic League contests in Gorman and Comanche last week end.

Eastland's track team, handicapped because most of the boys had run before on a regular 440-yard track, walked off team honors at Gorman, winning 53 points to Gorman's 44.

Eddleman, who won the low jump, was second in the 880-yard run, and fourth in the high jump, was high point man in the meet.

Eastland was given only one point by the scorer, but a week later this week showed its official points.

In other events, the junior team won its meet, senior boys were third and junior boys were second in baseball. Betty Gay Alving won the tennis girls singles. Nancy Harkrider and Marilyn Lucas won the girls doubles, with Lucas third in boys singles. Eddleman and Bill Eddleman were high boys doubles.

Eastland won the one-act play contest by default, since no other were entered.

Gladden Womack won the spelling contest, and Marge was third in shorthand.

Kimaird was first place in the senior boys declamation. Womack first for girls' and Herring second for junior boys.

Sue Wright was third in the ready writing competition, and Smith was second in the extemporaneous speaking.

The girls' volleyball team was placed fourth.

At the first, second and third places will go to the regional meet in Abilene April 20.

In the track events, Dan Collie won the high hurdles, with Bill Eddleman second and Bill Eddleman third. Eddleman took the low hurdle with Brashier second and Collie fourth. Collie was leader in the race when he fell and hurt himself badly.

Blair was third in the 220, Lewis Crossley second and Pete McFarland third in the 440. Eddleman was fourth and Jack Chamberlain fifth in the 880.

In the mile run, W. D. Cannon was first by a wide margin and Hunt was fourth.

In the 440-yard relay team event, it was Blair, Eddleman, Billy Jack Johnson and Hicks. The mile relay was won by Crossley, Bobby McFarland and Dan Collie, who came in second.

Collie was third in the 880, and Brashier and Hunt tied for second in the 440, with Crossley fourth. Blair tied for third in the high jump.

Over 100 Join Watermelon Group

Officials of the Carbon Watermelon Growers Association, conducting a membership drive among Eastland merchants Wednesday, said that membership in the group had increased to over 100, that three lots have been leased and will be purchased in Carbon, and that a shed has been bought which will be put on the lot for a marketing center for watermelons and other farm produce.

The movement, first of its kind in recent years in Eastland County, was receiving enthusiastic support, it was reported by B. O. Hallmark and E. Richardson, who were in Eastland Wednesday seeking memberships.

With watermelon planting season just at hand, the Carbon men said at least 400 acres of melons will be planted by members of the association, and possibly a good many more.

Plans are complete for the annual Eastland County 4-H Club Rally Day at the City Park in Eastland next Saturday, County Agent J. M. Cooper said Thursday.

All of the 676 club boys and girls and their parents are being invited to attend. Beginning at 10 a. m. the group will have a sing-song and play games until noon.

Following a picnic lunch at noon, the group will retire to the Eastland High School auditorium, where County Judge P. L. Crossley will present awards won by the boys in last year's National 4-H Club contests.

C. W. Jackson, extension radio editor of Texas A. & M. College, will be present for a short talk also, and will make some recordings for his farm and home program heard over WFAA at 6 a. m. daily.

Miss Frances Barton, assistant county home demonstration agent, will present some of the 4-H Club girls doing outstanding work.

Following the presentation of the awards, the group will see four films entitled "I Pledge My Heart," "Muddy Waters," "Kids Must Eat," and "Grow Your Own." The group will adjourn about 3:30 p. m.

Buckley, Desdemona, \$25 war bond in dairy production, a dairy medal and a safety contest medal; Roy Don Hickman of Rising Star, garden medal; Charles Ray McDaniel of Carbon, safety contest medal; Tom Grissom of Eastland, meat animal medal; Jackie Leech, Cisco, safety contest medal; Joe Ed Schaefer, Cisco, garden medal; George Lane, Jr., Eastland, poultry medal; Donnie Weaver, Carbon, garden medal and Buck Gibson, Pioneer, safety contest medal.

Don Maynard of Rising Star will also receive a poultry medal as will Frank Robinson of the Young school 4-H Club in Ranger.

Billy Pancake of Pioneer will be presented with two medals, one for gardening and one in poultry.

With one successful campaign behind them, members of the Eastland Civic League and Garden Club launched another Wednesday when they voted to appoint their town beautification committee en masse on a new committee to promote highway beautification.

At the meeting, Mrs. Jim Horton gave the final report on the Small Town Improvement Contest with which the organization has been busy for a year. She gave each member a book, printed by courtesy of Victor Cornelius, which was a copy of the original entry sent to the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs contest committee.

The book shows by pictures, news stories and charts the progress made in developing and beautifying Eastland during the past year. Many of the pictures are photographs, but many also are drawings by Eugene McGehee, illustrating news stories printed by Eastland newspapers and clipped out for reproduction in the book.

There are before and after pictures of Cornelius' new printing plant building and of the new Linkenhogers building.

The book was compiled largely through efforts of Mrs. Jack Frost, with assistance from various members of the beautification committee, comprised of Mrs. Horton, Mrs. Kenneth Tanner, Mrs. Dixie Williamson, Mrs. E. E. Fryschnag, Mrs. Dave Wolf, Mrs. Carl Johnson, Mrs. Virgil Seaberry and Mrs. Turner Collie.

At the meeting of the group Monday, Mrs. Hollis Bennett was program chairman, and Mrs. Frank Castleberry presided over the business session.

Mrs. Earl Conner led a round table discussion of civic discussion of civic planning, and safety posters made by students in Eastland High School and he junior high school were displayed under direction of Mrs. Joe Stephen, poster chairman.

Side Issues

I am one of those fellows who has to write notes to himself or never remember what it is he is supposed to do, or in my case, write.

So this week I had some notes carefully made out as usual, on the back of an old letter, about the topics I had thought up during the week to put into this weekly string of stuff, and darned it now I haven't lost the notes.

That puts a fellow with a poor memory in a terrific spot, and if I didn't have a good imagination, or what passes for one, I just for spite wouldn't write a column this week. Which might please just about everyone, including me.

However, I do recall that I wanted to talk a little about the long tour I made over the county roads of this precinct last week end with County Commissioner Henry Davenport, who has been going over and over those same roads for quite some spell. In fact, at one point he showed me the place he moved to with his parents when he was just a boy.

Davenport has about 220 or 230 miles of county roads in his precinct, which he estimates at just about half the county roads in the whole of Eastland County. He has felt and said in the past, and undoubtedly with a good deal of justice, that this precinct is discriminated against in the apportioning of the road and bridge funds because it receives the same amount for upkeep as the other precincts, which do not have as many miles of roads to keep up, or as much population to serve.

But that thought was not why Davenport took me over his road network. In fact, I don't know exactly why he did, except possibly that this is election year.

And I will say that on the whole the county roads of the precinct are in pretty good shape, except that a lot of them are washboard as can be.

But I've never driven over any gravel roads anywhere that didn't fall fair to that ailment when the weather was dry.

I was glad to go with Davenport, for my part, because I got to see a lot of the county that I had not been able to see in the less than a year I have lived in Eastland County, and also because he is filled with the lore of who lives here and there, and what their fathers and mothers did.

For instance, the story of the man who worked a long lifetime building a good farm between Eastland and Ranger, and then when he got it paid out and in good shape, died before he had the time to enjoy it any.

There in a sentence is a story of the history of a large part of the human race.

Money Still Comes In At Good Rate, Reports Show

From July of last year through March this year a total of \$205,029.14 of county and state delinquent taxes was collected in the program being conducted by Special Tax Collector Horace Walker and associates, Louis Williams, deputy special collector, said Thursday.

The total collected is about one-fourth of the total delinquent taxes piled up in the county during its history, and is about one-third or more of what were termed "collectible" delinquent taxes when the campaign was begun last summer.

Walker, in Eastland Thursday, said the collection program is continuing satisfactorily, and that he will be satisfied as long as the taxes continue to pour in at the present rate of \$20,000 to \$25,000 a month.

Walker said the entire program to clean the county's rolls of all long overdue taxes will take several more years, but that the next two years should see the bulk of the rolls cleared up.

County officials who were confronted with a good deal of opposition after the tax collection program was adopted less than a year ago say that much of the feeling against it has died, especially with the tax rate dropped to 90 cents this year and with a prospective drop to 60 cents next year.

The high tax rates of years past, they said, never would have been necessary if a high percentage of taxes had been paid.

The collection campaign, first seen as a major issue in the coming primary elections, has not been openly used as yet as an issue, and whether it will remain to be seen. Opposition stemmed from two sources, those who felt it was wrong to hire an out of the county collector, and those who believed it unfair to wage a strong tax collection program against themselves or their friends they felt could not afford to pay the taxes.

Six Farmers Chosen For TVA Program

Six Eastland County farmers, four of whom were in the armed forces during World War II, were chosen this week out of 27 applicants to be TVA fertilizer demonstrators during the coming year.

There are 16 such demonstrators in the county, and the six chosen replace six who dropped out.

Those chosen are T. B. Smartt of Cisco, G. E. Bennett of Gorman, D. E. Davis of Nimrod and Fred Brizenbire of Rising Star, all former servicemen, and Bill Logan of Alameda and W. B. Starr of Scranton.

The demonstrators obtain concentrated phosphate fertilizer from the TVA in Alabama for the price of the freight, to show the advantage of fertilizer in growing winter cover crops, as well as the advantage of the cover crops themselves.

TVA representatives will be in Eastland Friday, April 26 for an all-day tour of the county to show the benefits of cover crop plantings. Nine demonstration farms in the county will be visited during the day, and about 75 are expected to make the tour.

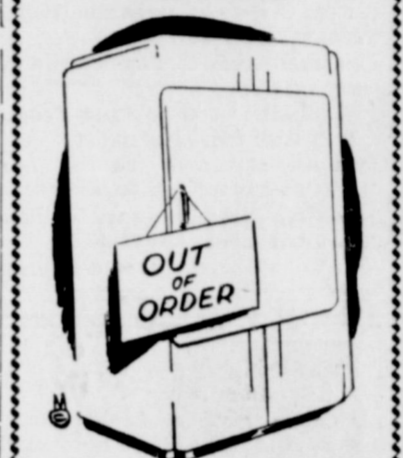

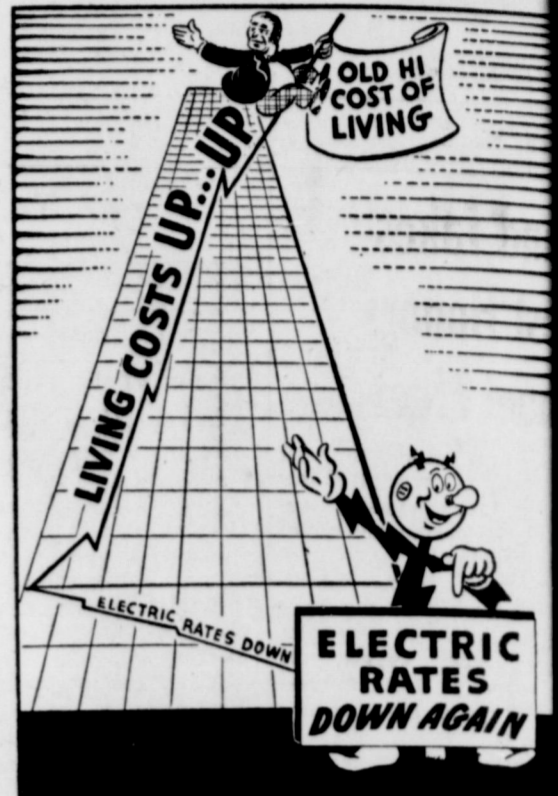
