John Love Elected Vice President District Home Demonstration Group

Frank Lovett Suddenly; 53 Years

(Frank) Lovett, 63, resident of Eastland County for 53 years and for many years a business man in Carbon and Eastland, died suddenly early Tuesday evening following a heart attack.

Funeral services were held in the First Baptist Church Thursday afternoon with Rev. F. H. Hennessee officiating, assisted by Rev. Hennessee of Corsicana. Burial in the Eastland Cemetery with the funeral home in charge.

Lovett had been a deacon of the First Baptist Church for many years. He was born in Comanche in 1883 and with his parents to Carbon in 1903, the same year he married Miss Nettie Ada Poe, of Carbon. He moved to Eastland in 1904 and was associated with the Citizens National Bank, and later the Texas State Bank. Since 1920 he had been in the automobile and insurance business, and continued until his death. He had in his place of business all over the county.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Nettie Ada Poe Lovett, three sons, Dr. Lovett of Olney, Dr. B. F. Lovett of Washington, D. C., and Raymond E. Lovett of New Orleans, one daughter, Mrs. Nell Lovett of Breckenridge, four granddaughters, his stepmother, Mrs. B. F. Lovett, a brother, John P. Lovett, of San Diego, and three sisters, Mrs. Edna Townsend of Fort Worth, Mrs. Ivy Clamps of Fort Worth and Mrs. Clarence Battle of Dallas.

Funeral services were W. D. R. Owen, Ed Layton, Rufus LaChapelle, Charlie Murphy, Donald Kinney, all of Eastland, George W. Anderson and Ben Scott of Dallas.

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Rainfall Totals .90 Inch Here; Farmers Helped

Eastland County, along with much of West Texas, had a multi-million dollar rain over the week end that wet the Easter bonnets of many church goers, but caused smiles among farmers and stockmen.

During Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, .90 of an inch of rain fell in Eastland, Weatherman J. A. Beard reported, but the rain was the slow, steady type that soaked into the drying earth.

It was the first rainfall of any consequence in much of Eastland County in well over a month, and during that period an unusual heat wave had dried moisture from the soil.

The rain came in time to save some grain crops here, although further west where a serious drought had set in last fall, many such crops were lost.

It also put the ground in ideal condition for peanut planting, said farmers.

If old time weather forecasters are to be trusted, Easter Sunday's rain means that it will rain each Sunday for seven weeks.

Fruit farmers of Eastland County forecast a crop nearly as large as last year's bumper harvest, barring unfortunate turns in the weather. Fruit is heavy on trees, and normal danger of frost has passed.

Softball League To Open In May

The six-team softball Eastland City League will begin play on the Fire Department field on North Seaman Street the latter part of May; it was decided at a meeting of managers and others at the Fire Station Tuesday night.

Fire Chief A. W. Hennessee reported after the meeting that five teams were lined up for play, and a sixth will be added before the season opens.

An organized schedule will be worked out, with play between the local teams at least three nights per week. Other nights will be open for contests between local and visiting teams.

Admission prices will be 10 cents at the front gate and five cents for grandstand admission at local games, and the same for games with out-of-town teams except that grandstand admission will be 10 cents.

Thirty-five per cent of the gross receipts will go to the team sponsors to help pay team expenses. The remainder will go toward upkeep of the field, Hennessee said, and if there is any balance, it will go into the treasury of the Eastland Volunteer Fire Department.

Before the war when the softball league operated here, teams played here from all over this section of Texas, and from as far away as Arizona and California, Hennessee said.

Butler Services Are Held In Crane

Funeral services were held at Crane Saturday for Floyd Finis Butler of Crane, and concluded at the Alameda Cemetery, where he was buried Sunday afternoon.

E. E. Myres of Crane and L. L. Hanks of Midland officiated. Pallbearers were his brothers-in-law, John L. Yielding, B. C. Coombs, Eular Sharp and Leonard Anderson.

Mr. Butler died at his home in Crane Friday morning of a cerebral hemorrhage. He was born at Alameda Sept. 5, 1890. He was a member of the Church of Christ for 37 years, and had served as elder in the church at Crane for 14 years. He was employed by the Gulf Oil Corporation, with which he had been associated for 19 years. He planned to retire June 26. He married Miss Nora Poston, who survives him, at Olden in July, 1913.

Other survivors include four sons, Halsey Butler of Sundown, Pat and J. T. Butler of Crane, and Finis Butler, who has just returned from service overseas, and five grandchildren, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Pat Butler of Carbon, a sister, Mrs. Elma Gregg of Oil Center, N. M., and a brother, Ike Butler of Carbon.

C of C To Call Group Meetings To Select Goals

A plan for a series of group meetings to organize a work program for the Eastland Chamber of Commerce was adopted Thursday by directors of the organization.

Under the plan, 10 chairmen were named who will call meetings for about 15 men each, and the groups will discuss ways in which the organization can work to improve Eastland.

The discussions will be called for under such topics as what can be done to improve each businessman's business, what can be done to improve Eastland as a whole, and what specific projects can be worked on to better the community.

C. J. Rhodes, president of the Chamber of Commerce, said it is hoped the program will give the body a work program that can be followed for a number of years.

He specified that the group meetings will not be for seeking funds, but only for the aims outlined.

County Officials Cite Cash Gains

Members of the Eastland County Commissioners Court this week cited advances in the county's financial condition during the past year in an advertisement placed in this issue of The Record.

The report of the court shows a steadily dropping tax rate, with lesser county taxes the result. County taxes will have dropped more than one-half in the 1943-1946 period, it showed.

Eastland's high school athletes of 1945-46 were honored in grand style at a football banquet attended by 160 in the Connellee Hotel last Friday.

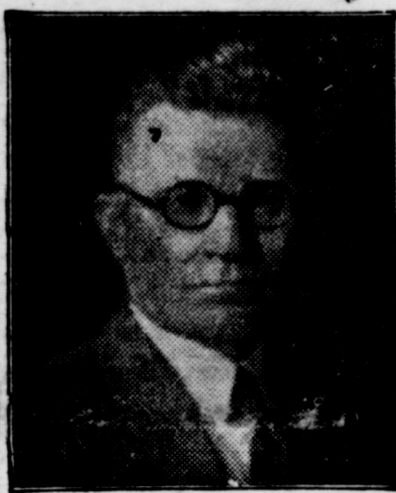

O. C. Funderburk To Live In Tyler

O. C. Funderburk, Eastland attorney who has lived here since 1919 and for nearly 17 years was an associate justice in the 11th Court of Civil Appeals here, announced this week that he will leave Tuesday for Tyler to practice law.

There he will be associated with the firm of Ramey, Calhoun, Marsh Brelsford and Sheehy.

Funderburk before he came here was county judge of Anderson County, of which Palestine is county seat, and was an assistant attorney general of Texas.

He went on the civil appeals court here early in 1928 and served on the court until the end of 1944.

"I regret having to leave Eastland, because I have so many friends here, but I feel I can do better professionally in Tyler," said Funderburk.

He had recently sold his Eastland home and is living in a hotel.

515 Are Members Of Concert Group

Five hundred and fifteen memberships for the Community Concerts Association were sold in Eastland County during the recent drive, 289 in Eastland, 137 in Cisco and 98 in Ranger, according to association officials.

Immediately after the drive, the artists selection committee tentatively chose four artists for next year. This year there were three concerts. Those chosen were: James Pease, baritone; Solveig Lunde, woman pianist; Carroll Glynn, violinist, and the Don Cosack Russian Chorus.

Eastland membership in the association is 25 more than during the recent season. Last year's ticket sale drive was the first.

Stockmen Name Date For Picking Annual Show Site

Whether Eastland, Ranger, or Cisco gets the annual livestock show of the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association depends on which town offers the best setup for the show, representatives of the livestock men told meetings in the three towns during the past week.

The three representatives, Dan Childress of Eastland, N. Clark of Cisco and Johnny King of Ranger, appeared Friday night before the Ranger Junior Chamber of Commerce, Wednesday night at a meeting of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, and Thursday noon at the monthly luncheon of the directors of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce.

Childress, acting as spokesman, said the group would select a permanent show place May 15.

He told the Eastland group that the Ranger organization had raised \$15,000 with which to build a rodeo grounds, and had offered to house the livestock show permanently at the rodeo grounds.

Secretary H. J. Tanner of the Eastland chamber recalled that Eastland men had offered some while back to raise \$5,000 for building a fair and stock show grounds if the livestock men would match it, but that the deal had fallen through.

Childress said that the stock group was not interested enough in such a program to raise the money. All they want, he said, is a place to show their cattle and other livestock, and those of 4-H Club and FFA boys and girls.

Clark and King both spoke of the benefits to be derived by the entire county from a program that would encourage the raising of more and better livestock.

Rehearsals Begun For Minstrel Show

Rehearsals were started this week for the minstrel show to be staged in May by the Eastland Quarterback Club, and Mrs. Art Johnson, director, said she was well pleased with the response.

Thirty-six men turned out for the first rehearsal Monday. Next Monday, the script will be ready, Mrs. Johnson said, and rehearsals will be down to business from then on.

No specific date has been set yet for the performance.

Tacketts Purchase Cafe In Eastland

Mr. and Mrs. Ben Tackett, formerly of Odessa, this week announced purchase of the American Cafe, next door to the bus depot and the Connellee Theater, and announced the name will be changed to the American Coffee Shop.

Tackett formerly was manager of an ice cream concern in Odessa, and Mrs. Tackett operated a candy shop there.

The coffee shop was closed for redecoration this week, but Tackett said it will be reopened Saturday under the new management.

Classroom Hours Are Too Long, Resolution Says

Dulin-Daniel Post No. 70, American Legion, this week protested by resolution a new Veterans Administration ruling that veterans who are being trained in the Eastland County Vocational School must attend daytime classes amounting to a minimum of 12 and a half hours per week.

Copies of a state committee for approving such schools, T. G. Lamphier, area director for the Veterans Administration with Dallas headquarters, and Herman Nami, state Legion commander, of San Antonio.

The resolution cited that 223 veterans have been approved by the school here and are receiving on the job training. Both veterans and employers have protested the classroom requirement, it said, and employers who were planning to train veterans are refusing to do so under the present setup.

Abolition or relaxation of the class training requirement was asked by the Legion post.

Some employers, the resolution said, protested that enforcement of the ruling would disrupt training of the veterans.

Campaign Outlined By N. E. Grisham

N. E. Grisham, Eastland attorney who has announced his candidacy for county attorney in the forthcoming elections, subject to action of the Democratic primary in July, this week issued the following statement:

"The principal duty of the County Attorney is to prosecute criminal cases for the state. It will be my purpose to see that justice is done. In addition to the prosecutions, it is further the duty of the county attorney to act as advisor and to assist the sheriff's department, the tax collector, the commissioner's court and other departments of the county government. I will co-operate with all of these departments in any manner which will make for efficiency and good government in the administration of the county's affairs. I will do my duty as I am directed to do under the Constitution and statutes of the State of Texas."

Grisham is 32 years of age, married to the former Sybil Holder, and has two children. He is a university graduate, and had five years law practice with his father, the late R. N. Grisham, prior to his entry into the Army. Grisham enlisted as a private, and was assigned to the 90th Infantry Division four years ago, and was separated from the service on January 22 of this year as a captain, in which position he held the office of Post Judge Advocate.
