## Milk And Bread Price Increases Allowed By OPA

OPA-approved price increases on two of the essentials of life, milk and bread, affected almost every person in Eastland County this week.

The milk price increase, announced first, raised the price of milk to consumers a cent a quart for sweet milk and half a cent for buttermilk—or a full cent for the latter where it is bought by the single quart.

The cent a pound increase in the price of bread was announced Wednesday, and was designed to compensate bakers for higher flour prices created by wheat price increases set up to stimulate the flow of grain for hungry people abroad.

The milk price increase was one of the now-familiar merry-go-rounds caused by supply and demand pressures. First came an increase in the price of dairy feeds, caused by the same grain situation that caused the bread price increase. But after the feed prices went up, dairymen were dosing money on every gallon of milk and pound of butterfat, so a 4c cent a hundred pounds increase had to be granted them on the price of the milk they produce, or they would have been going out of business wholesale. And the one cent a quart price the consumer has to pay extra to get his milk just about pays for the price increase given the farm producers of milk.

The only person who stood to gain anything was the milk producer who grows his own feed.

Another milk price increase is scheduled to come July 1 when a wartime milk subsidy goes off, but the increase at that time will be two cents a quart, to compensate milk producers for the loss of the 85 cents per 100 pounds subsidy they are receiving now.

A whopping increase in the price of butter also was reportedly in the offing, which should be discouraging only to the minority who have found any butter to buy.

## Side Issues

What makes a Lions Club different from any other club I have ever attended, and man and boy I have attended a lot of them, is the presence of a somewhat batty individual called the Tail Twister whose apparent duty it is to keep the club meetings in a continuous uproar by collecting fines from the wrong people at the wrong time.

In fact, I might get pretty indignant about the whole thing if it were not for the fact that the whole thing was a put-up job. ## Candidates Must File Saturday To Get Into Races

Political affairs in Eastland County drew toward a climax this week as County Democratic Executive Committee Chairman Oscar Lyerla warned prospective candidates that Saturday will be the last day to file for county and precinct offices.

Meanwhile, the Carbon Watermelon Growers Association held a free barbecue and "Candidates Jamboree" in Carbon Wednesday to touch off active political affairs in the county.

Lyerla announced that the Democratic executive committee will meet at 2 p. m. Monday in the district courtroom to make assessments and other arrangements for the first primary July 27.

He requested all precinct chairman to be present, and said that all candidates are invited to attend.

Saturday night, June 22, is the deadline for paying candidates' assessment fees, he said.

From reports this week, it appeared a number of candidates for county offices will be unopposed, although there already are two or more in most of the races.

Many of the candidates have been campaigning actively for a month or more, and several said that before the first primary, they intend to visit every home in the county, in person or by proxy.

Saturday night the V. F. W.'s will meet the Gorman All-Stars in a nine-inning game in the Eastland park. The game will begin at 8:15 p. m. The Veterans previously won from Gorman by an 8-5 score.

Attendance in games played in Eastland by the softball clubs has been good, with almost a capacity crowd on hand for the contest last Saturday night.

### Peaches Ripening; Crop Reported Good

Peaches were ripening in Eastland County this week, and although some orchards were hard hit by May and June storms, most growers were confident of a crop approaching last year's record yield.

Early Elbertas were ripe on the trees this week, said orchardists, with Golden Jubilee and Fair Beauty types due to ripen soon, followed by regular Elbertas, Hales, and numerous other kinds.

### C. Of C. Meetings To Map Program Are Being Held

Five of a series of ten group meetings of Eastland Chamber of Commerce members were held this week, with members suggesting ideas for the improvement of Eastland by projects they believe feasible.

Several suggestions came out of the meetings that may be acted on, said Chamber of Commerce Manager H. J. Tanner. One member said it seemed to him that fewer farmers are coming to Eastland to trade than used to, and wondered if there were not some way to remedy the situation.

It was suggested that farmers go to trade where their children are in school, and since Eastland schools have few students from outside the city limits, a move might be begun to enlarge the scope of the schools' enrollment.

One of the meetings, under chairmanship of W. W. Linkenhoger, is scheduled to be for farmers living near Eastland, so their thoughts can be obtained.

Out of the entire series, it is hoped a work program can be developed so the Chamber of Commerce can chart its course in a general way for some time ahead, with definite goals to work toward.

Tanner said it is hoped the series of meetings will be concluded next week.

### Site Is Cleared For Eastland Clay Aggregate Plant

Workmen this week began cleaning ground for the \$100,000 plant of the Texas Aggregate Company across the railroad tracks toward Eastland Lake from downtown Eastland, and other workmen began raising framing on a steel Quonset hut type building for Horace Horton's fine pottery plant on the other side of town.

The Horton building is one of three similar structures scheduled for erection soon by the Ross & Son Construction Company of Gorman and Brownwood. Theo Lamb is to have one erected on lots he purchased on East Main Street, and L. E. McGraw has contracted for another on property he purchased from A. B. Cornelius located on South Seaman Street.

C. W. Cline of Dallas, president of the Texas Aggregate Company, was in Eastland most of this week and said that he would leave in a day or so for the East to take up options on two rotary kilns to be installed on his firm's plant site for making light-weight aggregate from Eastland clay.

The kilns should be here for installation in a short time, he said. Workmen were to clear off all 10 of the acres the company acquired from the City of Eastland, and a spur railroad track is to be built to the plant site.

Cline plans to have the kiln operations in the open to begin with, but the machinery will be arranged so a building can be erected around it later if desired.

### Phone Book Shows 220 Increase Over 1945 Subscribers

A tally of numbers in the latest Eastland telephone book issued last week showed that the city has 807 telephones as of the date the book was published, compared with 587 in the 1945 book.

It was considered that the total did not give a true index of the growth of Eastland, since they reflected the generally better times, and the ability of the telephone company to install new phones, as well as the population increase.

However, the marked increase does help reflect the growth of the city, which also has been shown in other indices such as increased connections to the water and sewer systems and other utilities.

In the matter of who got into the new telephone book, the traditionally overwhelming Smiths ran a poor race. There were only five Smiths, whereas the Joneses were listed 11 times, the Johnsons 8 (plus two Johnstons) and a number of other names outranked that of Smith—numerically at least.

The 1945 book showed a total of 243 business telephones, while there were 310 in the new book, another indication of the strides Eastland has taken in a year.

### Fines Assessed In City Court; Death Toll Rises

With Eastland County highway deaths mounting well above war year totals, Eastland officers this week were clanking down on speeders and fines were being assessed in city court.

City Secretary K. B. Tanner, who acts as judge of the city court, said a number of minimum fines have been assessed in the court recently, and one repeater, up for his second offense, was fined \$10 and was told that the next fine, if there is a next one, will be \$25.

"He was the first repeat offender in two years or so," said Tanner.

Officers were following a practice of warning drivers whose speed was over limits but not excessively so, said City Officer W. E. Stallter. Through travellers on the highways also were given warnings instead of tickets, said Tanner.

"We're not out to get a lot of drivers into court, but to keep our streets as safe as possible," said Tanner.

In Cisco, State Highway Patrolman Ziesel told the Lions Club that Eastland County highway accident fatalities so far in 1946 total nine, compared with six during all of 1945.

Tanner said that youthful drivers who apparently have more wish for thrills than they do for safety are causing the city officers more trouble than any other group.

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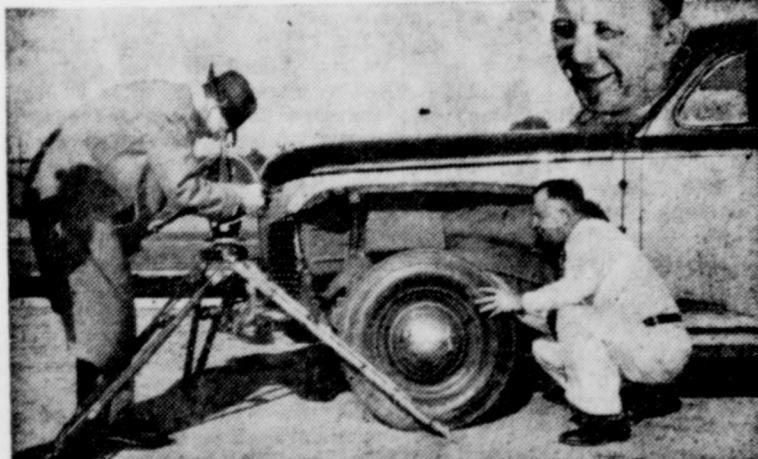

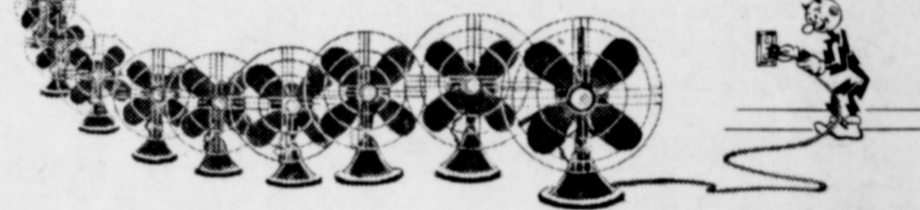

### Treatment Urged For Trees, Shrubs Hurt By Storms

With fruit trees and ornamentals damaged by hail in several places over Eastland County during the past two months, J. M. Cooper, county agricultural agent, recommends a treatment to help prevent infection or fungus growth.

Cooper recommends a wash composed of one pound of Bordeaux mixture dissolved in five gallons of water. The mixture should be applied with a paint brush, mop or old broom over the damaged surface. After treatment, wait for 30 days and then apply orange shellac only where the bark has been injured.

Grape vineyards are now showing up with black rot, he said. Excessive moisture is conducive to the spread of this trouble among grapes. It can be controlled by following a definite spray schedule, using Bordeaux mixture, spraying the first time in January. Nothing can be done now to stop or prevent it since the spores are inside the grapes.

Some varieties are more resistant to it than others.

Powdery mildew, another fungus disease on roses, hedge plants and other ornamentals, can be controlled by dusting or spraying with sulphur once a week until the trouble stops, usually necessitating three or four applications. If the spray is used, it is advisable to use wettable sulphur.

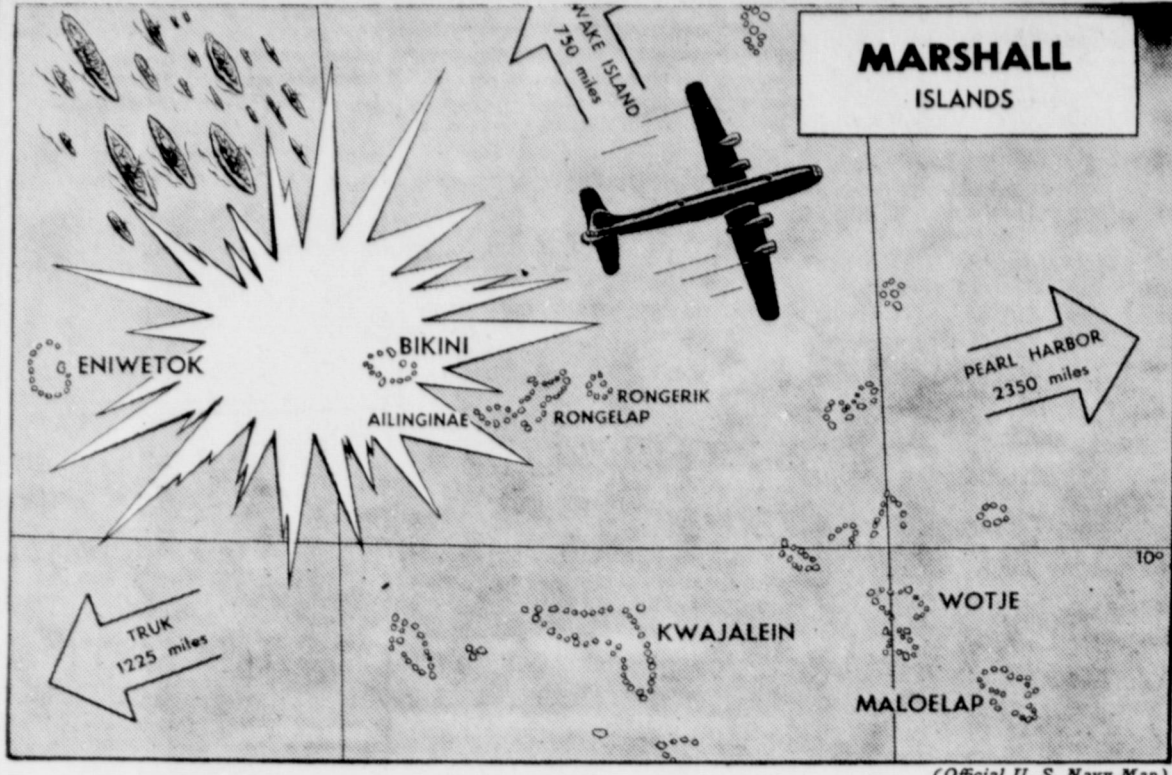

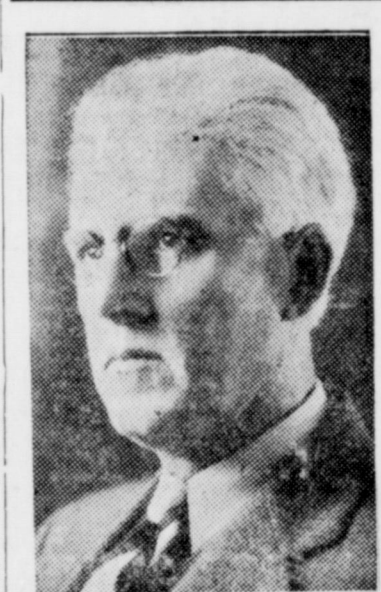
