Rain Washes Away Fears Of Drouth, Does Much Good

One of those million dollar rains that newspapers are always talking about came to Eastland County and a lot of the rest of West Texas Tuesday and Wednesday, broke up a drouth, and put farm crops and pastures back on the right track.

The rain, which was spotty as to amount but was widespread, came just after farmers had almost completed threshing grain crops, and as gardens and field crops were beginning to need moisture badly.

Peanuts were not suffering yet, but the moisture was welcomed by all farmers, including even the few who had not yet planted peanuts.

Most parts of Eastland County got heavy, washing rains that did erode fields no good, but filled pasture tanks and set small streams to running again.

Corn had been suffering badly from lack of moisture, and some field crops already were in a bad way when the rain came. One farmer said his corn crop was made until the last week or so of hot weather threatened to keep ears from rounding out.

Oklahoman Killed By Fall Near Here

John Kendall, 79, of Shawnee, Okla., died in the Eastland Hospital Sunday morning from internal injuries received when he fell off the roof of a farm home north of Eastland Thursday of last week.

Mr. Kendall, owner of the farm, came to Eastland to investigate damage to the roof done by recent hail storms, and was on the roof when he fell, breaking a number of ribs and receiving other internal hurts.

The farm is located about a mile and a half north of Eastland, and it was said that Mr. Kendall had once lived here.

His wife and daughter came to his side before his death. The body was sent to Oklahoma by Hamner Funeral Home for services and burial.

Plea To Conserve Water Made As Use Reaches High Level

A plea for Eastland residents not to waste water was made this week by City Manager K. B. Tanner as the city water system Tuesday pumped a million and a half gallons of water, possibly an all-time record.

"People have been complaining about the taste of the water," said Tanner, "and they're right. Our filtration plant just wasn't built to handle that much water, and can't take all the lake sediment out when it does handle it that fast."

Tanner said the chemically treated water is perfectly safe to use, but gives the impression it is not, because of the slight odor and taste.

"People who let water run on their lawns until it runs down the street, who have leaky faucets or water connections, or who otherwise waste water are contributing greatly to the excessive water use," Tanner said.

Eastland is not in any danger of a water shortage this summer, he said, and the system can pump all that is needed, but the filtration plant is the bottleneck to the production of clear, sparkling water when use exceeds the capacity of the plant.

City officials in times past have discussed cutting down the 15,000-gallon minimum allowed water users but so far have taken no action to do so. Tanner has pointed out that if every water user in Eastland used the minimum, the system could not supply the water. Many other cities have set the minimum rate on a usage base of 7,500 gallons per month or less.

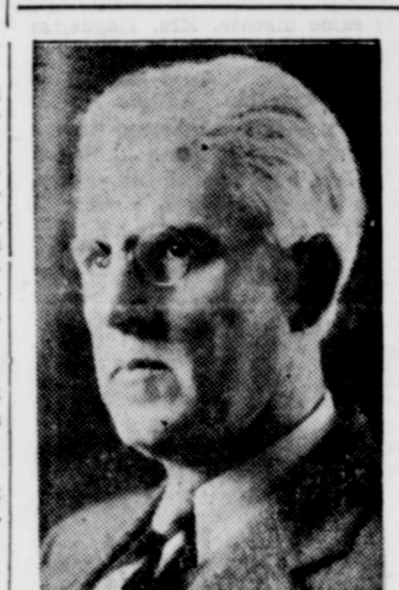

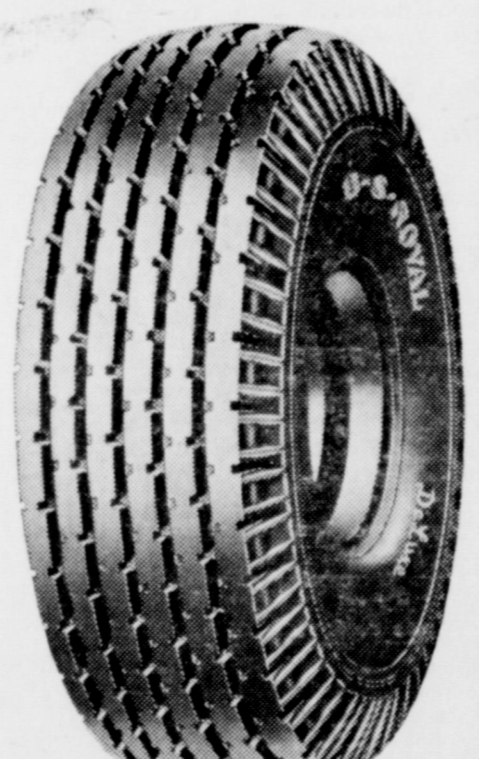

STRIKES AND PENSIONS

There are those who think the questions of strikes and old age pensions are "hot" political issues. They are "hot" for tender hands. This is a time for courageous action. My stand on these questions is given below:

STRIKES

I believe that labor as well as capital should have the opportunity of earning a decent income under safe and sanitary conditions, and in return should be liable for their acts and responsible on their contracts. The financial records of unions should be made public in order that the rank and file of labor as well as the public can be informed as to their source of revenue and expenditure of funds. The anti-trust laws should apply to unions and business alike.

I believe that strikes should be prevented in essential industries, and no one should be permitted to strike against the government of the United States.

Racketeers in labor unions, business enterprises and everywhere else must be outlawed by a strong law.

Labor disputes should be decided in the courthouse in our established courts. I had rather trust a jury of twelve good citizens than a bureau that might have communistic tendencies.

OLD AGE PENSIONS

Because of the rise in the cost of living, the old age pension check now buys only one half of what it would have bought four years ago. In some cases both labor and industry have been given an increase in income but the old people have been ignored and their pensions reduced. I favor raising the amount of the old age pensions to keep up with the rising cost of living.

I favor lowering the age qualification from 65 to 60. In a few years when jobs get scarce, the men and women over 60 will be the first to be let out of a job. Those over 60 are seldom in demand as employees, and a humane way should be provided to take care of them. This situation should be met at once.

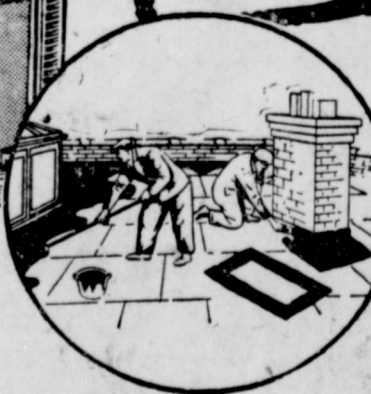

"Son, I've met thousands of people in this world, but never a man I didn't like," the late Will Rogers told a youthful Gib Sandefer 20 years ago on the Hardin-Simmons University campus, where the famed humorist and good will diplomat was a guest.
And that oft' repeated saying of Will Rogers has been Gib Sandefer's creed down through the years. He has traveled the world over, and everywhere he has made and left friends.
Gib Sandefer was born and reared in the 17th Congressional District. He is 40 years of age, married, and the father of one daughter. He is not wealthy, not aspiring to attain great quantities of the world's goods, but finding greater wealth instead in the friendships of his fellow man.
He attended Abilene public schools. In 1927, he was graduated from Hardin-Simmons, where for 31 years his father, the late Dr. Jefferson Davis Sandefer, was president. He stayed with the university, as Business Manager of Athletics and as manager of the famous and colorful Cowboy band. It was through his ability to make the right contacts, that the band toured 12 foreign countries, gave command performances before crowned heads of Europe, and traveled 500,000 miles spreading the music and spirit of the West Texas Cowboy.
In 1929, Gib Sandefer bought a small ranch in Nolan county, and operated it with success until disposing of it in 1942.
He declined a Navy commission that carried a desk assignment in Washington, D. C. to become a field representative of the American Red Cross in various combat areas of the recent war—in Africa, in Italy, and in the China-Burma-India theatre. Home, he toured the United States as a lecturer asking for greater world fellowship and a more thorough understanding of the other man's problems as the means for assuring the future peace of the world. He recently declined a radio contract to offer his services to this district as representative to congress.

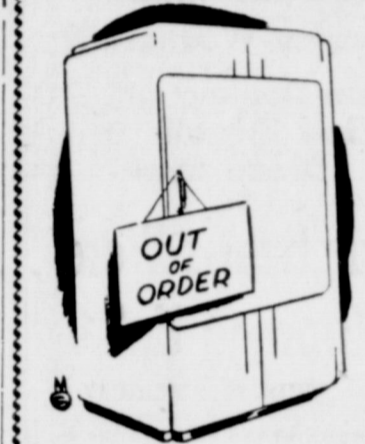
