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Side Issues

I used to work for a fairly large-sized daily paper, and sometimes when I see some of the rather stylized feature stories by the present-day writers for the dailies I have the urge to go back to that kind of style in this paper, but I always stop and think and realize that I'm too close to the people I'm writing about to try any such thing.

For example I read a story the other day that if I were emulating, I would write such stuff as "round-faced, smiling County Agent J. M. Cooper," or "tall, thin, cigar-chewing Frank Crowell," or "burly, placid, tenor-singing School Supt. W. G. Womack," and so on.

But then to be honest, I would have to include some personal descriptions such as one of Neil Day as "fat, forty, and father of five," or of Ed Freyschlag as "dapper, graying, mustached."

You get the idea. Of course there are some men, whom I will let you name for yourselves, about whom I just could not write at all, using such a system, and there are other borderline cases who would be written about only by the use of great diplomacy and tact.

But it's when you get to the women that the rub comes. There just wouldn't be enough words in anyone's vocabulary to paint the sort of word pictures of the gals that would please them, unless the writer would clear off the beam and looked up on such phrases as "ravishingly beautiful," and "gorgeously alluring." And then how could a guy live with himself?

But to other and more practical matters, County Agent J. M. Cooper says he has never seen in this part of the country such a corn crop as is now maturing.

Apparently Eastland County and adjoining areas got just the right combination of rain and drouth this spring and early summer, the result, because there are a number of corn fields in the county that look as if they will yield at least 50 bushel to the acre, which is some corn in these here parts. It would be pretty good corn in other parts of the real corn-growing belt.

The weather has only part of the credit for the corn crop. The credit goes to the farmers who are using improved methods for cultivation, and to the new hybrid corn seed especially developed for Texas climate.

In a way, it's a shame that more corn isn't being raised in the county this year, but of course the farmer who could look ahead in the early spring and dope out which crop would yield a bumper return would be wealthy in a few years, and I haven't seen any farmers who were wealthy after a few years, or were wealthy period. But with stock feed as short as it is this year, and with poultry prices faced with unprecedented advances, the more corn that can be raised around here, the better for everyone.

And I for one like good old corn sticks and cornbread every day in a while. But have you

League To Seek Improved Water Supply For City

A work program for the year including efforts to improve the water supply and quality in Eastland, efforts to improve the Negro school situation here, continuation of efforts to improve the appearance and cleanliness of Eastland, and several annual projects of various kinds, was discussed and for the most part decided on at a program planning breakfast and meeting of executive officers and committee chairmen of the Civic League and Garden Club in the home of Mrs. Frank Castleberry Wednesday morning.

Mrs. James Horton was named chairman of a group to meet with the City Commission on the water situation.

Members present said it was a shame to encourage the beautification of Eastland by the planting of shrubs, gardens and lawns, and then to fail to make plenty of water available at low rates, as the city has in the past, to make the greenery grow as it should.

Another committee, the group's already constituted inter-racial committee, headed by Mrs. Pat Crawford, was instructed to meet with the Eastland School Board to see if something could not be done to improve standards in the local Negro school.

One suggestion that has been offered by Negro mothers of school children in Eastland, it was said, is that the Negro schools in Eastland, Cisco and Ranger be consolidated so there can be a larger teaching staff and increased number of classes.

The local colored school now has only one teacher for all grades from first through high school, it was said.

Mrs. Ben Hamner was announced as the new recording secretary, with all other major officers, including Mrs. Castleberry as president, to serve another year.

Cisco Awarded Stock Show By County Association

After bidding by Eastland, Cisco and Ranger, Cisco Monday was awarded the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association annual livestock show for a period of five years.

The show has been alternated between the three towns, but last fall the association began a quest for a permanent show site, and finally wound up by asking the three towns for proposals.

Cisco's Junior Chamber of Commerce sponsored the organization of the Cisco Livestock Show Association, \$6,000 was raised with which to erect barns and pens, and the Jaycees of Cisco pledged \$500 for the first year's prize money. City of Cisco agreed to donate six acres of land on the Lake Cisco highway, with other land pledged when and if needed.

At a meeting in Eastland Saturday, the special stock show committee of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, along with other interested individuals including merchants, decided to stand on Eastland's original proposal to raise \$5,000 for the stock show if the stock raisers would raise another 5,000.

Jobless Veterans Outnumber Others In Eastland Area

Unemployed veterans outnumber employed civilian workers by approximately three to one in the Eastland area, W. H. Donathan, district supervisor for Texas Unemployment Compensation Commission, reported, comparing veteran unemployment with individuals receiving civilian unemployment insurance. He said that the veterans were searching for jobs themselves and that the employment service was aiding but that churches, civic clubs, and merchants associations were needed to help solve this major reconversion problem — the re-employment of war veterans.

In the Eastland area there are 121 unemployed civilian workers filing claims for unemployment benefits, and 429 unemployed veterans. The latter are receiving readjustment allowances under the G. I. Bill of Rights, which is administered by the TUCC in Texas through agreement with the Veterans' Administration. Payments under the G. I. Bill comes from monies supplied by the VA out of congressional appropriations for that purpose.

Our economy will be unbalanced until these veterans find jobs, Donathan declared, explaining that this was not only a local problem but nationwide. Everyone has to help because our post-war economy is not absorbing them fast enough. These young veterans want the kind of jobs on which they can build a future, get married, raise a family, he said.

Donathan said that in the few instances the veterans have refused suitable jobs, their allowances have been stopped as provided in the G. I. Bill.

Meat, Milk, Butter Costs To Advance If Agency Stays Out

Eastland residents, many of whom were fearful with people all over the United States of skyrocketing prices with the end of OPA, saw the price line held here generally pretty well this week during the first few days of the post-war OPA-less America.

As the Senate moved Thursday to join the House in some sort of an OPA extension, most Eastland merchants expressed confidence that the price line could be held within reason at the local level, but said they could not predict what manufacturers and jobbers would or would not do in case the OPA is not revived.

Cattle reached an all-time high price level in the Chicago market, reflecting the demand for meat at any price in the meat-hungry East and Mid-west, but as of Wednesday when stores closed for the Fourth of July holiday, meat prices had not increased appreciably in Eastland.

However, some increases in some items such as meat and dairy products seemed inevitable in face of the fact that the government has been supporting those prices by subsidies that went off with the OPA.

J. P. Kilgore, owner of the Eastland Creamery, said he had not advanced prices on anything his firm sells, but that price increases will have to come soon if the OPA stays out, since the government in effect has been paying two cents of the cost of every quart of milk sold to the public.

The same thing is true of butter and cheese.

Dry goods, furniture and other retail establishments in Eastland were holding the price line, and the J. C. Penney store here went on with plans for a clearance sale which is advertised in this issue of The Record, despite the fanfare about skyrocketing prices.

Many persons in Eastland apparently were ready for OPA to stay dead, but others were greatly afraid that increasing pressure on Eastern manufacturers and wholesalers would cause increased levels of prices in most lines, which in turn would create the demand for still higher wages, leading to strikes which would create new scarcities and lift the inflation spiral still higher.

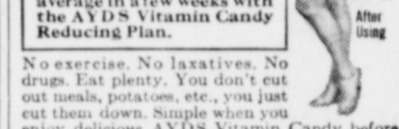

Burkett Announces For Legislature, Tells Of Platform

Omar Burkett, former state representative from Eastland County, this week authorized The Record to announce his candidacy for election as state representative of the 106th District comprising Eastland County only.

In his announcement he said: "My position on public questions is very well known to most of the people of Eastland County, but for the convenience of those who have not had the opportunity to familiarize themselves with my Legislative Record, I submit the following short statement:

"For the improvement of public education which includes increase in teachers' salaries, increase in the per capita apportionment, more funds for rural aid and adequate state aid for our junior colleges, I gave my full support.

"During my service as a Legislator, I voted for but one tax measure: House Bill 8, and I assure you, nothing less than a public calamity would induce me to support another tax measure or tax increase of any character at this time, as I positively see no good reason for upping of any tax in these perilous times.
