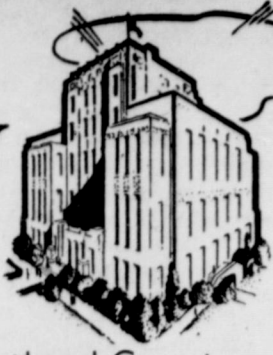

Side Issues

After a trip to Kermit in far west Texas last week end, I can report that Eastland County just looks like it's dry here.

Driving back east, there was almost not a single green blade of grass to be seen between Kermit and Baird—a very long piece of territory.

Cotton is burning up in the fields, and feed crops in lots of areas are doing little if any better.

Joe Pickle, managing editor of the Big Spring Herald, told me that 60 per cent of the Howard county cotton crop already has been given up as a total loss, over a month before time to mature.

Much of the western half of Texas is in the same shape, or worse. In some parts, they tell me, there isn't wasn't enough moisture to get any crops this year—and no rain has fallen since.

While all this is going on, I hear that farmers in the Mississippi delta region are despairing of having any crops because of too much rain. It has rained and kept on raining there.

Mankind has been wringing his hands over the whys and wherefores of such antics of nature since there has been a mankind, I suppose, and although the scientists now can give us some of the answers as to why, they seem to be unable to do just as much about changing the weather as the famous "nobody" in Mark Twain's famous story about everybody talking about and nobody doing anything about it.

Meanwhile, the farmers and stockmen of Eastland County are gazing the clear blue skies with anxious eyes, but with a few exceptions seem to be in pretty good shape yet as to moisture. Some of the earlier planted peanuts are beginning to reach the stage where the lack of rain is hurting them some, and all peanuts and other crops will have to have some moisture before very much to avoid serious damage, but the situation is not yet disastrous, and it is further west, or even critical, yet. As they say in referring to hospital patients, we could call serious but not critical.

Meaning the patient is not about to die, but is hurting pretty bad.

Last week in the story The Record ran about the election, there was a notable omission in the failure to mention the results in the county Commissioners race in Precinct 1, in which the incumbent, Henry Davenport, and Ed Castleberry went into a runoff, eliminating Earl Blackwell.

The omission certainly was not intentional, and was for once not my fault, except that of course everything that goes into the paper is my fault if someone doesn't like it.

But I wrote into my story of the outcome of the story on the election the outcome of the race for the county commissioners post, and somehow in getting the story set up, the item was left out, and I found out afterward that I wasn't making friends or influencing people the way I had rather.

But to anyone interested, I'm sorry the item was left out, and an assure you that it was just one of those things that every so often make newspaper editors form resolves to move to desert islands for the rest of their lives.

In lieu of a high school band, which the school board says it is unable to support, the organization of a town band by E. J. Pryor and others to play at football games and on similar occasions seems to me to be a fine and spirited gesture on the part of those involved, and I am sure they will win the plaudits of the people of Eastland.

I personally have always thought that there are more important things in the educational world than bands of football either, and yet a large group of our citizens have gotten a lot of education out of both.

Anyway, I'm for E. J. and his band, and I hope the day is not so far distant when there will be an Eastland High School band once more.

Temperature Hits Maximum Of 107 Two Days In Row

Eastland's temperatures, after a relapse into the 90's last week, climbed again over the week end and reached near stratospheric heights Tuesday and Wednesday.

Weatherman J. A. Beard reported that the maximum for both Tuesday and Wednesday was 107, with the maximum last Friday was 98, Saturday 101, Sunday 103 and Monday 103.

Last year's high mark until later in the year than this was 103, and in the third week of August the year's high of 109 was reached.

This year, new heat and dry weather records have been set in many parts of West Texas where official full-time weather observers keep statistics on such things.

In Eastland, Beard is official weather observer, but does not keep such things as annual records, and comparisons with past years. His sole duty is to keep daily records and send in daily reports to a central office.

The hot dry weather already had burned up most gardens, was drying out grass in pastures, and was causing apprehension among peanut growers, who said a rain will be needed soon if peanuts are to bear well.

Eastland County watermelons, mostly planted late, were stunted by the dry weather and were not as large as they could have been.

Serenity Marks County Convention Of Democrats

All was serene Saturday as the Democratic Party of Eastland County held its post-election convention in Eastland and voted in perfect harmony to support the nominees of the party in the runoff primary, and to support the choice of the governor nominee, whether it be Rainey or Jester, in selecting state executive committeemen for the party and other state party officers.

Delegates to the state party convention in San Antonio, chosen at the county convention, were instructed to vote as a unit on the basis of the above-mentioned attitudes.

After B. W. Patterson had refused the chairmanship of the convention, J. J. Kelley of Ranger was chosen permanent chairman, with Pearl Donaway of Dothan as secretary.

Fred Brown of Eastland was appointed chairman of a committee on delegates, with R. L. Ponsler of Cisco, Dr. G. C. Boswell of Ranger, F. S. Perry of Gorman and Raymond Gray of Rising Star as other members.

Resolutions committeemen appointed were Earl Conner, Sr., of Eastland, L. R. Pearson of Ranger, and B. W. Patterson of Eastland.

County Veterans School Setup Called Best In State

Band Is Organized To Take Place Of High School Group

Organization of an Eastland town band to play at football games and other functions in place of the non-existent Eastland High School Band was completed at a meeting in the high school auditorium Wednesday evening.

First practice of the new organization, which is open to any musicians who wish to play in it, will be held in the high school at 7:30 p. m. Monday.

Director of the band and its guiding spirit is E. J. Pryor, who once played in the Eastland High band when there was one. Several years ago, as an economy measure, the high school band director's place was not filled, and since then the school band has been dormant.

Pryor's call for the meeting Wednesday was answered by 23 musicians, largely of high school age. Pryor said he feels certain the organization later will have 40 to 50 members.

He said the brasses are pretty well represented in the lineup so far, but that there is an urgent need for at least two bass horn players and two French horn players. Instruments from the high school are on hand to be played.

More saxophone players, complete with saxophones, also could be used, he said.

Major purpose of the band will be to play at football games, and perhaps its first appearance will be at the dedication ceremony set for the improved Maverick Field Sept. 6, to dedicate the lights donated by the Quarterback Club and the stands put up by the School Board.

However, Pryor said if response is good to the call for players, the band may stage a short concert on the Courthouse Square some evening before the September 6 date.

Pryor has organized and directed several dance bands, and plays most of the brass instruments. He is assistant manager at Burr's Store.

The band will remain organized as long as it is needed and the membership remains intact. Pryor said. Whether it will be a marching band depends on the uniform situation, which remains to be clarified.

Progress Shown On Erection Of Clay Products Plant Here

Good progress was shown this week on construction of the Eastland Haydite plant of the Texas Lightweight Aggregate Company after numerous delays had intervened to slow down the work at earlier stages.

Huge rotary kilns in which the clay material will be baked arrived early in the week, but sat on railroad sidings for lack of a railroad spur line to the plant.

But Thursday, T. & P. workmen were laying the spur line, and a few more days will see great changes at the plant site, officials said.

Workmen at the plant were laying cement blocks for a building that will be used first for an office and later for a tool house when an office is constructed of Haydite blocks the company will make in Dallas from the material produced in the Eastland plant.

Work was going also on a structure that will house screening machinery to prepare clay for the kilns.

The kilns, huge pipe-like affairs, came divided in halves, and will be welded together at the site.

Wheat Insurance Deadline Is Set

Application for winter wheat insurance must be made at the County Agricultural Conservation office in the Courthouse before August 31, Emmitt E. Powell, administrator, said this week.

Federal Crop Insurance is an all-risk insurance to protect a farmer's investment against crop losses from unavoidable hazards. Powell said. The hazards are those which farmers, no matter how careful, cannot control—drought, flood, winterkill, hail, insects and other natural causes of crop loss.

Protection can be obtained under the insurance to cover a specified number of bushels, according to the farmer's needs.

Application may be made for insurance by any farmer, landlord or tenant on his crop share.

18-Year-Olds Still Not Signing Up

Despite a previous notice by the Eastland County Selective Service Board that 18-year-old youths are required to register for Selective Service on their 18th birthday, numerous such youths still are failing to register, the local board said this week.

It was pointed out that failure to register is punishable, upon conviction, by fine or imprisonment, or both.

Lights, Stadium At Football Field To Be Dedicated

A dedication program for the new lights and bleachers at Maverick Field was planned this week by members of the Eastland Quarterback Club, who raised the money and obtained the materials for putting up the lights. Many of the members spent many hours of their time working on the project.

The ceremony as planned will be held Friday night, Feb. 6, just one week before the opening of the Eastland High School football season.

As outlined tentatively at a meeting of the Quarterback Club at Firemen's Field after a softball game Tuesday night, the program will consist of a formal turning over of the lights to the School Board by officers of the club; an introduction of the players on the 1946 high school football squad, probably by Coach John E. Little.

Some numbers by the newly organized Eastland town band, and a scrimmage session between two squads of high school football players.

Other numbers may be added later, since the discussion so far has been on a highly tentative basis, particularly since Little and Assistant Coach John D. Harvey are in Corpus Christi attending a state coaching school.

The School Board and Quarterback Club went 50-50 in paying the coaches' expenses to the school. President Conrad Reeves of the club said it will be necessary to charge admission to the dedication program, so the club can meet a deficit in erecting the lights.

Like everything else, the project cost more than was anticipated, and the club's funds are depleted, he said.

The club has taken in over 300 members at a dues payment of \$5 each, and raised about \$900 at the minstrel show held last spring.

Finishing touches were being put on the new lights and new stands at the field this week, and Reeves said the floodlights for the light stands are in town, ready to erect.

Absentee Ballot Deadline August 20

August 20 will be the last day to cast absentee ballots for the runoff primary to be held August 24, County Democratic Chairman Oscar Lyerla reminded voters this week.

Absentee ballots may be cast at any time before then with the county clerk by those who are going to be absent from the county the day of the election.

A relatively heavy second primary vote is expected, especially in view of the interest in the sheriff's race, commissioners' runoffs, and the fact there will be a runoff in the governor's race for the first time since 1934.

Lyerla reminded candidates in the runoffs that second expense reports are due to be filed with the proper authority between Aug. 12 and 16. County candidates file the reports with the county clerk, and district candidates with the district clerk.

Progress of Institution Hailed By A & M Professor Here For Study And Analysis

The Eastland County Vocational School, organized less than a year ago as one of the pioneer institutions of its kind in the state for vocational training of World War II veterans now ranks as the best of 91 similar schools in Texas, E. V. Walton, professor of Agricultural Education at Texas A. & M. College, said in Eastland Thursday.

Walton has been here two weeks analyzing the county program and giving advice and help in the development of several parts of the program.

Veterans Enrolled In School Seeking Farms As Tenants

Landowners who are seeking young ambitious hard-working tenants may find them through the Eastland County Vocational School for Veterans, M. D. Fox, director, said this week.

Over 75 returned veterans are enrolled in agriculture in the school, he said, and the men are making farming their vocation. They receive training in farm management, farm shop, soil and water conservation, livestock and poultry production and producing a living at home under the supervision of skilled agriculture teachers.

The veterans agree to enter into a farm and home improvement program and to devote 94 hours per month upon new and improve farm practices.

Many of them are eligible for this training for four years. They receive from \$65 to \$90 per month under the G. I. Bill of Rights. Many of them use subsistence money for the purchase of livestock, poultry and farm equipment, in order to farm more efficiently.

Fox explained that all veterans enrolled in the school are now either farm owners or tenants, but that others would be eligible for training if proper farms could be located. Veterans want farms that give promise of profitable returns.

The Soil Conservation Service, Farm Security, Extension Service, and Vocational Agriculture teachers are cooperating in this training.

Landowners who are interested in securing one of the veteran tenants may write or personally contact Fox at the Eastland office in the Sinclair Prairie Building.

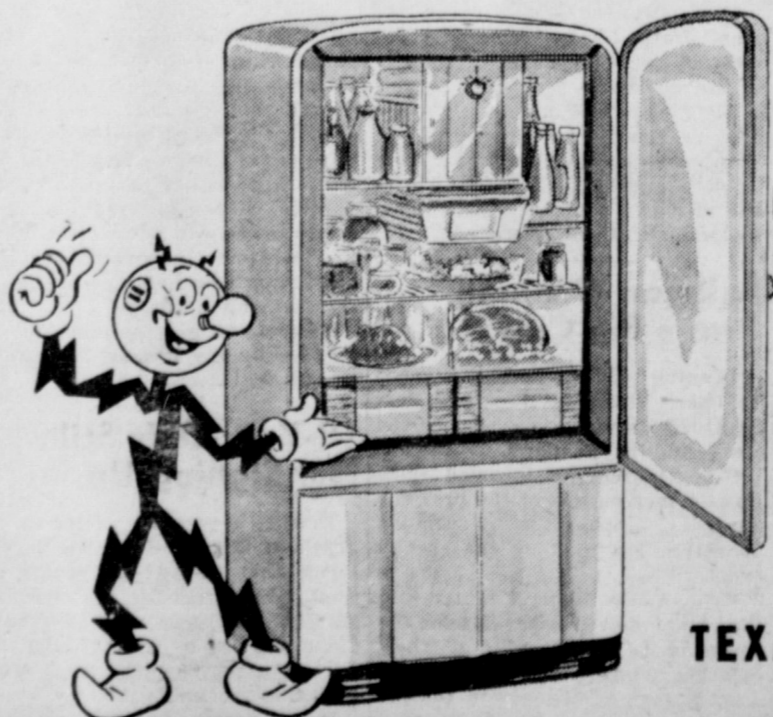

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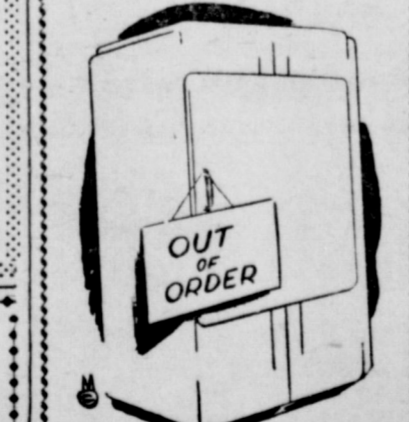

Demobilization of Army Enlisted Personnel

FORT SAM HOUSTON. — The complete program for discharge of non-volunteer, enlisted personnel under the criteria first announced June 29 upon the signing of the new selective service act, as announced by the War Dept., was made public today at Fourth Army Headquarters.

The following provisions now govern demobilization of Army enlisted personnel:

- 1. All non-volunteer, enlisted fathers will be separated by Sept. 30, 1946, regardless of length of service.
2. All non-volunteer, enlisted men with 20 months service as of Sept. 30, will be separated by that date.
3. Beginning October 1, all non-volunteer enlisted men with 18 months of service as of November 30 will be eligible for separation and will be separated by November 30.
4. All non-volunteer enlisted men who accumulate 18 months of service in a month subsequent to November will be separated by the last day of the month in which they accumulate 18 months of service.
5. Until September 30, the same discharge criteria will apply to enlisted women as to enlisted men. All non-volunteer WAC per-

sonnel whose term of service will expire by June 30, 1947, were encouraged during the month of July to volunteer until June 30, 1947, or for the duration of emergency plus six months.

WAC enlisted personnel assigned to general hospitals which are scheduled to close by Dec. 31, 1946, who do not desire to volunteer until June 30, 1947, were urged to volunteer for active duty until completion of their present assignments.

Effective Oct. 1, 1946, all WAC enlisted personnel except those volunteering for additional duty or who had previously volunteered for additional duty will be eligible for separation and will be separated by October 31.

The previously announced criteria for officers remains unchanged. Computation of length of service will include total active commissioned or enlisted honorable service, continuous or interrupted, since Sept. 16, 1940.

The War Department directive defines "father" as any enlisted man who has a child or children dependent upon him for support and with whom he maintains a bona-fide family relationship in the home. The term "child" is further defined to include a child

legally adopted, a stepchild, a foster child, and a person who is supported in good faith by the individual in a relationship similar to that of a parent to a child. It does not include any person 18 years of age or over unless such person is physically or mentally handicapped.

Certified true copies of a birth certificate or an affidavit of a disinterested person constitutes documentary proof of fatherhood. It is the responsibility of the individual concerned to obtain such proof and submit it at the time or prior to reporting to a separation center.

Veterans Buying Greater Amounts Of War Surpluses

Veterans of World War II are now buying more than half as much surplus property in one month as they formerly bought in six months. War Assets Administrations reported today.

Sales to veterans in June accounted for 35 per cent of all consumer goods sold during the month. The total of such sales were \$221,915,000 in terms of reported cost. The veterans share was \$77,789,000 an increase of 63 per cent over the previous month. Their previous peak was \$47,795,000, or 25.2 per cent for May. In six months preceding June their total purchases amounted to \$155,968,000.

Recovery value of consumer goods sold to veterans in June was \$33,936,731, or 43.6 per cent. Eight classifications, covered nearly 75 per cent of all such sales. They were motor vehicles, 35.1 per cent, fabricated textile products, 8.7 per cent, apparel, except footwear, 6.9 per cent, tractors, 6.8 per cent,

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constructin machinery, 5.7 per cent, basic textiles, 5.7 per cent, general purpose industrial machinery, 2.7 per cent and footwear, 1.4 per cent.

The June report covers only sales of consumer goods to veterans of the WAA in the continental United States. It does not include sales to veterans of aircraft, capital and producers goods and real estate, nor sales to them by other agencies in this country or abroad.

In June Department of the Interior sales to veterans in U. S. territories and possessions totaled \$1,880,000. Department of Agriculture sales of agricultural products totaled \$1,873,000 and the Maritime Commission reported \$119,000. Purchases by veterans buying as small business through the Reconstruction Finance Corporation are estimated at \$3,000,000.

No figures are available on veterans purchases of aircraft in June, but it is believed that they bought a large share of the \$75,000,000 worth sold.

Peanut Council's Growth Is Shown By Membership

Significant of the great growth in recent years of the peanut industry in the Southwest is the increase of members from this area in the National Peanut Council. Wylie, Ranger Peanut Company, Ranger, Texas; George Homer, Denison Peanut Company, Denison, Texas; W. M. Durham, Durham Pecan & Peanut Company, Comanche, Texas; and Ralph McMillan, Bristow Peanut Company, Bristow, Okla.

The National Peanut Council is an association composed of growers, shellers, brokers, peanut butter manufacturers, confectioners, in fact, all of those whose businesses are in whole or part concerned with peanuts. The Council's ing consumption of peanuts and major objectives include increasing peanut products through national advertising and promotion and improving through research, the acre yield and the quality of peanuts and peanut products. Launching its first consumer advertising early this year, the Council is currently running full-color ads in national magazines. On the research side, the Council can list as recent accomplishments a new stabilizing agent to prevent oil separation in peanut butter, work on longer shelf-life for peanuts and peanut products, insect control studies, flavor retention data, improved harvesting techniques, patent surveys, new peanut foods and investigations and evaluation of roasting methods to retain the thiamin content of peanuts.

Acreage in the Southwestern area has increased from 453,000 acres to more than a million acres during the six years since the National Peanut Council was formed in 1940. This increased acreage along with the steadily rising price of peanuts over this same period brought an income in 1945 of more than \$38,000,000 to Southwestern growers.

Among the officers of the National Peanut Council, the Southwestern area is represented by J. D. Sargent of Tolar, Texas, who is president of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association and vice-president of the National Peanut Council. Advice Given On Ways To Prevent Getting Diabetes

AUSTIN—Despite the fact that modern medicine can do much to help the diabetic live out a normal life span, nevertheless diabetes took a toll of several hundred lives in Texas during the past year, according to Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer.

"While the communicable diseases such as typhoid fever, malaria, diphtheria and smallpox are annually causing a decreasing number of deaths in this country, diabetes is still taking a tragic number of human lives each year, especially in the middle aged group," Dr. Cox said.

"Until recent years diabetes was not noted as a major health problem, but it became accepted as such in direct ratio to the development of medical laboratory procedures, which made the disease more easily diagnosed."

Dr. Cox said that diabetes is generally recognized as a class disease. It seems to attack the white collar class of indoor men and women much more frequently than it does the outdoor person whose work is more vigorous and calls for more exercise. Whatever the actual cause of the disease may be, vocational and economic conditions are factors, since it seems a fact that those who do not indulge in luxurious living and whose occupations call for manual labor are not frequently affected.

Dr. Cox said simple, wholesome diets, sufficient exercise and sleep are factors in the prevention of diabetes, and an annual physical examination, especially in middle aged persons, is important so that if the disease is present, competent treatment can be instituted while the disease is in its early stage.

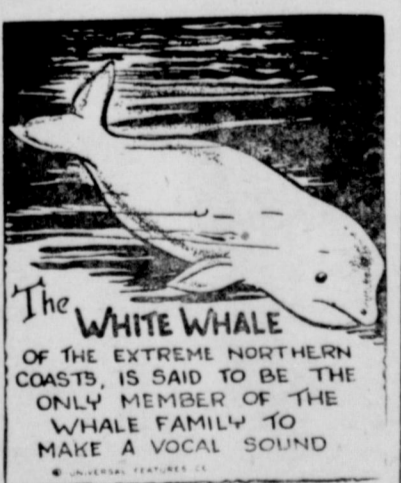

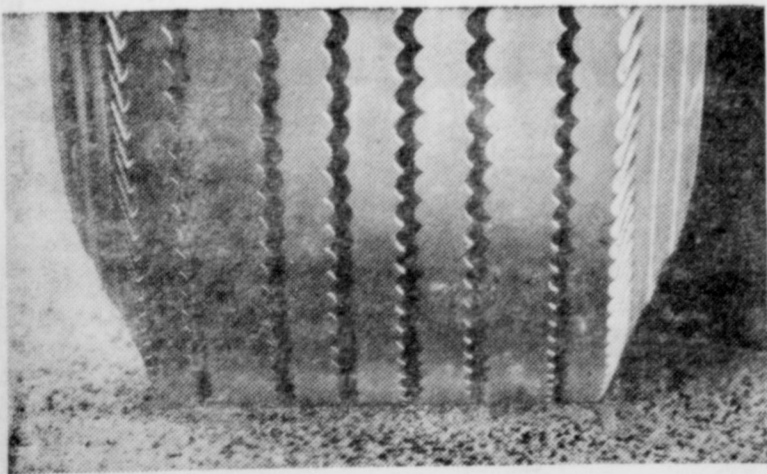

H. J. R. No. 40 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to an Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 7-a"; providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from the taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicles registration fees shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; and for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1-4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect January 1, 1945; negativing any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; and providing for the proclamation of the election and the publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows:

"Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicle registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-ways, constructing, maintaining, and policing such public roadways, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the Legis-

lature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund under existing law, provided, however, that one-fourth (1-4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and, provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each County and the percentage allowed to be retained by each County under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held in November, 1946, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1-4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect January 1, 1945; and negativing any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto

vide preliminary financing for the school that was being vocational education to the farms, offices, and shops. Men like County Superintendent, Homer Smith, W. P. Roach, J. Frank Dean, Mrs. Ulala Burnett, Dr. P. M. Kuykendall and Tobe Morton, members of the County School Board, and K. E. Tanner, Fred Brown, R. L. Ponsler, J. J. Kelley, Cecil Shults, and T. O. Shelley, members of the advisory board, set their brains and hands to work on this program as a result of the recommendation of influential businessmen to provide the returned GI the needed and desired refresher and vocational training to readjust him to his new civilian job.

They chose a quiet young man, Marshal D. Fox, holder of B. S. and M. E. Degrees from Texas A. & M. College, as their director. Young Fox has a genius for organization and hard work. He had a wonderful record as a vocational agriculture teacher and superintendent before he put on a Navy uniform.

The board of directors and Fox decided that they would employ the best instructors obtainable. All of the instructors were college graduates with a lot of experience in their fields. Most of them are veterans. They brought the education the ex-GI's needed to Eastland, Rising Star, Gorman, Cisco, and Ranger. Classes in Agriculture, Trades and Distributive Education were taught. The Veterans Administration paid the bill under the provisions of the GI Bill of Rights.

Young farmers enrolled in agriculture plan their farms for the best returns. They meet in groups and study the best methods of soil conservation, caring for livestock, pasture improvement, food production, farm record keeping, and farm shop. They devote 10 1/2 hours per week to group instruction either in a classroom, out on a farm, or visiting experiment stations. In addition, they are visited weekly by their instructors for two hours of individual instruction. They agree to devote 96 hours per month to new and improved practices on their farms. Their wives are assisted by a home counsellor, Mrs. Hazel Hickman, who has a long and successful record in home economics and home demonstration work. Mrs. Hickman can speak their language; she was "drafted" from her farm home near Rising Star, after recently leaving the State Extension Service to settle down to put into practice what she has been teaching.

Advisory committees of citizens are set up for Agriculture, Trades and Industries, and Distributive Education. The committees are composed of successful farmers, tradesmen, and businessmen. Instructors advise with them frequently.

Veterans pursuing a course of study in the Eastland County Vocational School receive from 65 to 90 dollars per month for subsistence. They are using the money received to buy groceries, farm implements, livestock, and seed. No veteran is kept enrolled who does not make satisfactory progress in his train-

ing program. At the present time 335 veterans are receiving training which is designed to assist them to become established in their vocation. They are making up for the time spent in the jungles, in the air, on the seas, and on the battlefields of half the world.

A milestone in education has been laid by Eastland County people in the building of useful permanent citizens. At the same time over a quarter of a million dollars a year is being injected into the blood stream of the county that has known the rise and fall of oil and has returned to the basic business of agriculture, trade and industry.

Navy Deadline Set On Transfer From Officers' Reserve

NEW ORLEANS, August—Deadline for applications of U. S. Naval Reserve officers for transfer to the regular Navy has been established for September 15, 1946, Eight Naval District Headquarters has announced.

Naval Reserve and temporary USN officers, including officers on active duty, terminal leave and those eligible who are on inactive duty, who desire transfer to the regular Navy, must submit their

applications on or before the deadline. Applications received at district headquarters on or before September 15 will be processed through the local board of review and forwarded to the Navy's Bureau of Personnel for action.

The deadline does not apply to officers who request transfer to the regular Navy as law specialists, officers who will have completed less than one year's commissioned service on September 15 and officers who receive their first commission after September 15, the Navy said.

Officers who are applying for transfer to the regular Navy as chief warrant or warrant officers are not included in this category since the deadline for such applications was previously set at July

20, 1946. Applicants who are now on inactive duty or terminal leave should address correspondence to Commandant, Eighth Naval District, Federal Building, New Orleans, 12, La., Navy officials said.
