His successor for the unexpired term which ends in January will be named by the Commissioners Court and a Democratic nominee to be voted on in the general election in November will be chosen by the Eastland County Democratic Executive Committee.

County Judge Lewis Crossley said the court may wait until after Saturday when the committee meets, and name for the unexpired term the same man the committee chooses as nominee.

County Democratic Chairman Oscar Lyerla said that if Karkalits' official withdrawal is received, the ommittee scheduled to meet Saturday to canvass the run-off returns, will take up the matter of a nominee if enough committeemen are present.

Lyerla said he feels that before such a matter is taken up, at least half of the 27 committeemen should be present.

There was some sentiment for naming Neil Day of Eastland, who was defeated by Karkalits in the first primary, for the place on the ticket.

An aspirant also was Paul Farrow, who has served under Karkalits in the tax office for several years. Farrow lives in Cisco.
