A U.S. CONGRESSMAN made an interesting proposal that was carried in the press recently.

The proposition was that citizens be given a reduced postage rate, say two cents per letter, when they are writing to their congressmen.

This would amount to more or less a "franking" privilege in reverse. As it stands, congressmen are allowed to send their mail (as long as it isn't campaign material) free of charge.

This particular congressman apparently feels that more people would write to their congressmen (or to more congressmen) if the postage expense was not so high.

This might not be such a bad idea. We were aware of a person recently who decided that in order to get their particular point noticed, they would write to every member of congress. In doing that, you would have to send right at 500 pieces of mail. At today's first class rate, that would run close to \$100, just for the postage alone.

It is an interesting point, and it's hard to say if it would be worth the taxpayer investment or not.

A COVER STORY on a national magazine (*Newsweek*) last week posed the possibility that "Your next boss might be Japanese."

Before you scoff at the idea, look at what the Japanese have done in recent years.

While most Americans are concerned about the big trade deficit that the U.S. has with Japan (\$60 billion) as well as other countries, Japanese investors were moving to America and starting companies here on our own soil.

Japanese companies now employ around 250,000 Americans, the article pointed out, and in the same breath predicted that in ten years the number would pass the million mark.

Japan has a two-pronged reason for establishing companies in America. One is the fact that at present, the value of the dollar to the yen makes it unprofitable to export items from Japan.

In addition, if congress should restrict Japanese imports with protectionist laws (which many people feel they should do), their American factories would allow these Japanese companies to continue selling here.

Who are the Japanese companies, and where are they located? Honda Motor Company of America, located in Marysville, Ohio, employs 2,500. Hitachi operates a plant at Norman, Oklahoma, and Bridgestone Tire has a big plant it opened recently in Tennessee.

Japan's Sony Corp. has 7,000 American employees, Matsushita Electric employs around 8,000, and California First Bank has another 4,000 employees.

Toyota has 2,347 American employees, and Nissan Motors works 3,300. Other Japanese companies with American plants include Konica, Sharp, Toshiba, Kyocera and Mitsui.

Economists feel that this may only be the tip of the iceberg. If so, our trade deficit may become a moot point.

Question: would it be worse to have a nuclear waste repository located in our "back yard," or face the prospects of having all big business being foreign-owned? Either one is a pretty sobering prospect.

Fillies Meet Happy Thursday In District Playoff Game

Bovina High School's Fillies will enter the basketball playoffs against Happy's girls on Thursday at the West Texas State Fieldhouse. The game begins at 7:30 p.m.

A preliminary game will pit the WTSU women vs Eastern New Mexico University's women's team. This game starts at 5 p.m., and fans may watch both games for one admission price.

The playoff game will determine the number two seed in District 5-1A behind Nazareth. The Fillies finished second in the first round of play with a 4-1 record, but fell to Happy in the second round.

"I think the girls will be ready to play. We got out of our game when we played them at Happy (the team lost by 13 points). If we're able to handle their full-court press, we should do fairly well," said Fillies' coach Marks Lanham.

The first time the teams met in district play, at Bovina, the Fillies scored a fairly easy win. They led the game by as much as 24 points before winning by seven.

The Fillies are led by their two-pronged scoring attack of Mindy Neal and Peggy Shepherd, both averaging right at 20 points per game.

If the Fillies win, they would advance to the bi-district round of the playoffs, and would meet the Valley High School girls. If Bovina wins, the bi-district game is tentatively set for Tuesday, February 17 at Olton.

The Valley girls have a pair of big girls, over six feet, so would match up pretty well with the Fillies on size. Valley has a 16-8 season record. The Fillies are 18-7, and the Happy girls are 20-7.

The Mustangs finished in a tie for second place in the second half of the district standings with a 3-2 record. However, Farwell, the team with whom the Mustangs tied, will advance to the playoffs, since they placed second outright in the first round.

The Fillies took advantage of free throws in the third quarter to make the game interesting by halftime. Bovina hit 12 of 13 shots from the line in the second quarter, as Coach Marks Lanham's crew outscored the Swifts, 16-6, to pull to within seven points, 29-22 at the intermission.

Nazareth came back with a good third quarter, outscoring the Fillies, 11-4, to retake the momentum. The Fillies had the

edge in the final quarter, but the 14-point deficit was too much for the team to make up.

Peggy Shepherd was leading scorer with 22 points, and Mindy Neal had 11.

Once again in the boys' game, the Swifts started fast, and held a 14-6 lead at the end of the first quarter.

He was preceded in death by one son, Freddie Segovia, in 1977.

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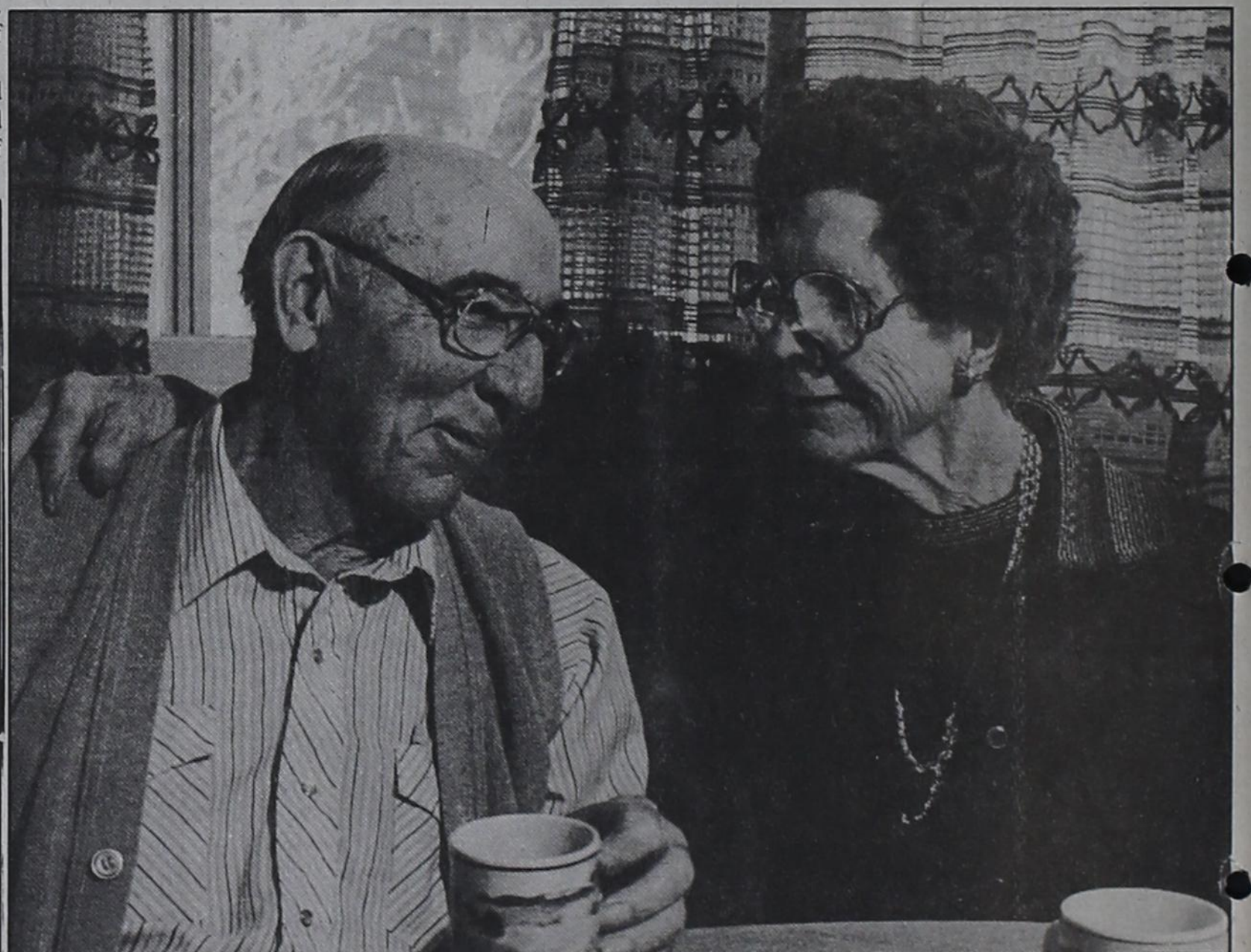
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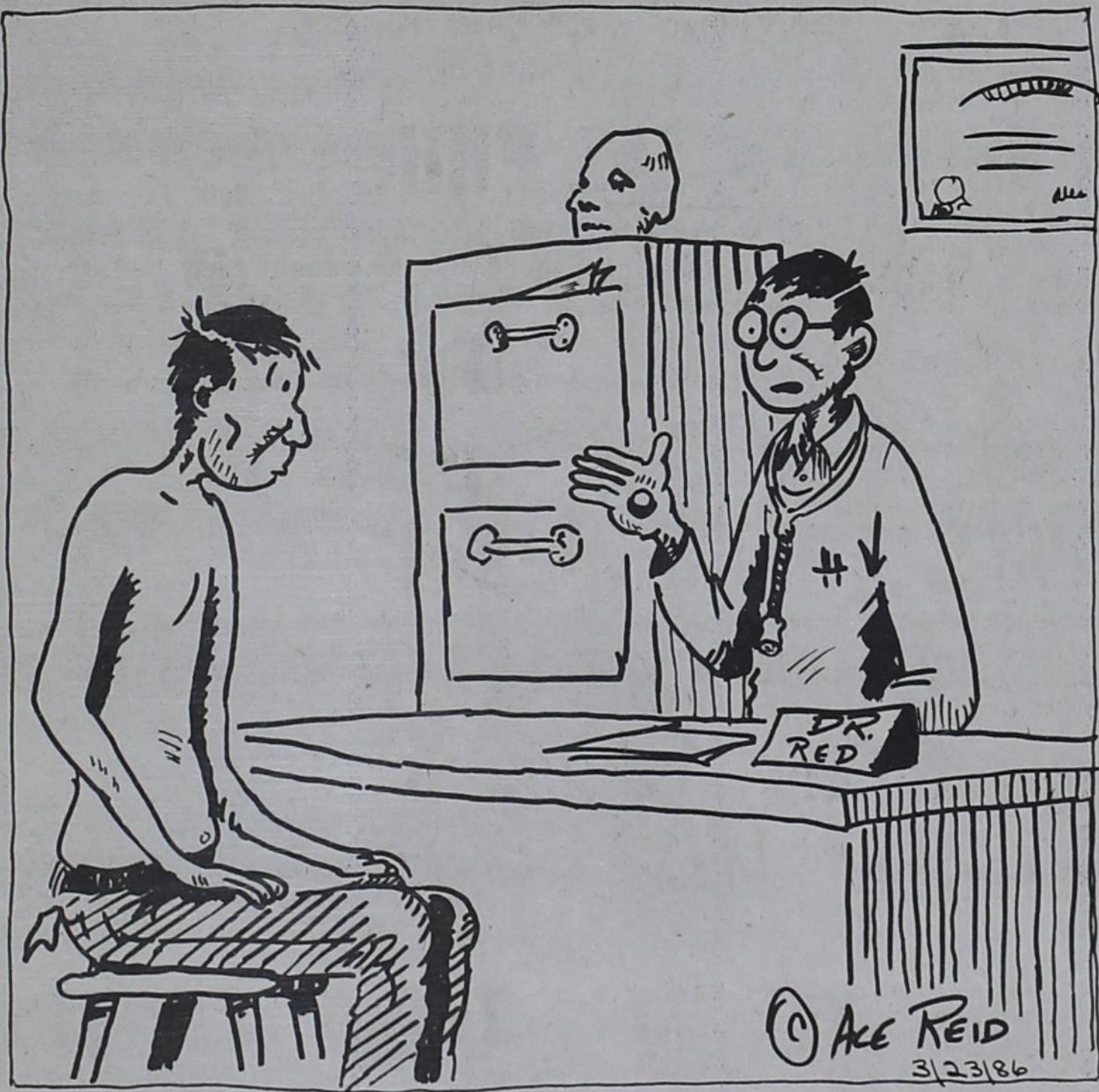

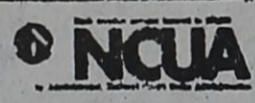
