Eastland is practically seething with new business and industrial activity of various sorts, and the ending this week end of the new Earnest store and food locker marks some sort of a milestone in the progress of a town.

\$10,000 Industrial Fund For Eastland C Of C Proposed

With much success already on the record in a drive to attract industry to Eastland, a Chamber of Commerce committee this week considered raising a \$10,000 revolving fund with which to attract still more industries.

One plant already attracted here is that of the Texas Lightweight Aggregate Company, which is scheduled to begin its first production next week. On the way is a plant of the Hollywood-Maxwell Company, to make brassieres.

The fund, which would be raised through subscription and would be a non-profit undertaking, would be used to facilitate the location of industries here. As an example, the Hollywood-Maxwell firm wanted a building of certain dimensions, and the Chamber of Commerce, without any money in sight, has underwritten a project to enlarge the Masonic Hall to accommodate the plant.

Other small industries in the past have indicated interest in locating in Eastland, said Chamber of Commerce Secretary H. J. Tanner, but have gone elsewhere when sites and buildings were not quickly available here.

Other towns in the area have such funds as the one proposed, Tanner said, specifically Mineral Wells, which used its fund to advantage, according to reports, in getting a large sewer tile plant which both Eastland and Mineral Wells were seeking.

The committee before which the fund proposal was made is a special one which has been handling negotiations on the brassiere plant.

Open House To Be Held At Locker Plant Sunday

Elaborate Setup Nearly Complete; Store To Open

Mr. and Mrs. J. O. Earnest, Sunday will hold open house from 1 to 6 p. m. in their new Clover Farm Store and Frozen Food Lockers in Eastland.

The new plant, brand new throughout and covering 9700 square feet of floor space, is one of the most elaborate of its size in the Southwest.

It represents the untiring efforts of Earnest, who has battled materials shortages all over the Southwest to get the necessary materials for putting up the building and finishing the interior. Last minute slowdowns will prevent its being entirely complete Sunday, Earnest said.

The new store is across the street and a half block down from the present Clover Farm Store. The actual floor space of the store is smaller, but better arranged and distributed, since the store was especially designed for its purpose.

In the new building are the store, grocery storeroom, and merchandise office in the front, and behind them the locker room, deep freeze vault, meat processing room, chill room, age room, pork curing room, pork storage room, vegetable vault, commercial storage vault, poultry room, abattoir or slaughtering room, two smoke-houses, lard rendering room, fruit and vegetable preparation room for use by those who wish to prepare their own produce before putting it in lockers, and machinery room.

There are 750 lockers in the locker room—row after row of them.

The new plant, with its labyrinth of rooms and corridors, is well worth inspecting, even for curiosity's sake.

Work on the new building was begun in February of this year. Earnest said the construction took twice as long as it should have, and cost about twice what he had estimated, because of the situation on materials, and to a lesser extent on labor.

Finishing touches were being put on the plant this week, and Earnest said most of it will be complete in time for the open house Sunday.

The locker plant will be the second completed in Eastland County. There has been one for some time in Cisco, and plants are under construction in Gorman and Ranger.

GI Bill Of Rights To Expire Soon

The famous GI Bill of Rights law granting education, loan and other benefits to discharged veterans, will terminate on Saturday of next week, Oct. 5, M-Sgt. Ernest E. Elmore, Eastland U. S. Army recruiting sub-station commander, said this week.

Men taken into the Army after that day will not receive full GI Bill of Rights benefits, he said, while those enlisting on or before Oct. 5 still will be entitled to full benefits of the bill.

4-H Boy Makes Neat Profit On Chickens Won In County Contest Last September

Thomas Morgan, Morton Valley 4-H Club member, has an outstanding record in raising poultry this year, reports N. R. Watkins, assistant county agent.

Thomas won fourth place with his registered Poland China gilt in the Sears Cow-Sow-Hen County show in September, 1946. The prize for fourth place was 100 baby chicks, 50 turkey eggs or 25 poulters. Young Morgan chose 100 white Leghorn chicks. When the chicks arrived Jan. 28, 1946, there were 102 chicks in the box and all were alive and healthy.

Through care, feeding and hard work, Morgan raised all of the chicks except two which were accidentally stepped on by a cow when they were 20 days old. None was lost due to diseases.

Twenty three of the cockerels and 17 of the cull pullets were eaten at home and 25 cockerels were sold. Thirty five of the best pullets have been set for laying hens for one of his next year's projects. This demonstration made Morgan a net profit of \$34.80 after all expenses were paid.

Hiram Childress Succeeds Father As Court Clerk

Hiram Childress, war veteran and graduate of Eastland High School who now is practicing law in Sweetwater, has been appointed clerk of the Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals in Eastland to succeed his father, Dan Childress, it was announced this week.

Justices of the court were emphatic in saying the appointment was not made as the result of a "deal," and that the appointment was entirely unsolicited by either Hiram Childress or his father, and came as a surprise to both of them.

Hiram Childress was born at Sweetwater and moved with his parents to Eastland in 1927, when his father was appointed clerk of the court. He graduated from Eastland High in 1934, and attended the University of Texas and Southern Methodist Law School, where he received his law degree in 1940.

After setting up practice in Sweetwater, he volunteered in 1941 as an aviation cadet. He served four and a half years in the Air Corps, two in England, France, and Belgium, and was in Germany at the time of the surrender as an intelligence officer with the 9th Air Corps.

After his discharge in December, 1945, he resumed his law practice in Sweetwater.

It was said that this is the first time in the records of the state's judiciary that a son has followed his father as clerk of a court of civil appeals.

Hiram Childress, who is unmarried, will take up his duties here after winding up his affairs in Sweetwater.

Chamberlain Firm Expands To Open Separate Agency

Simultaneous announcement of the opening of a new Willys Department of the Chamberlain Motor Company, and the showing there Saturday of the new "Jeep" Station Wagon, was made this week by Jack Chamberlain.

The new department is located in the former Lamb Motor Company building on West Main Street.

Chamberlain said his firm will continue to occupy the present building at 508 West Main Street as a Kaiser-Frazer dealership.

The new station wagon, hailed as a radical innovation, will be shown at the new location Saturday. The vehicle, made by Willys-Overland, has a larger chassis than the post-war Jeep, but incorporates many of the same features, including the motor.

It sets seven, and seats are removable for the carrying of luggage, farm produce, or other things. The body is all-steel, unlike the conventional station wagon which is partially wood.

Kaiser And Frazer Cars To Be Shown

First Eastland showing of the new Kaiser or Frazer automobiles, or both, is scheduled at the Chamberlain Motor Company Saturday. Jack Chamberlain, operator of the firm, said he had assurance he would have one or both of the cars to show, but was not certain of details.

The Kaiser, lower-priced of the sister cars, features new, advanced body lines, unprecedented seating width and increased visibility, according to advance publicity.

The car has a 100-horsepower motor, features seat cushions 62 inches wide front and rear, and has a 123 1/2 inch wheelbase.

The Frazer has many of the same features, but also has foam latex set cushions, optional overdrive, advanced springing of conventional type, and more luxurious interior trim.

Both cars are mass produced in the huge Willow Run factory which set up mass production on Liberator bombers during the war.

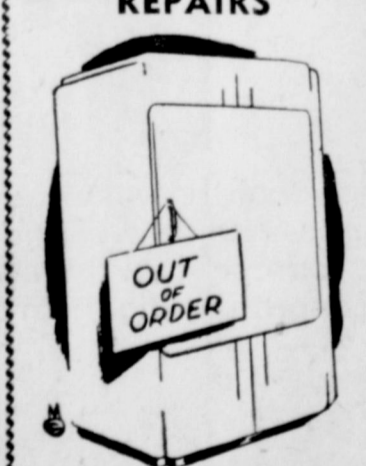

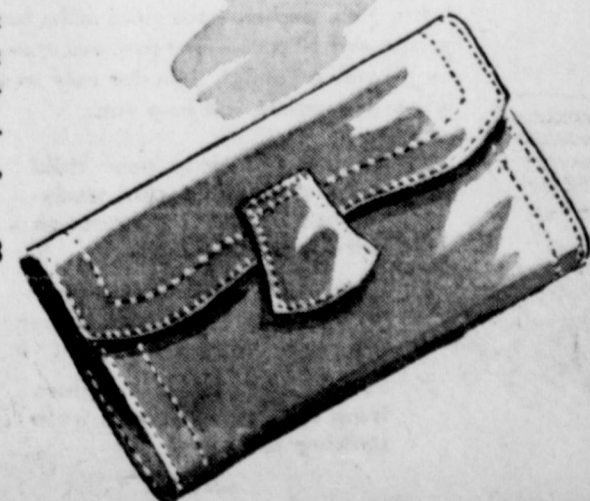

ROUND-UP OFFICERS

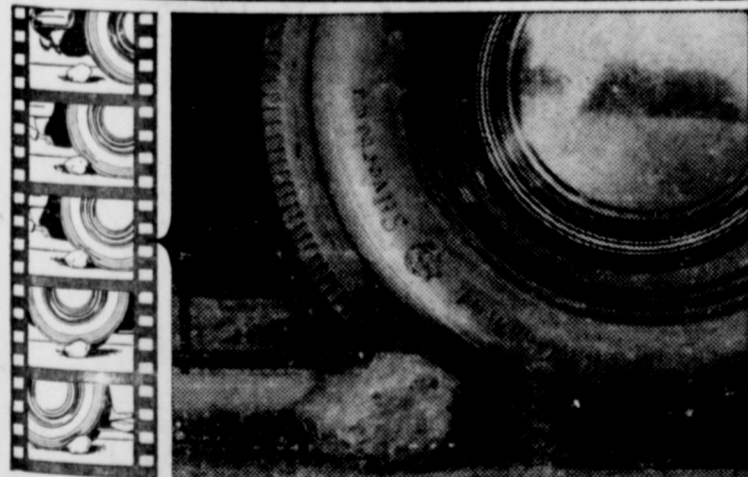
